But he rambled on, pitifully, about how lucky we were to own our papers, and how he had missed his opportunities to own papers over the years.

He loves the newspaper business, like most of us in the business, one doesn't do it without a love for it.

We didn't have a job for him...but gave him a list of other papers to head west towards...to see if perhaps they had an opening.

He drove off, disappointed, but still smiling and pleasant.

Cindy looked at me, I looked at Cindy. She said, "Is THAT where we're headed?" We tried to laugh it off.

No one knows what misfortune plagues a stranger...no one knows what mistakes he may have made to get in such sad shape.

But even trying to laugh it off, all day we were quiet, a little disturbed.

That night I laid down, counted my blessings and said the old "there but for the grace of God, go I" line.

Northeast Texas Community College has announced that classes for the 1988 Summer I semester will begin on Monday, June 6, rather than the previously listed date of May 31.

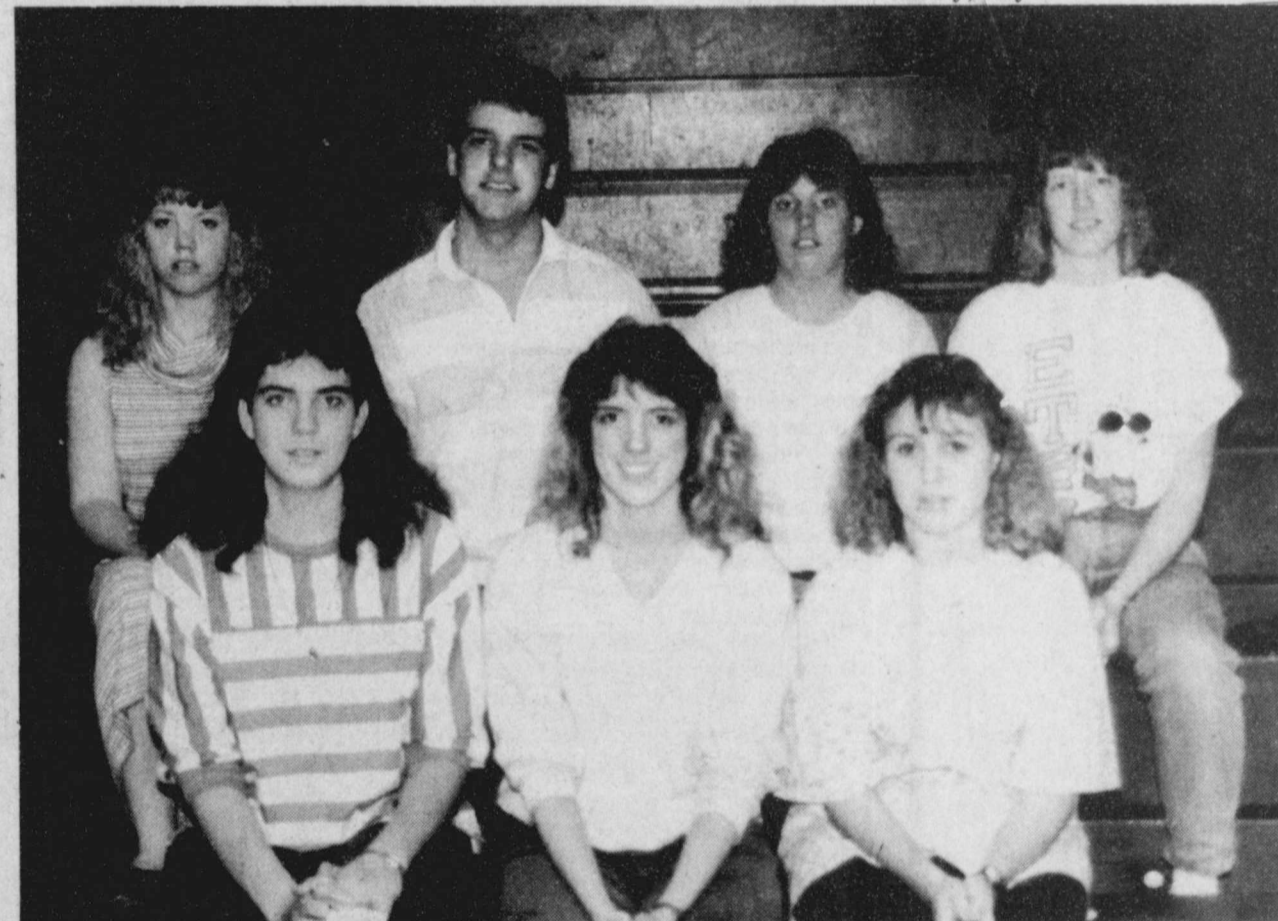
According to NTCC's Registrar and Director of Admissions, Phil W. Ebersberger, "After talking with officials of area public school districts,

