I tried wiggling...that hurt. There were sharp bits down in that hole...and they were sticking into my leg.

So I resorted to the only recourse left to me...yelling for my husband at the top of my lungs.

He came on the run, screamed to a halt and looked at me.

I suppose coming upon one's wife down at ground level, looking as if the earth had swallowed her is a little bit of a shock.

In the deepening dusk he had a mighty surprised expression on his face. Then he started to laugh. He took his time about that laugh. All the time I was squirming around like a bug on a pin, trying to get him to help me out of my predicament, and he was laughing!

Finally, he pulled me free of the post hole, much like extracting a cork from a bottle.

A goodly portion of my skin stayed behind in the hole.

I stood there, blood running down my leg, gravel stuck into it, madder than a wet hen, and he couldn't stop laughing.

I wanted to get mad, I really did, but decided it wouldn't be very smart. Murder is illegal, and that was the only thing that came to mind! And he did get me out, at least.

So instead I turned away, dusting some of the gravel off my leg, grabbed up a shovel and began filling the blasted, blankety-blank hole up!

Two Wounded, One Takes Own Life In Tragic Shooting

A Tuesday afternoon shooting ended with the assailant taking his own life, after shooting his wife and daughter.

According to Red River County Deputy Carl Motley, the Red River County Sheriff's Department received a call at 5:17 p.m. Tuesday, that Debbie Ann Hammond, age 34, and her oldest daughter, Kristin, age 15, had been wounded when John Howard Hammond, estranged husband of Debbie, had come into their home on North Main Street in Bogata, and shot them. A younger daughter, Julie, apparently ran next door for help, and neighbors came and helped them call the ambulance and police.

Hammond then became the object of a two-county search by law enforcement officials, as warrants were issued for his arrest on two counts of attempted murder.

Hammond was spotted once by a citizen in Jolintown shortly after that, but then wasn't seen again for some time.

At approximately 7:00 p.m. that evening, a Titus County Deputy met the suspect, who was driving a 1987 black Chevrolet pickup, on Highway 71 east of Talco. The deputy turned around to follow the suspect, who then turned onto a small county road known as the Iron Bridge Road.

Highway Patrolmen Jerry Conway and Byron Martin, a Titus County Constable and Titus County Deputy Ricky Pool set up a roadblock on the iron bridge.

According to official reports, Hammond, who was driving between 30 to 35 miles per hour, came around the curve just before the bridge, and spotted the roadblock. He then

stopped the pickup, placed it in park, and shot himself in the right temple.

Hammond was transferred by ambulance to Titus County Memorial Hospital where he died at approximately 9:00 p.m.

Debbie and Kristin Hammond were treated and released from St. Joseph's Hospital in Paris after sustaining gunshot wounds. Mrs. Hammond in the left upper thigh, and Kristin with a wound to the foot and a graze across the back of her leg.

The wounds were apparently made by a .38 caliber pistol. A .38 caliber pistol was found in the truck with Hammond.

Titus County has ordered a routine autopsy in the matter, since the fatal shooting incident occurred just across the Red River County line in Titus County.

Talco Homecoming Declared A Success

Fun, fellowship memories, back slapping, hugs, squeals of recognition, a few tears, a sneak look at name tags all took place on Saturday, June 24 at the 50th anniversary of the Talco School.

On March 3, 1939, the three year old Talco Times published a 40 page special edition to honor the opening and dedication of the new \$185,000 plant. The auditorium seated 869 and the cafeteria seated 350 in two shifts. B.E. Dunagan was superintendent, Glen Flewharty, high school principal and Guy Lemmond, elementary school principal. The board members were Tom Hill, H.L. Buelsford, K.O. France, Tom Cunningham, E.C. Taylor and Nolan Neugent.

Mr. Morse was born May 21, 1917 in Hopkins County and was a member of the Church of Christ in Talco. He is survived by his wife, Wanda, of Talco; two daughters, Judy Marshall and Barbara Morse of Carrollton; and one grandchild, Shawn Marshall.

