

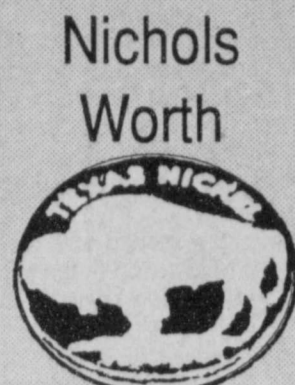

## If Texas Taxpayers Want Their FUTA Tax Lowered..Now Is The Time To Take Action!

Many Texans will remember that back in 1976 the federal government enacted a temporary 0.2 percent FUTA surtax to pay off \$8.7 billion debt in the national unemployment system. Despite a promise that the tax would expire when the debt was paid off, the temptation of collecting almost \$1 billion in revenue was obviously too great for Congress to resist and the tax, due to expire in 1987, was extended through 1990.

There is absolutely no reason to continue to tax Texas taxpayers and the Texas Employment Commission has supported elimination of the surtax since 1987. Finally, a bill to re-

peal the 0.2 percent FUTA surtax has been introduced by two Oregon representatives, Ron Wyden and Peter DeFazio. "The Federal Unemployment Tax Relief Act of 1989," HR 2316, will, if passed, repeal the surtax at the end of 1989 reducing every Texas taxpayer's annual FUTA cost by \$14 per employee.

Although a hearing has not yet been set, the bill will eventually be heard in the Subcommittee on Human Resources of the House Ways and Means Committee. For everyone who is interested in this legislation, now is the time to write congressional representatives. Taxpayers in this state may find that the bill does not pass without active support from the business community.

On a related note... The TEC opposed another federal measure that would have increased our administrative budget, but would have cost the employees of the state \$164 million in additional FUTA taxes in the next three years. The proposal, based on increasing the \$7000 FUTA wage base, would have added \$300,000,000 nationwide to the operating budgets of employment security agencies. All state agencies are facing budget crunches, but TEC felt that this price was too high. Over three years, Texas would have received about \$45 million of the \$164 estimated collections from Texas employers for employment security operations. That definitely did not appear to be in the best interest of taxpayers!

## Some Fire Safety Rules

Noting the tragic loss of lives and property from fire in Texas, State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson today urged Texans to reduce the number and severity of fires by learning effective methods of fire prevention and safety during Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14.

Fire departments in Texas responded in 1988 to more than 102,849 fires which killed 299 people, injured more than 2,400 and destroyed in excess of \$340 million in property, according to data from the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System, operated by the State Board of Insurance, State Fire Marshal's Office. Three hundred and eight fire departments, protecting 74% of the state population reported fires to TEXFIRS in 1988.

This year marks the 67th anniversary of National Fire Prevention Week. The week-long observance was first established in 1922 by President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" of October 9, 1871.

That conflagration killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million. People began thinking in terms of fire prevention in addition to fire fighting as a result of this fire.

A list of fire prevention guidelines and a fact sheet about fires in Texas for 1988 are listed below.

- 1) Keep matches and lighters away from small children.
- 2) Do not use gasoline or flammable liquids for cleaning in the home. Do not use them to start or freshen a fire for heating or cooking.
- 3) Provide proper ventilation for portable gas and oil heaters or fireplaces.
- 4) Do not smoke in bed.
- 5) Before going to bed, check

upholstered furniture to ensure that smoking materials are not lodged in the furniture.

6) Dispose of smoking materials safely. Store them out of doors in a metal container and immerse them with water to make sure that they are completely out.

7) Make sure that heating and cooking appliances are properly installed and used according to instructions.

8) Make sure that all electrical cords are safe. Electrical cords should not be placed under rugs, over hooks, in door openings or other traffic paths. Check cords routinely for wear. Do not puncture cords with tacks, nails or other sharp objects and do not use cords which appear to be cracked, pinched, punctured or otherwise damaged.

9) Use only the correct size fuses in fuse boxes.

10) Keep basement, closets, attic and garage cleared of combustibles such as papers, cartons, old furniture, clothes or oil soaked rags.

11) Store gasoline and other flammable liquids in closed containers away from heat, sparks and children, preferably away from the house. Never store flammable liquids in glass jugs, old bleach bottles or makeshift containers.

12) Keep paint stored in closed metal containers and discard paint-laden brushes.

13) Furnaces, stoves and stove pipes should be kept well away from combustible walls and ceilings. These appliances should be installed and maintained by qualified service people.

14) Heating equipment should be checked yearly by a qualified service person.

## Rebels Battered By Raiders 39-19

"Is my Knee CONTAGIOUS?" intoned sidelined senior running back Clint Tidwell to a Rivercrest coach near the end of last week's 39-19 loss by a Rebel Squad decimated by injuries to the class 3A Winnboro Red Raiders on their turf.

