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Talco Junior High Sports

The Talco Junior High girls team traveled to Saltillo on Thursday to begin play in the end-of-year tournament held in Sulphur Bluff. Due to the number of teams, some games were played in Saltillo on Thursday. The girls faced the Avery team and took an early lead for an uneventful game, winning 32-18. Laquitta Norman led in scoring with 24 points.

The girls returned Friday to Sulphur Bluff to meet the Deport girls team. Friday's game saw the Talco girls in foul trouble and an off night, but they pulled out the win 29-17. Again Laquitta Norman led in scoring with 14 points.

On Saturday at 11 a.m., the Talco girls met their first competition against the Sulphur Bluff girls. Talco won the game with a fair amount of ease. Norman scored 26 points, aided by Jackie Reed and Jennifer Bond each with six points and Tawala Padgett added a free shot, final score 39-24.

Saturday evening's game saw the Talco girls competing for first place against the Blossom girls team. The game was up and down the court, first with Talco on top and then from the bottom. Laquitta Norman, Talco's powerhouse, had four fouls and the team held a nine point lead. With Norman off the court, the team could not hold the lead and as Blossom pulled ahead they began a stall with less than two minutes left on the clock. A stall was not something Talco has faced this year and the girls were at a loss as what to do. When fouls were finally committed, the wrong players were fouled and made their

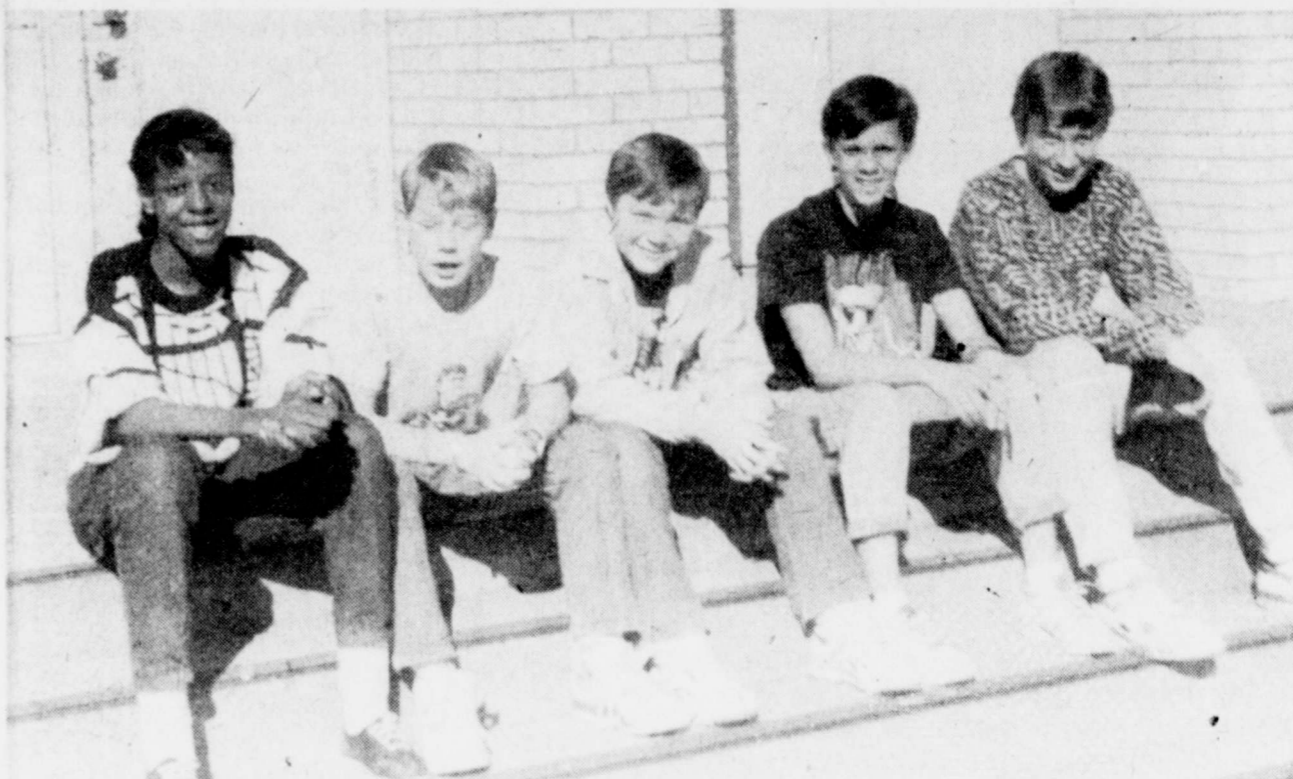
free shots to increase the lead Blossom held. Norman re-entered the game with :40 seconds left on the clock but it wasn't enough, time ran out and Blossom won the game 34-31. Regardless of the loss, second place is no shame with the competition in the tourney and Talco is proud of the Junior High girls. Laquitta Norman scored a total of 85 points during the tourney outscoring any other player.