Funeral services were scheduled for Thursday, June 22 at the Talco Church of Christ with Ken Garner officiating. Burial followed in Sulphur Bluff Cemetery.

When talking with Oma, it is easy to see that she loved her work of taking care of children. She believes children need to be talked to quite a lot to make them obedient. If the children refuse to listen, she says, the sting of a switch should be used, "But of course, beating is not the answer," she says. "And", she added, "all the children I kept were good."

April of 1981 her husband died and in 1982, upon Dr. E.E. Brooks advice, she moved to the nursing home. She feels that giving up her home was the hardest thing to do, but she says she has much respect for Dr. Brooks and knew it best to take his advice.

Although Red River Haven isn't home to Oma, she still manages to bring joy and laughter to those who stop by for a visit.

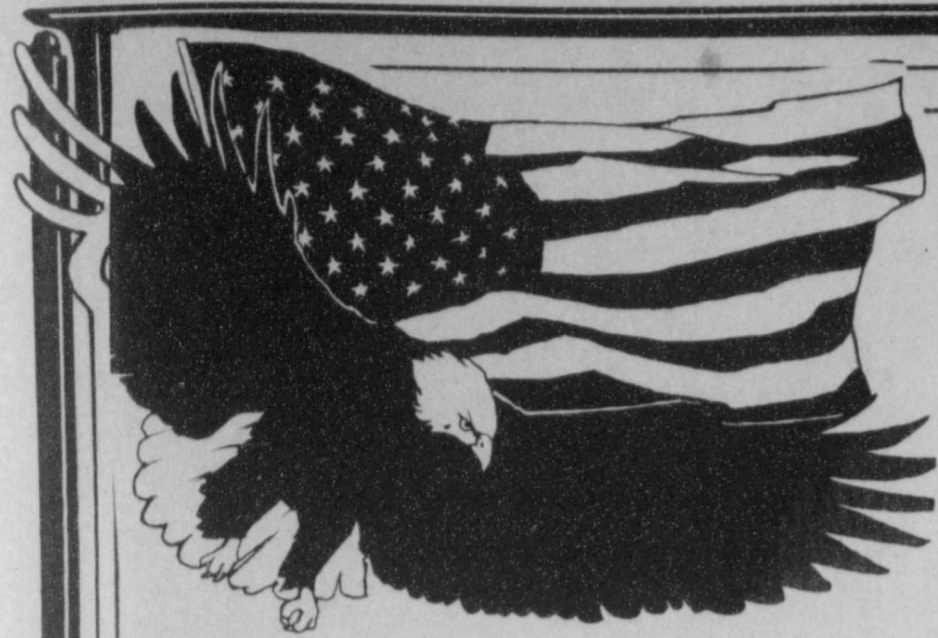

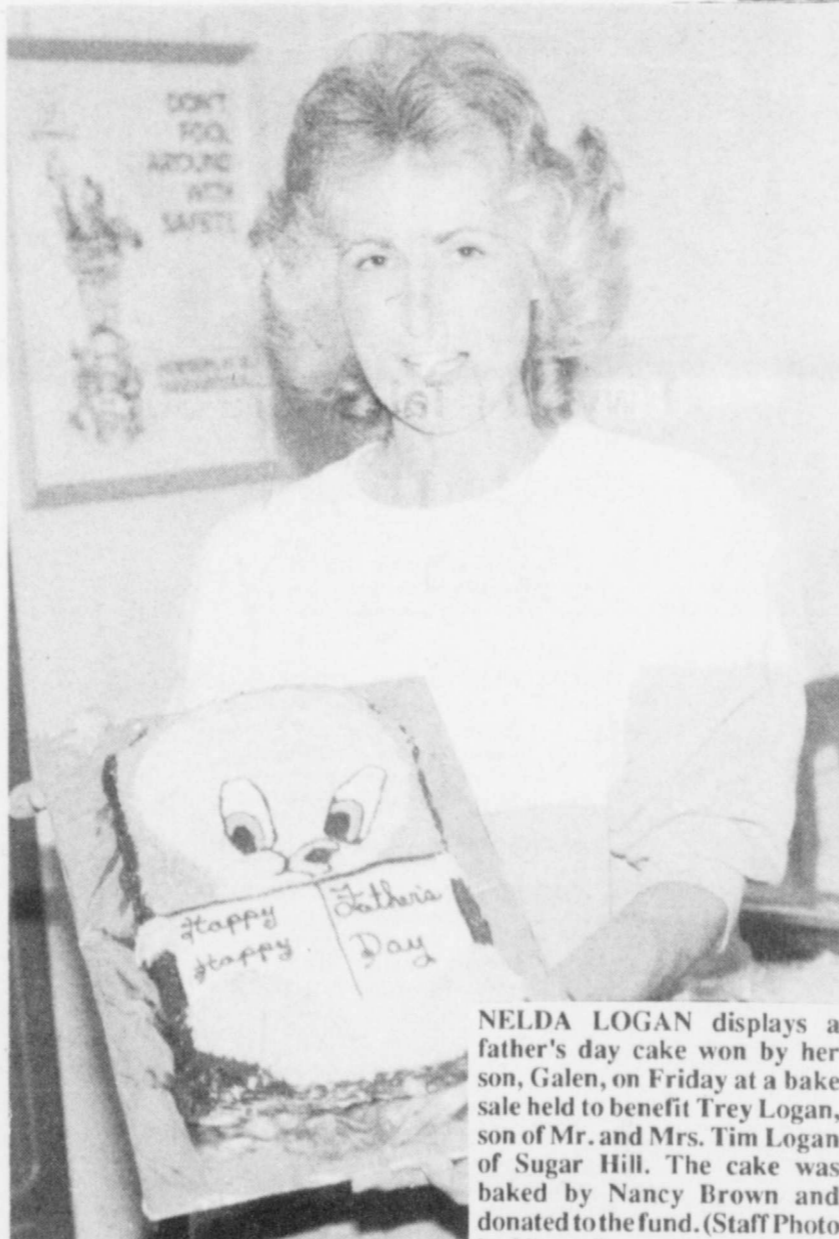



Strawberry Chiffon Pie

- 1 Keebler Ready-Crust Graham Cracker pie crust
- 1 pkg. (3 ozs.) strawberry flavor gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 pkg. (10 ozs.) frozen sliced strawberries
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 2 egg whites
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 cup cold whipping cream

