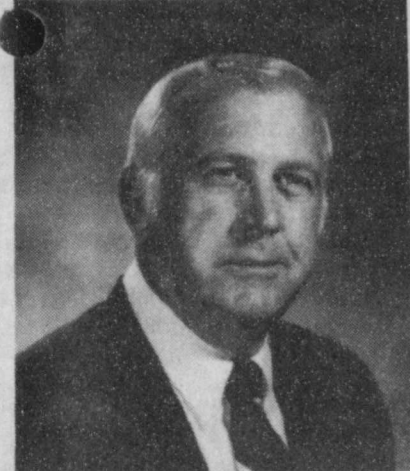

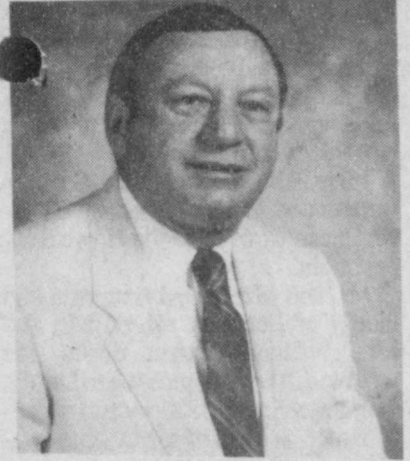

Talco-Bogata Recognizes Principals

Texas Governor William P. Clements, Jr., recently issued a proclamation designating the week of October 10-16 as Secondary School Principals Week in Texas and urged Texans to pay appropriate recognition to those principals.

An official memorandum from the governor's office stated that the school principal is a vital element in the educational process. These men and women serve as the instructional leaders on the school campus and act as a liaison between teachers, students and parents in the community.

The school principal is the recognized educational leader of a school and has been proven by research and study, to be the key factor in establishing the effectiveness of a school. The principal's leadership and direction sets the atmosphere and tone of a school, the climate for learning, and is the basic foundation upon which a school's goals are achieved.

The skills of the principal effect the performance of teachers and the degree of concern for what students learn and become. These important individuals play a major role in establishing educational excellence in our state by successfully implementing the elements of education reform.

The state of Texas appreciates the skill, dedication and commitment typical of its school principals and it is most fitting that these men and women be recognized and honored.

Many of the citizens in Bogata, Talco surrounding communities can recall when principals served in the small rural and one room schools as teacher, principal, janitor and many other unclassified tasks. Over the years, changes have been made in education and many of the present day duties of principals reflect some of those changes. Due to larger enrollments, an intensified amount of paper work, and more discipline problems in the school, principals sometimes find themselves overwhelmed with the task of fulfilling their roles as leaders.

A principal's job description for the Talco-Bogata CISD states the job goal for principals is that by use of leadership, supervision and administrative skills they manage the assigned school so as to promote the educational development of each student. By observing the principals of our three campuses as they perform their duties from day to day, it is easy to see that Mr. Smith, Mr. Stubblefield and Vickers all go above and beyond their requirements in an effort to aid in the academic and social well being of their students.

As principal of Rivercrest High School, James Smith meets new challenges each day. Mr. Smith became principal of Rivercrest in 1986. He served as principal of Bogata Elementary and Junior High for the

1984-85 school year. Mr. Smith began his student teaching in Custer, OK at Custer High School teaching Industrial Arts in 1963. He became the Industrial Arts and Math teacher at Robert E. Lee Junior High School in Pampa in 1963 and taught there until 1966. He taught math at Choctaw High School in Choctaw, OK from 1966-67. From then to 1975 he taught math at Iowa Park High School in Iowa Park. He became assistant principal of Coakly Junior High in Harlingen in 1975 and served in that capacity until 1977. From then to 1980, he served as principal of Clarksville Junior High in Clarksville and then moved to Como where he was superintendent until 1984.

Mr. Smith graduated from Jewell High School in Jewell, Oregon in 1959. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford, OK in 1963 with a major in Industrial Arts and a minor in Business and Physical Education. He received his Master of Education degree from Southwestern Oklahoma State University in 1967, with a major in Math and minor in Physical Education. He received his Post Master's from East Texas State University in Commerce with a major in Educa-

tional Administration and a minor in Secondary and Higher Education. In August of 1988, Mr. Smith received his Doctor of Education Degree from the Department of Secondary and Higher Education with a major in Educational Administration from East Texas State University. He is very active in civic organizations, the community and the First United Methodist Church where he is a member. He is married to Beverly Ann Elace, a secretary at Region VIII Education Service Center in Mt. Pleasant. They have one daughter, Teresa Twedell of Mesquite and a son, Gary, a student at Oklahoma State University.