The Junio High teams returned to action Monday night, traveling to Chapel Hill.

The seventh grade boys played their best game of the season when the third quarter saw the taller Chapel Hill boys with only a 3-point lead at the end of the quarter, 20-17. Mistakes took over for the Talco boys in the fourth and final quarter. The young Rebels simply could not find the basket. The final score was 30-17, Chapel Hill.

The girls team could not hold the lead on Chapel Hill either. Laquitta Norman was held under control, scoring only 13 points and was put out of the game with five fouls in the fourth quarter. Final score was 31-20, Chapel Hill.

The Talco "A" boys took the court and took control. Shannon Richeson led scoring for Talco with 16 points. Where both the "B" boys and girls just couldn't get it together, the A boys could do no wrong. The score was 69-48, Talco. The boys teams will begin their end-of-year tourney on Thursday, February 1. Everyone is encouraged to come out and support the youngest teams at Sulphur Bluff.

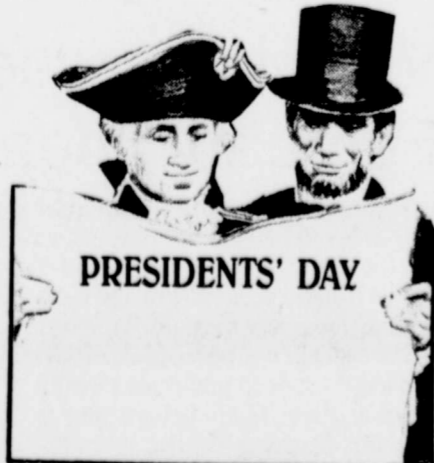

Virginia Jessee To Be February Speaker For Group



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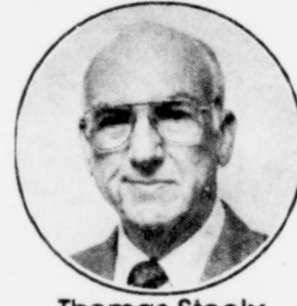

Producers Facing Uncertain Forage Supply

If the winter continues as sporadic as it began, East Texas forage producers may face a real supply problem, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist for the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

"Although excess rain occurred during the first six months of 1989, the lack of rain since July practically stopped all forage production," said Dr. Reeves. "As a result, many producers started feeding hay earlier than normal."

"Even with an above normal hay harvest, some producers are likely to be cut out of hay before forages begin to grow in the spring," Reeves said. "Therefore, it is a good idea to inventory the cow herd and the hay supply to determine the feeding program which will be required the remainder of the winter. If more is needed, locate the hay now instead of waiting until everybody else is looking."

Recent rains should make small grain pastures grow and viable seeds planted prior to the rains should germinate.

"We have a minimum of two more months before much forage production can be expected," Reeves said. "Anything that germinates now will require about six weeks before it can be grazed, providing moisture is available and we have decent growing weather."

"Knowing the quality of the hay is critical in determining how to properly supplement the cows nutritional needs," Reeves said. "Having the hay tested for quality is still a viable practice."

