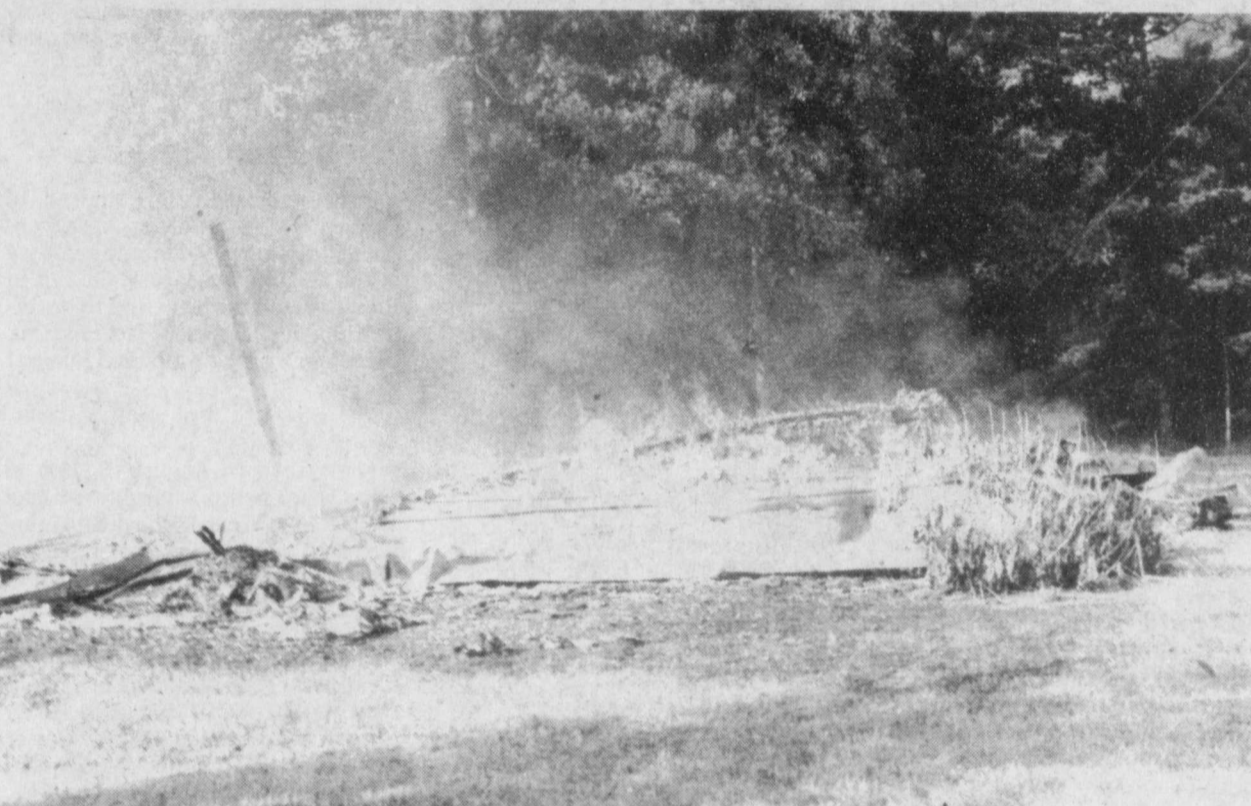

Russell, Burns, Daniels Win Election

Jerry Russell, Billy Daniels and Neva Dell Burns were winners in the Talco-Bogata Independent School District trustee election on May 7.

Incumbent Jerry Russell with 354 votes won over Bruce Case with 187 votes for the Place 1 seat.

For Place 4 trustee, Neva Dell Burns with 440 votes won over Greg Bagley with 187 votes. For the Place 7 seat, incumbent Billy Daniels won with 486 votes over Rex Orrill with 156.

The other day I witnessed two children getting an education. They had their major lesson in a cemetery...

Lest you think this is morbid, the purpose of the cemetery visit was to take some photographs of bluebonnets at their peak.

But with a 10-year old nephew and an 8-year old friend, the visit turned into something of a treasure hunt.

They started out looking at some of the "old fashioned" names carved into the headstones. They were fascinated by the Woodsmen of the World markers with their stone "logs".

Then they began to read the dates. When they found one with World War II on it, and the deceased's name and rank, it was as if history became alive for them.

I assured them that if they kept looking they would find graves of soldiers from World War I as well.

Shortly there was an exclamation of excitement, typical of a 10-year old, "Nanalee, come look at this absolutely COOL grave." (I never thought of graveyards in exactly those terms.)

