## Accident Victim Pinned In Wreckage

An almost miraculous lack of serious injury occurred when a semi-tractor trailer rig overturned on FM 71, five miles west of Talco Tuesday afternoon.

Ricky Watson of Kilgore was the

driver of the Well Perforating Truck belonging to Wedge CRC, Inc. The vehicle was traveling towards Talco making a curve, when it went out of control and off the road on the left side, overturning and pinning Watson for an hour and thirty-five minutes.

Talco Volunteer Fire Department, Mt. Pleasant Fire Department and Titus County Rescue Units responded to the call.

The rescue teams had to dig into the ground on the passenger's side, using

two oil field boom trucks to raise the rig inch by inch, until the driver could be removed on the passenger's side.

He was taken by ambulance to Titus County Memorial Hospital, where his condition is unknown, but

thought to be stable. Way had been cleared for a helicopter in case an air flight was needed. The helicopter went on to the Titus County Memorial Hospital in case it was needed.

## Immunization Clinic Set

The Texas Department of Health, Public Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at 210 S. Johnson St., Mt. Pleasant on June 15 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasized that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age. Im-

munizations to be offered include mumps, measles, rubella, oral polio, diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis and tetanus-diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenza type vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 24 months and 60 months. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and social security number if it is available.

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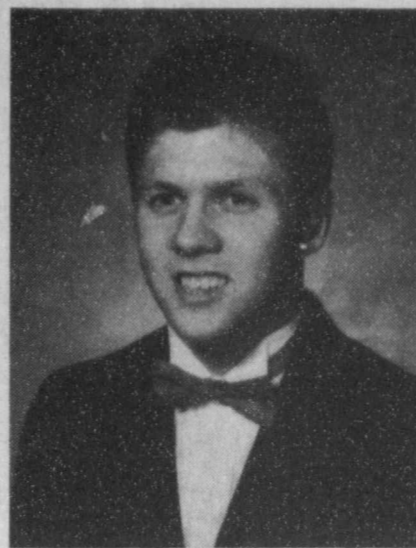


DALE RHODES of Rivercrest Heights caught this 30 lb. catfish while fishing with his nephew.

Flag Day is June 14...next week. It's an almost forgotten holiday, but one which deserves special attention. Because this nation is in sad need of a renewal of patriotism and respect for that most honored of symbols, the Star Spangled Banner.

Oh, it's easy to look at all the terrible things wrong in this nation. It's simple to say that there isn't any use fighting it, the country is "going down the tubes". But a glance at history, any nation's history, including the United States of America, shows that every single generation has deployed the state their nation was in.

But the flag isn't part of the corruption. It isn't party to politics. It isn't a symbol for a select group of people. It is ours...plain and simple.

The rules governing the flag are little known. So herein follows a list of the official Flag Law. Read it, and then, Fly Your Flag!

It is the universal custom to display the Flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaves in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.

The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, except when an all weather flag is displayed.

The flag should be displayed on all days, especially on New Year's Day, Inauguration Day, Lincoln's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Easter Sunday, Mother's Day, Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day (half staff until noon), Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Constitution Day, Columbus Day, Navy Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day; such other days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States, the birthdays of States, and on State holidays.

The flag should be displayed daily on or near the main administration building of every public institution.

The flag should be displayed during school days in or near every schoolhouse.

The flag should not be displayed on a float in a parade except from a staff, or as provided in subsection (1).

The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle or of a railroad trail or boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff shall be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.

No other flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the flag of the United States of America, except during church services conducted by naval chaplains at sea, when the church pennant may be flown above the flag during church services for the personnel of the Navy. No person shall display the flag of the United Nations or any other national or international flag equal, above, or in a position of superior prominence or honor to, or in place of, the flag of the United States at any place within the United States of any Territory or possession thereof; Provided, That nothing in this section shall make unlawful the continuance of the practice heretofore followed of displaying the flag of the United Nations in a position of superior prominence or honor, and other national flags in positions of equal prominence or honor, with that of the flag of the United States at the headquarters of the United Nations.

The flag when it is displayed with another flag against a wall from crossed staffs, should be on the right, the flag's own right, and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag.

The flag should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flats of States or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.

When flags of States, cities or localities, or pennants of societies are flown on the same halyard with the flag of the United States, the latter should always be at the peak. When the flags are flown from adjacent staffs, the flag of the United States should be hoisted first and lowered last. No such flag or pennant may be placed above the flat of the United States or to the United States flag's right.

