Canning...A Tasty Way To Preserve

It's canning season. Canning, the preservation of food by heat, pickling or other methods, is as age-old as civilization.

Ancient Egyptians used earthenware jars to seal food in. After packing the jars with berries or sliced fruits, they poured hot animal fat into the jar until it covered the produced.

As our technologies increased, so did the sophistication of canning.

And even with the advent of the deep freeze canning persists, for it is one of the most economical, flavor-saving methods ever devised.

Throughout east Texas there have been favorites fruits and vegetables for preserving for generations.

Blackberries, made into jelly or

canned whole; peaches, pickled, or sweet preserved; plum jelly, fig preserves; canned green beans; tomatoes, corn, relishes in variety uncountable, the list goes on and on!

Canning these days usually occurs in an air-conditioned kitchen. Instead of sterilizing jars in boiling water many cooks use the sterilize cycle on their dishwasher.

Other than that the process remains much the same as when mothers, grandmothers and great-grandmothers suffered in the heat of a wood stove without benefit of even electricity.

Local culinary specialists indulge in flights of fancy that leave their canned goods looking, and tasting like gourmet fare.

Canned vegetable soups become studies in color and variety, pickles are topped off with just the right slice of red pepper or yellow squash for accent.

Jellies lined up on a pantry shelf rival the most elegant cathedral for stained glass color.

Attractive jars, calico ruffled lids and a basket makes a gift that anyone is thrilled to get.

Canning held a much more important and basic need for the generations previous to today, however.

Without the produce from the summer's garden, winters held little to eat.

In an era of large families canned goods provided the mainstay of

menus, and there was usually neither the money nor the opportunity to shop at a grocery store more than a few times a year.

Because of the lack of refrigeration, and the scarcity of money, even meat was preserved in glass jars.

Several old-timers know the secret to canning fish, beef or pork, although pork was usually salt-cured or smoked.

The familiar names of Kerr and Ball are mainstays of the canning industry as they were a hundred years ago.

Beginning with rubber seal lids with a wire closure, they have progressed to a wide variety of sizes, shapes and designs in the present day.

Grandmothers would probably have delighted in self-sealing lids, and the availability of products to help can.

Fruit color preservation is aided by pectin products, the art of knowing exactly when a batch of jelly is ready for pouring up is made simpler by products to help jelling.

Controversy over whether these products detract from the flavor can be found, but one fact remains clear.

Canning, an age-old art, remains wherever good, fresh gardens produce delicious vegetables and fruits.

A pantry stocked with the colorful montage of jellies, jams, preserves or vegetables is a joy to behold. It makes the hours of tedious peeling, cooking, stirring sterilizing and work well worth every minute.

Jack Jeffus Dies In Wichita Falls, TX

Jack Jeffus, retired Wichita Falls banker and civic leader, died Thursday in a Wichita Falls hospital after a lengthy illness. He was the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom Jeffus of Deport and the nephew of Hugh Jeffus, Sr. of Deport. He was a graduate of Deport High School.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at First Presbyterian Church with the Rev. John Wiley officiating. Richard Fatheree, a former co-worker, delivered the eulogy. Entombment was in Crestview Mausoleum under the direction of Hampton-Vaughan Funeral Home.

Jeffus, 62, was born in Wichita Falls October 17, 1925. His father, Jack Jeffus, Sr., was a vice-president of City National Bank until his death in 1942. His mother, Jan Allen Breen, died in 1979.

Jeffus attended schools there in 1940, when he moved to Deport. After graduating from Deport High School, Jeffus attended Dartmouth College in Hanover, NH before joining the Navy under the V12 officer training program. He was commissioned a week after his 19th birthday, making him one of the youngest officers in the Navy.

During World War II, Jeffus served in the Pacific Theater aboard landing ship transports. He participated in the invasion of Okinawa and in the occupation of Japan, Korea and China. He was released from active duty in 1946 as a lieutenant, junior grade.

