Rivercrest FFA Students Learn Lifetime Skills

Across the nation, throughout the state, and at Rivercrest FFA, National FFA Week has been in effect this week.

Rivercrest FFA chapter has 84 members, with 90 involved in agriculture.

Over the past few years, there have been some major changes in the FFA program, nationwide and locally.

In the past, students took Ag 1, 2, 3 or 4. During those semesters, a general course was studied, including plants, cattle, shop and related studies.

Now, the courses offered are much more specialized. There will be about 25 different Rivercrest will offer all 25.

Specialty courses in plants, cattle, mechanics, etc. will be taught each semester, with students directing all their attention to that subject during that time.

The new curriculum will be effective this coming year.

FFA has changed, as has the curriculum. Where once one only thought of as livestock projects, it now teaches everything from high-tech work through bookkeeping skills!

Obviously, the basic knowledge of electricity, carpentry and painting, are skills that will be useful to girls or boys for the rest of their lives. Even apartment dwellers have a need to occasionally hang pictures, repaint or make minor repairs without having to call in an expensive repairman.

Record books required on all projects teach bookkeeping skills and hone English skills.

The physical work done is matched by the mental work required in the classroom, especially with the new curriculum.

Speech is developed through public speaking, as is self-confidence.

Management is learned through the self-governing aspect of FFA,

and so is cooperation.

Chemistry becomes a practical skill when students learn about testing soil, milk or figuring how much paint, fertilizer or wood is needed for a project.

Business skills are the same in any world, whether agriculturally oriented or computer oriented.

Rivercrest meat training lab has long been their pride and joy, and leaves students with a knowledge of meat processing that can be turned into a lifetime job or simply teach a future homemaker how to buy the best type of meat.

FFA sparks interest and support not only in the school system, but throughout the community. FFA members are frequently some of the finest young people in the community.

So this week, during FFA Week, the Rivercrest Chapter and all chapters deserve a big "Well Done".

Management Controls Cow Profit

Cow herds in East Texas range from excellent management to practically no management, says a livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"These systems worked pretty well until the hard freeze the first of February," said Dr. Randall Grooms, Extension livestock specialist at Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. "Cattlemen with excellent management programs have a good chance of making a profit. However, it has long been established that you can't starve a profit out of a cow."

Producers kept their cows in good condition 't have a big worry during extremely cold weather. They know that takes more energy during these times and they keep their cows full of hay.

Grooms says that properly managed cow herds also have free choice high phosphorus minerals available along with trace mineralized salt.

This is on contrast to lesser managed herds that have cows in poorer condition with hay being below the minimum seven percent protein required for maintenance. Generally, these poorer managed cow herds are wormy and are not receiving supplemental protein or energy, phosphorus or magnesium in mineral, and usually no salt is available.

"The only cattlemen who have a potential for profit are those who have control of their total program," Grooms said. "These producers control their breeding and calving seasons, health programs, nutrition programs and the genetic design of their future calf crop."

Roundball Roundup

The Rivercrest Rebels won two games last week, as they fought to keep their play-off hopes alive. That goal, however, eluded them, despite their holding up their portion of the play-off prospects; all dreams of post season play evaporated when Cooper upset league champion Honey Grove to claim the runner-up spot in District 17AA and advance with the Warriors to bi-district play.

Nonetheless, the Rebels played at peak performance. Against Como-Pickton, the Rebels built a comfortable lead as senior Jackie Whitney, starting his final game at home with a trio of classmates, hit nine first quarter points, all of them from long distance, to set the early pace. Senior Jimmy Lewis added eight more to Whitney's long range specialty, giving them a 21-12 first quarter lead. The Rebels were sailing smoothly until the fourth period, when the Eagles outside shooting got hot, enabling them to cut the margin to a scant five points with three minutes to play. But the Rebels settled in to a 71-61 victory. Three other Rebels scored in double figures: Jason Pogue, 11; Jeremy Abshier, 13; Scooter Brown, 13 in addition to Lewis' 15 total markers.

