The meat processing training program at Rivercrest provides training in the classroom and laboratory in making wholesale and retail cuts of

beef, swine and sheep. All students in production ag must complete a six month successful Supervised Occupational Experience Program to receive credit in the

This is the backbone of the FFA program. It makes things very relevant to the student and is often their first experience in owning some productive animal which is totally dependent on their care. It is probably the first time that a crop becomes a concern. The weather, prices, harvet costs, markets, become very real. Free enterprise, in other words, becomes a fact.



munity, a state, a nation! But, suffice it to say simply that Rivercrest FFA deserves a big salute from everyone...keep up the good work!





On Sunday, Mr. White and other veterans said farewell made their departures for home. Next year's reunion was set for February 18, 1989 in Mobile, Alabama.



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
