Fire Destroys Downtown Talco Buildings

Talco's Main Street suffered the loss of three businesses and a good portion of the north side of their downtown area Friday night.

About 1 a.m., the Talco, Mt. Pleasant, Bogata, Winfield and Clarksville fire departments responded to a call in downtown Talco. "The Store" own-

ed by Pat and Frances Stephens, "The Feed Store" also owned by the Stephens and Mark Hale's Karate Building and the old Talco Bank Building were on fire.

It took the firemen until 7 a.m. Saturday morning to get the blaze

under control and it was 11:30 a.m. before the fire was completely out.

Only a small amount of meat and food could be saved from the store, with all else being destroyed. The old Talco Bank Building sustained the least damage, with the other buildings being a complete loss.

Fireman Randy Carroll said "It went up like a tender box, there wasn't much they could do to save the buildings." At this time the cause of the fire is under investigation.

Bro. Gary House kept firemen well supplied with coffee, tea, water and cold drinks. Mrs. Cordell Alexander

opened her cafe to supply the men with hamburgers at 4 a.m. and Jo and Kelly Anschutz helped serve the food to weary firefighters.

The Titus County Ambulance Service kept Paramedics on stand-by for the firefighters.

Board Meeting Considers Classroom Solution

Several parents of Elementary and Junior High students attended the special called meeting of the Talco-Bogata School Board Tuesday night, May 24 to discuss possible solutions to the need for more classroom space on the Bogata campus.

Superintendent Harold Cowley explained to the board members and guests that due to House Bill 72, a ratio of one teacher to 22 students will be enforced beginning in September for grades K-4. Mr. Cowley showed the projected enrollment for Talco and Bogata schools as follows, with the Bogata figure listed first: Kindergarten, 25-28; first grade 40-20; second grade, 43-18; third grade, 43-18; fourth grade, 35-24; fifth grade, 45-14; sixth grade, 43-26; seventh grade, 51-17; eighth grade, 38-14.

Mr. Cowley stated that based on these enrollment figures, more personnel will have to be hired for the schools and space provided for two more classrooms on the Bogata campus.

Mr. Cowley then presented suggested solutions to the space problem submitted to the administration as follows:

Plan A: Transport Bogata seventh and eighth grades to Talco campus. This solution would involve only transportation costs.

Plan B: Move Bogata and Talco seventh and eighth grades to Rivercrest campus. This plan would involve the cost of five buildings.

Plan C: Move all grades, Bogata and Talco, to Rivercrest. This would

be a long range plan involving the construction of new school buildings and would be done only with consenting votes of the majority of communities.

Plan D: Place a temporary building on the Bogata campus. This plan would involve the cost of one temporary building which would house two classrooms.

Plan E: Move students from one campus to the other in order to balance grades.

A final suggestion was presented at the meeting to start school in September with intentions to build a permanent structure on the Bogata campus. Those parents attending stated their willingness to transport the Bogata seventh and eighth grade

students to the Talco campus for one semester, until construction of classrooms at Bogata could be completed, if forced to by the State. The School Board is to look into cost of the permanent classrooms on the Bogata campus, available property to buy near the Bogata campus, and the State mandates concerning starting school with the intent to build and have information at the June board meeting.

Mr. Cowley suggested that residents of the communities ask themselves the question, "Where do we want to be five years from now?" and form research groups to consider the needs of the campuses, including repairs, new buildings, and more playground space and look for solutions to these problems.

Refreshments were served and club dismissed for summer months. The next meeting will be September 8 with Jimmie King as hostess.



Sales Tax On Feed Dropped

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that sales tax will no longer be charged on feed normally eaten by farm and ranch animals that is also used to feed Texas game animals.

"It doesn't make sense to tax feed that farmers and ranchers use to support the native wildlife population when other farm animals get to eat the same stuff tax-free," Bullock said.

Bullock said removal of the sales tax on hay, corn, oats and other feeds that can be eaten by deer, turkey and other wild animals will promote progressive wildlife and conservation practices.

