## George Bush Wins Presidency

The Bush-Quayle ticket won the national presidential election in what has been described as "a rout" Tuesday, taking 353 electoral votes to Dukakis' 107, and 54.2 of the popular vote.

On a local level, voters were not so overwhelmingly in favor of the Republican candidate, with most rural boxes going to Dukakis or being almost even.

Congressman Jim Chapman won his bid for re-election easily. State representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson also found himself returned to office with no problem.

At press time the vote count was not total, but Richard Anderson was trailing behind his challenger, Republican Bill Ratliff.

In Titus County the Bush-Quayle ticket received 4247 votes and Dukakis Bentsen received 4357.

Lloyd Bentsen received 6140 in his bid for senate re-election.

Kent Hance received 3370 to Clint Hackney's 4698. Tom Phillips received 3245 votes and Ted D. Robertson 4738; Paul Murphy 2599 to Lloyd Doggett 5497. Bill Ratliff 4204 and Bill Anderson 4298. Sam Russell 6719 Charles Bleil 6030.

Amendment 1 in Titus County received 6081 for votes and 912 against. Amendment 2 received 3705, against 2914. Amendment 3 for 4059 against 2642.

Talco voters voted 126 for George Bush, 241 for Michael Dukakis.

Wilkinson voted 61 for Bush, 88 for Dukakis.

Missing three games was Charles Harvey of Pattonville. Twelve people missed four games in the contest.