After the war he returned to Dartmouth, graduating in 1947. He worked on Wall Street for an investment banking firm until 1949 when he returned to Wichita Falls. Jeffus began work at City National Bank, now First Republic Bank Wichita Falls, on April 1, 1949. He started in an officer training program and worked in all departments.

He was named vice-president in 1956 at the age of 31, which made him one of the youngest bank vice-presidents in the United States at the time.

He became senior vice-president in 1966 and was elected to the board of directors the same year.

Jeffus was a commercial loan officer from 1956 to 1979, during which time he was banker to many of the city's leading businesses.

In addition to his duties as loan officer, Jeffus was in charge of the bank's bond portfolio. He was instrumental in installing the bank's first computer system and was in charge of building and remodeling projects.

In 1979, Jeffus became chief administrative and financial officer. He served in that position until his retirement in 1987.

In 1957 he was chosen one of the Five Outstanding Young Texans by the Texas Jaycees. He was an organizer of the Wichita Club. Jeffus served on the board of Wichita Falls Country Club for 8 years and as its president in 1967-68.

As chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee, he negotiated with the Air Force for the location, design and construction of the present Wichita Falls Municipal Terminal.

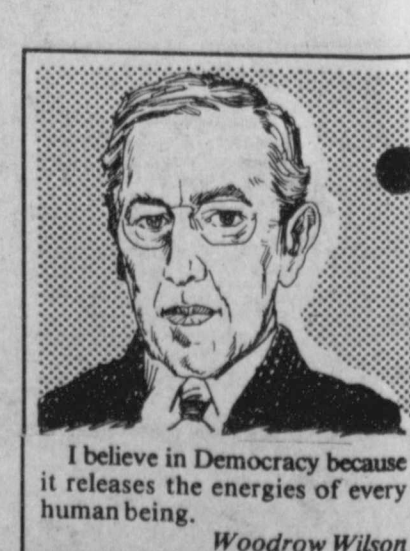
He was one of the organizers of Wichita County Republican Party and served on the executive committee of Wichita Falls Board of Commerce & Industry.

He is survived by his wife, Vinson Jeffus of Wichita Falls; a son, Marshall of Wichita Falls; two daughters, Sandy Lee of Wichita Falls and Lisa Powers of Lubbock; a stepson, Gary Inman of Wichita Falls; a stepdaughter, Vicki Inman Jeffus of Wichita Falls; a sister, Ellen Boddy Middleton of Houston; and 10 grandchildren.

