

Lake Louise, Banff, Balance Beauty and Tourism Skillfully

For those who chose to read our trip account last week, yes, we did end it a little abruptly. There was a closing paragraph, but it didn't fit! Thanks to everyone who called or dropped by to tell us you enjoyed the column.

Lake Louise was one of our first stops at the lower end of the Icefields Parkway.

Lake Louise is one of the most beautiful spots in the world.

Perfectly composed, the spectacularly aqua water is flanked by deep greens fir trees interspersed with noisy little aspen whispering their secrets to one another on the slightest breeze.

This tapers to one of the most majestic mountains the imagination could conjure, perfectly set like a jewel at the end of this panorama.

The Chateau Lake Louise stands solidly at the wide end of this picture-postcard beauty, angled so that the view is available to all guests.

Colorful canoes paddle by, walks and hikes from easy to difficult weave all the way around the lake.

Artists have been painting this for 100 years, and the present generation of painters stand with their easels trying to capture the incredible beauty before them.

After admiring the scenery we stopped at a place called Paradise Cafe and Grocery, where the front yard was so covered with brilliant flowers that it was worthy of photos.

Cream cheese, wheat crackers and biscuits (like the English, Canadians call what we call cookies "biscuits") completed a picnic we shared with ground squirrels, jackdaws, Canadian Jays and chipmunks.

At Lake Louise Village we admired the beautiful log or lumber condos and ski resorts.

Then we had to get on down the road to Banff, where our hotel reservations were waiting for the next four nights.

Banff is much larger than Jasper, and much more tourist oriented.

Prices are higher, food in particular is more expensive, and the mosquitoes are a rival for anything the state of Texas ever produced!

Banff mosquitos cheat, anyway. They don't whine. The first thing one becomes aware of is the actual bite. They are huge!

One drive we took along Vermilion Lakes yielded a flock of Canadian geese, a bald Eagle, and over 50 mosquito bites!

Early the next morning we took what was by far the most fascinating drive of the trip.

We had an hour and a half drive into British Columbia for the raft trip, which was on the Kicking Horse River in Yoho National Park.

But we had allowed ourselves extra time, and it was a good thing, because along that leisurely drive we stopped to take pictures of: an entire elk herd; a beautiful Mule Deer doe, a magnificent bull Elk grazing in the trees, antlers in velvet; and several dozen roaring waterfalls.

When we had been told that the Canadian National Parks of Alberta and British Columbia were more beautiful than those Colorado and Wyoming we had scored.

They truly are, though. The mountain driving is so easy, without the sheer drops on the side of the road that they can be better enjoyed, too.

The amazing color of the water, and the wide-spread scope of the mountains, makes them even more path-taking than most of the Rockies.

At Golden, we linked up with the rest of our rafting band and loaded up on a bus to wind down a narrow gravel road to the side of the Kicking Horse River.

Since most of you probably read my column last week, we'll close here, and give rafting a rest for a week!

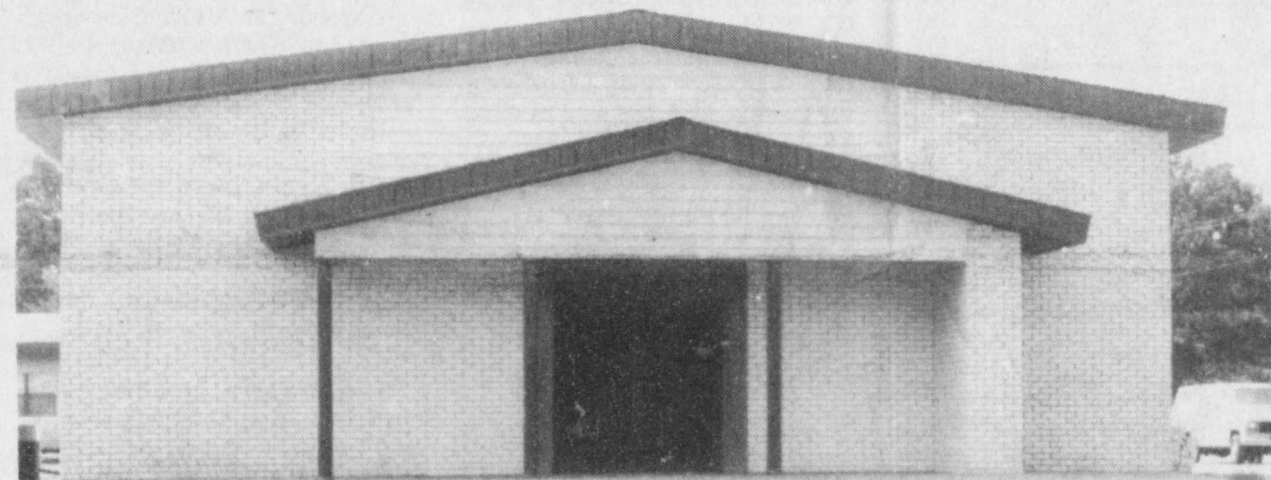

## Calvary Baptist Church Anticipates 50th Celebration

On August 20 and 21, the Calvary Baptist Church in Talco will celebrate fifty years of Christian worship at their church. Everyone is invited to attend these special services.