Tidwell's one turf reflected the sense of misfortune that seemed to afflict the Rebels in the final quarter, when three senior lettermen were forced to exit the contest due to injuries. First, Kevin Binion, who had been hurt on the game's fourth snap, but attempted to return, went down for the duration. This left the Rebels without a center, since Joey Webb did not suit up. Then senior fullback Marcus Savage, who had rushed for 109 yards on fourteen carries, including the Rebels first score, a 46 yard trap breakaway late in the initial marker to tie the contest, sprained an ankle. The hospital ward population increased when Tidwell's replacement, Jeremy Abshier, possibly broke a finger.

The Rebels held a 19-14 advantage when the injury bug struck, but gave up 25 points in the final thirteen minutes.

Winnboro was led by junior running back Leon Dickerson, who had a career making game, with 265 rushing yards on thirty-one carries (an

average of 8.5) rushed for four touchdowns and added one more on a half-back pass. The one man show accounted for all but 36 of the Raiders rushing yardage.

Rivercrest came back to cut the margin to one point just before half-time, when a fifty yard drive culminated on a five yard pass from Shane Beers to Joshua Abshier connected in the Raider end zone. That surge continued in the second half as linebacker Joe Dellis recovered the

controlling the ball for nearly eight minutes, to score the go-ahead touchdown with 46 seconds left to play in the third period.

The stage was set for a nightmarish fourth quarter for the Rebels. Proceed to play a make-shift offense due to the numerous injuries, the Rebels turned the ball over to the Raiders three times in that twelve minute span, with each giveaway resulting in six points for the Raiders to account for the final point spread.

The Rebels were able to maintain their seasonal rushing average for 265 yards. In addition to Savage's 109 steps, Jeremy Abshier added 68 yards on fourteen carries; Marc Teel, seeing his first sustained action at tailback, had a good 5.8 yards per carry, netting him 40 yards on seven calls. Tell will see more action at the slot this week. Joe Dellis adapted to

the fullback slot.

Defensively, the Rebel's Shane Beers was in nearly every tackle from his middle linebacker slot; freshman Tony Sanders continued to impress with his offensive and defensive play.

The Rebels now stand at 1-4 midway through the season. This week District 17-AA play begins as the Rebels travel to Wolfe City, who is led by Heath Davis and outstanding runner who is posting all-district credentials.

The Rebels will be hampered by injuries: all of the hurt players are questionable; none will be able to go the whole game. Says Coach Giddens "It isn't worth risking permanent injury to a young man, we will be cautious".

Mid-season stats show that Marcus Savage is leading the rebels in rushing yardages with 476 yards on 80 carries, for an average of 5.9. Offensively, the Rebels are averaging 286 yards per game, and have scored a total of 79 points.

The leading scorer is Joshua Abshier with 25 points. The Rebels have given up an average of 328 yards per game, allowing 135 points against them. The leading receiver is Jeremy Abshier, with 9 receptions for 192 yards, and average of 21.2 yards per reception.

