SKIN CANCER FACTS

How many people get skin cancer?

Skin cancer is the most common of all cancers. It accounts for nearly half of all cancers in the United States. More than 3.5 million cases of basal and squamous cell skin cancer are diagnosed in this country each year. Melanoma, the most serious type of skin cancer, will account for more than 76,600 cases of skin cancer in 2013.

What are the risk factors for skin cancer?

Risk factors for non-melanoma and melanoma skin cancers include: Unprotected and/or excessive exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation (sunlight or tanning booths); Pale skin (easily sunburned, doesn't tan much or at all, natural red or blond hair); Occupational exposures to coal tar, pitch, creosote, arsenic compounds, or radium; You or other members of your family have had skin cancers; Multiple or unusual moles; Severe sunburns in the past.

What are the signs and symptoms of skin cancer?

Skin cancer can be found early, and both doctors and patients play important roles in finding skin cancer. Contact your doctor if you have any of the following signs/ symptoms: Any change on your skin, especially in the size or color of a mole, growth, or spot, or a new growth (even if it has no color); Scaliness, oozing, bleeding, or a change in the way a bump or nodule looks; The spread of pigmentation (color) beyond its border, such as dark coloring that spreads past the edge of a mole or mark; A change in sensation, such as itchiness, tenderness, or pain.

Can skin cancer be prevented?

The best ways to lower the risk of skin cancer are to avoid long exposure to intense sunlight and practice sun safety. You can still exercise and enjoy the outdoors while using sun safety at the same time. Here are some ways to be sun safe:

•Avoid direct exposure to the sun between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Teach children the shadow rule: if your shadow is shorter than you, the sun's rays are at their strongest.

•Seek shade, especially in the middle of the day when the sun's rays are strongest.

•Follow the Slip! Slop! Slap! and Wrap! rules:

*Slip on a shirt: Cover up with protective clothing to guard as much skin as possible when you are out in the sun. Choose comfortable clothes made of tightly woven fabrics that you cannot see through when held up to a

*Slop on sunscreen: Use sunscreen and lip balm with broad spectrum protection and a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher. Apply a generous amount of sunscreen (about a palmful) to unprotected skin at least 30 minutes before outdoor activities. Reapply every 2 hours and after swimming, toweling dry, or sweating. Use sunscreen even on hazy or overcast days.

*Slap on a hat: Cover your head with a wide-brimmed hat, shading your face, ears, and neck. If you choose a baseball cap, remember to protect your ears and neck with sunscreen.

*Wrap on sunglasses: Wear sunglasses with 100% UVA and UVB absorption to provide optimal protection for the eyes and the surrounding skin.

•Sunscreen doesn't protect from all UV rays, so don't use sunscreen as a way to stay out in the sun longer.

•Follow these practices to protect your skin even on cloudy or overcast days. UV rays travel through clouds. •Avoid other sources of UV light. Tanning beds and sun lamps are dangerous. They also damage your skin.

Three to retire from Haskell CISD

The final bell has rung for the 2013-14 school year. As students and school staff look forward to the "summer freedom," three Haskell CISD school personnel look forward to that and much more.

Susan Blanks, Andrea Estrada and Minnie Camacho, with a combined sixty-eight years of service to our students, have decided the time is right to retire.

Blanks, the school nurse for the Haskell CISD, has spent twenty-seven years with the district. After taking basic classes at Abilene Christian University, she graduated from Mary Meeks School of Nursing as a registered nurse. She worked for Stamford Memorial Hospital for a couple of years.

Blanks was a stay at home mom for several years, when the school nurse position became available. Thinking it sounded like fun, she decided to try it.

Blanks said, "I would say that this has been a dream job. I get to work with kids every day and they are just fun. Kids are usually so honest, and you never know what they may say.

She also has enjoyed working with the school staff, who have become like family. Since there is not a school nurse on every campus, she acknowledges that it has to be a team effort. The students truly believe "the nurse" can make anything better. There were days when the line to the health office was never ending, and an ice pack or band-aid could heal any "boo boo."

Of course there were many more serious issues to be handled. Blanks recalled the day a young student fell on the playground and required over one hundred stitches in his head, or the many broken bones through the years needing immediate attention. She gave daily prescribed meds, asthma treatments, diabetic glucose checks, soothed upset stomachs and even dug rocks out of several ears.

Every day is different, but the goal is always to help keep the students healthy so they can stay in class and learn. She has felt honored that the parents entrusted her with their children's care.

Many things have changed since she began in the school district. Records were not kept on computers and there were only four immunizations required to begin school. Certainly there have been many changes to these requirements, but other very important changes have

also occurred. Programs for rising childhood obesity, the addition of ten automated defibrillators for cardiac arrest on all campuses, diabetes care teams and CPR, first aide and AED trainings are just a few of the changes.

Blanks says, "It is always fun when I see a student out in the 'real world' and they run to give me a hug."

Her future plans include helping her husband Terry on the farm, and spending much more time with her family. That family includes sons Matt and Stephanie in San Antonio, Jeff and Braid and Brad and Callie all in Abilene. She especially looks forward to helping out with her six grandchildren.

Andrea Estrada of Weinert, began her career in the school system as an instructional aide at Weinert Elementary. After seven years, the Weinert and Haskell school districts consolidated and she was hired to work in the Haskell Elementary cafeteria, where she spent the next fourteen

She attended Sinton High School, before her family moved to this area. Married to her husband Julian, they have lived and raised their family in Weinert. She doesn't think she will miss getting up at 5 a.m. to be at school to prepare breakfast each morning, or the heavy lifting that is a part of the job.

