Oh woe is us!. In the meantime, if you need to call our number is 652-5823. (I wonder if OUR computer will manage to print this number out...surely we're in IT'S data base!)

Texas Jobless Rate Lowest Since 1984

The number of unemployed Texans has not been this low in the last four years according to Mary Scott Nabers, Commissioner at the Texas Employment Commission. "We have seen a continuous decline in recent months and our latest statistics place the state rate at 6.2% in mid-December. That's the lowest rate Texans have seen since December of 1984," Nabers said.

By way of comparison the September rate was 7.1%; October statistics indicated 6.8%; November's rate was 6.6% and in December a decline to 6.2%. The last time the rate was below 6.2% was in December 1984 when it was 5.6%.

The total number of jobless Texans dropped by just over 33,000 in December, to a level of 518,900. The

over-the-month decrease was encouraging, but unemployment has been gradually declining throughout most of 1988. Total employment decreased moderately over the month but was still almost 100,000 above the year-ago estimate.

The majority of the 27 Metropolitan Statistical Areas in Texas for which statistics were currently available mirrored the Statewide pattern, with unemployment decreasing in December. Only four major areas had rates which rose over the month, while one MSA's jobless rate remained unchanged. The current rates for four MSA's were slightly above their December 1987 rates, and one area's rate was the same as the year-ago rate. All other MSA's had lower rates this December than they re-

ported a year earlier.

Areas with the lowest unemployment rates included: Bryan-College Station, with a 3.9% rate in December; the Dallas PMSA, at 4.8%; and Austin, with a 5.0% rate. Three areas tied for fourth-lowest rate: Amarillo, Ft. Worth-Arlington and Lubbock all had December rates of 5.2%.

Only three MSA's had rates in December 1988 above 10%-McAllen-Edinburg-Mission's current rate was 16.4%, the highest among the MSA's. Laredo's December rate was 12.6% and the Brownsville-Harlingen MSA's rate was 10.8%. Rates in these border areas generally tend to be higher than average, and unemployment normally increases in the winter months due to migrant workers returning to their homes there.

High Speed Chase Tears Through Three Counties

What began as a theft of services in Mt. Vernon on Sunday night quickly escalated into a high speed chase that lasted 45 minutes and involved 20 law enforcement officers from four counties. Four roadblocks were run before the chase ended in arrest.

The chase began when a Mt. Vernon store called the police to report that two white males in an orange Firebird bearing Florida license tags, had filled the vehicle with gas an driven off without paying for it.

When the police officer attempted to stop the pair, they fled northward on Highway 37, and he began to call in help.

The Texas Department of Public Safety asked for a roadblock at the intersection of Highway 7 and Highway 271 in Bogata, but the fleeing subjects ran through the intersection without even hitting their brakes.

Constable Randy Boren of Pct. 1, Lamar County, was behind the Mt. Vernon officer and Lamar County and Red River County deputies were pouring in.

Speeds were clocked up to 110 mph, and never dropped below 70 or 80 mph during the entire chase, according to reports.

Roadblocks at Clarksville and DeKalb failed to halt the vehicle. The DeKalb roadblock had been set up with a trailer truck across the roadway, but a tiny space between the trailer and a culvert offered just

enough space for the car to get through.

Law enforcement officials report it was like a movie, with a line of flashing lights following the suspect as it drove cars off the road, passed and generally created havoc.

At one point, the driver of the Firebird actually rammed DeKalb's Chief of Police Carroll Dubson's car.

Franklin, Lamar, Red River and Bowie County officers continued the chase which ended at a roadblock just outside of New Boston.

Mt. Vernon Chief of Police Franklin Perry stated, "I could see them tossing things out of the car towards the end, but there was no way to mark the locations, and it wouldn't be usable evidence anyway, since we wouldn't be able to prove it belonged to them."

Gary Lee Kirkland, 17, and a 14-year old white male companion, both of Pensacola, Florida, were arrested and charged with aggravated assault on a Peace Officer, after ramming the side of DeKalb's Chief of Police's car.

Kirkland has since charged with theft of services, reckless driving and fleeing by city police authorities in Mt. Vernon.

Kirkland is believed to be wanted on charges in Florida but no official confirmation has been received as of Wednesday morning.

District 17AA has been called the strongest loop in Class 2-A basketball in Texas, in both boys and girls' divisions. Six of the seven schools have played in the regional finals at least once, while two girls teams have won state; in addition, four boys teams have gone to state at least once. In 1987, for example, the first and second place teams of District 17AA played each other in the regional finals, a game away from state, in both boys and girls' classifications. For this season, the games played last week, though fewer in number, bore a heavy impact on the District race.