we learned that due to the early winter snows, two of the four districts have extended their school year to a point where there would be a conflict with the starting date of the first summer term. It is our feeling that since summer classes are quite concentrated in content, we can better serve our students by changing our

schedule, rather than having the students miss the first two or three class days."

Early registration for the first summer term will be held on Tuesday, May 24. Additional registration will be conducted May 31 through June 2, and classes will begin on June 6.

The first summer term will end on Friday, July 8.

B.H.S. and friends.

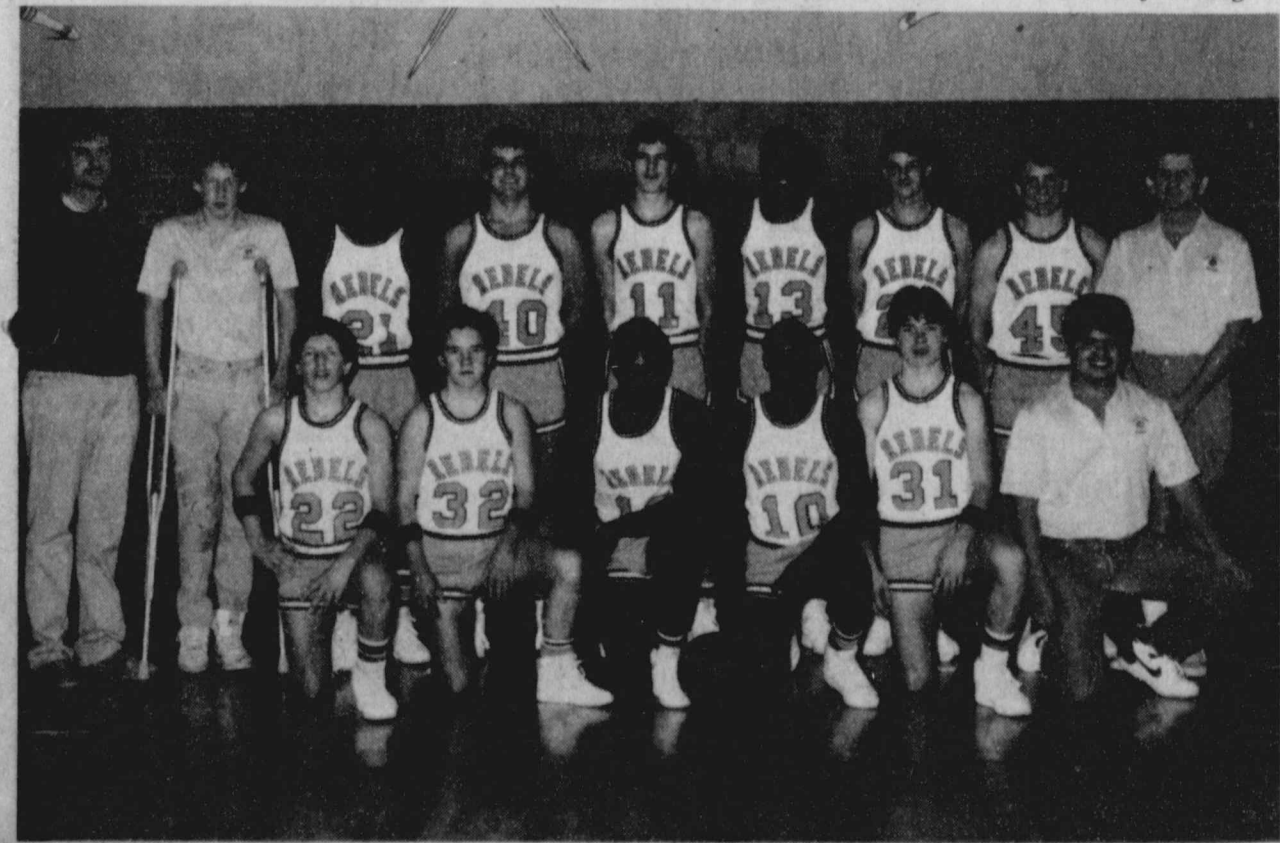
Mrs. Neva Jean Oats, music teacher in the Bogata School, will, with her family, present a musical program of "Memories Through The Years".