The grave they had found was of a Confederate soldier. Their eyes were big, their active minds impressed. Then the real lesson began to sink in. For they discovered that lambs and angels usually marked the graves of infants and children.

To today's modern youngster, the concept of so many children dying is simply inconceivable. We had a little talk, about how infants died from unpasteurized milk, from pneumonia, from smallpox and scarlet fever.

I pointed out to my nephew that at Christmas when he underwent emergency appendicitis surgery, his biggest problem was missing Christmas morning at home. Back in the early part of the century, he would have died.

They grew more and more thoughtful as they scamped from marker...trying to find the oldest grave, the most unusual grave.

They had a wonderful time...and came away with a new perspective on life...that families go on for many years...that modern medicine truly saves lives...that people once lived, loved, fought and played just as they do now.

I believe they truly have a feeling of continuity with their ancestors now. What started as a simple picture-taking expedition turned into an experience for us all.

Cool Weather Contributes To Insect Problem

Cool weather has contributed to heavier insect populations in vegetable crops than normal. The aphid population has been extremely high and needs to be controlled. Aphids can transmit disease to other plants and reduce plant vigor. Sprays containing malathion, diazinon and insecticidal soaps may be used to control aphids.

Thrips cause a curling of the leaf tissue on peas and beans a delay maturity because of damage to the growing terminal. Commercial growers who control thrips with insecticides can harvest about a week earlier than those who do not use insecticides. Malathion, diazinon and Cygon are approved for thrip control.

Squash bugs are not hard to control if control measures are started early enough. The insect overwinters in the adult stage and invades the squash or cucurbit plant shortly after it begins growth. Eggs are laid on the underside of the leaf. The eggs are ember color and triangular in shape. Control should be started when the eggs hatch. Small squash bugs are green with black legs. Sevin and Thiodan may be used for control.

Fire ants are common nuisance pests in vegetable gardens. No baits can legally be used inside the garden. Sevin, diazinon and malathion can be used as a drench or in the granular form in the garden.

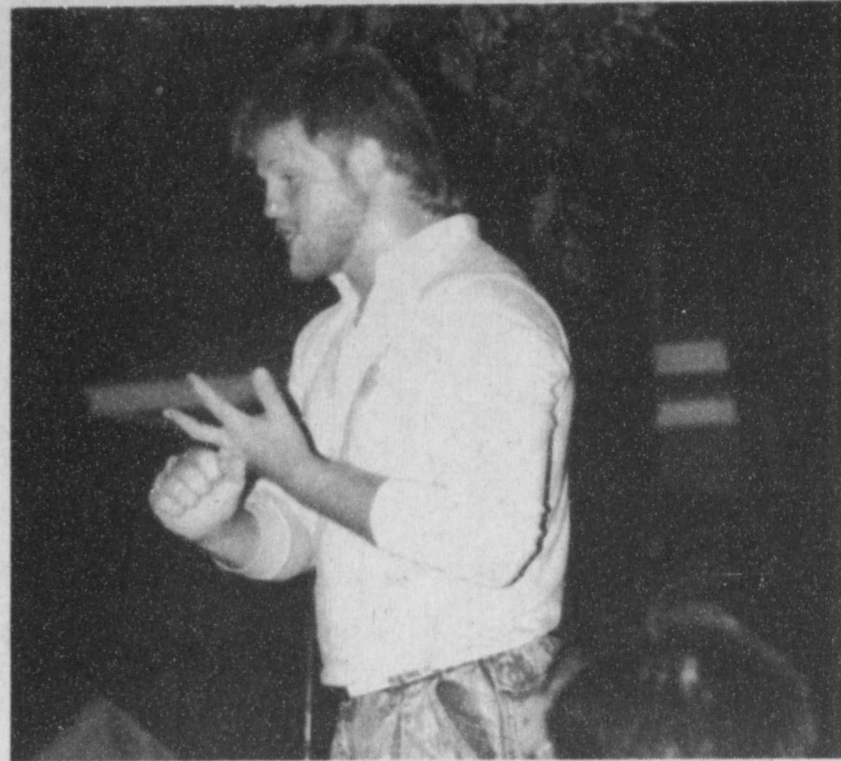
On Thursday, May 5, the Rivercrest, Talco-Bogata Junior High and Beginning Bands were honored with a banquet sponsored by the Band Boosters.