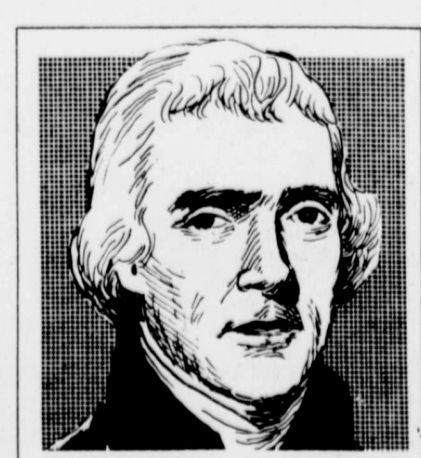

The next meeting will be Feb. 6th starting with a supper at 6:30 and Certificate of Appreciation following and then the regular meeting at 8:00.

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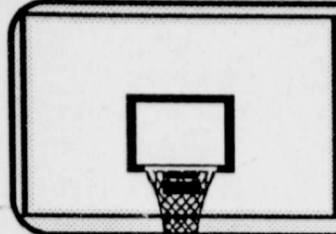

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Roundball Roundup

The Rivercrest High School Rebels and Rebelettes continue to play excellent basketball, as both teams approach the 20-win mark on the season. The Rebelettes need only one win in their final four district games to attain that goal, while the boys have six games left and are currently 18-5. Both squads are in the thick of District 17AA title chase, and are contending for post-season play-off berths.

Carol Black Graduates ETSU

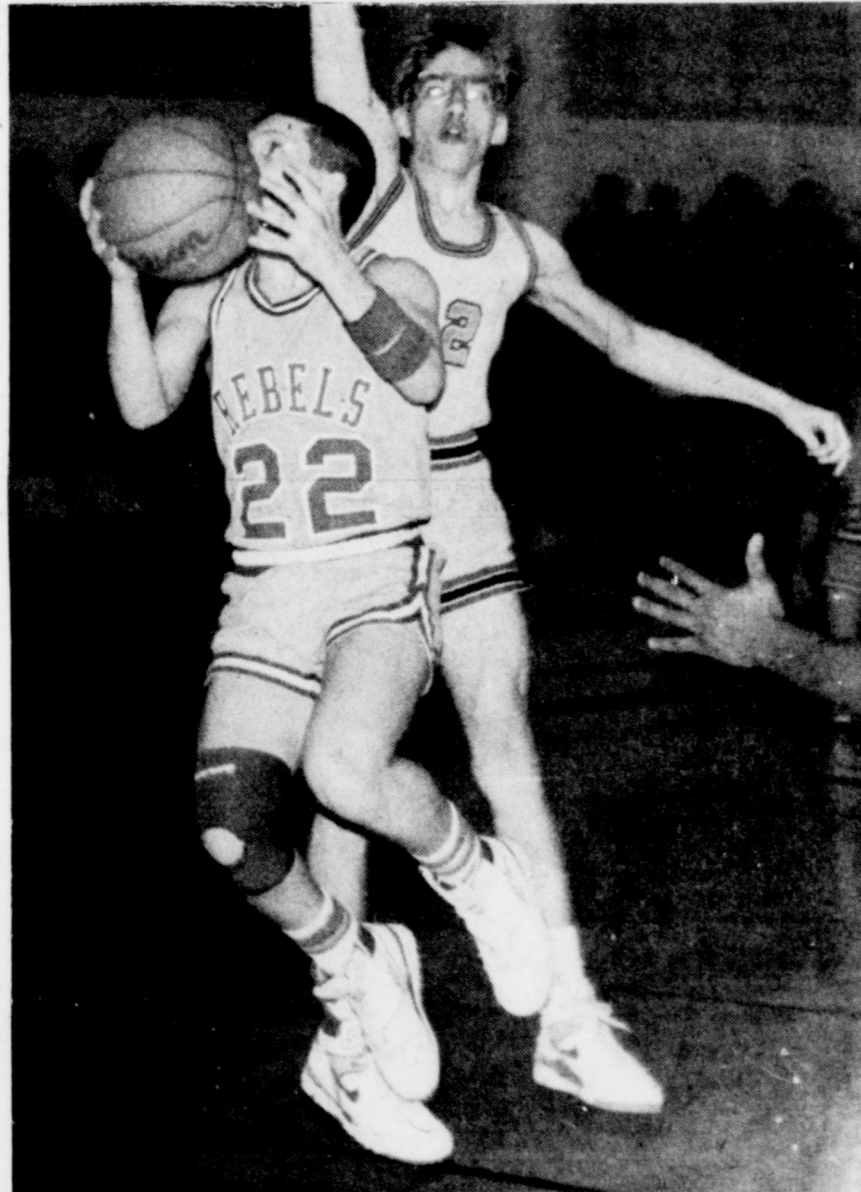
Carol Rhodes Black graduated from East Texas State University on December 22, 1989 with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice degree.

