Rain Relieves Drought For Some

There are few things that Texans, and especially East Texans, enjoy more than talking about the weather. But lately talking about the weather has been depressing and frustrating, as drought scorches the area.

Average rainfall for the 1988 year has been nearly 20 inches below normal, with the major lack occurring in April and May, crucial times for

farmers, hay producers, ranchers and gardeners.

The fourth of July weekend provided area residents with some better news. Thunderstorms, high winds and some hail whipped the area, relieving severe drought for some, while others did without.

Up to three inches pounded desperately parched fields and mead-

ows, while Mother Nature put on an unprecedented display of lightning and high winds.

Talco suffered a number of power disruptions, requiring Texas New Mexico to remove downed limbs from lines. Also suffering power loss were portions of Red River County and Lamar County. Servicemen for electric companies and telephone

companies found themselves spread thin when the worst storm hit on Saturday.

Sunday; morning thunderheads built and built, but no rain fell on most of the area.

July Fourth was mostly cloudy, with scattered showers during the morning, but bright sunshine and smothering humidity in the afternoon. Trees and limbs were ripped up in

some places, but basically damage was minor.

Whether the summer will continue to provide much needed rain or not, is of course, yet to be seen.

Damage is already evident among crops blooming, but cotton, always hardy in dry weather, should do well in those areas that received the rain.

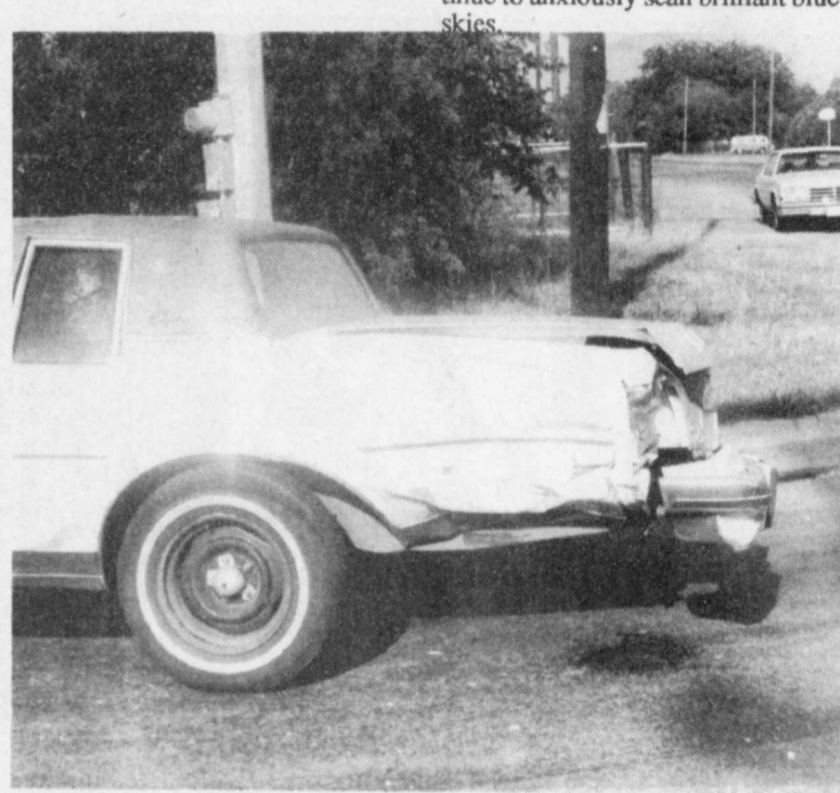
For those that missed the storms sweeping the area, they must continue to anxiously scan brilliant blue skies.

Valentine Keeps Flint Knapping Alive

William Valentine is a familiar name to most people in Blossom and the surrounding areas. But you hear many people refer to this same person as the "arrowhead man" for he has revived the lost art of making arrowheads and knives from stone.

Mr. Valentine said that he has been making the arrowheads, or "flint knapping" for forty years. He started his craft because he was curious to see how they were made.

"I've been a bow hunter all my life, and I made these [arrow points] and put them on arrows," Valentine

said.

Most of his technique he learned on his own through trial and error. But in 1983 he was able to learn about flint knapping from some archaeologists. He also learned a lot from a flint knapping club that he joined.

