## Most Area Sales Taxes Show Drop

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that 54 cities and 81 counties that collect a half-percent local option sales tax will receive their first rebates from the tax in this month's sales tax allocation.

"Local governments whose voters adopted this tax will find extra money in this month's check," Bullock said. City rebates from the new tax are included in the monthly allocation checks Bullock mails to cities that col-

lect the optional one-percent city tax. County checks are sent at the same time.

March's checks also include rebates from two services that became taxable on January 1, data processing and real property repair and remodeling, Bullock said.

This month's rebates totaling \$52.4 million were sent to 834 cities and 81 counties that collect the local option taxes, Bullock said.

The largest city allocation this month, \$8.3 million, went to Houston.

In Lamar County, Blossom received \$537.48, compared to \$873.25 for the same period last year, for a total of \$4,515.69 to date this year.

Deport received no payment this period, compared to \$536.38 for last year's payment, marking a 10.79 percent decrease.

Paris received \$104,322.85 for a 7.30 percent increase over last year.

In Red River County, Bogata received no payment for this period, compared to \$1,119.65 for last year's payment, marking a 7.55 percent decrease over payments to date from last year.

Clarksville received \$12,743.44 for an 11.77 percent increase while Detroit received no payment this period for a 3.07 percent decrease over the same period last year.

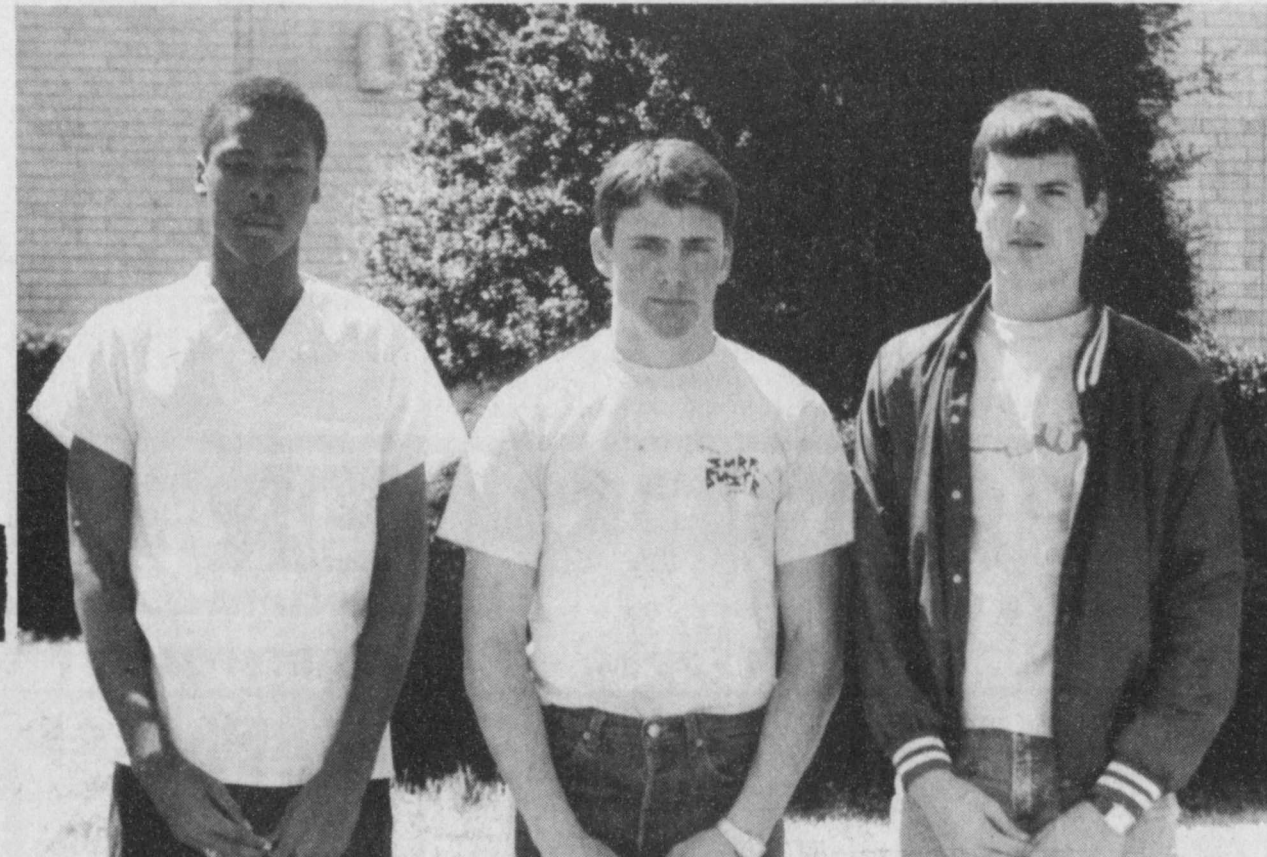
In Titus County, Mt. Pleasant received \$61,934.54 for an 8.00 percent decrease.