Special guests will be former pastors and their families, former deacons and former members who have moved away. All current members should be present in order to welcome visitors.

Beginning Saturday, August 20, services will be held at 7 p.m. with C.G. Renfro. Sunday, August 21, services will be at 9:45 a.m. with Sunday School, 10:45 a.m. with morning worship with Don Williams; 12 noon with a covered dish luncheon and at 3 p.m. afternoon service with Marion Coon, followed by a reception for fellowship.

Anyone who loves to sing or play is invited to bring music and share your talent with the congregation in special music during the services.

For the last two months, Calvary has been without a pastor, however,

on Sunday, July 10, Brett Castle was called as pastor. Bro. Brett graduated from East Texas Baptist University in Marshall in May where he was named recipient of the James & Mary Williams Award for outstanding service performed by a student pastor. He served as mission pastor at Toledo Bend Baptist Mission since November, 1986. Bro. Brett and his wife, Betty, have two sons, Brett, who is 12 and Nicholas, who is nine.

The Calvary Baptist Church was organized on August 18, 1938 with 42 charter members and was located on the corner of Hwy. 271 and McLean Street with Bro. Joe Sullivan as first pastor.

In 1952, Bro. R.E. Baucum led in helping the Negro Baptists of the community to erect a church building with the assistance of Calvary

Baptist. Then in 1955 the present church auditorium, educational building, and parsonage were erected on FM 71 east during the ministry of Bro. Joe Denton. The new \$100,000 church plant included 11,000 square feet of air conditioned floor space.

Under the leadership of Bro. Barry Jernigan, a new parsonage was built in 1980, and remodeling of the present building began.

Remodeling continued under the leadership of Bro. Marion Coon and Bro. Ted White. Completion of the

renovation is near, and plans are being made for a gymnasium in the near future.

Through the years, the church has had a part in the Associational, State and Foreign work with regular contributions through the Cooperative Program and Associational Missions. Special emphasis has been given to the church's youth, and in 1987, money was raised with which to purchase a church van, and Darin Lair of Mt. Pleasant was called as Youth Minister.

## Talco Ministers Comment On Movie

Talco Ministers have expressed their opinions on the controversial movie "The Last Temptation of Christ".

The movie has received widespread attention due to the highly controversial nature in which it deals with the life of Christ, especially a "hallucination scene".

Brother Gary House of the First Baptist Church in Talco stated that "I only know what I've read and heard on the news, but in my opinion it is simply trying to bring down the name of Jesus Christ and undermine the word of God".

Brother Johnny Mack Brown of Maple Springs Baptist Church said that "there are a thousand other ways this movie could have been made to show the temptation of Jesus Christ, and the movie shouldn't have been made like it was".

Brother Brown continued that he is against this movie because of the "confusion it could cause to non-Christians". He continued that "We already have too many movies and TV shows that are just pure dirty and nasty".

Brother Wesley Vandever of the Church of God of Prophecy in Sugar Hill said "I feel this movie is degrading to the name of Jesus Christ and to Christians as a whole".

Brother Brett Castle of Calvary

Baptist Church in Talco states that "this movie takes away from Christ. I have read scripts on parts of this movie that were given to me at my past church. They were terrible in my opinion".

All of the ministers contacted stated that they believed that people were not being over-cautious concerning the film, in fact, might not be being cautious enough.

When asked why people who do not attend church regularly are signing a petition to stop the showing of the movie in our area, they stated that people who do not attend church regularly still have a deeply instilled belief in Jesus Christ, and an interest in keeping their image of Jesus from being perverted.

All agreed that the movie would not be a success in this area. They agreed that some people might go to see the movie out of curiosity, but most won't, finding the whole idea disgusting.

It was not possible to contact every minister in the area on the subject, but it is safe to say that none of them would voice approval for a movie of this nature.

Whether or not the film which has attracted so much attention will be a financial success must, of course, remain to be seen.

