

He was getting tired. To entertain himself he was sliding carefully from side to side across the pew.

When he tired of that, he tried flipping through the hymn book, but it contained no pictures, and very little of interest.

He turned to look back at the congregation, looking me straight in the eye. I grinned and gave him a big wink. Delightedly, he lowered himself behind the pew back, then slowly raised up again. I rewarded him with another smile.

With all apologies to my minister, watching the little boy in the pew ahead of me caused a wave of memory so strong that the gist of the sermon led to the back.

Summer services when I was a child weren't punctuated with the rumble of air conditioning, but with the faint, rhythmic "fup, fup, fup" of the old-fashioned ceiling fans.

My grandmother and grandfather, Jeffus, with whom I did a great deal of my church attendance, would place me between them, thus effectively corraling their charge from getting up to too much mischief.

Grandmother was a great believer in starch. Not wimpy spray starch, nor even cold starch. We're talking boiled starch that would provide enough stiffness to support at least a hundred pounds dead weight!

I always remember her ironing grandfather's white dress shirts that he wore to the bank. They stood like soldiers at attention, leaning only slightly against the wall, upright thanks to that starch!

The problem was, I had tender skin. She wanted to starch my little cotton dresses (pre-perma-press, obviously) like she did his shirts.

This created tension. My mom, who also has tender skin, wouldn't subject me to starch, preferring my skirts to be a little limp rather than listening to me whimper over the rash on my skin.

Then, protesting loudly, she dressed me for church, pronouncing the dress suitable and further irritating me by giving her forefinger a quick lick and swiping back an errant lock or two of hair.

Upon arrival the huge old church sanctuary always felt so cool. The blistering Texas sun hadn't yet had a chance to heat the building, and the fans were stirring the air.

But as service progressed, the room became warmer, and the starch in my dress would begin to sting and prickle. Pretty soon, perspiration would break out, and I began trying to stealthily scratch.

Before long Grandmother would admonish me to "Sit Still, Young Lady" in a firm whisper.

Like the little boy today, I employed methods of passing the time. Of course, singing the hymns was fun. The passing of the collection plate was always a high point.

It was only the sermon that dragged on. Most kids feel the same.

As I grew older I began to sit with the other youngsters, all in a row at the front, where we came under the scrutiny not just of our particular guardians, but the entire congregation. If we began to giggle or whisper loudly, or overused our note-passing privileges, it became the job of the adult sitting directly behind us to provide a little discipline.

Eventually, of course, the service ended, and we could while away a few minutes running like colts turned out into pasture, exercising our vocal cords (reduced to almost no use for an entire HOUR), and generally getting rid of the excess energy we were so abundantly blessed with.

Things change, the church, like most churches, is air conditioned. The floor has carpet, the decor is different. But some things are as constant as summer itself.

The familiar hymns, the ritual of collection, the soft amens and scripture readings.

That's why I winked at the little boy ahead of me...because I knew how he felt...and because that's exactly what my Grandfather always did to me. You see, he understood too...remembering back when he was a youngster, before the turn of the century, when sermons were a little wearisome to children, and summer services had the same hymns, the same rituals, the same wonderful continuity.

Reclaimer Demonstrated On County Road

Red River County hasn't moved into the twenty-first century, but some days it seems we're getting close. Last week, when state-of-the-art road building equipment was demonstrated near Jolntown, old-timers who can remember using mulepower to build country roads had cause to think so.

A new Caterpillar machine chugged along the right-of-way, tilling down four inches, mixing and breaking down the existing oil pavement and leaving an improved surface in its wake. The method uses less oil and provides a smoother, more durable surface when compacted.

Darr Equipment Company of Dallas, by arrangement with First Precinct Commissioner Drue Pirtle, was demonstrating the capabilities of the Caterpillar RR-250 Road Reclaimer for area officials. Darr is Caterpillar's dealer in northeast Texas.

Local observers found the demonstration impressive, but don't take it for granted that a locally-owned RR-250 will be prowling our roads right away. While long-term economy is promised, members of the Commissioners' Court will want to scratch their heads for a while before investing in one of the monsters. The price tag is a good deal higher than the mule teams and scrapers of yesteryear.