Talco received \$1,105.91, compared to \$1,072.92 for the same period last year, for a 14.78 percent decrease.

March's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in January and reported to the Comptroller's Office by February 22, Bullock said.

Upon investigation, policemen found blood in the car seat and on the inside of the car door. Mrs. Moorehead's purse was found in the front seat and her shoes were also found and blood trailed from the car about 60 feet.

Police were continuing the search for Mrs. Moorehead Tuesday, March 22, with bloodhounds and on horseback and dirt bikes.

Glenda Moorehead is the daughter of Clifton and Gladys Tucker of Bogata. She is 43 years of age and at-

tended Bogata School. She has three children, ages 25, 23 and 21 and has worked at the El Charro Restaurant in Tyler for the past 15 years.

## Mrs. Cliff Adams Dies March 16

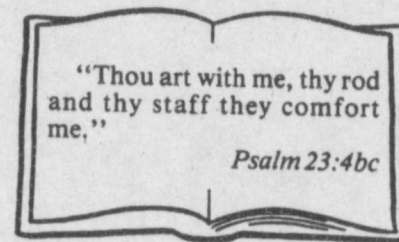

**Bogata Notified Of Surplus Construction Funds**

The City of Bogata has been notified by Gregory Olin, Texas Water Dev. Board, that they have been furnished the final accounting costs by Hayter Engineering and have a surplus in construction funds of \$21,688.00. In the report at the March 14 City Council meeting, it was stated that the City has to buy Certificate No. 19, maturing June 1, 2003, in the amount of \$10,000.00 plus interest of \$290.89. regulations. This report has been furnished to Dudley Farr, Texas Water Development Board, Austin.