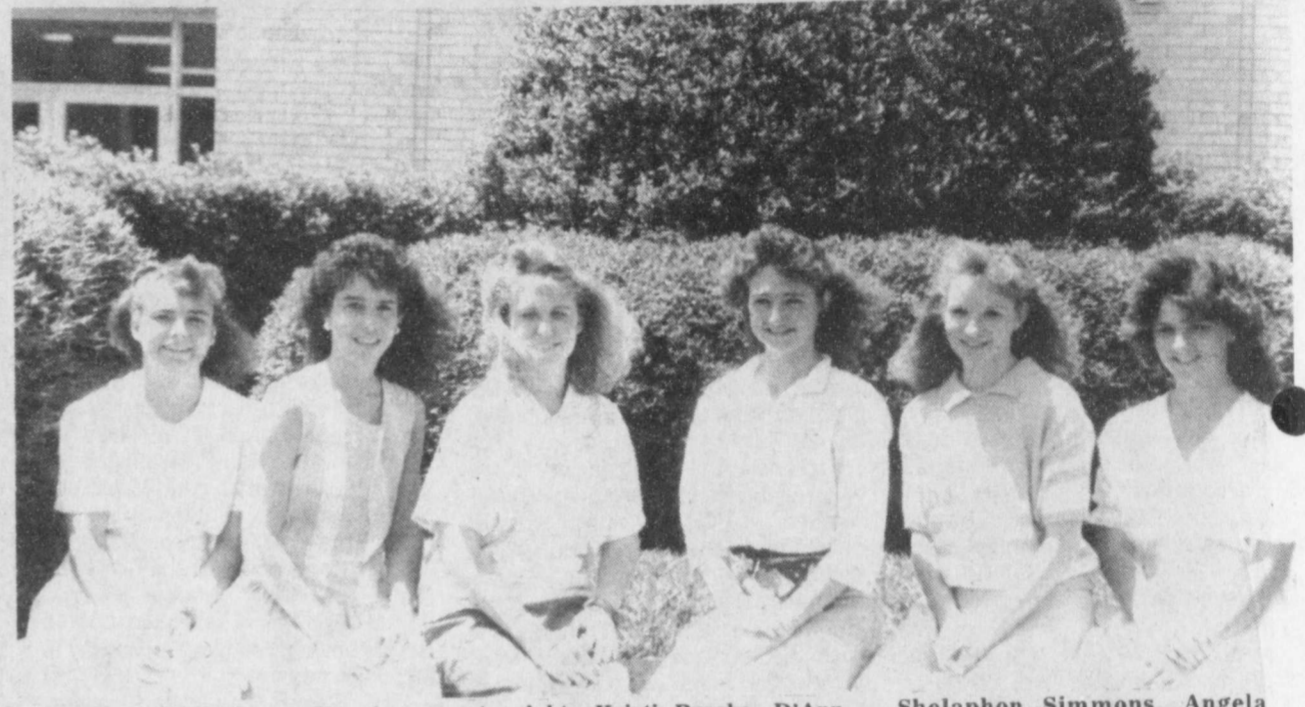

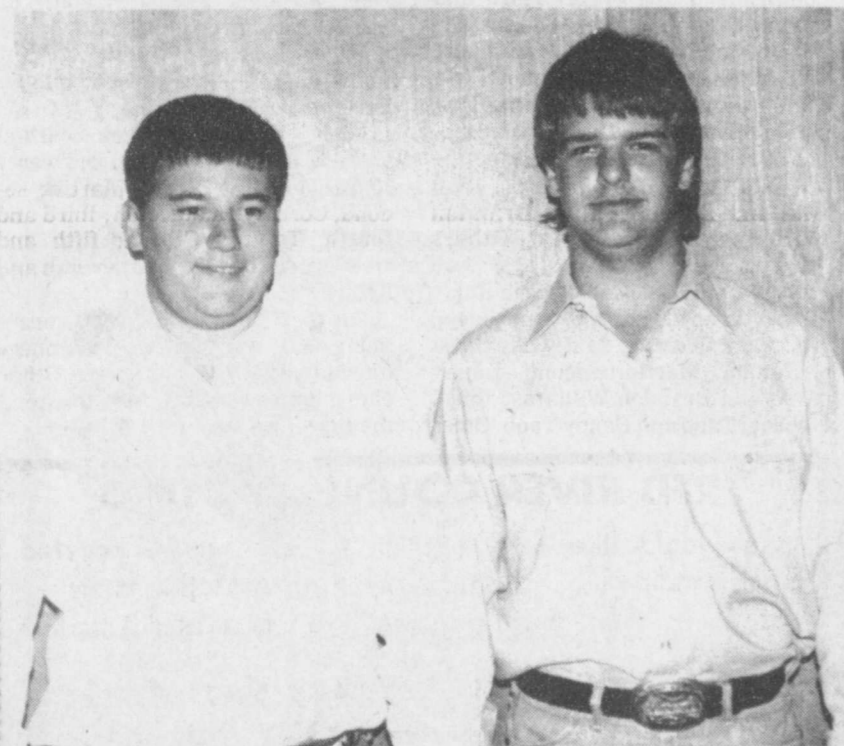

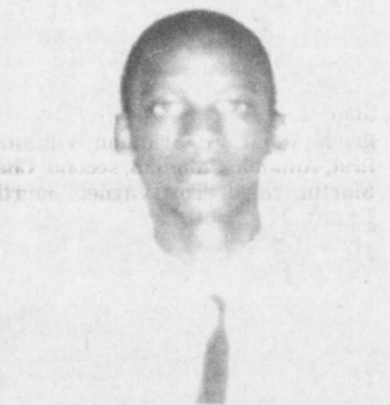

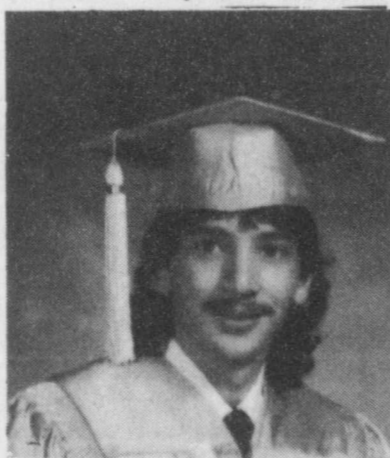

Tick Season Poses Threats

The tick season, with its dangers for man and beast, is upon us. According to local representatives of the Texas Agricultural Service and the Animal Health Commission, the season will be in full swing for another six weeks or more.

The several species of ticks infesting the local area reproduce on "host animals" including livestock and pets. When feeding, ticks draw blood from the host and transmit disease by depositing microorganisms carried on their mouthparts or in salivary fluids.

Both "Lone Star" ticks and brown dog ticks are carriers of Rocky Mountain spotted fever and tularemia. If promptly diagnosed and treated, these diseases may be cured, but a non-fatal local case of "tick fever" has already been confirmed this year.

