Grooms says that properly manhigh phow herds also have free choice high phosphorus minerals available
along with trace mineralized salt along with trace mineralized salt.
This is on contrast to lesser managed herds that have cows in poorer condition with hay being below the minimum seven percent protein required for maintenance. Generally, these poorer managed cow herds are
wormy and are not receiving supplemental protein or energy, phosphorus or magnesium in mineral, and
