

Fruit Crop Should Be Good

By Herb Brevard

In spite of late freezes and unexpected frosts, East Texas fruit and berry producers will have a bountiful crop in most areas, says Marty Baker, horticulturist.

Some varieties had a total crop loss but on the average, production is expected to meet most of the market demand.

Peach production on varieties such as Dixiland, Redglobe, Redskin, Harvester and Denman looks so good that thinning has been necessary in many orchards to assure good size peaches. Most of the counties in Northeast Texas have these varieties available.

On the other hand, Sentinel, Surecrop, Bicentennial, Springold, Derby, Texstar, La Felician, Flordaking and June gold suffered 60 to 100 percent crop loss due to early flowering after long hours of chilling requirements were met before February 15. Trees of this variety in Jasper County suffered 60 percent damage and those in Smith, Cherokee, Henderson, Angelina, Freestone, Anderson and Kaufman Counties suffered 75 to 100 percent loss.

Elberta and early Elberta varieties were a total loss in Cass County due to the accumulated hours of chilling, freezing temperatures and damage to the stigma and ovule in opened flowers.

If fertilization took place prior to the freeze and the fertilized ovule escaped damage, a peach crop will be made. Most peach varieties are self pollinating and require only enough bee or wind activity to assist the flower in self pollinating. Most producers concluded that more fruit was set where bees were in the orchards during flowering periods on cold days.

Approximately 30 percent of the buds present on blueberries were damaged by the late freeze. Climax, Delite and Southland were severely damaged while Tibblue and Britewell varieties recovered very well from the freezing temperatures. Good production is expected on plants which are in their third or fourth year of production. Several pick your own operations will have blueberries within the next three to four weeks.

Baker says that blackberries, Dor-manred raspberries and grapes will be available in record acreage in East Texas this year. Large, high quality berries will be produced on muscadine grapes and blackberry varieties of Womack, Brazos, Cheyenne and Rosborough.

Several producers are also expecting an excellent crop of strawberries.

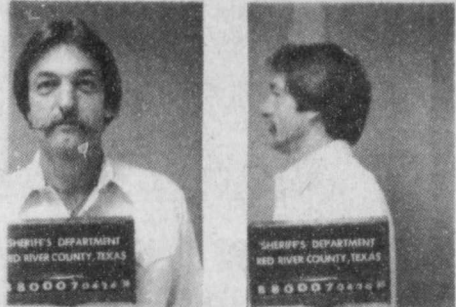
