Many Texans will remember that back in 1976 the federal government enacted a temporary 0.2 percent FUTA surtax to pay off \$8.7 billion debt in the national unemployment system. Despite a promise that the tax would expire when the debt was paid off, the temptation of collecting almost \$1 billion in revenue was obviously too great for Congress to resist and the tax, due to expire in 1987, was extended through 1990.

There is absolutely no reason to continue to tax Texas taxpayers and the Texas Employment Commission has supported elimination of the surtax since 1987. Finally, a bill to re-

The TEC opposed another federal measure that would have increased our administrative budget, but would have cost the employees of the state \$164 million in additional FUTA taxes in the next three years. The proposal, based on increasing the \$7000 FUTA wage base, would have added \$300,000,000 nationwide to the operating budgets of employment security agencies. All state agencies are facing budget crunches, but TEC felt that th price was too high. Over three years, Texas would have received about \$45 million of the \$164 estimated collections from Texas employers for employment security operations. That definitely did not appear to be in the best interest of taxpayers!

Practice escape procedures: sleep with your bedroom door closed. It could increase escape time.

If you suspect fire, test the door. If it is hot, do not open it because the area on the other side of the door is too hot to enter safely. If you think it is safe, brace your shoulder against the door and open it cautionsly. Be ready to slam the door if heat or smoke rush in.

Practice escaping and meeting outdoors at an assigned spot.

In case of fire, call the fire department from a neighbor's phone.

from small children. 2) Do not use gasoline or flammable liquids for cleaning in the

home. Do not use them to start or freshen a fire for heating or cooking. 3) Provide proper ventilation for portable gas and oil heaters or fire-

4) Do not smoke in bed. 5) Before going to bed, check

upholstered furniture to ensure that smoking materials are not lodged in the furniture.

6) Dispose of smoking materials safely. Store them out of doors in a metal container and immerse them with water to make sure that they are completely out.

7) Make sure that heating and cooking appliances are properly installed and used according to instruct-

8) Make sure that all electrical cords are safe. Electrical cords should not be placed under rugs, over hooks, in door opnings or other traffic paths. Check cords routinely for wear. Do not puncture cords with tacks, nails or other sharp objects and do not use cords which appear to be cracked, pinched, punctured or otherwise damaged.

9) Use only the correct size fuses in fuse boxes.

10) Keep basement, closets, attic and garage cleared of combustibles such a spapers, cartons, old furniture, clothes or oil soaked rags.

11) Store gasoline and other flammable liquids in closed containers away from heat, sparks and children, preferably away from the house. Never store flammable liquids in glass jugs, old bleach bottles or makeshift

12) Keep paint stored in closed metal containers and discard paintladen brushes.

13) Furnaces, stoves and stove pipes should be kept well away from combustible walls and ceilings. These appliances should be installed and maintained by qualified service

14) Heating equipment should be checked yearly by a qualified service

Before, I had never thought about being able to see my plate and choosing whatever food I wished to eat. When I finally found the correct food, I had difficulty in getting it to my mouth without making a complete mess of myself and the table. I was thrilled to finish that meal. It was

> a lot harder than I had expected. My next experience was taking a bath and getting ready for bed. Since I have lived in the same house for 18 years, I felt that this activity wouldn't take too long, considering I was very familiar with my surroundings. I never realized how difficult a bath could be without my vision. Normally, I turned thedials to a certain point that I see in order to adjust the temperature of the water. Had I not been very careful, I could have easily scalded myself. Also, groping around for a bar of soap is no fun, especially when it falls into the water. Before getting out of the bathtub, I decided to take the blindfold off, so that I wouldn't fall and injure myself. This experiment made

me sad knowing some individuals did not have the opportunity to pull off a blindfold in order to regain their eyesight.

After getting out of the bathtub, I once again replaced the blindfold. Trying to get dressed without sight turned into a very frustrating job. I was unable to tell if my garments were going on frontwards or backwards, wrong side out or right. Finally, after several minutes of tag searching, I was able to put my clothe son correctly. It was satisfying accomplishing such a small task on my

Next, I decided that I would watch television for approximately thirty minutes to an hour. I usually watch television every evening, but if I were actually blind, this would definitely change. Even though I was blindfolded, I thought that I could still listen to the television and enjoy it. Needless to say, the blindfold did not

last too long. After ten minutes of trying to figure out what was going on, I gave up, I couldn't see anything. I felt totally useless sitting in my bedroom unable to see anything around me. I turned the television off and once again replaced the blind-

My usual routine at this time is doing homework. I pulled my books from my backpack and without thinking, I flipped the book open. All at once, I realized that I had no idea if the book was upside down or backwards. I also realized that I couldn't read a single word on the pages that I could feel in front of me. This really made me think back to all of the times that I had just picked up a novel and started reading. I passed so many hours lost in the words that I was seeing in a book. I decided to attempt doing my homework and see

how it felt to be totally dependent on someone else for my studying. I asked my mother if she would help me with my experiment and read to me. I felt so helpless while listening to her. Usually while reading my textbooks, I highlight phrases for future references. This time, all I could do was listen and thank God that I was really not blind. After a few minutes of listening to my mother read, I decided to go to bed and think about

what had just taken place. Summarizing my evening, I thought about so many little things that I was unable to do that I normally take for granted. For example, during dinner, my mother had to prepare my plate. That is usually a boring task

that I never even think about, it just come snaturally. Withou sight, I felt helpless and awkward. I felt that no matter what I could do, there was someone there that could see and do a better job than I could. These feeling shelped me to understand some of the resentment and anger tha blind people must sometimes feel. I felt angry just because I couldn't finda bar of soap in the bathtub, yet I knew that I could remove the blindfold at

I have sometimes wondered what it would be like to be blind. Just a few hours that I experimented proved to be enough for me. Knowing that my experimental game was a reality for so many others made me grateful for my good vision. I realize that I have taken so much for granted in life, and that I have never stopped to consider those less fortunate. Without sight, my life would be completely different. The tasks that I perform daily and sometimes consider simple and bothersome are not easy without