In response to questions about Mr. Smith, Rivercrest High School students described him as fair, understanding and always willing to give the students another chance.

Frank Stubblefield is a name most people in this area are familiar with. In describing Mr. Stubblefield, area residents, teachers and parents of Bogata students use words such as friendly, concerned, kind and always ready to listen to the problems and needs of others. Bogata faculty members agree to as their supervisor, Mr. Stubblefield is always fair and considerate.

Mr. Stubblefield graduated from Bogata High School in 1949. He then attended Paris Junior College, but his education was interrupted by his serving in the United States Air Force from 1950 to 1953. In 1956 he received his Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics from East Texas State University and his Master of Education degree in elementary education from ETSU in 1966. He received his Administrative certificate for elementary and junior high from ETSU in 1969. He completed his student teaching at Bogata in 1956. From 1956 to 1957, Mr. Stubblefield served as a mathematics teacher and junior high coach at Dimple. From 1957 to 1961 he was employed by the United States Postal Service as the Bogata postmaster. He became the high school coach and mathematics teacher at Bogata in 1961 and in 1962 became principal of Bogata Elementary School and remained in that position until 1974. He was then employed as a mathematics teacher at Rivercrest High School. From 1975 to 1984, he was the head coach of girls basketball at Rivercrest. He became principal of Bogata Elementary and Junior High in 1986.

Frank Stubblefield is married to Anita Rich and they have three daughters, Elizabeth Jones of Rockwall; Linda Barlen of Arlington; and Jo Ann Poole Ceburne. They two grandchildren. He is a member of Texas State Teachers Association and Teachers Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association, various civic clubs and attends the United Methodist Church in Bogata.

Billy Joe Vickers is a 1949 graduate of Bogata High School. He then attended Paris Junior College. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from East Texas State University in 1957 with a major in Elementary Education and a minor in English. He received his master of Education degree from East Texas University with a major in Administration in 1962. He completed his practice teaching at A.L. Day Elementary in Commerce, teaching science.

He has a total of 31 years experience in the Talco and Bogata Schools. He coached on Elementary and High School levels for 15 years. He is a member of the Lions Club, served on the Talco City Council and attends the Church of Christ in Talco. He served a short time in the United States Navy. He is married to Wanda Rogers and they have one daughter,

Tina Nolen of Talco. They are expecting their first grandchild soon.

Having lived in Bogata and Talco, Vickers is loved and respected in both communities. Talco residents are of the opinion that he is a very fine person and has the best interest of his students at heart.

Principals often get labeled a "heavy" because of their duties involving discipline in the schools. With this knowledge, principals must work

hard to gain the trust of students while maintaining their authority. According to students on the three campuses, Mr. Smith, Mr. Stubblefield and Vickers have all managed somehow accomplish this task. Not only do these men have the students and teachers as friends, they also hold their respect as instructional leaders on the school campus.

Fire Safety Program Presented

The Talco Elementary and Talco Junior High schools heard a program from the Talco Fire Department and the Mt. Pleasant Fire Department Monday.

Talco Fire Chief Randy Carroll and Danny Welch, Titus County-Mt. Pleasant Fire Marshall presented the program, which was sponsored by the Talco PTO.

An informative talk on a child's level, "Don't Play With Matches" and a slide show was presented.

A report that at least two houses a year in Titus County are burned because of youngsters playing with fire impressed the students.

The school has two fire drills at month, and it was stressed that home fire drills should be held. Children were urged to see that doors and windows aren't locked, making sure windows aren't painted or stuck together and to practice opening windows.

They are instructed about crawling on hands and knees to escape smoke and it was stressed that "anything can be replaced except your

life". Procedures for dealing with burning clothes were gone over, and proper ways to report fires, including staying on the phone to give directions was stressed.

Calling for a fireman if trapped, overcoming fear of firemen with air packs and various other lifesaving were other aspects of the program.

Booklets were handed out to the students, supplied by Danny Welch of Mt. Pleasant.

The students also learned about getting out of the way of emergency vehicles, establishing a meeting place for family members in case of fire, and heard how two grass fires in Talco had been started by kids.

A firetruck was on hand to be looked over by the youngsters, who inspected equipment and heard about volunteers donating their time because they want to help.

In appreciation the Talco PTO donated \$100.00 to the Talco VFD and \$50.00 to Mt. Pleasant Fire Department.

Red River, Titus Counties Unite To Repair Bridges

Red River County Precinct 1 Commissioner H. Drue Pirtle and Titus County Precinct 3 Commissioner J.W. Terrell closed the bridge across Sulphur River last Wednesday for repairs. Road crews from both counties were busy tearing out each end of the bridge in order to level the approaches and re-deck the ends with new bridge lumber.