Carol and her husband, Danny, reside at their home in Johntown with their two daughters, Dena and dCrystal White. They have one son, James White of Mt. Pleasant.

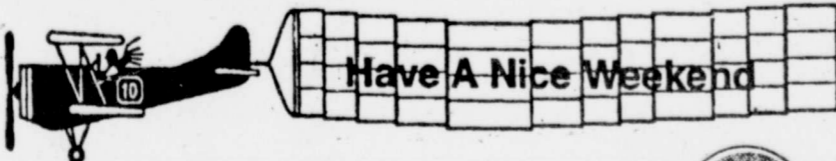

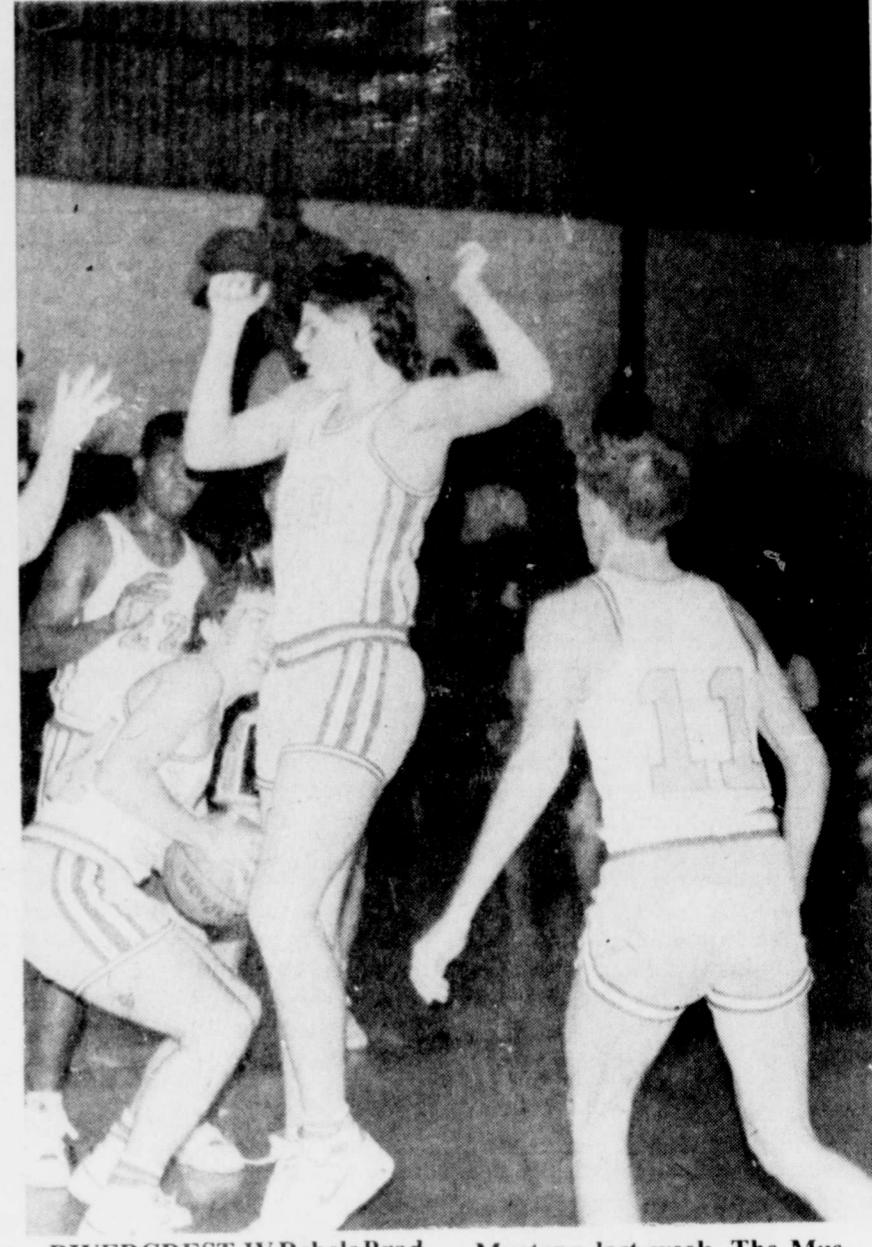

Latchkey Children A Product Of The 1980's

"Latchkey children" is a term that dates back to the 19th century, when house keys on neck chains were the badge of working class children on their own. While children in self-care are not a product of the 1980's, the magnitude of the problem is.

Recent census data indicate that about 2.1 million children between the ages of five and 13 spend some time in self-care. Other expert sources estimate the number of latchkey

children in that age category to be three or four times the official 2 million figure.

In response to the problems facing latchkey children and their families, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has joined forces with the American Home Economics Association to implement Project Home Safe. Project Home Safe is a national demonstration project which includes research, training, materials devel-

opment and start-up or strengthening of community school age child care programs throughout the U.S.

Regional Project Home Safe Trainings, conducted by the Extension Service, are being held across the state and a training will be held on March 21 and 22 in Mt. Pleasant for volunteers from Red River County.

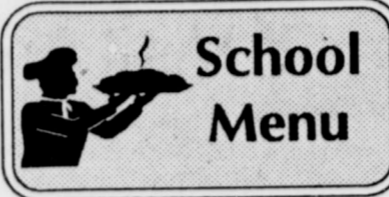