In a large bowl, dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add frozen strawberries and lemon juice; stir until berries are thawed. Chill until slightly thickened, about 30 minutes. In small bowl, beat egg whites until foamy. Gradually add sugar; beat until stiff peaks form. Using same beaters, whip cream until stiff. Reserving 1 cup for garnish, fold remaining whipped cream into strawberry mixture. Fold in egg whites. Spoon into crust, mounding high above rim. Chill until set, about 4 hours. Garnish with reserved whipped cream and additional strawberries, if desired.

Keeping Healthy

Majority of Colorectal Cancer Patients Diagnosed Early Can Be Saved

The American Cancer Society reports that colorectal cancer is the second most common cause of cancer death in the U.S., ranking next to lung cancer. "With early detection and careful follow up, the cure rate for colorectal cancer could reach 90 percent, according to experts in the field, reports the American Family Physician.

One of these specialists, Paul Sherlock, MD, chairman of the Department of Medicine, Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, New York City, says that several factors are probably involved in the development of colorectal cancer. These include diet, environment and heredity, although the relationship between diet and colorectal cancer is still not completely understood.

Theories about the effect of diet include the idea that "dietary fat triggers the release of bile acids which promote the action of carcinogenic agents", and also that "people eating high fat, low-fiber diets excrete many mutagens in the stool". Occupational exposure to environmental pollutants have also been linked to colorectal cancer.