The Sulphur River bridge is one of the twenty-one bridges in Precinct 1 that the Texas Highway Department has recommended to close until it is repaired.

The repair on the bridge is scheduled to be finished Thursday and the road will be open to the public again.

Plans are being drawn by the Texas Highway Department to build a new bridge across Sulphur River to replace the old bridge. It is hoped that the contract can be signed to begin construction next summer.










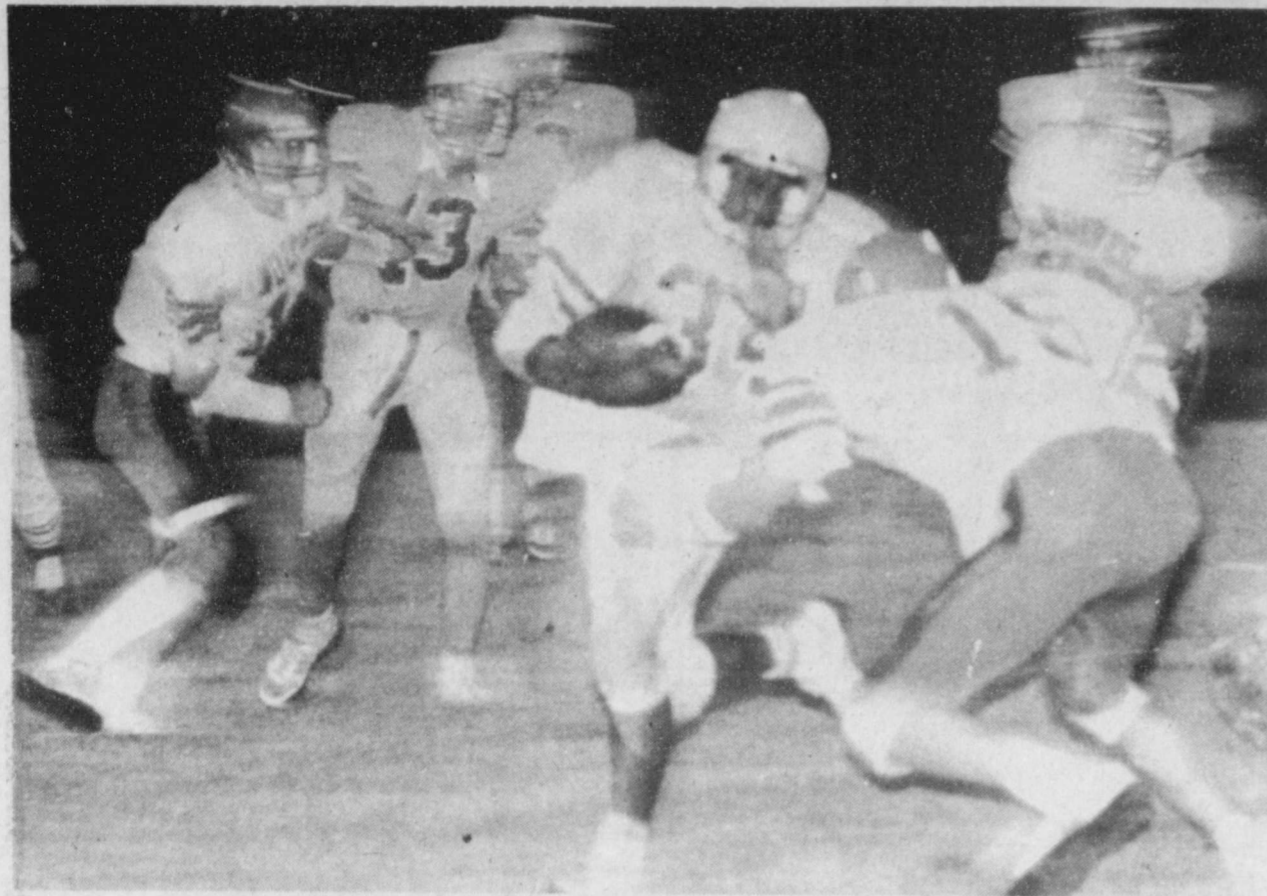

Some of the direct descendants of John McCrury, one of the founding fathers of the McCrury Cemetery