Times have changed. Former Bogata mayor W.C. Barnard recalls that in the World War I era, farmer-landowners were expected to contribute team and labor to work on roads through or by their property. Barnard remembers Ernest Geer as "Road Foreman" for an area near Deport. Geer was responsible for supervising roadworks and keeping track of citizen contributions to the programs.

Superintendent Harold Cowley reported on chapter programs, the

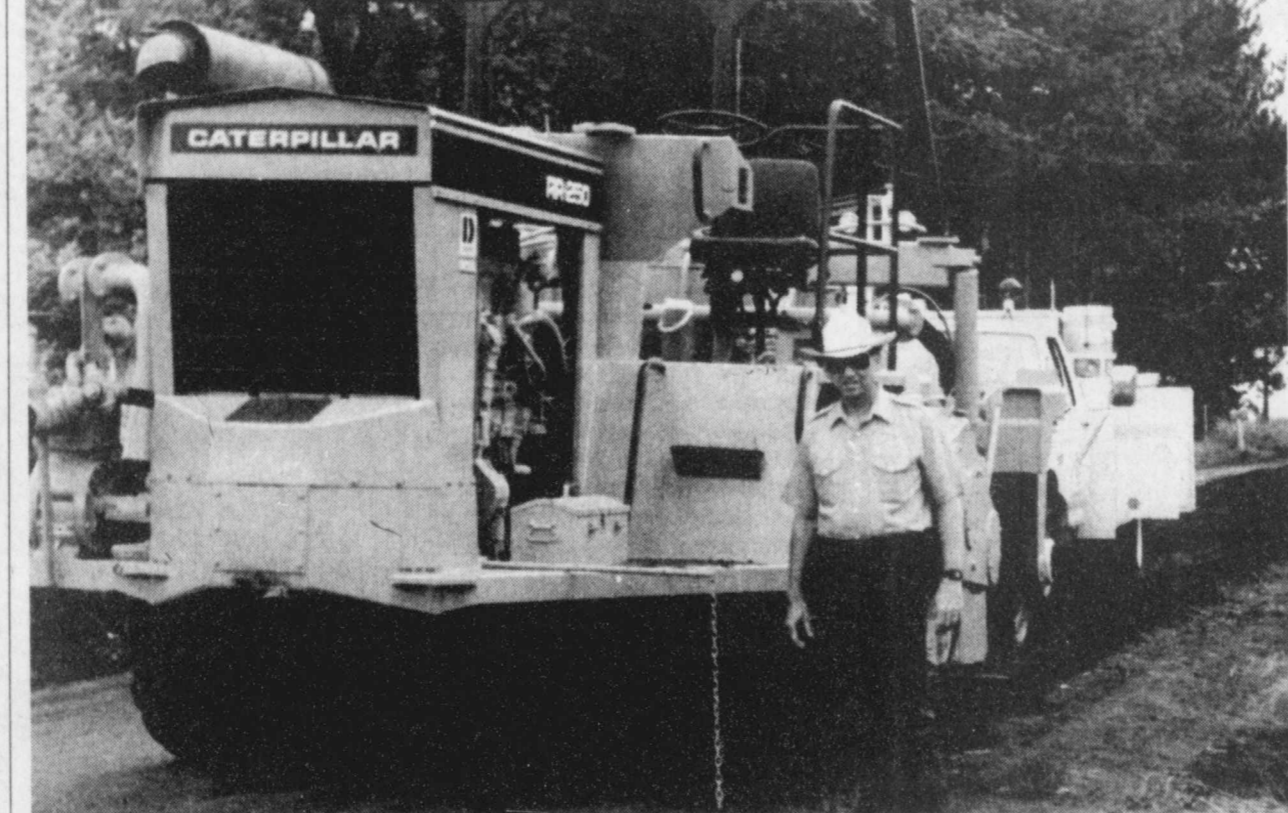
library programs, and the school board convention to be held in San Antonio.
