Dave Roever Speaks To Rivercrest Students

Dave Roever, a Vietnam veteran, captivated Rivercrest High School students, Bogat and Talco eighth grade students, faculty members and guests last Wednesday, November 23, during a special assembly held at Rivercrest, with the story of his experiences in Vietnam.

Mr. Roever also dealt with issues facing young people today such as drugs, alcohol, suicide and teenage pregnancy.

Mr. Roever told the students to respect themselves enough to respect others. "Respect starts in you and is passed on to others," he said.

Dave Roever served in Vietnam from January 1969 to July 27, 1969.

He was a member of River Division 573 of the River Patrol in the Mekong Delta. He took a shot in his hand from enemy fire while attempting to throw a phosphorus grenade to clear the underbrush and burn out traps. The grenade exploded some six inches from his face and he received extensive burns and injuries which have taken him years to overcome.

Mr. Roever told those at the assembly that he lived every day of his life in pain. He stated that he hated war and believed that he was fully qualified to make that statement. "However, said Roever, "I can still say that I'm proud to have served my country."

Five Arrested In Seizure

Five people were arrested by Red River County Sheriff's Deputies and Drug Enforcement Administration agents in connection with the discovery of a methamphetamine lab

Wednesday, November 23, north of Clarksville.

Trent Ray Commander, 33, of Clarksville and James Thomas Smith, 42, of Bogata, were charged with possession of a controlled substance and conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamines. Bond for Commander was set at \$20,000 on each charge and bond for Smith was set at \$10,000 on each charge.

Also charged with conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamines was Jeff Wayne Russell, 17, of Bogata. His bond was set at \$10,000.

Teresa Elizabeth Short, 28, of Idabel, OK, was also arrested at the residence on charges of possession of marijuana and conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamines.

Robert Eugene Combs, 51, of Paris, was arrested outside the residence for possession of a firearm and unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon.