When flags of two or more nations are displayed, they are to be flown from separate staffs of the same height. The flags should be of approximately equal size. International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation above that of another nation in time of peace.

When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at an angle from the window sill, balcony or front of a building, the union of the flag should be placed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half-staff. When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending from a house to a pole at the edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted over, when displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, to the observer's left.

When the flag is displayed over the middle of the street, it should be

suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street or to the east in a north and south street.

When use on a speaker's platform, the flat if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium, the flag should hold the position of superior prominence, in advance of the audience, and in the position of honor at the clergyman's or speaker's right as he faces the audience.

The flag should form a distinctive feature of the ceremony of unveiling a statue or monument, but it should never be used as the covering for the statue or monument.

The flag, when flown at half-staff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the day.

The term half-staff means the position for the flag when it is one-half the distance between the top and bottom of the staff.

When the flag is used to cover a casket, it should be so placed that the union is at the head and over the left shoulder. The flag should not be lowered into the grave or allowed to touch the ground.

When the flag is suspended across a corridor or lobby in a building with only one main entrance, it should be suspended vertically with the union of the flag to the observer's left upon entering.

That no disrespect should be shown to the flag of the United States of America, the flag should not be dipped to any person or thing. Regimental colors, State flags and organizational or institutional flags are to be dipped as a mark of honor.

The flag should never be displayed with the union down, in excess of a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.

The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.

The flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.

The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free.

The flag should never be fastened, displayed, used or stored in such a manner as to permit it to be easily torn, soiled or damaged in any way.

The flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling.

The flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter,

word, figure, design, picture or drawing of any nature.

The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything.

The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever.

No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform.

The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in review, all persons present except those in uniform should face the flag and stand at attention with the right hand over the heart. Those in uniform should render the military salute.

During rendition of the national anthem when the flag is displayed, all present except those in uniform should stand at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. Men not in uniform should remove their headress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag should be rendered by standing at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart.

## Dry Conditions Still Exist

Even though some areas of East Texas have received rain, dry conditions still exist over a wide area. With the possibility of facing even drier conditions, producers should make alternate plans for their forage and livestock operations, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist.

Begin by determining how much hay remains in storage, the quality of hay, the condition of forage remaining in the pastures and hay meadows, how many animals are on the place and the condition of the animals.

The culling criteria for the cattle should be given careful consideration. Many producers have animals that could not be easily replaced and must maintain the base herd under any condition in order to keep their operation. Others could disperse the entire herd and start over under more favorable conditions.

For those producers who have received adequate rain, Reeves suggests cutting all the excess forage possible to make hay. The market outlook for quality hay is good in many areas and this may be the year that some will make a profit in hay production.

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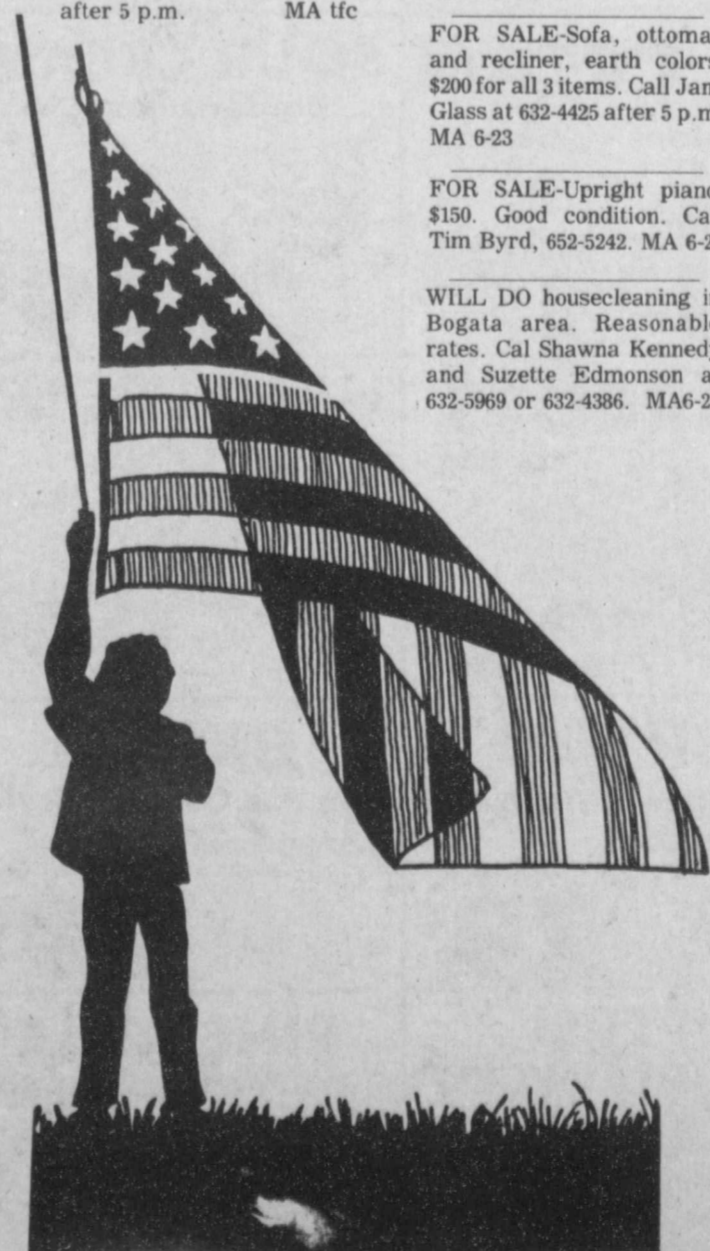