Bogata Exes Remember Lucy B. Holder

As the time for the Bogata School 1988 Homecoming draws near, memories spring to the forefront of the minds of those students and teachers who once walked the halls of Bogata and across the breezeway to the library and study hall, sat in the classrooms and gazed out the open windows on a warm spring day, who sang "Hail Bogata High School, We sing praise to you." And among those fond memories comes one that all students who were privileged to be taught by Mrs. Lucy Bell Holder all share. We remember, "Soft pedal, boys and girls". This was Mrs. Holder's phrase for "get quiet". The phrase got a lot of laughs from the students, but all of us held great respect for one of the grandest teachers BHS ever employed.

Mrs. Holder was born north of the Rosalie Church in 1903 to Dr. and Mrs. Robert Jones. She recalls a happy childhood riding with "Papa", tramping up and down Spring Branch, and driving cows to the pasture. She and her brother, Robert, did a lot of fishing. She says that they would sometimes catch 36 or 46 small fish in an afternoon.

She attended school at Rosalie in a three room school, typical for that time. She later graduated as Valedictorian of Clarksville High School in 1921. The following summer, she went to Denton to get a teaching certificate. She taught and served as principal at Mauldin that fall. She says she remembers being very scared about that first job. The following year, she taught at Johntown, she then traveled to Pharr-San Juan Alamo in the Rio Grande Valley to teach there. She says that was an exciting and different experience for her.

Her next teaching job was in Seymour, where she was reunited with a childhood sweetheart, Sam Holder. They married and returned to Rosalie in 1935. They had two sons, Samuel Boyd and William Robert. In 1942, Mrs. Holder went back to work, teaching once again at Johntown. In 1946 she came to Bogata High School and retired from Rivedcrest in 1970. She says that her years of teaching were very happy years. When asked about the subjects she taught, she laughingly says that she taught so

many different ones it's now hard for her to remember all of them.

Mr. Holder died in 1985 after a long illness. Mrs. Holder now lives alone in the same community in which she was born and raised her children in. She recently celebrated her 85th birthday with her son and family, Dr. and Mrs. Sam Holder in Linden. Her other son, Dr. Bob Holder and family, live in Baytown. Mrs. Holder has five grandchildren and one great-grandchild. She is looking forward to the birth of her grandson's twins and the wedding of her granddaughter this summer. She says that the activities of her children and those of her ex-students keep life interesting. Many of her days are spent enjoying her hobby of making fancy quilts.

Friends, relatives and ex-students of Mrs. Lucy Bell Holder all agree that she has left a lasting, positive mark on their lives. Perhaps a good way to describe Mrs. Holder is by using three words from the first few lines of our school song, which says, "Stalwart, Brave and True."

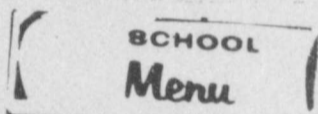
Deidra Eudy of Irving and Burton Vickers of Abilene were married February 14 in Grand Prairie by Justice of the Peace Cameron Gray.



Is the County Attorney smarter or have more common sense than the jurors of Red River County?

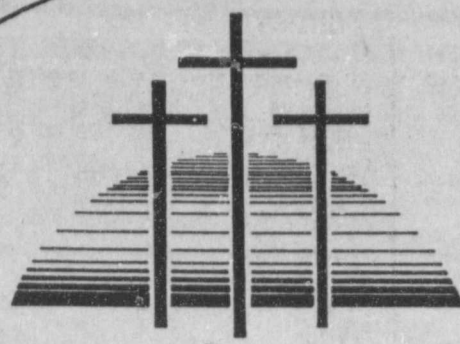
