Colors. Perhaps it's because things are so gloomy right now, with most of the colors leached out because of the extreme cold, but colors have been making more of an impact on my feeble brain than usual.

And as I pawed through my paint box to find some burnt umber, it hit me that learning those colors was one of the first educational experiences I had...and is for most people.

Before we even went to school most of us sat on our parent's lap and had things that were red, or blue, or yellow held up, and were told "Red"...see sweetheart...Red!"

During our first year in school we were taught our primary colors, then the next step was that yellow and blue made green, red and blue made purple, yellow and red made orange...on and on.

Those early crayon boxes contained simple sticks of color.. A little later on we managed those larger, more complicated boxes of crayons.

Those rows of crayons were almost magical. Names like Prussian Blue, Raw Sienna, Cerulean Blue, Alizarin Crimson, Royal Purple, Raw Umber Forest Green, Lime Green Cocoa Brown..

The names absolutely fascinated me. They seemed so exotic, so wonderful.

A picture colored with them seemed ever so much more sophisticated than one done simply in red, green and blue!

There were even boxes of crayons which had silver, copper and gold crayons. And while they never produced a perfect golden gleam, they did add a valuable, sparkling touch of color!

That color education was so basic, though, that even today Prussian Blue conjures up the blue of antique German uniforms from the 1700's.

Forest green means pines and spruce.

That early education in color, provided simply by a box of wax crayons, has been a basic, permanent part of my life.

I suspect it has been for millions of others, too.

Sometimes the earliest, simplest lessons are the best.

We hope the drawing for cash prizes added a little "spice" to the subscribing process, and that we can continue to provide excellent news and local coverage for all the communities we serve.