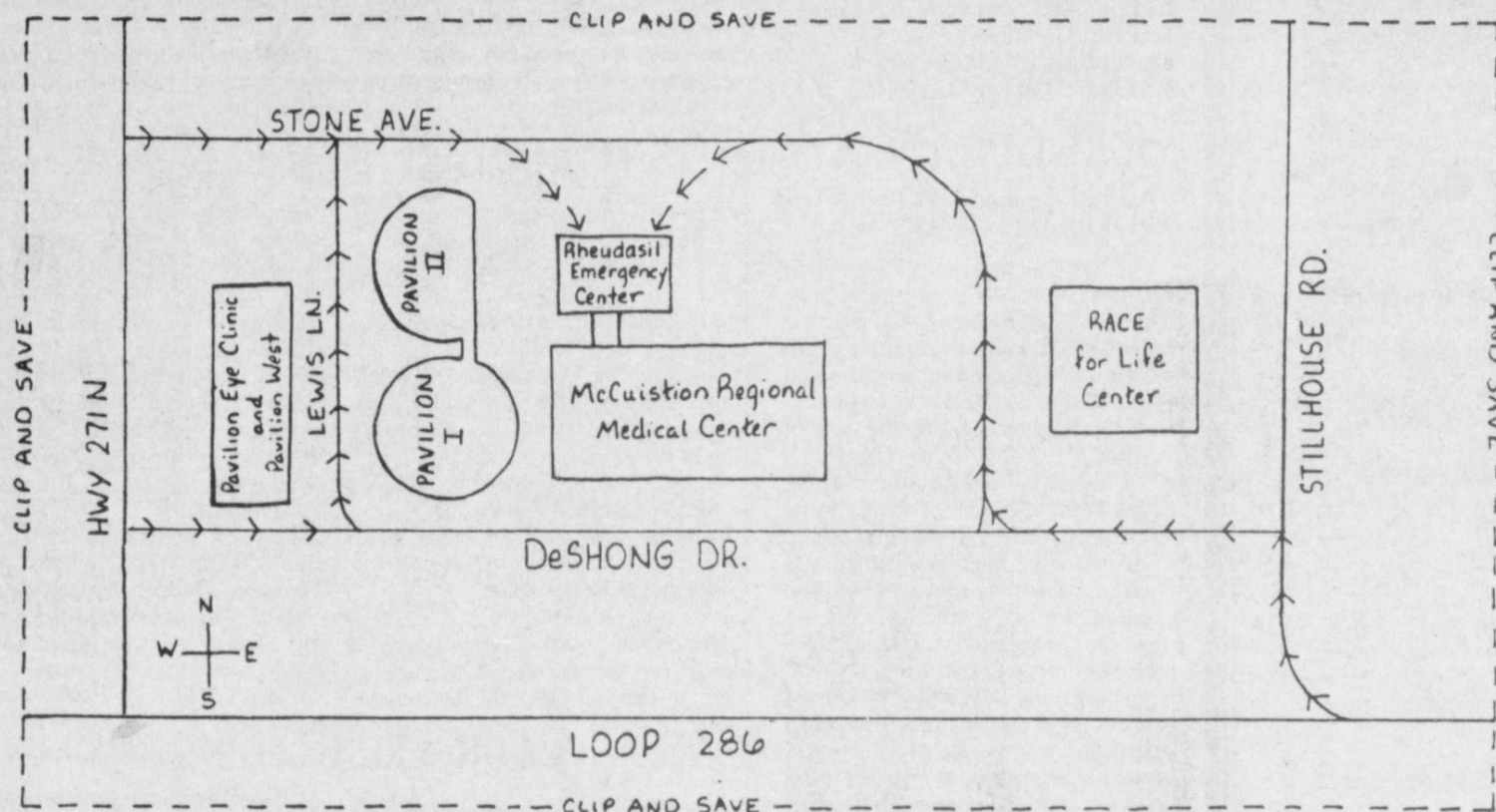
Red River Appraisal District requested the City of Bogata to consider a resolution to validate the acquisition in all respects due to the purchasing of the property located at 101 West Broadway in December, 1982 for \$15,000.00. This was tabled until more information is received.

Council voted to provide a street light on North Douglas Street.

Projected completion date for the new City Hall is April 10. H.E. Bryson reported an estimated cost of approximately \$3,500.00 for the parking lot and sidewalk. He also reported that a curb is needed between the new City Hall and the dress shop. Council approved the buying of office furniture from Ken's Furniture in Paris.

City Secretary Anita Couch read the City Judge's report in her absence. The report was given as follows: two ran stop sign, two exhibition of acceleration, one no liability insurance.

**THE APPRAISAL DISTRICT CASE**

Some people in this county have been blinded by my good overall record in office by their lack of understanding on one case, the appraisal district case. A more detailed explanation is in order.

**GUILT OR INNOCENCE:** The State had a weak circumstantial evidence case. There were no eye-witnesses. There were no confessions. There was no "smoking gun". The State's evidence consisted of hundreds of documents to be introduced over a several day period and the testimony of an auditor about why the presence of some figures and documents and the absence of other figures and documents prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. While the State could certainly prove that a large amount of money was missing, it could have come close in only a few transactions to proving beyond a reasonable doubt that the particular defendant has an explanation to offer in her defense. The State would almost certainly have lost this case at trial in my opinion.