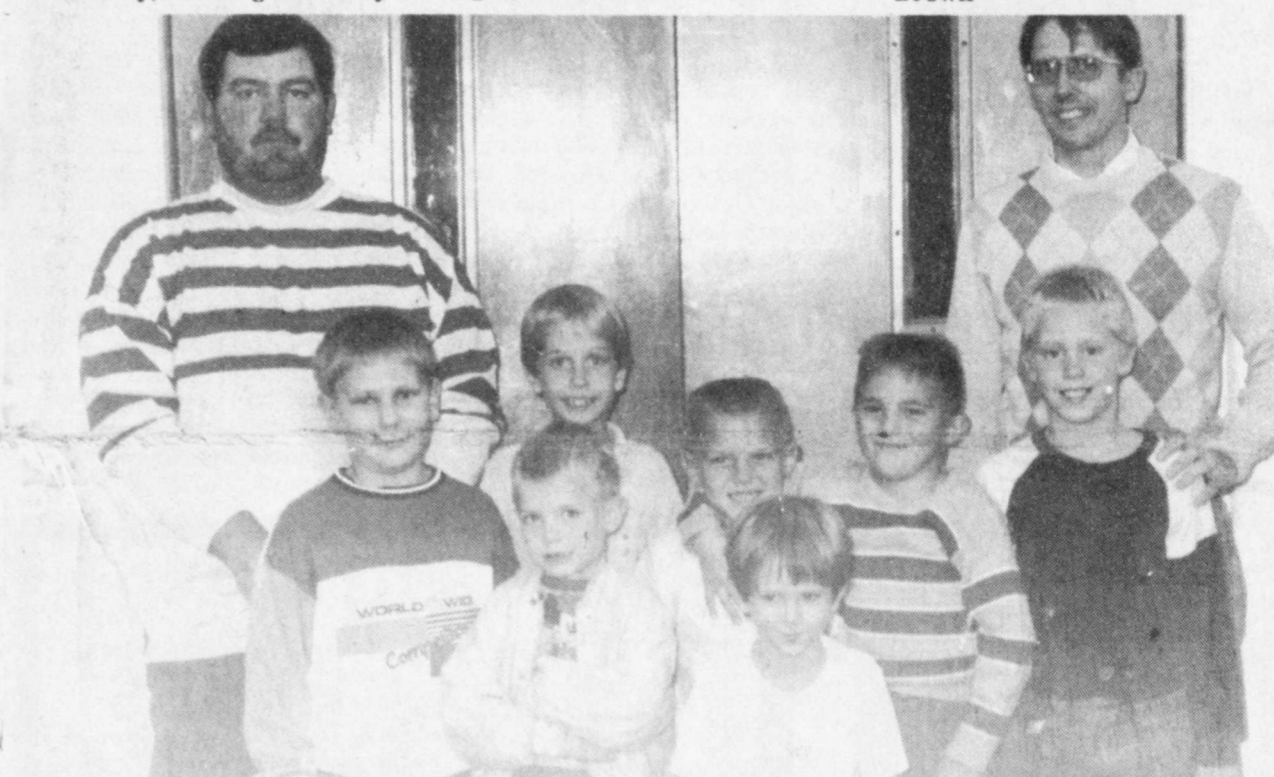

## Lions' Club Scholarship Fund Announced

The Bogata Lions Scholarship Fund will give \$500.00 to Rivercrest High School no later than April 1 of each school year, to be awarded to a graduating senior each year.

A scholarship certificate will be awarded to the chosen student during the awards assembly. A certified check will be made payable to the student and the college and/or technical school of their choice accredited by the Texas Education Agency to be used for the fall semester.

The student must have a "B" aver-

age. That is, a "B" average as defined by the student handbook. Band, P.E., Teacher's Assistant, etc. do not count.

The student must fill out the proper application forms and submit a resume of the past two years' activities as related to family, home, school, citizenship, community and work experience.

The student will be interviewed by the Scholarship Committee made up of the School Counselor and five Lion Club Members nominated by the nominating committee and voted on

by the membership.

The winner of the VFW Scholarship is not eligible to receive this scholarship.

One alternate will be selected for this scholarship.

Some of the things the student will be judged on will be school activities, citizenship, conduct, community activities and conduct in the community. Applications are available at the school.

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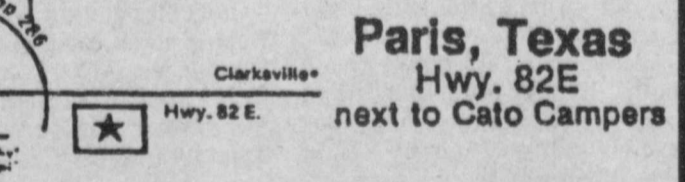

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# Rivercrest Loses To "Top Dogs"

The underdogs were ready to play the top dogs. And for at least one half, the Rivercrest Rebels chased the Cooper Bulldogs up and down the gridiron, nipping at their heels, and generally being a feisty nuisance to the haughty, tough and in the end, victorious, Bulldogs. The 47-25 "Dogs win makes them "the best of show" in District 17AA, and enhances their top ten state Class A ranking. But the Bulldogs had to overcome a determined Rebel squad, who until the final minutes, truly believed they could pull off the upset of the year. The courageous Rebs will see play-off action as the District runners-up and also have the satisfaction of knowing they gave the Bulldogs their toughest competition of the year, according to the Dog's coaching staff. The Rebs scored more points against Cooper than any team has all season. A 66-yard excursion down the sidelines by Scooter Brown with only a few minutes elapsed gave the fighting Rebs their initial lead, 7-0, following David Stansell's conversion. The run, which was aided by a key block by guard Ronny Alsup, came after the Rebel defense had halted the Bulldogs on the opening series. Brown displayed his early season, pre-injury ability, using his breakaway speed to gain 110 yards on ten calls, an average of 11 yards per carry. In addition, Brown in keeping his pre-game promise, returned a fourth period kick-off for 87 yards, to account for the game's final tally. Cooper, behind the powerful Her-

shel Walker-like running of Junior Byron "Bam" Morris, quickly marched 87 yards in ten plays to knot the score, then take the lead on a controversial, and clearly illegal, two point conversion, which went uncalculated, not once but twice, by a local chapter officiating crew. Morris carried the pigskin 25 times and gained 235 yards, an average of 9.4. He scored three touchdowns. Still in the first quarter, the Rebels, under the field leadership of senior quarterback Bradley Woods, re-venge the Dogs with a 70-yard, nine play drive, culminating in six points when Woods crossed the goal line on a six yard run to make the score 13-8 in favor of the Rebs.