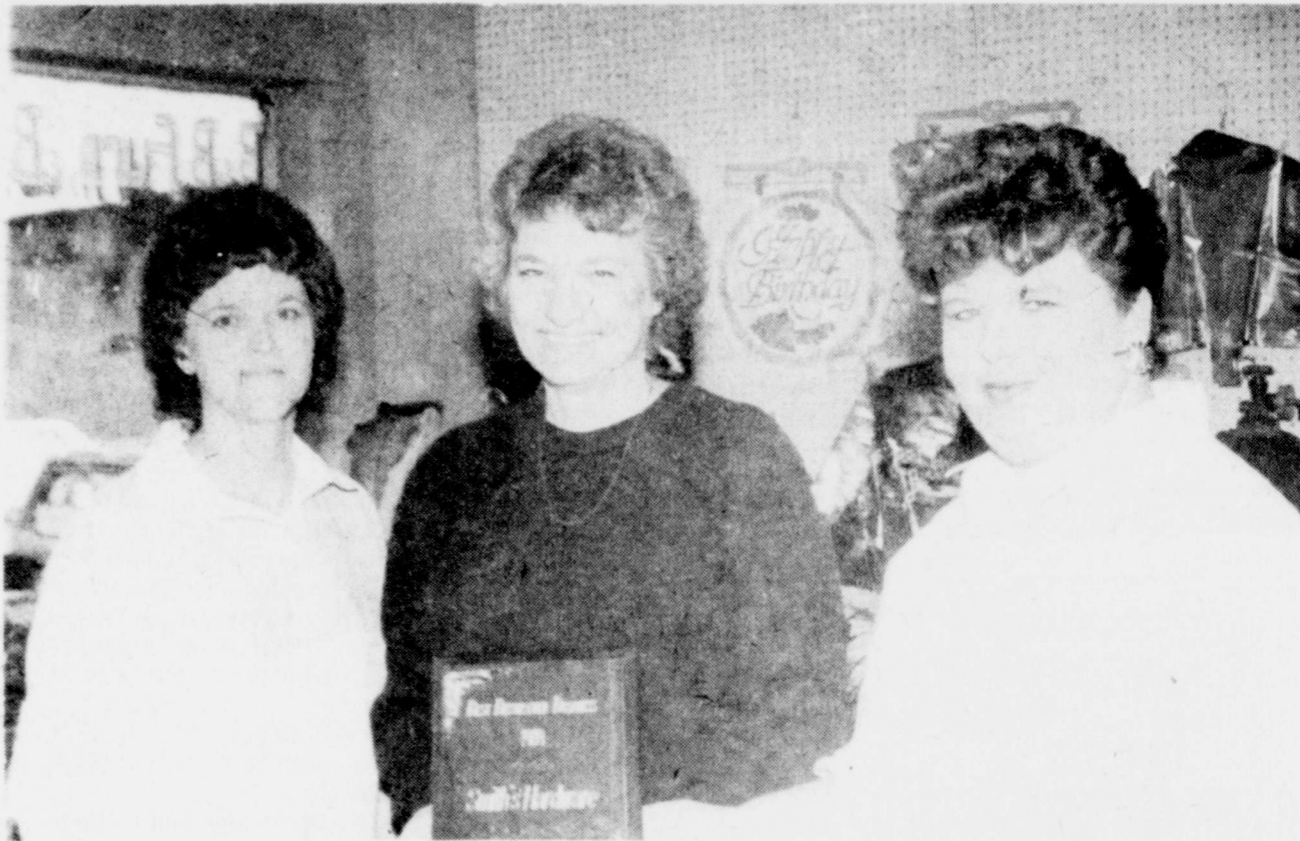

Talco Girl Scout Cookie Sale Begins

January 12-26, Girl Scouts will be taking orders for Girl Scout cookies, with delivery set for February 21-March 7.

Seven varieties will be offered at \$2.25 per box. This year a sugar-free snack cracker, Golden Yangles, is being introduced. Other varieties include Caramel Delites, Thin Mints, Peanut Butter Sandwiches, Shortbread, Lemon Pastry Creme and Peanut Butter Patties.

According to Betsy Mills of Paris, coordinator of the sale for Red River Valley Council, Girl Scouts have been selling cookies to support their program for over 50 years. Last year,

Girl Scouts all across America sold approximately 155 million boxes of cookies. Over 107,000 boxes were sold by local council in its 13-county jurisdiction.

Proceeds help both individual troops and the local council, which provides services and facilities.

This sale offers young girls valuable communication and sales experience, and an opportunity to develop

their self-confidence. Before selling cookies, the girls practice safety procedures and discuss sales techniques. It also helps them learn about

money management, budgeting, goal-setting and planning, all valuable business skills that can be useful in later life.

The Girl Scout council also offers an incentive award program for the girls, based on the number of boxes they sell.

Girls can also earn up to \$125 credit toward resident camp sessions at Camp Gambill next summer.

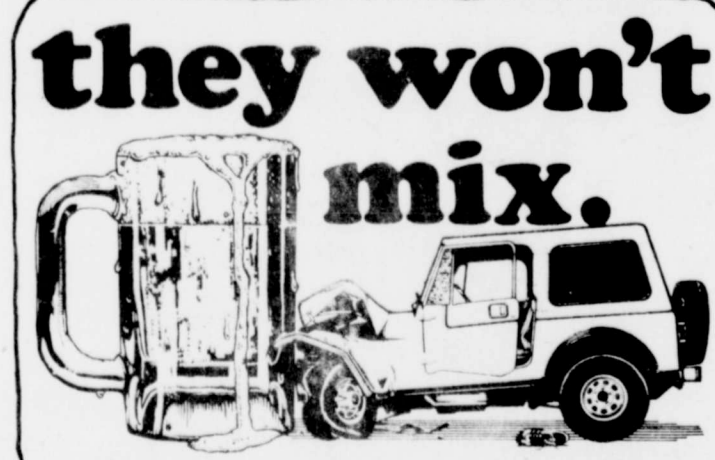

Warren Denison Recalls War Time Experiences As Airman

On December 7, 1942, Dick Haddock and Alvin Crossland invited Warren Denison to get in the car with them, drive to Dallas and sign up for the Armed Services of the United States of America.

Years later, Warren recalls that that was an embarkation on a whole new way of life.

After inlisting Warren found himself in the airforce, stationed in Wichita Falls and learning to be an aircraft mechanic. After that it was on to Fort Miers, in Florida, where he went through gunner school. From there he went to Tuscon, Arizona, then to San Francisco, California. That was a lot of travelling for a country boy...but then he went to Italy.