Varsity Boys:
The Rebels were slated for only one game, but that was against the Mustangs, and fast Chisum Mustangs. The Mustangs are one of three District 17AA teams to be ranked among the top ten in the state at some juncture of this season. The Mustangs came to Jhntown looking to wind up the first half of loop play undefeated, sporting a 5-0 mark. The Rebels assumed the role of underdog in the tiff, with a 4-1 record. But when the smoke had settled in this barn-burner, the Rebels had soundly beaten the Mustangs, 67-56, creating a three-way tie atop the District chart, as Rivercrest, Chisum and Honey Grove (the team that beat the Rebels) have 5-1 tallies.

As usual, the Rebel victory was a total team effort. All five Rebel start-

ers ended the night in double figures: Bradley Woods had 18 points, Jeremy Abshier 14, Jimmy Lewis, 12, although he sat out much of the second quarter with an ankle injury, Scooter Brown 10 and Jason Pogue, 11 points.

The Rebels dogged play under the boards set the tone for the game. Jason Pogue, the towering junior post, who seems to improve with each outing, outplayed Chisum's 6'5" all everything, Corey Sims. The Rebels outscored the Mustangs 29-19 in the last quarter to take the game out of reach, but they had to overcome a five-point advantage by Chisum midway through that period. The win for the Rebels knotted the series record between the two schools at three apiece.

The Rebels were able to savor the win, since they were open on Friday night. The needed respite also gave a chance for some nagging injuries to heal.

Varsity Girls

"Almost" is the word summarizing the Rebelette season. Two weeks ago, this steadily improving unit almost beat a top ten ranked team. Last week, the Rebelettes came within several seconds and a single point of beating a very strong Chisum Lady Mustang team, which came to town with a 17-5 and 6-1 record. This one was close all the way, with the Rebelettes overcoming a 9-point Mustang lead late in

the game, only to suffer a 71-70 loss. The Rebelettes were driving for the winning shot with three seconds left when a costly turnover thwarted their effort. Rosie Norman had 17 points, while Krista Weatherall added 15, mostly from the outside, and Jerilyn Russell complimented her with 10 more.

Although scheduled as a varsity contest, the Rebel coaching staff opted to rest the principal varsity performers, and to allow the game against Mt. Pleasant to be played by freshmen, junior varsity and varsity girls who often get little game time, even though they work as hard every day. Except for a first quarter lull, the squad played well, before falling 60-51 to the Tigerettes. An interesting note is that the junior varsity unit owns a 17-4 season record, with all the losses coming to varsity teams. This fact speaks well of the promise for future Rebelette fortunes.

The Rebelettes fought gamely back from an 18-2 first period shell-shocking, cutting the margin to only five near game's end. Julie Stewart scored 11 points as she took charge. Sophomore Katy Ross scored most of her 11 points from under the basket, either on passes or offensive rebounds. Shane Webb hit for eight points, including a three-pointer at the close of the third period.

Both varsity units play at home Friday night against Cooper.

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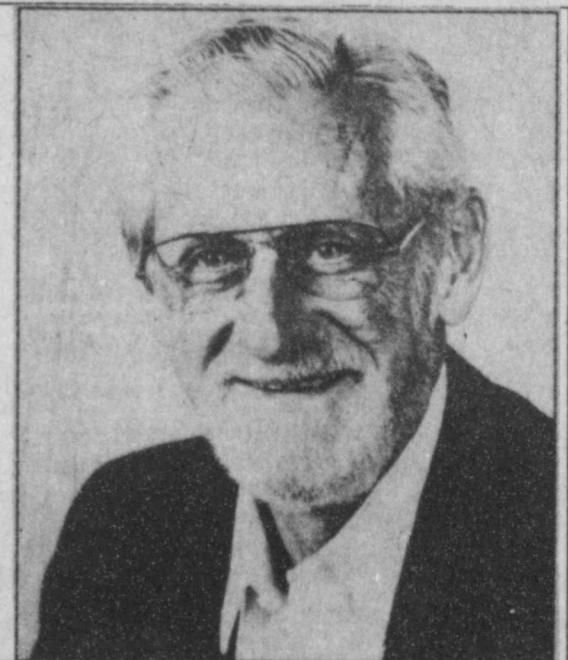

Winter Pastures Stretching Feed Dollars

Warm weather in both December and January has resulted in better than normal growth of winter pastures.

"This is a fortunate situation since most producers have a limited hay supply," said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "For those who have winter pasture, hay usage has been reduced about 50% and the quality of nutrition has been better."


Limited grazing helps stretch growth and grazing over a longer period. However, it should be regulated by the number of cattle and the amount of forage available if optimum use is to be realized.

Reeves said that while grazing winter pasture is a good time to utilize low quality hay.

The heavier winter pastures are grazed, the quicker fertilization will be needed. "Watch for signs of nutrient deficiency," Reeves said. "Fertilize by the color of the forage and not by the calendar."

