





Voters in the tri-county district that make up the Northeast Texas Community College district voted down the tax bonds for the construction of new classrooms.

Proposition I, that would have changed the tax cap from the original 10¢ per \$100 valuation to an eight cent ad valorem cap, was soundly defeated by a two-to-one margin, 2,004 in favor to 4,232 against.

Proposition 2,\$3.5 million in classroom construction bonds failed 2,084 for and 4,320 against. Proposition 3 followed suit, as the \$1.25 million plan for specialized classroom con-

struction fell 1,956 to 4,314 against. Proposition 4, the most controversial of the four, the gymnasium andchild care facility went down by an overwhelming 1,606 for and 4,647

In Titus County, Precincts 3 & 9, voters at Talco City Hall, voted as

Proposition 1, 24 for, 135 against; Proposition 2, 25 for, 132 against; Proposition 3, 31 for, 126 against; Proposition 4, 16 for, 140 against for a total vote of 629. A total of 25,154 votes were cast in the three counties in the bond election proceedings.

The term 20/20 refers to the size letters which the average eye can read twenty feet away. In most standard vision testing, you read the family Snellen eye chart at a distance of 20 feet. # Control Diseases In Vegetable Gardens Early

By Herb Brevard

Recent rains played havoc with many newly planted vegetable gardens in East Texas. According to a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, chances are that he soil is compacted or eroded, the seed will rot from being covered too deeply and replanting may be necessary.

ing may be necessary.

"Soil temperature is critical to the planting time of vegetables," said Dr. George Philley. "If the soil temperature is too low, plant growth is slowed and the plant is weakened, making it susceptible to soil borne diseases. Soils warm at a much slower rate than air, thus hasty gardeners often

jump the gun and plant too early."

"Seedling disease or damping off is a term used to describe sudden seedling death," he said. "Although a disease organism may be involved, failure to get a stand is often the result of soil temperatures being too low. Planting on a raised seedbed may help because the soil in the bed warms faster."

Philley suggested buying seed which have been treated with a fungicide if possible. Buying disease resistant varieties and varieties adapted to the area is very important in controlling diseases.

Many area pond owners wait too long each year before treating pondand the results obtained are less than desirable. Later treatments can cause oxygen depletin and loss of

The following chemicals are cleared for use in controlling the filamentous algea: Hydrothol, Bluestone, Chelated copper compounds and Simazine. There are certain restrictions on their use. When using Hydrothol, wait three days before fishing and do not water livestock or use for domestic purposes for seven days after use of the chemical. Bluestone is commonly sold under the brand name of Kocide and there are no restrictions on its use except there could be some problems where used in soft water.

available in an number of commercially prepared products, Algea-Rhap, Komeen, K-TEA, ine Plus and

A&V70. The common brand name of Simazine is Aquazine. It is a restricted product and can only be purchased by individuals with privat eor commercial applicator licenses. One should remember that there is a 12 month wait after application of Aquazine before one can use the water for livestock, irrigation or domestic

The above are the only approved chemicals that have been used int he past and not approved presently should not be used. One should always read the label and use the proper dosage. Some of the rates ar eper acre foot of water and some are for surface acre of water. An acre foot of water is

one surface acre measuring one foot.