He spent the rest of 1943 and into 1944 at a place called Giulia, Italy as a nose gunner with the 459th bomber group.

The so-called "air field" used by the 459th was constructed of huge metal plates laid out to form a runway. The control tower for the group was constructed of a wooden box with open windows sitting on 4 wooden poles. The tower was known as "Coffee Tower", and housed radio equipment and staffed with two controllers. By today's standards it was pretty primitive.

Warren and the rest of the airmen of the 459th slept in tents and were cold, wet and miserable most of the time., Denison notes.

"It wasn't exactly a picnic" he grins. He flew 50 missions in the nose of a B-17 before returning state-side.

Cramped into the nose of the huge planes, he got his best glimpses of Italy, the time he spent on the ground was completely spent on the base.

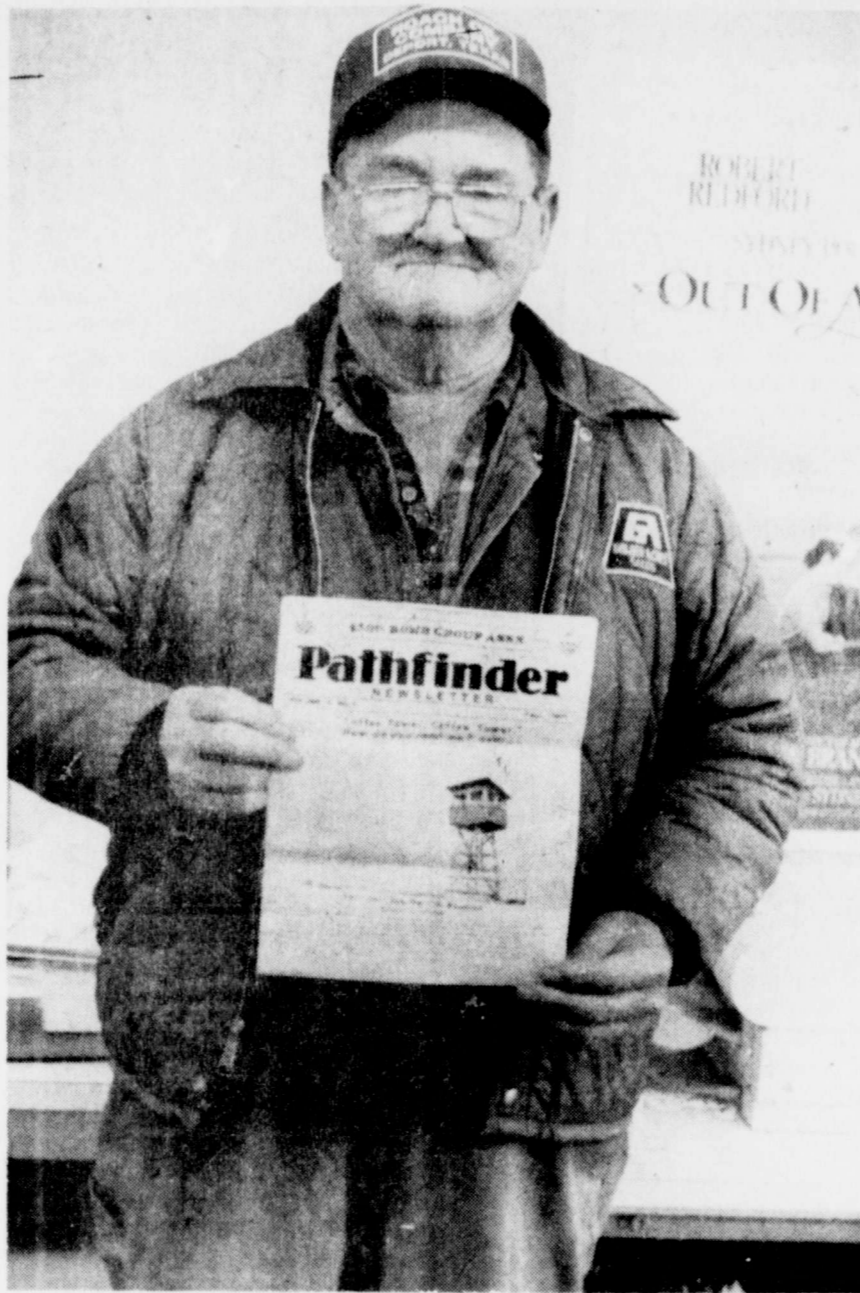
Last October marked the 7th reunion of the 459th group, and they had a reunion held in Niagara Falls, New York. Denison didn't attend that reunion, but did attend the 1986 one in Dayton, Ohio.

