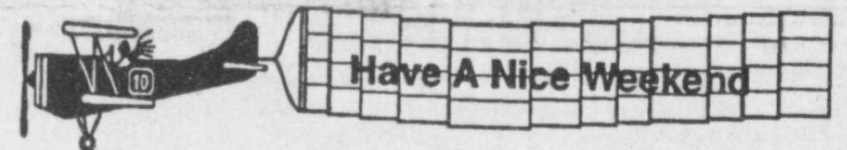

Rivercrest Loses 7-0 To Winnsboro

"If it weren't for bad luck, we'd have no luck at all." This popular glom and doom slogan must certainly apply to the unfortunate Rivercrest Rebel squad this week, following their touch 7-0 loss to the Winnsboro Red Raiders.

The Rebels, in providing their best overall performance of the season, held the bigger and stronger 3-A opponents out of the endzone for more than three quarters, and until the final minute, had opportunity to overturn the outcome. Coach Terry Tiddens agreed with that analysis when he said, "The team had a good outing tonight, they certainly reduced significantly the mistakes of early season."

The Rebels overcame their propensity to cough up the pigskin, committing only two fumbles, which considering the wet playing conditions was commendable. The key play of the contest came on the first snap of the fourth quarter. The determined Rebel defensive unit, led by Craig Easley, Bradley Woods and Kevin Beene, with capable aid from Shane Beers, Audie Early and Clint Tidwell, forced the Raiders into a crucial fourth down from the Rebel 46-yard line. When Raider signal caller Mark Safford took the snap, the slippery pigskin squirmed from his hands and fell feet overhead. But Safford was able to snatch the ball away in mid-air, then squirmed through the momentarily confused Rebel defensive

line for a seven yard gain. The all important first down enabled the Raiders to continue the lone scoring drive of the night, and with three minutes plus elapsed in the final stanza, senior tailback, Brady Ross, scored on a one yard plunge. Craig Deaton added the extra point.

Desite the loss, the Rebel squad gave indication that they are ready to open District 17AA play against Wolfe City this Friday night. The offense regained much of their punch, especially in the second half, as running back Scooter Brown, who carried for 63 yards, gave evidence that his injured toes are responding to treatment. In addition, quarterback Bradley Woods excited the fans early on with a 37-yard gain from a quarterback draw. But these two plays constituted the bulk of the Rebel offense, as they netted only 138 yards on the night. The Rebel passing game was off target, as Woods went without a completion in four attempts, while having one picked off late in the game. The Rebels had six first downs, while Winnsboro, behind the powerful running of Ross, 187 yards, had 13, and a total of 236 yards on offense.

The Rebel defensive play was noteworthy. In the first quarter, Marcus Savage recovered a Raider bobble to halt their penetration into Rebel territory at the 25-yard line.

Midway in the second quarter, safety Jeremy Abshire leaped into the endzone to deter a Raider aerial

from its intended target and preserve the shut-out. On the final play of the first half, cornerback Jimmy Lewis swiped a pass. But it was the Raider offensive line that made the difference in the game. By the fourth quarter, their decided weight advantage began to tell, as they in their scoring drive, were able to control the line of scrimmage.

But after the Raider score, the Rebel defense rallied to give their counterparts an opportunity to score. On two occasions, the Rebels applied heavy rush to the Raider punter, forcing him to cover the ball, and give possession to the Rebels. But the offense, which at times looked sharp, was unable to capitalize on the coveted field position.

"No one likes being 0-5," mused Giddens as he evaluated the team's fortunes. "But I still honestly believe the Rebels, if they stay healthy, and if they execute as they did tonight, will exert an influence in the district race. Last week, Winnsboro scored 25 points against Cooper, who is the favorite in our district. We only allowed Winnsboro one touchdown." Giddens concluded, "The homecoming game against Wolfe City starts a new count. We can go to play-offs, if we win four of our last five games."

Kick-off for Friday's game is set for 7:30 p.m. with homecoming ceremonies starting at 6:50 p.m.

Tickets are available at all schools, for home games, at \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students. Gate price for the tickets is \$3.00 each.