According to Bullock, Texas farmers and ranchers who lease hunting

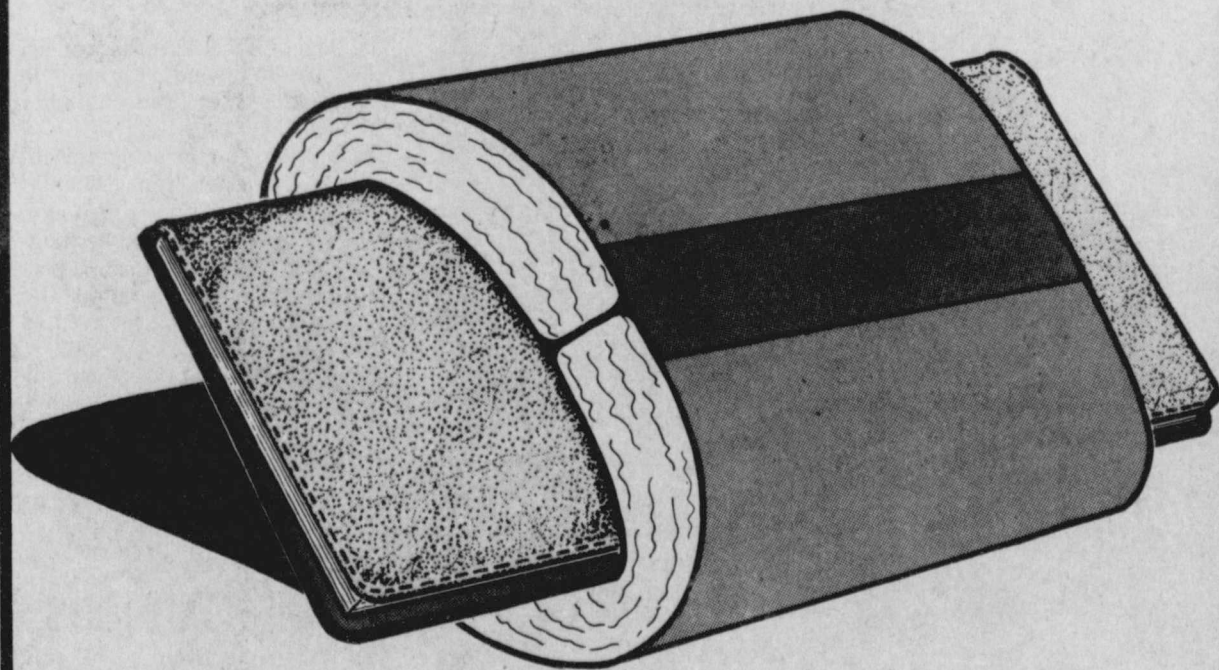
acreage will benefit by being able to provide supplemental feed during drought conditions or when animal habitats have been reduced.

Land owners will find it easier to buy feed under the proposed rule, since they will no longer have to declare the type and location of the animal eating the feed.

"We've had some confusing situations because of the current rule, for example, corn bought to feed deer is taxable, but corn bought to feed cows isn't," Bullock said.

Feed for domestic farm animals and work animals will remain exempt from the state sales tax, but feed bought for pets such as cats and dogs is still taxable, he added.

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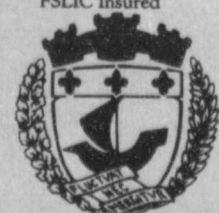
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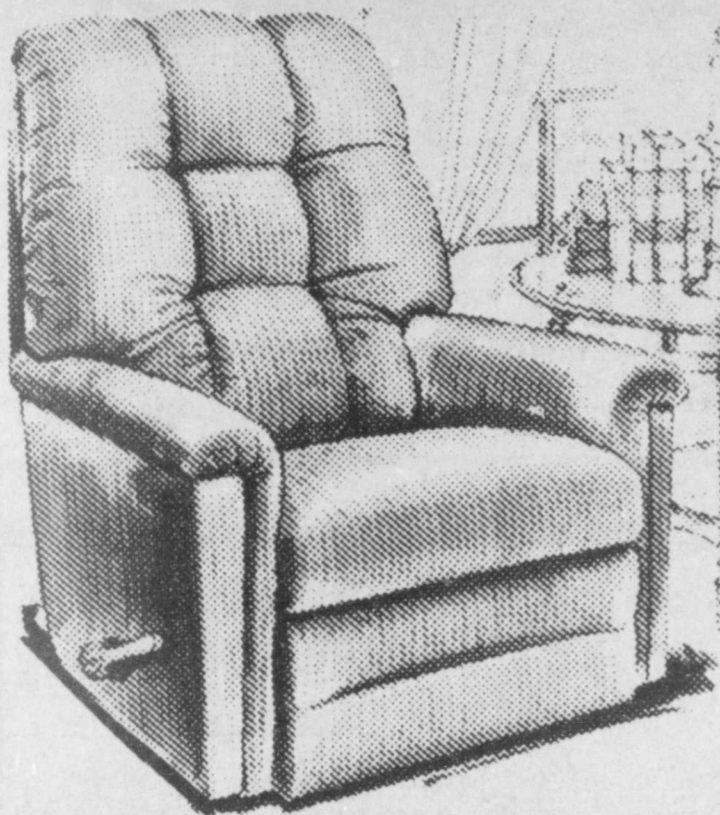
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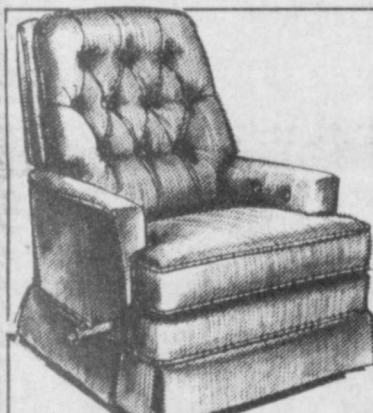
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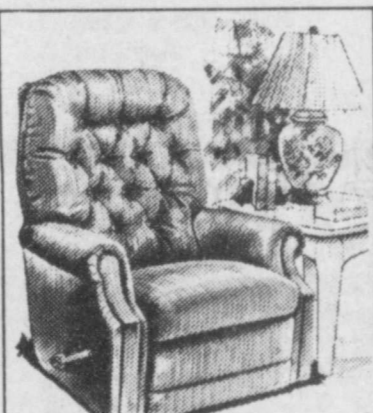
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Kelsey Speaks To Kiwanis