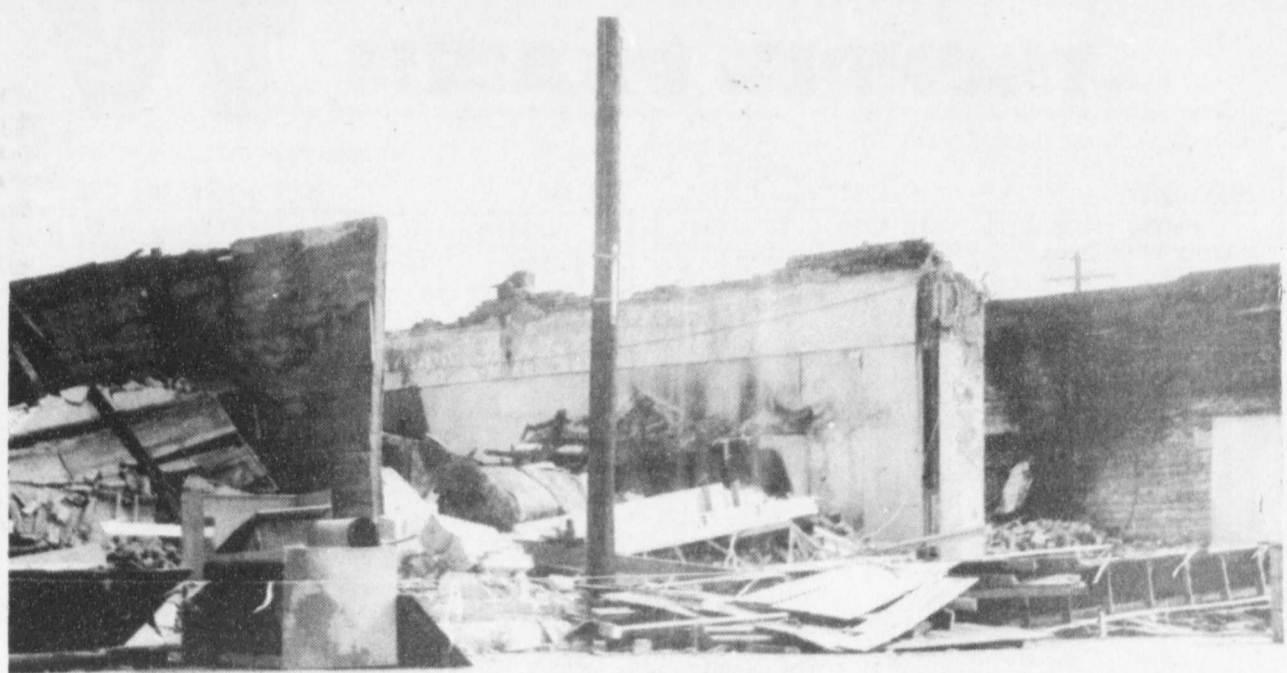

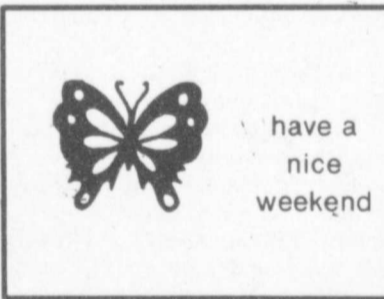

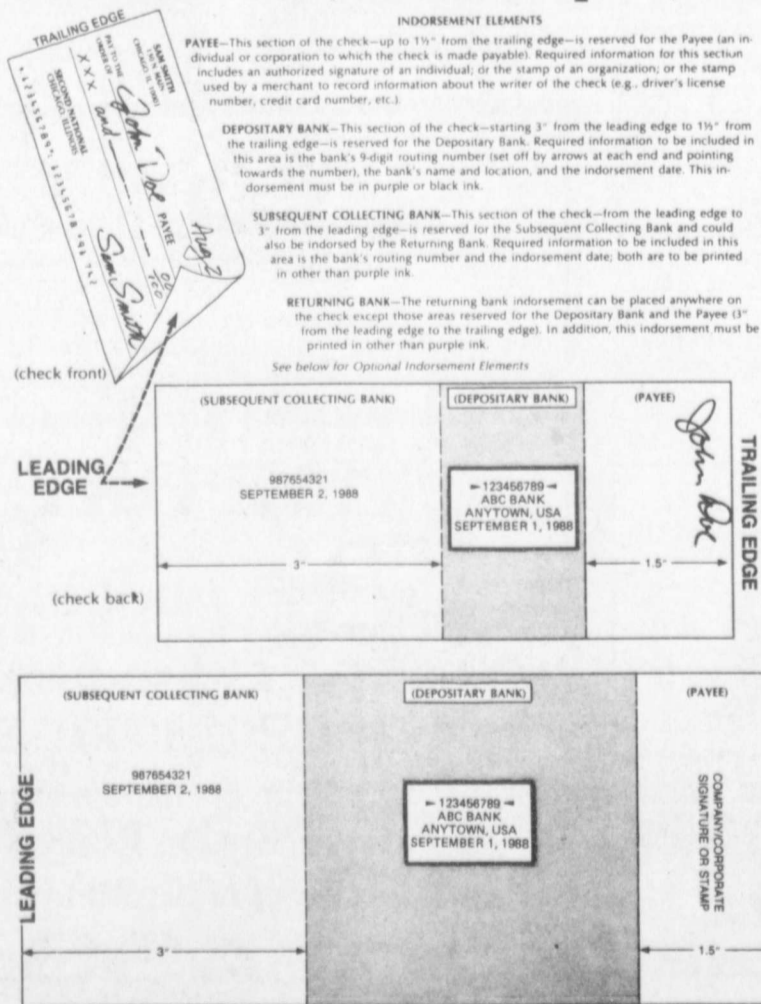

## PEACHY-KEEN POUND CAKE

- Topping**
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds
  - 1/4 cup shredded coconut
  - 1/4 cup butter or margarine
  - 1/4 cup light brown sugar
  - 2 peaches, peeled and diced,
  - or 1-1/2 cups frozen peaches
- Cake**
- 1 cup butter or margarine
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 1-2/3 cup Swans Down Cake Flour
  - 4 eggs
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Place almonds and coconut in a microwave-safe dish and microwave on HIGH 3 to 4 minutes or until coconut is toasted, stirring occasionally. Place 1/4 cup butter in 8-cup microwave-safe tube pan. Microwave on HIGH 1 minute or until melted. Crumble brown sugar into pan. Top with half the coconut-almond mixture, peaches and the remaining coconut-almond mixture; set aside. In a mixer bowl, cream 1 cup butter and sugar until fluffy. Add remaining cake ingredients and beat at low speed 1 minute. Spoon batter over topping. Microwave on MEDIUM (50% power) 9 minutes, rotating pan every 2 minutes. Microwave on HIGH 1 to 3 minutes or until the surface is almost set. Let stand on counter 10 minutes. Loosen sides with knife; turn out onto cake rack to cool. Garnish with additional peaches if desired.

Note: Wattage of microwave ovens varies. Recipe kitchen-tested in 650-700 watt ovens. Consult instruction manual for your oven's wattage and possible adjustments in cooking times.

## Winter Pasture Can Supplement Hay Supply

By Herb Brevard

Winter pastures can stretch hay supplies for drought stricken livestock producers, according to an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Winter pasture can be cost less than hay and provides a higher quality forage than hay, said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., Extension Agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

Producers need to decide if they will plant small grain or ryegrass and clover for winter grazing. Small grain is better adapted for planting in a prepared seedbed. Ryegrass and clover can be successfully broadcast or drilled into an existing sod.

Reeves said that producers must decide this month what kind of winter pasture to plant and where to plant it. If small grain is chosen, seedbeds need to be prepared now for planting by September 15. If ryegrass and clover is the choice, planting time is not until late September or October.