**PUNISHMENT:** Would a jury have sent to prison a 23-year old mother of two infant children for a first offense, non-violent, white-collar crime? If your answer is no, then what is the next highest punishment a jury could give? Ten years probated-which is what the defendant received, plus a \$40 per month probation fee for 10 years. What about restitution? Remember the State could prove beyond a reasonable doubt that only a few thousand dollars were taken by the defendant. Most of the money could not be ordered repaid because it could not be attributed to the defendant. Even if the whole amount could have been ordered repaid, the order could not have been enforced against that particular defendant because she was not financially able to repay. It is basic criminal law that a court cannot send a probationer to prison for failure to do something he or she cannot do. The insurance bonding company reimbursed the taxing jurisdiction for its provable losses.

Shouldn't the defendant have been ordered to pay the insurance company the few thousand dollars restitution that could be attributed to her? Yes, and she would have been if the State hadn't had a case it was almost certainly going to lose if it went to trial.

I have been criticized for plea bargaining. This case was similar to two cases involving alleged embezzlement of public funds in which Red River County juries acquitted the defendants well before I became your County Attorney. In weak cases the choice is sometimes between getting something and getting nothing. I chose to get something. In this case the blame was publicly placed on the guilty person, \$40 monthly fee was required, and the defendant will carry the conviction on her record for the rest of her life.

Was mine the right choice? The District Judge who went over the case in detail with me and the defense lawyer before he approved the plea bargain thought so.

**PLEA BARGAINING:** 90% to 95% of felonies are plea bargained in Red River County and every other county in Texas. Plea bargains are here to stay because if properly done, they make good sense. Never doubt for one second that my opponent, if elected, would plea bargain just as often as me and the other felony prosecutors in the State of Texas.

If you want all 75 felonies per year tried in Red River County, then ask your Commissioner's Court to increase your county taxes by about 60% because that would be about the cost of trying them all. (An additional judge, court reporter, 2 assistant county attorneys, jury panel and jury fees, appointed attorney's fees and free court reporter's notes at \$4.00 per page for appeals for all indigent defendants). Misdemeanors not included.

Trying those cases will not result in substantially more punishment, however, because the purpose of plea bargaining is to approximate what a jury would do.

Who was I to make the decision about the plea bargain? The only person in the world who was elected to make exactly that decision in Red River County, Texas. You elect a prosecutor to use his judgment, expertise and knowledge of cases that the public cannot have. A prosecutor cannot take the time to adequately inform the public about the details of 75 felonies per year and 167 misdemeanors per year. To try to do so would cause the cases to be moved to other counties to be tried, and the cost would be prohibitive. The place for a trial is in the courtroom, not in the newspapers and on radio.

My good 7 year record on punishment, sending 23 criminals per year to prison, shows I know what I'm doing. The 1,226 total years of prison sentences I have obtained as prosecutor shows I'm doing my job right. Based on population, Red River County was in the top 3% among Texas cities for sending criminals to prison in 1985, the first year figures were available. And we were in the top 20% for 1986.

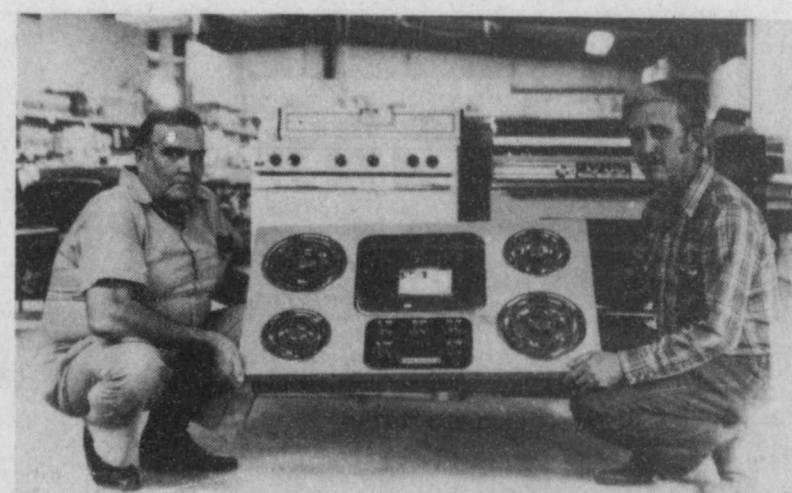