Humans, particularly those who work or vacation in heavily tick infested areas, who experience the onset of fever-like symptoms and recall being bitten by a tick 10-14 days earlier should mention this association to their physician, according to a Texas Agricultural Service publication.

Dogs and other small animals if attacked by large numbers of ticks may suffer from serious and potentially fatal inflammation, toxification and severe anemia, according to the publication.

Humans exposed to ticks are counselled to use repellents and to check their clothing, bodies and hair at least twice daily to remove ticks promptly.

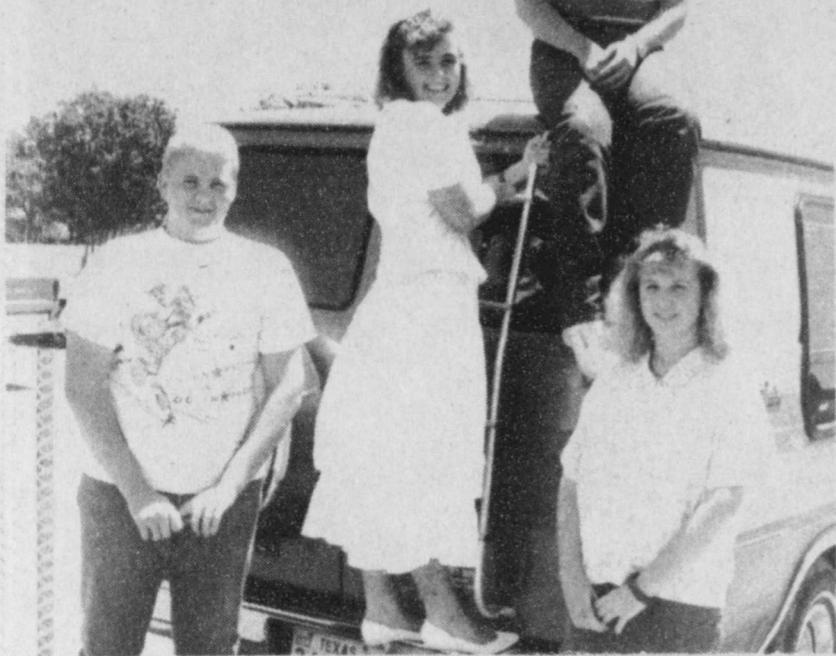
Livestock and pets may be protected to a degree by tick dips and other chemical applications. Severe infestation should be treated by a veterinarian.