The Rebels had a respectable, especially against the huge Cooper defensive line, 171 yards rushing and 258 yards total offense. Cooper, with its powerful ground game, and balanced passing attack, amassed an awesome 581 yards, including 22 first downs. The scoring barrage continued in the second quarter, as Cooper forged ahead 14-13 with 8:29 to play as quarterback Chris Partain, capped a 62-yard thrust with a one-yard drive. After the Dogs halted the Rebel offense for the first time in the game, they drove 79 yards for their third marker. Running back Brad Lancaster set the pace of the drive, though Morris carried the final four yards. Lancaster had 109 yards in sixteen attempts, and scored Cooper's fourth touchdown on a 24-yard run midway in the third quarter.

The Rebels still refused to roll over and play dead. In the final two minutes of the first half, an exceptional 69-yard march saw the Rebels use ten plays to score with only three seconds remaining. The key play was a perfectly executed "flea flicker". The classic play found Woods tossing to Jeremy Abshire, who then pitched outside to a sprinting Brown, who raced 40 yards. The Rebel passing attack was sufficient to net 87 yards. Wood was five of eleven, but three interceptions in the second half. Sophomore tight-end Jeff Bagley caught consecutive passes for 26-yards. As the Bulldogs returned from the locker room for the second half, they realized their claim was in jeopardy. They set forth, therefore, to simply wear down the smaller Rebels. The running of Morris, who swatted would be tacklers, as if they were mosquitoes and Lancaster, who followed the holes created by his huge offensive line, as well as the accuracy of Partain's passes, was more than the Rebels could withstand. Partain was nine of eleven after his first two were incomplete, for 175 yards, including a 64-yard third quarter strike to Shawn Garcia, and an 18-yard touchdown pass to bulky Byron Bonds in the fourth.

After the Garcia reception, Cooper broke the Rebels back, when James Wolfe intercepted Woods on the Rebel twenty. Morris' third touchdown gave the Bulldogs an insurmountable 35-19 advantage. The game was played much closer than the final score indicates.

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# Rebels Gear Up For Bi-District Play

The play-offs. The objective of every schoolboy squad, and the motivation for every varsity coach is to continue playing football after the regular season slate is finished. From the two-a-days under the burning August sun, to the after school practices in the dusky twilight of early November, the driving force is the play-offs. The institution's tradition is built upon play-off appearances. Coaches futures hinge upon consistency of play-off activity.

A generation of Rivercrest Rebels will learn anew the intensity and excitement of play-off competition Friday night. The runners-up in District 17AA loop will face District 18AA champion Grand Saline in a bi-district duel to be played in Commerce at ETSU stadium. Game time is set for 8 p.m.

Advance tickets may be purchased at the Rivercrest High School office, with adult tickets being priced at \$4.00 and student seats selling for only \$2.00. At the gate, all tickets will be \$5.00. Rebel fans will occupy the south end of the single bleacher stadium.

As for the combatants, the Grand Saline Indians, coached by Carter Elliott, bring an 8-1 overall record and a 4-0 district mark into the fray. Moreover, they boast of a rich history in post season play, as this year marks Grand Saline's seventh consecutive appearance in that echelon of football. This tradition dates back to their days in Class 3A ranks.

The Indians show a double-wing offensive set, alternating with a power I formation; thus, their primary emphasis is on the running game. Several big running backs share the burden, while an offensive line will match the Rebel front line's average 190 pounds. Defensively, the Indians will display a standard 5-0 or "27" face, with little stunting or blitzing.

The Rebels, who have apparently peaked at the right time, despite a season finale loss to top ten power Cooper, are seeing play-off action for the first time in three years. Reb Leader Terry Giddens, reflecting upon last week's performance, commented, "We played to the best of our ability against Cooper. The game, although a defeat, added to our team's confidence. Grand Saline will not be nearly as talented or as tough as Cooper. We have a realistic chance against them."