Mr. Valentine explained that he goes down to the Hill Country to get flint for the arrowheads. He then heats the flint so that it is more workable. He uses sticks with copper or bone tips, called "Ishi" sticks, to flake off pieces of flint.

"I have used all kinds of methods to get flakes to come off," he said. "I even used a can opener once, and it worked."

While he works the flint he uses a round sandstone to prepare the edges so they can continue to be thinned down.

"I broke hundreds and thousands of them before I finally learned the proper techniques," Valentine said, "I still break some though."

A small arrowhead may take 30 or 40 minutes to complete, while a large one may take an hour and a half or two hours of uninterrupted work. But

the results are well worth it.

The Valentine household is filled with many examples of his work. He has constructed clocks, knives, jew-

elry and bows and arrows through his craft. Several collages of arrow points, made of various kinds of stone and glass, line the walls of the house. Also, the windows are filled with brightly colored glass arrow points hung from transparent cord.

Mr. Valentine also shares his craft with those who wish to learn. The day I visited he was instructing two of his students, "Pee Wee" Speer from Ft. Towson, OK and Anthony Bland of Clarksville.

William Valentine is a genuine craftsman, and his wife, Jerry, is a wonderful artist with oil paints as well. Perhaps the age old craft of making tools by hand will not be lost, thanks to people like this.

Pond Die-Offs Occurring From Drought Condition

Many East Texas pond owners are experiencing fish die-offs as a result of drought conditions.

Sufficient rainfall to produce runoff into farm ponds has been lacking throughout much of 1988, said Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist with the Prairie View A&M University Cooperative Extension Program.

Combinations of low water levels and high temperatures have caused numerous problems with oxygen depletion, according to Higginbotham who is headquartered at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. Additionally, nitrite poisoning has been a common occurrence in small ponds intensively managed for catfish. Nitrite poisoning is caused by an organic build-up in the pond from wasted feed and metabolic accumulations. Stock salt, added at the rate of 200 pounds per surface area, should help prevent nitrite poisoning.

Higginbotham suggests reducing the fish inventory in ponds carrying 1,000 pounds or more of catfish per acre to lessen the likelihood of oxygen depletion problems.

If fish are seen swimming sluggishly on the pond surface during the

morning, an oxygen depletion is probably occurring, said Higginbotham. A pump set in shallow water or an outboard motor can be used to circulate water and increase oxygen, thus reducing fish losses.