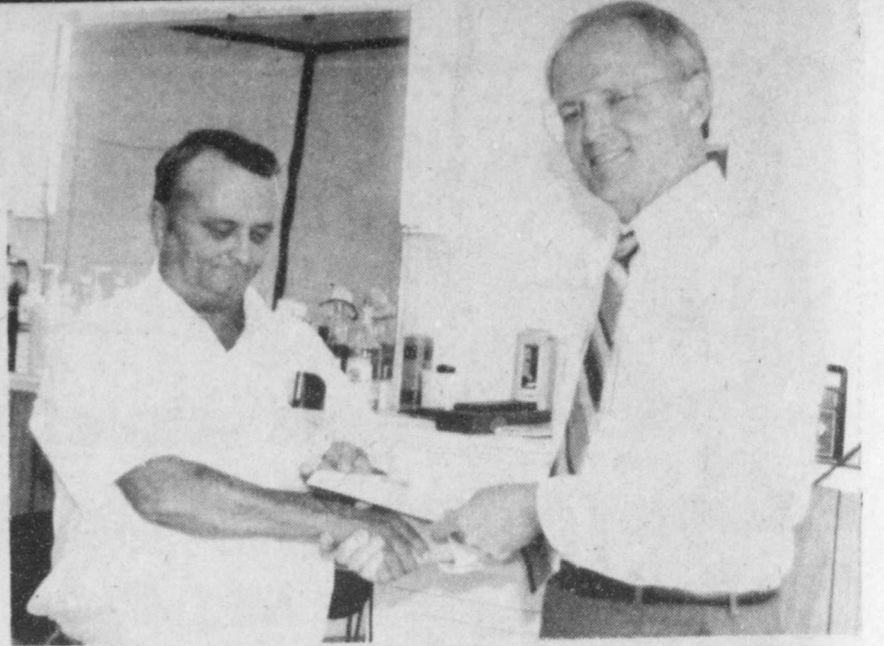

## THOUGHT FOR FOOD

### Steak Imperial Over Riceland Rice

- 1/2 cup dry red wine
- 1/4 cup bottled teriyaki marinade
- 1 1/2 lbs. beef round steak, cut in thin strips
- 2 tbsp. Chef-way oil
- 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) mushroom gravy or 1 pkg. prepared mix
- 2 tbsp. currant or other tart red jelly
- 1 1/2 cups slivered green pepper
- 2 tart cooking apples,

cored and sliced cups hot cooked Riceland Rice

Combine wine and teriyaki marinade; pour over steak; allow to marinate 3-4 hours. Set aside while preparing pepper and apples. Drain marinade from meat and reserve. Saute meat in oil, using high heat, until brown. If using a packaged gravy mix, prepare according to package directions. Stir in gravy, jelly and marinade. Bring to a boil. Thicken with cornstarch mixed with cold water if necessary. Top with peppers and apples. Sprinkle apples lightly with salt and sugar, if desired. Cover and simmer 15 minutes.