The spacious new gym of Chisum High School was the scene for the season finale. It was a game which the Rebels had to win to force a post season tournament for runner-up in the district. The Rebels played their finest overall team game of the year on both ends of the court. They deserved the 71-59 win they earned;

but, it was an uncelebrated victory, as their efforts went for naught in face of the Cooper upset win. The Rebels fell behind early, 19-10 at one point, before Jason Pogue completed a three-point play to cut the margin to a single point, 21-20, three minutes into the second period. The second half was all Rebels, especially the trio of senior starters climaxed their schoolboy careers: Bradley Woods, Jimmy Lewis and Scooter Brown. Sparked by Woods' consecutive three point efforts, which fueled his game-leading 23 points, the Rebels advanced to a 47-40 lead five minutes into the half. Brown and two of his four steals in that span, and finished with 15 points. Despite having the flu most of the week, Lewis hit for nine points. Junior Jeremy Abshier and Pogue proved they will be team leaders as seniors, as they hit for 15 and 8 points respectively.

The game was marked by excellent Rebel defense, especially by Pogue, who blocked three shots and captured nine of the Rebels 23 boards. With a 14 point cushion, the Rebels coasted to win with a stall game.

"Our seniors wanted this game, and took charge," commented coach Wake Wood. "Their defensive play set the pace, and with each made shot, their confidence was boosted."

The Rebels finish the year at 15-15 and 7-5 in district play. For the third straight season, they miss the play-offs by a single game, losing out one way or another in the finale.

Some of the highlights of the Rebel season included the defensive play of

Scooter Brown, with his 84 steals of the year, Brown moved into fourth place in the Rebel all-time statistical record in this category, with a total of 170.

Offensively, Bradley Wood moved into fifth place in scoring, ahead of David Rozell, with 1071 career points. Also, Woods hit 46 three point shots this season to lead in that new category. Wood hit 30% from long range.

Team stats, furnished by the Rebel athletic department include: team steals, 9.2 per game; offensive rebounds, 14.0 per game; defensive rebounds, 17.8; team free throw percentage, 58%; team field goal percentage, 36% (705 of 1963 attempts); three point percentage, 27% (109 of 403); points scored, 1831, averaging 61 points per game.

Two Rebels finished with a scoring average above 10 points. Woods averaged 17.3 per game and Lewis 13.3. Jason Pogue accounted for 49 blocked shots on the year. Woods finished his play with a total of 513 rebounds to rank 13th on the all time rebounds list.

As a person anote, I have enjoyed covering the Rebel and Rebelettes in both football and basketball this year. I appreciate the kind remarks toward my column. Please understand it is impossible to cover every detail, to mention every player in every game. But the fact is every student athlete contributed to the success of the programs. They each deserve recognition. And one closing thought; The Rebel fans are great.

School Counts

The second School Attendance Counting Period provided by the State of Texas is upcoming, and it is critical that all students attend school every day.

The Texas Legislature enacted a law in 1984 basing the Average Daily Attendance on the best of four of eight weeks of student attendance. There were four weeks of counting in October, 1988 and now the spring counting is here.

The spring attendance accounting period starts February 20 and will continue through March 24.

During this time, spring break will be March 13-17. Since the spring break splits the counting period, parents are asked to try to schedule trips so your child will not miss a day of school.

As a result of the cooperative efforts, Talco-Bogata students are learning and achieving at a high plateau. Creative teaching is the norm in the Talco-Bogata schools and it is unique in that it attracts quality applicants for teachers.

From a financial standpoint, approximately \$3,432 per child will be spent during this school year. The State of Texas assists the district by allotting \$1,742 per child. This does not mean the school enrollment can be multiplied by that amount to arrive at allotted funding. It means the \$1,742 per child is paid according to the Average Daily Attendance. This means each day a child is absent during the counting period, the Talco-Bogata I.S.D. will lose \$87.10. If attendance is low, this cost will ultimately be reflected back to the taxpayer or less school programs.

A bunion creates an unsightly

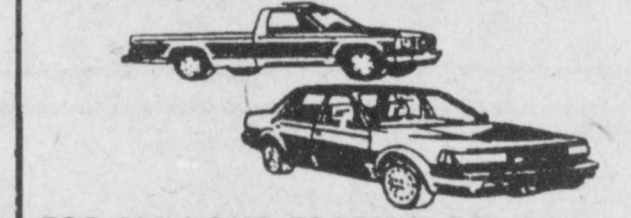