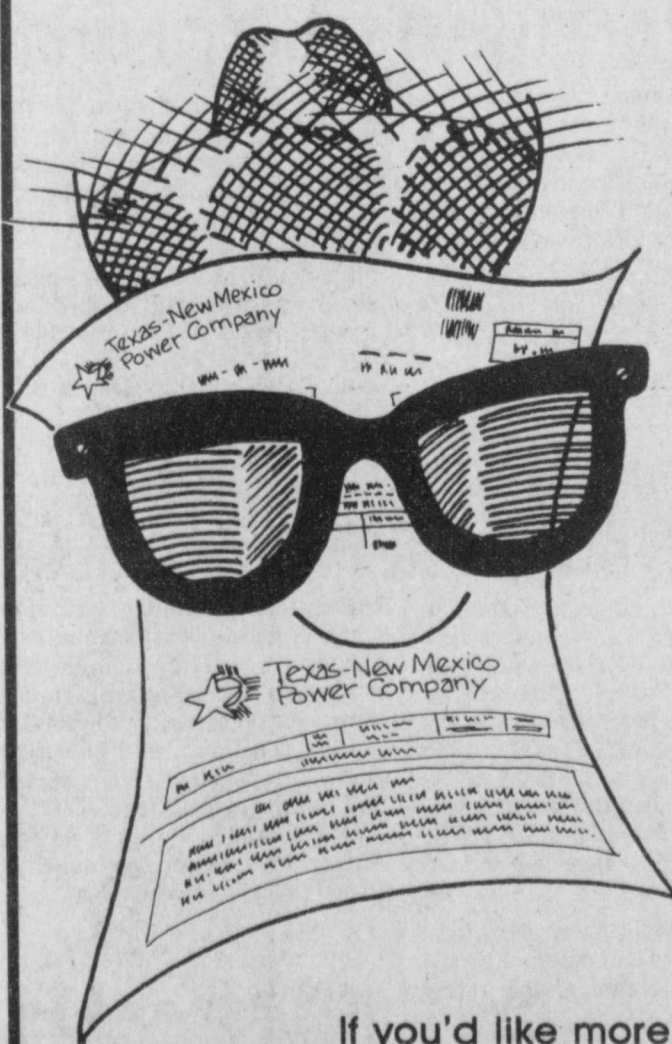

Keeping Healthy

Select Cordless Phone Model Carefully

Hearing loss problems are reported to be occurring with cordless phone models that have the ringing mechanism located in the earpiece, according to an FDA Drug Bulletin. "When the phone rings, if the user places the phone to the ear without first switching a control button from 'standby' to 'conversation', the next ring can be directly into the ear."

The Bulletin states that the problem may also occur with some cordless phones that have a paging feature that causes a ringing or other loud signal that comes from the earpiece when a switch on the base unit is activated by someone else.

The FDA suggests that other cordless phone models be selected and that anyone who already owns the ones associated with problems should keep them out of reach of small children and instruct all household members and visitors about the importance of turning off the ringer before placing the phone to the ear.

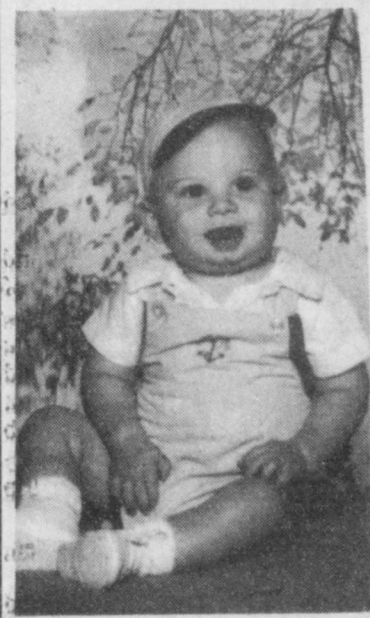

Keeping Healthy

Anxiety in the Elderly

A physical illness, a drug reaction, depression, or possibly other underlying reasons may be involved in acute severe anxiety in elderly patients, according to psychiatric specialist, Lissy Jarvik, MD, PhD, Professor, Department of Psychiatry and Biobehavioral Science at the University of California, Los Angeles. "A pure anxiety disorder in the elderly is rare," although chronic low-grade generalized anxiety is common in the elderly, said Dr. Jarvik at a symposium held at The American Psychiatric Association's annual meeting.

Dr. Jarvik said that there is little information available on the workings of medications used in the treatment of the elderly. Older patients are frequently on one or more drugs for one or more physical conditions and drug interactions become more problematic and more important for this group when body metabolism changes. Drugs tend to accumulate in tissue and to remain in the system for a longer period of time than in younger patients.

The symposium was supported by an educational grant from the Mead Johnson Pharmaceutical Division.

For now, though, most people just smile and enjoy the delicious moisture.

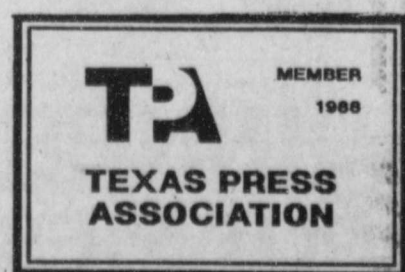
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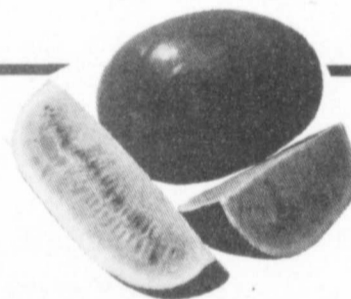