During the winter when growth can be limited by low temperatures, do not fertilize too heavily at one time. Light applications as needed will produce the most forage for the fertilizer dollar.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought conditions which occurred January 1 through August 31, 1988 and continuing, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office in Clarksville, FmHA County Supervisor Frank B. Stroud said recently.

Red River County is one of 89 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought conditions.

Stroud said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"Applications for loans under this

emergency designation will be accepted until August 29, 1989, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing an possibly over into the new farming season," Stroud said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

 INGROWN PROBLEMS
 Ingrown nails, or nails that begin to cut or grow into the skin, are one of the most common foot problems among older people. Ingrown toenail occurs most often in the large toe, but other toes can also be afflicted. Sometimes, ingrown toenails are so painful that a person cannot wear shoes. Untreated, an ingrown nail can break through the skin, leaving a toe vulnerable to infection. Any infection should be treated by the podiatrist immediately because infection can spread into the rest of the body. Left untreated, ingrown toenails can also cause thickening around the nail to thicken and become painful. A nail that is C-shaped when viewed from the front should be looked at by the podiatrist before attempting to trim it.
 Any chronic symptom can be a sign of a more serious health problem. In the case of fungus nail, it can be an early sign of diabetes. If you notice any nail discoloration without having bruised the area, it is best to have it checked. As in any case, it is best to begin a treatment of a problem in the early stages of its development.

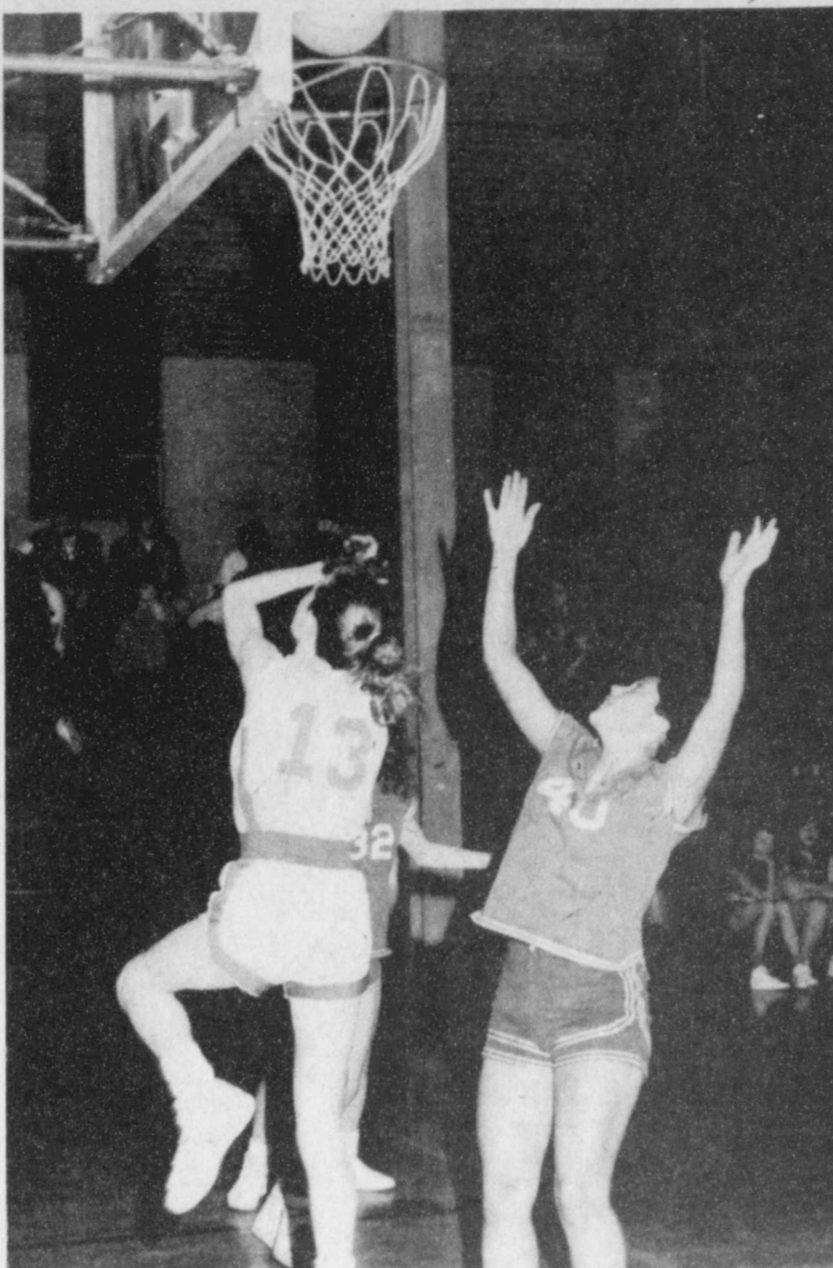