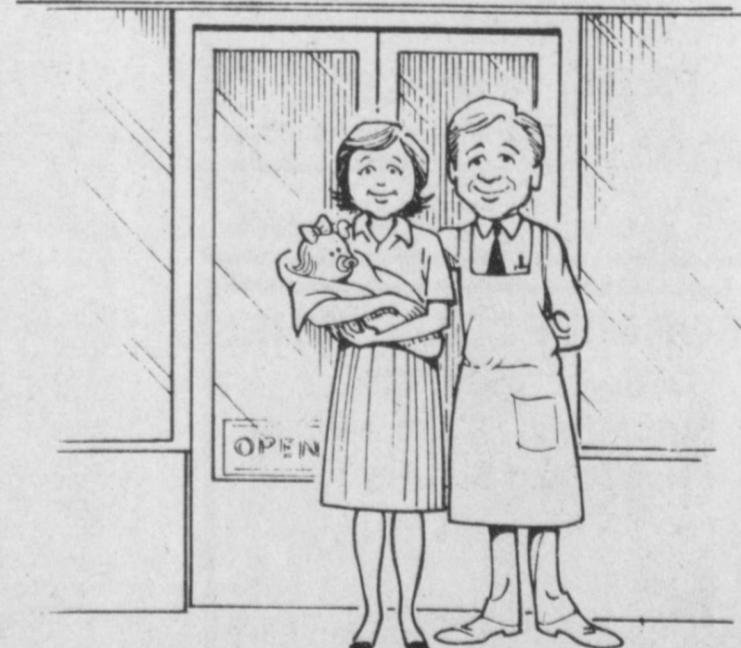
were present. County officials present were: County Judge, L.D. Williamson; County Clerk, Mary Hausler; and Precinct I Commission, Drue Pirtle.

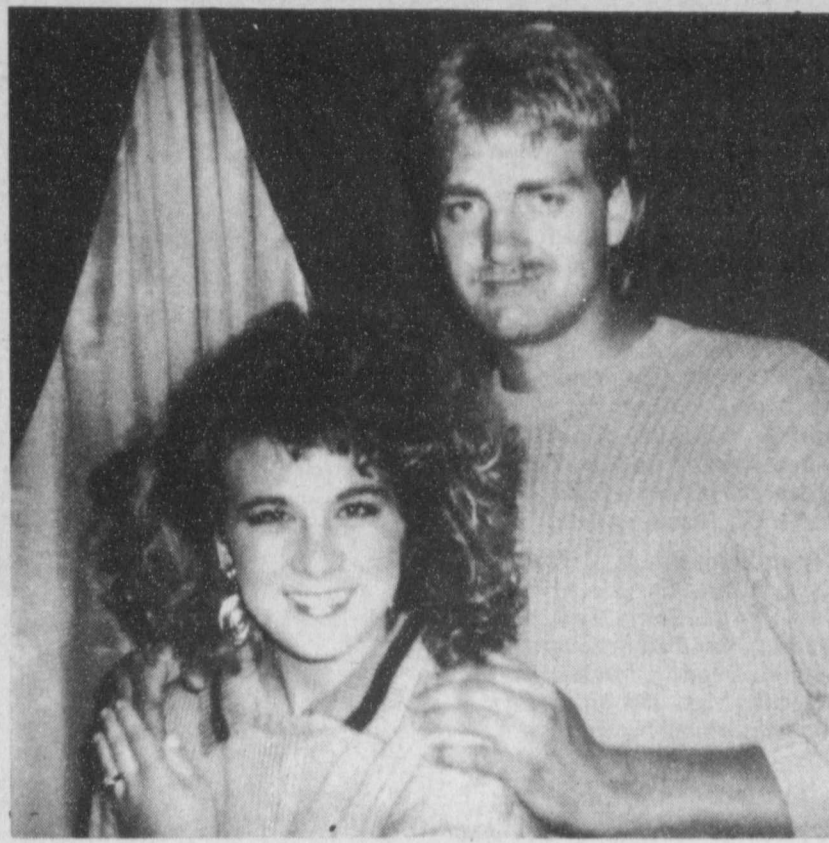

Local Sales Tax Rebates Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a surge in sales tax rebates to several large metropolitan areas in Texas reflects increasing statewide economic growth and stability.

"The state's metropolitan areas are doing even better than originally forecast. I'm glad to see Texas is sitting on solid economic ground again," Bullock said.

However, locally, rebates were down, as Blossom received no payment this period for a .68% decrease over the same period from last year. Deport received no payment this

period, for a 1.21% decrease over the same period last year.

Paris received \$144,914.56 this period, for a 6.27% increase. Bogata received \$1,238.72 for this period, for an 8.61% decrease over last year's payments to date while Clarksville received \$12,869.76 for this period for a 7.31% increase.

Talco received \$1,437.19 for this period, for a 33.08% decrease over last year's payments to date while Mt.

Pleasant received \$77,639.15 for a 7.82% decrease.