Their next reunion will be in San Francisco, and Warren says he probably won't be able to go to that one, but in two years he 's definitely going, since that one will be a little closer to home.

He doesn't know all the guys at those reunions, but it's a time to share experiences once again. For whether an airman knew knew one another personally way back then...they know the shared, common experiences of fighting a war.

There are millions of men like Warren Denison...country boys who left homes and families to go and fight far, far away. They did it out of excitement, out of curiosity, out of duty...and they did it, most of all, to defend their country.

They are all older now, those that survived...but they all remember, and each has his own personal war stories to tell.

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A NOTICE TO PROPANE GAS CONSUMERS

Hershel Welch of WelchGas has stated that there is absolutely no justification for the drastic rise in the price of propane. Welch said his cost of propane has increased over 50-cents per gallon since December 1, 1989, from wholesale suppliers and refiners.

Granted, this has been the coldest December, both nationwide and worldwide, in the last 40 years. Certain areas of the United States and around the globe were caught short of heating oil and diesel which caused a mad scramble for gas supplies and caused transportation problems getting fuel from one point to another resulting in a shortage of propane in mid-west and east areas.

Several large cities were without electricity and the natural gas supply systems were severely strained to keep up. One major electric utility energy company in Texas cut off electricity twice a day to its metropolitan customers for short periods resulting in extensive water pipe damage and causing flooding situations.

Propane dealers who supply fuel for rural homes are having to pay exorbitantly high prices and compete for gas supply against large petro-chemical plants and brokers who are running the price up.

WelchGas has access to adequate supplies of propane and the transportation equipment necessary to deliver it to our customers in a timely manner. We are simply having to pay these unreasonably high prices which we consider unjustified.

The Texas Attorney General's office is investigating the situation to see if there is any unfair business practices. Welch feels this is not the normal "supply and demand" situation, and it should be looked into.

Animal Pests Take No Winter Vacations

External pests on livestock and pets do not disappear during the winter cold, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Lice on livestock and fleas and ticks on pets continue to be a problem, even in the coldest weather," said Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Overton. "Lice on livestock multiply rapidly during the winter months. On the other hand, fleas and ticks reproduce at a slower rate, but are still present."

"Cattle infested with lice appear unthrifty, bare spots appear where the hair has fallen out or the animals may rub against objects," Robinson said. "Lice can be controlled by applying the proper insecticide. Some

of the materials have restrictions, so label directions should be strictly followed."

For pets, Robinson suggests continuing treatment for fleas through the winter to help reduce next spring's infestation. Special attention should be given to bedding areas. Bedding should be cleaned or changed. Outside the home, use an approved insecticide.

"Ticks overwinter as adults," Robinson said. "They are found primarily in litter or trash with an occasional tick on pets. Treatment should be intensified when the first sign of tick movement is noticed in the spring. It is virtually impossible to keep free roaming pets free of ticks and fleas. Therefore, periodic treatment is essential."

This workshop is for writers working on various forms of fiction, from short stories and novels to narratives. Lectures and group discussions will focus on students' own works in progress.

Participants in a divorce recovery course will be held January 23 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., and will study the emotional states of divorce; recognition of unhealthy relationship patterns and how to build positive relationships in the future; problem areas in relating with children, during and after divorce. Registration can be completed at the continuing education office located in the Alford Center on the PJC campus.