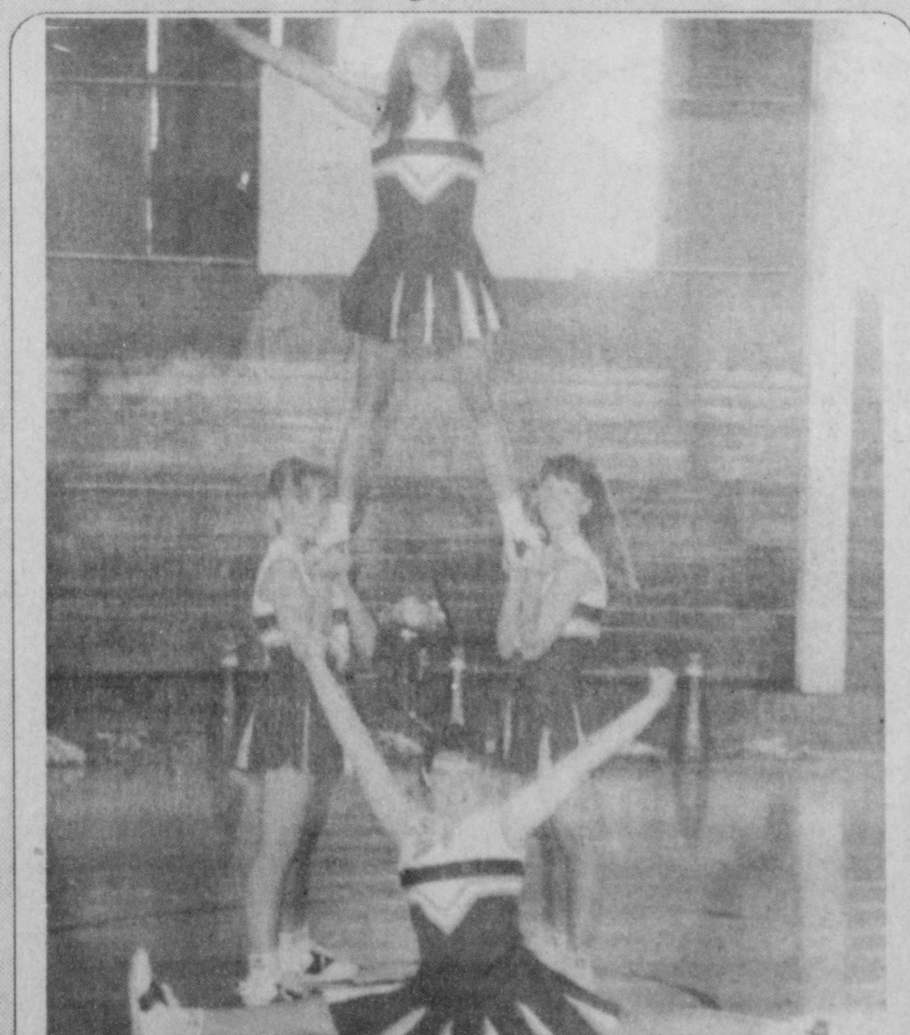

# Experiments In Blindness Revealing!

Have you ever considered what it would be like to be blind? To complete an assignment for Psy/EIEd 300, I took the opportunity to blindfold myself to try to experience what a blind person deals with in every day

life. I chose to blindfold myself from the time I came home from work, around 7 p.m. until bedtime. I wanted to see just how much my evening would be affected if I were blind. My first experiment without the

aid of sight was eating dinner. Normally, I can eat my meal and clean up the kitchen in twenty-five minutes. However, being sightless added several minutes to that 25-minute routine. Unable to fix my own plate was

a new experience. Also, the simple task of placing my fork on the correct food was rather difficult and challenging. Before, I had never thought about being able to see my plate and choosing whatever food I wished to eat. When I finally found the correct food, I had difficulty in getting it to my mouth without making a complete mess of myself and the table. I was thrilled to finish that meal. It was a lot harder than I had expected.

My next experience was taking a bath and getting ready for bed. Since I have lived in the same house for 18 years, I felt that this activity wouldn't take too long, considering I was very familiar with my surroundings. I never realized how difficult a bath could be without my vision. Normally, I turned the dials to a certain point that I see in order to adjust the temperature of the water. Had I not been very careful, I could have easily scalded myself. Also, groping around for a bar of soap is no fun, especially when it falls into the water. Before getting out of the bathtub, I decided to take the blindfold off, so that I wouldn't fall and injure myself. This experiment made me sad knowing some individuals did not have the opportunity to pull off a blindfold in order to regain their eyesight.

After getting out of the bathtub, I once again replaced the blindfold. Trying to get dressed without sight turned into a very frustrating job. I was unable to tell if my garments were going on frontwards or backwards, wrong side out or right. Finally, after several minutes of tag searching, I was able to put my clothes on correctly. It was satisfying accomplishing such a small task on my own.

Next, I decided that I would watch television for approximately thirty minutes to an hour. I usually watch television every evening, but if I were actually blind, this would definitely change. Even though I was blindfolded, I thought that I could still listen to the television and enjoy it. Needless to say, the blindfold did not

last too long. After ten minutes of trying to figure out what was going on, I gave up, I couldn't see anything. I felt totally useless sitting in my bedroom unable to see anything around me. I turned the television off and once again replaced the blindfold.

My usual routine at this time is doing homework. I pulled my books from my backpack and without thinking, I flipped the book open. All at once, I realized that I had no idea if the book was upside down or backwards. I also realized that I couldn't read a single word on the pages that I could feel in front of me. This really made me think back to all of the times that I had just picked up a novel and started reading. I passed so many hours lost in the words that I was seeing in a book. I decided to attempt doing my homework and see

how it felt to be totally dependent on someone else for my studying. I asked my mother if she would help me with my experiment and read to me. I felt so helpless while listening to her. Usually while reading my textbooks, I highlight phrases for future references. This time, all I could do was listen and thank God that I was really not blind. After a few minutes of listening to my mother read, I decided to go to bed and think about what had just taken place.

Summarizing my evening, I thought about so many little things that I was unable to do that I normally take for granted. For example, during dinner, my mother had to prepare my plate. That is usually a boring task

that I never even think about, it just come snaturally. Without sight, I felt helpless and awkward. I felt that no matter what I could do, there was someone there that could see and do a better job than I could. These feelings helped me to understand some of the resentment and anger that blind people must sometimes feel. I felt angry just because I couldn't find a bar of soap in the bathtub, yet I knew that I could remove the blindfold at any time.

I have sometimes wondered what it would be like to be blind. Just a few hours that I experimented proved to be enough for me. Knowing that my experimental game was a reality for so many others made me grateful for my good vision. I realize that I have taken so much for granted in life, and that I have never stopped to consider those less fortunate. Without sight, my life would be completely different. The tasks that I perform daily and sometimes consider simple and bothersome are not easy without sight.