All the forage plants that grow during the winter like a pH of at least 6. Therefore, Reeves suggests taking a soil test now to determine the nutrients involved. If lime is needed, it, plus any recommended phosphorus and potassium, should be applied before disking or breaking the land. The incorporation of these nutrients will speed their interaction with the soil.

Producers should check seed supplies and prices with dealers so that this information may be used in making final winter pasture decisions.

The ladies flew from Dallas to Anchorage where they joined a Princess tour.

Their home base for the first two days was Anchorage. While there, they were taken to Whittier by bus on a flatbed rail car as there are no roads to Whittier. They traveled through picturesque Bear Valley with snow capped mountains and Portage glaciers in view. Arriving in Whittier, they transferred to a sleek catamaran vessel for a trip through College Fjord to see numerous glaciers. The trip was highlighted by an active glacier that calved into the calm water. Loud cracking sounds preceded the breaking ice. Bald eagles were seen in their nesting places as well as sea otters in the water.

The next day they departed Anchorage aboard the Midnight Sun Express, a domed train, for a 7-hour ride to Denali National Park. One night was spent with a wildlife tour where they came within a few miles of Mt. McKinley, but were unable to view the mountain because of cloud cover. A grizzly bear with cubs, caribou, moose and dall sheep were sighted.

Leaving Denali, they continued on the Midnight Sun Express to Fairbanks. There the travelers cruised on the China and Tanana Rivers via a sternwheeler. They saw old Indian villages, gold mining sites and operating fishwheels. They also saw a demonstration by one of Alaska's women's dog mushers. Fairbanks also offered a view of the Trans-Alaska pipeline and a visit to the University of Alaska.

After Fairbanks, the ladies traveled by motorcoach to Tok, Alaska, Whitehorse Yukon Territory to Skagway, Alaska (the northern-most port of the Inside Passage). The overland trip from Fairbanks to Skagway was 700 miles through miles of wilderness in interior Alaska. This trip took two days.

In Skagway, the group boarded the Sun Princess for a luxurious cruise down the Inside Passage. They leisurely viewed the shoreline along the way.