In the larger metropolitan areas,

such as Ft. Worth, whose payment showed a 27.4% increase and Houston, whose payment grew 22.4% for the same period, other cities showed large increases as well.

Checks totaling \$64.8 million were mailed to 914 Texas cities that collect an optional local sales tax at either one percent or one and one-half percent, showing a growth of 17% in sales tax rebates this month over October 1987, Bullock said.

The checks represent taxes collected in August and reported by Sept. 20.

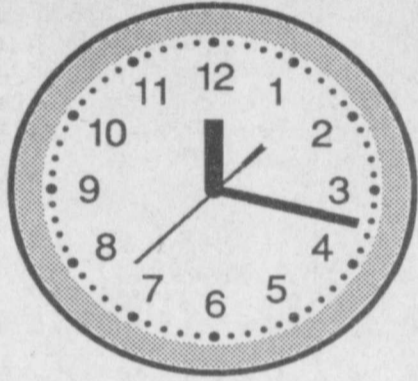

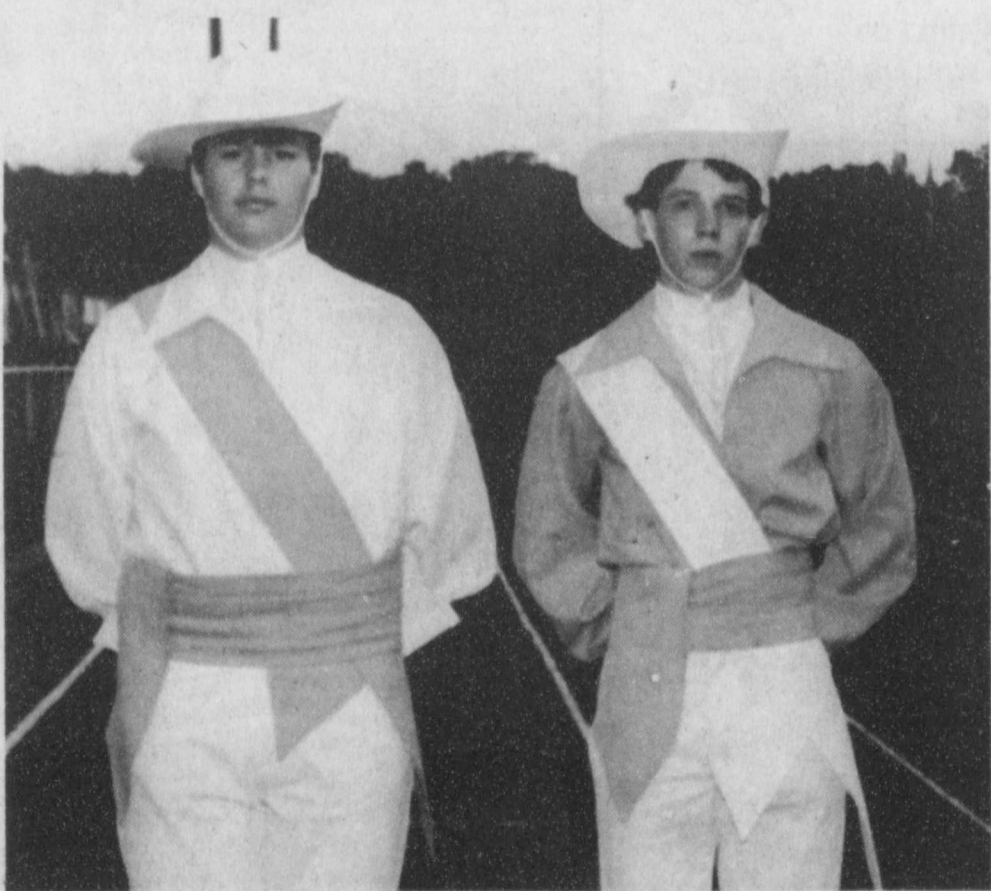

Diet and Mental Function

A group of 260 healthy men and women over the age of 60 were given a psychological test to measure memory as well as a test for abstract thinking and problem-solving. Those who had a low dietary intake and low blood levels of riboflavin, folic acid, vitamin B12, and vitamin C tended to perform the poorest in the tests, the researchers reported. The results were not related to income level or amount of education.

All this does not mean you should jump on the vitamin-supplement bandwagon once you reach the golden years. What the University of New Mexico study does suggest, however, is that maintaining a well-balanced diet is all the more important as you age.

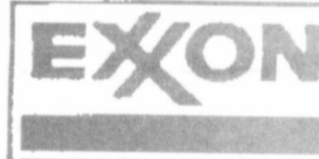