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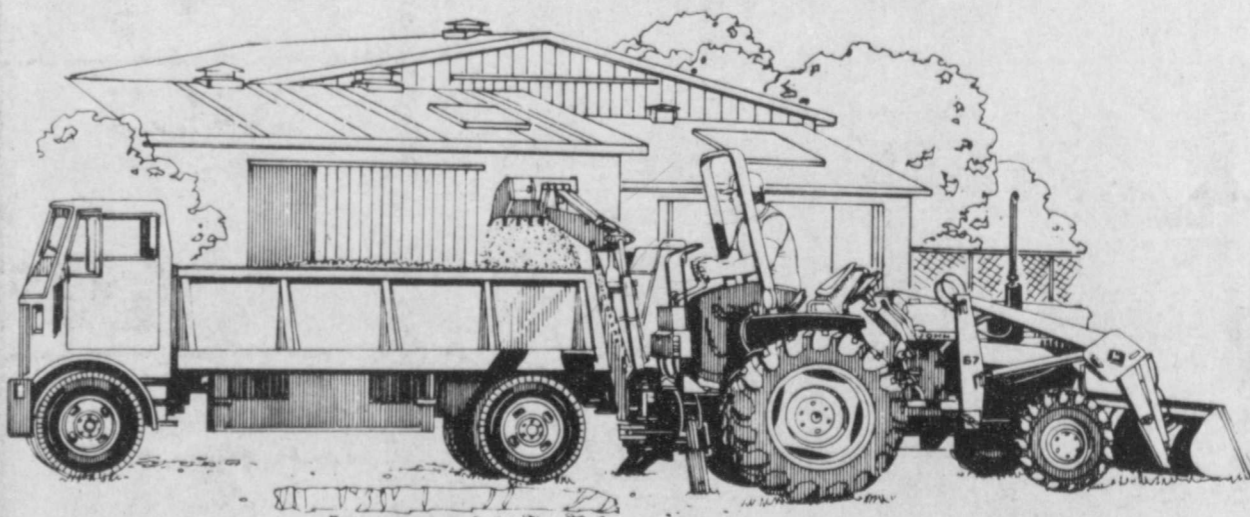

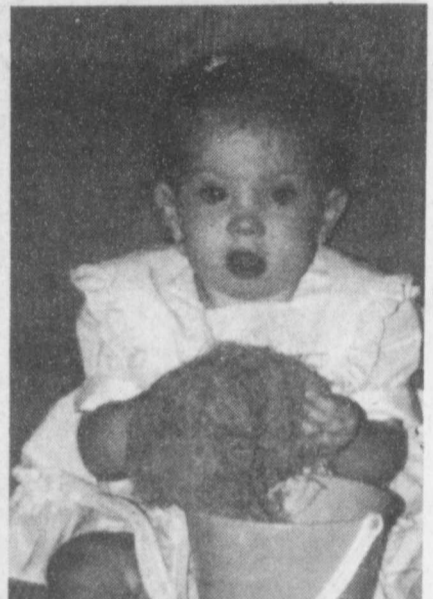