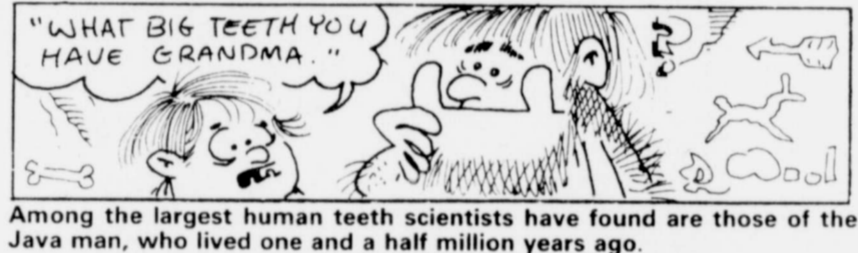

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL.
 CITY OF TALCO, P.O. Box 365, Talco, Texas 75487 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10869-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 125,000 gallons per day. The wastewater treatment facilities are on the north side of Farm-to-Market Road 71, approximately one mile northeast of the City of Talco, Tarrant County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into an unnamed ditch; thence to Prairie Lake; thence to an unnamed tributary of the Sulphur River; thence to the Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin.
 In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff has determined the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge and whether the proposed discharge will cause significant degradation to any high quality waters in the area. The uses for the unclassified receiving waters are no significant aquatic life for the unnamed ditch and limited aquatic life for Prairie Lake. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic habitat. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses, and no significant degradation of high quality receiving waters is anticipated. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.
 The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that effluent limitations for minimum dissolved oxygen concentration have been added. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of

Commission approval.

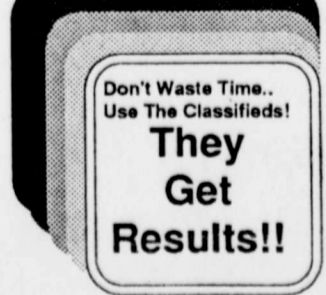

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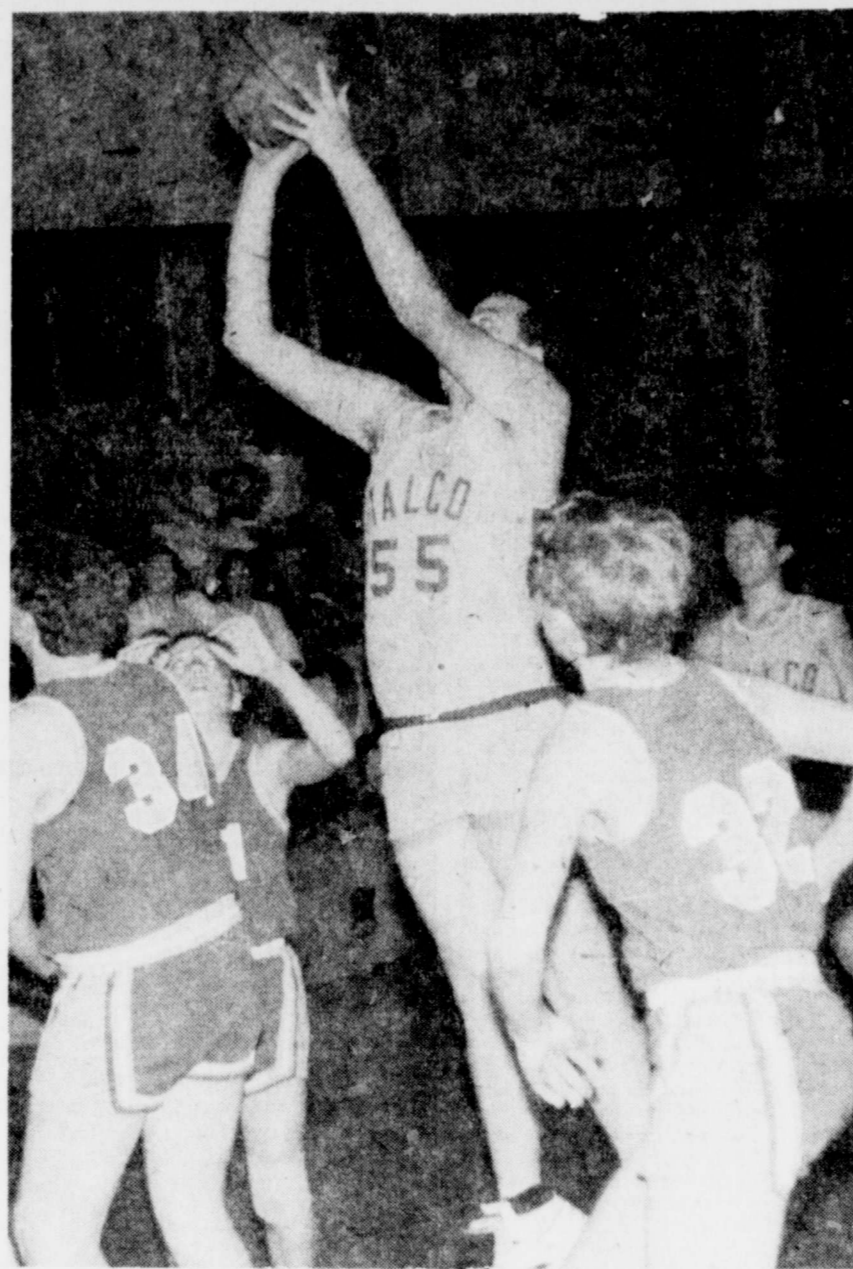