Estrada hopes to be able to join her sisters in their travels and have more time for her church ministry. She plans to work part-time, and still have plenty of time for her grandchildren's activities.

Minnie Camacho was born and raised in Haskell. She has spent the past twenty years working for the Haskell school district. After working sixteen years in the maintenance department as a school custodian, she joined the cafeteria team for the last four years.

Having a high level of energy, Camacho isn't ready to completely quit working. In fact she will be working part-time in the high school cafeteria, continue working at Haskell Memorial Hospital and will probably help her son at his local restaurant.

Although it may feel a little sad to leave their "school family" and the excitement of the children, that has been a big part of their lives for many years, all three retirees look forward to the possibilities the future holds. We wish them the best as they begin the next chapter in their lives.

Lieutenant governor's challenger wins runoff

AUSTIN-Republican voters picked Dan Patrick to face Democrat Leticia Van de Putte in the race for lieutenant governor in November.

Patrick received 65 percent of the vote to incumbent Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst's 35 percent in the May 27 runoff. Sen. Patrick, R-Houston, and Sen. Van de Putte, D-San Antonio, have seven years and 15 years of experience, respectively, as members of the 31-member Senate. Van de Putte ran unopposed in the March Democratic Party Primary.

Dewhurst has presided over the Senate since 2003. His term of office will expire on Dec. 31. A businessman in private life, Dewhurst has been credited for his leadership in balancing five two-year state budgets and in building a multi-billion dollar "rainy day" fund to be tapped in fiscal emergencies.

In other party primary runoff results, incumbent Republican U.S. Sen. John Cornyn will face Dallas businessman Dr. David M. Alameel, a Democrat, in the November general election. Alameel won the primary runoff with 72 percent of the vote to Kesha Rogers of Houston's 28 percent. Jim Hogan of Cleburne won the Democratic runoff for agriculture commissioner over Richard S. "Kinky" Friedman. Hogan's opponent in November will be former state Rep. Sid Miller of Stephenville, who beat former state Rep. Tommy Merritt of Longview in the GOP runoff. State Sen. Ken Paxton of McKinney, with 63.6 percent of the vote, won the GOP runoff for attorney general against state Rep. Dan Branch of Dallas, who received 36.4 percent. Pasadena oil, gas and petrochemical consultant Ryan Sitton won the GOP runoff for a seat on the threemember Texas Railroad Commission in a contest with former state Rep. Wayne Christian of Center.

Greenville physician Dr. Bob Deuell, a long-serving member of the Texas Senate, was defeated by 300 votes in a runoff against Bob Hall of Edgewood. And, incumbent Republican U.S. Rep. Ralph Hall of Rockwall, with 47.2 his runoff bid against John Ratcliffe, who received 52.8 percent. The outcome of this runoff was reported in the national news. Hall, 91, is a World War II veteran and the oldest member of the U.S. House of Representatives. He was a Democrat when he first entered the House in 1981 and in 2004 switched to the Perry in 2011.

Republican Party. Ratcliffe, who served under then-President George W. Bush as a U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Texas, also served eight terms as mayor of Heath, Texas, a municipality just south of Hall's home in Rockwall, 30 minutes east of Dallas.

Coming up this month are state party conventions during which nominations will be made official. The Republican State Convention will be held at the Fort Worth Convention Center from June 5-7 and the Democratic State Convention will be held June 26-28 at the Dallas Convention Center.


Hearing focuses on impeachment

Steps toward impeachment of University of Texas System regent Wallace Hall of Dallas continued May 21 when the House Select Committee on Transparency in State Agency Operations met. Earlier in May the panel voted to move forward in processes leading toward having Hall removed from office.

The panel and the state's Public Integrity Unit have been investigating Hall for nearly a year to determine if the regent misused his office in an attempt to have UT President William Powers Jr. fired. Invited to testify was Jeff Archer, Texas Legislative Council assistant executive counsel who explained the framework for developing articles of impeachment. Any member or group of members of the Cafe" where parents, Legislature may confidentially submit a proposed article of impeachment, and submitted material would be parceled out to a trio of drafting attorneys, he said, adding that articles of impeachment drawn up by the House would be subject to review by Senate.

House Texas Parliamentarian Chris Griesel testified, saying the House could be called back into session by either by proclamation of the governor or by a majority of members of the House. If the committee were to adopt Craig Cunningham, Dawson articles of impeachment to present for consideration in the House, steps would have to be taken such as publication of notice in newspapers giving the particulars of a special convening of the Legislature, Griesel said.

Watch for new aphid

Most people have heard about the fall, 2014 sugarcane aphid (Melanaphis sacchari) outbreak in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Gulf Coast counties and Louisiana, Mississippi and Oklahoma. The USDA Agricultural Research Service and others have conducted genetic tests and determined that the new pest is in fact the sugarcane aphid but it has switched hosts to sorghum for some unknown reason. It is still being found on sugarcane in the affected counties, but the majority of the insects are on sorghum. Our colleagues downstate are now reporting treatable levels of sugarcane aphids in some fields, and they are also reporting an increasing number of winged adults. It is a long distance from the infested fields downstate to the Texas High Plains, but these winged aphids can easily ride wind currents and storm fronts. So there is a slight risk that aphids will reach the High Plains. We have no idea if the semi-tropical species can survive and reproduce in our climate, but it is worth watching for them in our sorghum and other sorghum related plants. There has been a bit of confusion about the name of the new pest. Sugarcane aphid and yellow sugarcane aphid sound a lot alike. In order to avoid potential confusion, Texas and Louisiana entomologists have agreed to bend the rules and will now use the name "white sugarcane aphid" when talking about Melanaphis sacchari, the



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