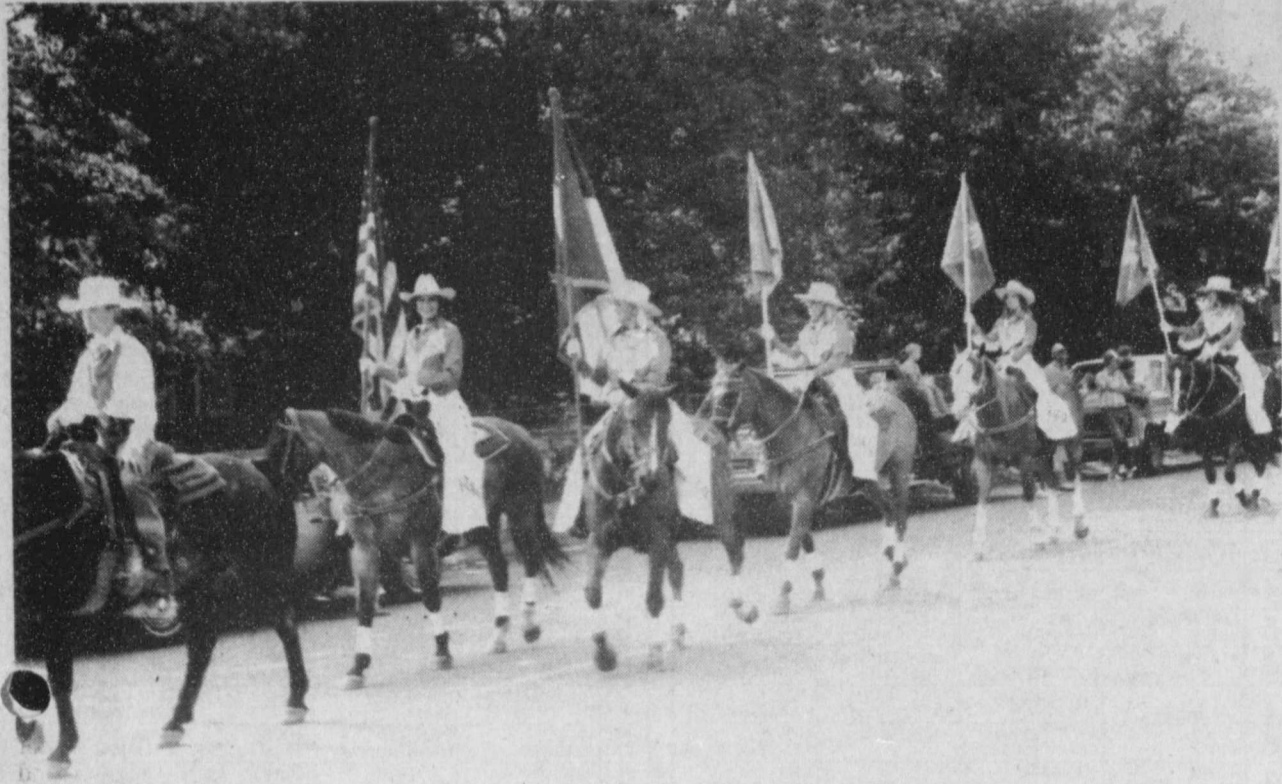

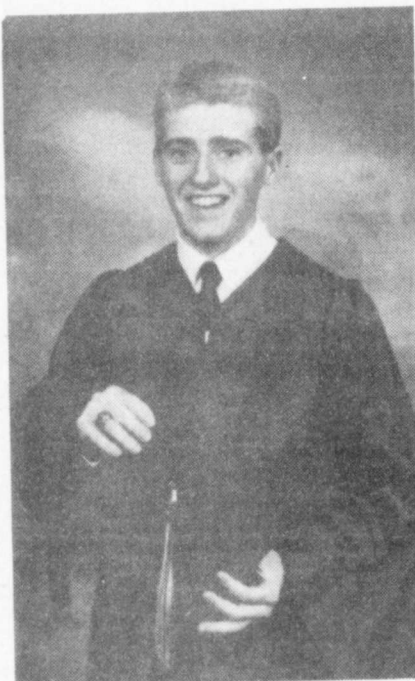

Taxes May Be Postponed On Drought Sales

Producers of livestock, including poultry, may elect to postpone for one year the reporting of income from sales due to drought conditions, according to Dr. Greg Clary, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This election applies to all livestock held for sale, whether raised or bought for resale. It also applies to livestock used for draft, breeding, dairy or sporting purposes and held less than two years in the case of cattle and horses or less than one year in the case of other livestock.

This second group of livestock, for breeding or dairy purposes, must be replaced within two years after the

close of the first year in which any part of the gain from drought sales is realized, Clary pointed out.

Livestock do not have to be raised in a drought area and the sale does not have to take place in a drought area to qualify for postponement. However, Clary emphasized that the sale must occur solely because of drought conditions that affected the water supply or grazing conditions.

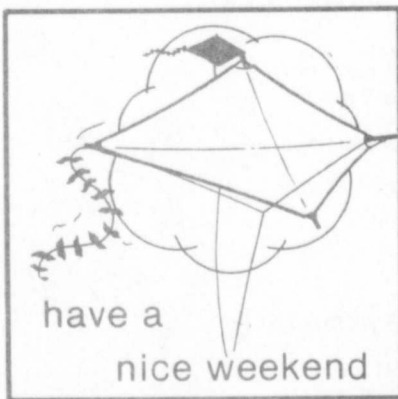
To make the election to postpone income, a statement must be attached. This two year replacement period may be extended with approval of the IRS district director.

Clary, headquartered at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton, said only income from livestock sold in excess of the number sold under usual business practices in the absence of drought is eligible for

postponement. For example, if under usual business practices, a producer would sell five dairy animals during the year, but because of drought in 1988 must sell 20 dairy animals, the proceeds from 15 animals could be reported as income on tax return for 1989.

Producers must meet the following conditions in order to postpone reporting of this income: (1) their to the tax return for the year of the sale. The statement must include the (3) they can show that the sale would not have occurred except for the drought; and (4) the drought has resulted in an area being designated as eligible for assistance by the federal government.

Sales made before the area became eligible for federal assistance still qualify.