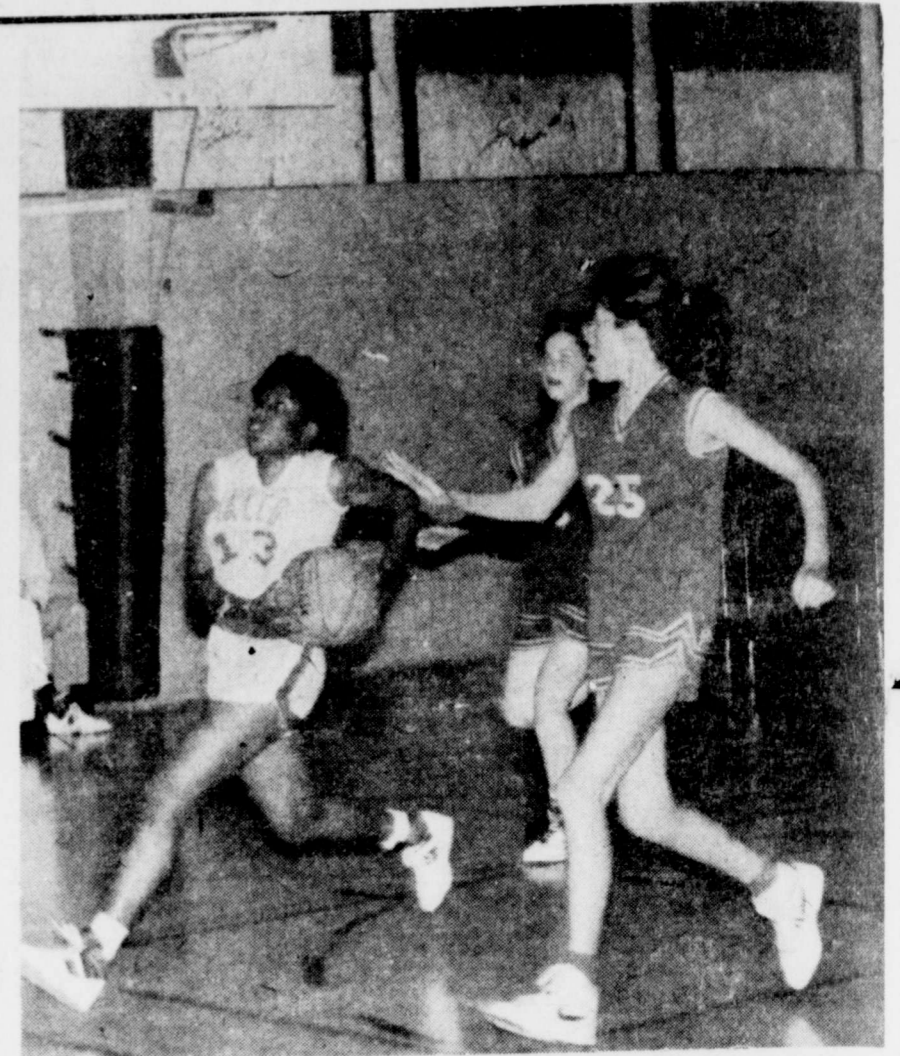