"The major strength of the 1988 Rebels" mused Giddens, "is their character. When we were 0-5 in pre-district, these young men refused to hang their head, or to quit trying. Because they believed in themselves, they kept on fighting." Giddens added, "Now that tough early season schedule will be an advantage to us, because Grand Saline did not play nearly as tough an early schedule."

Scouting reports reveal that the Indians are close to the caliber of Honey Grove, a quality District 17AA member, whom the Rebels defeated, indeed they keyed their play-off aspirations upon the outcome of that

contest.

The Rebels have shown a diverse offense, mixing the run and pass. They are averaging about 150 yards per game on the ground, and more than 80 in the air. The Rebels have an explosive offense, and are capable of scoring quickly, as shown against Cooper. A healthy Scooter Brown, who had a 66-yard touchdown, and an 87-yard kickoff return against the Dogs will aid the Rebel cause.

Senior leadership on the Rebel squad has provided the impetus and motivation needed for advancement to the play-offs. Field general Bradley Woods calls the signals smoothly and efficiently, while also handling the punting chores (a 35 yard average) as well as playing solid defense as linebacker. Senior Ronny Alsup also leads the interior line as strong guard, while quick guard Craig Easley plays the key middle linebacker position. Other Rebel seniors who have ably contributed on offense are the wingback tandem of Jimmy Lewis and Justin Roach. Defensively, Kevin Beene leads the team in tackles, while brother Danny plays alongside at defensive tackle. The tough line is steadied by te consistent play inside-outside linebacker or tackle Chad Parish. Finally, senior David Stansell, who was forced from active play due to a shoulder injury, has learned to handle the extra points. From this senior core has developed an exciting team.

"Honestly, I believe the team who



makes the fewest mistakes will emerge the victor," said Giddens. "Grand Saline is so well-disciplined, they will not beat themselves. The Rebels must not either."

All Rebel fans are encouraged to make their trek to Commerce. A gigantic pep rally will be held in the Rebel gym on Friday at 3:15 p.m. Come and show that Rebel Spirit.

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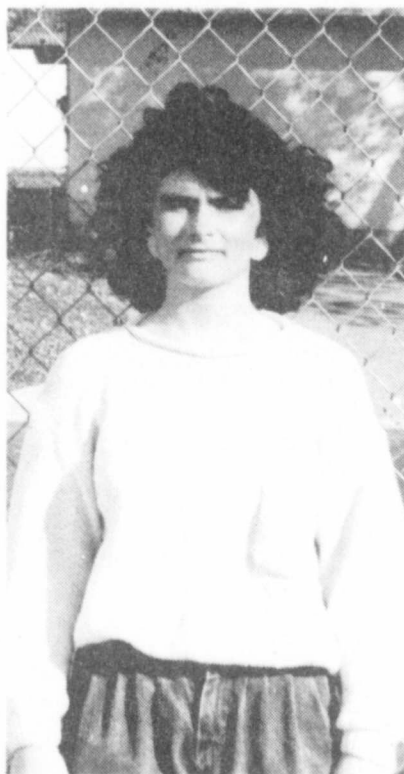

# If you smell gas, here's what to do.

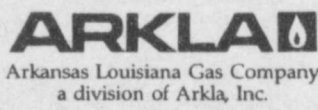
You can't smell gas in its natural state, so Arkla adds a distinctive odor to make leaks easier to detect. Natural gas is clean, safe and efficient, but, if you smell gas in your home, there are certain things you should do.

If the odor of gas is light, the source of the leak is probably one of your gas appliances. Occasionally pilot lights will blow out, so first check each of these. - extinguish all open flames. Don't use matches. Don't turn on light switches or use electrical or battery-powered equipment that might create a spark.
- get out of your house and call Arkla from an outside phone. Wait there until our service representative arrives.