Individuals interested in participating in the training should contact Virginia Brock, Red River County Extension Agent in Clarksville.

A Project Home Safe Resource Center and Hotline have been established at the AHEA headquarters. Parents and other concerned adults can call the toll-free Project Home Safe Hotline, 1-800-252-SAFE, to obtain information about the latchkey issues and school age child care programs.

The trainings will train individuals to work with coalitions of local leaders to assess local needs, identify available resources and develop a plan of action to solve local community problems of children in self-care.

In communities which offer no alternative to the latchkey arrangement, life-skills training for children in self-care will be provided by Project Home Safe volunteers. In addition, Project Home Safe Volunteers will work to create local, state and national awareness of the needs and problems of young children who care for themselves.

However, according to information published in the *American Journal of Nursing*, "how fast it gets there and even whether it makes it at all depends on the amount of liquid taken with it and on the patient's body position at the time."

"Even those who have no evidence of gastric or cardiac disease should stand up or at least sit bolt upright while swallowing tablets and capsules with at least 100 ml of liquid." Bed-ridden patients and those who have trouble swallowing should be given their medication in liquid form, readers are advised.

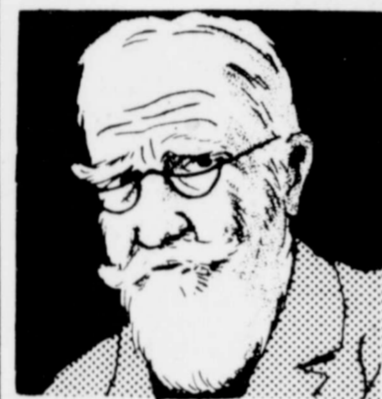

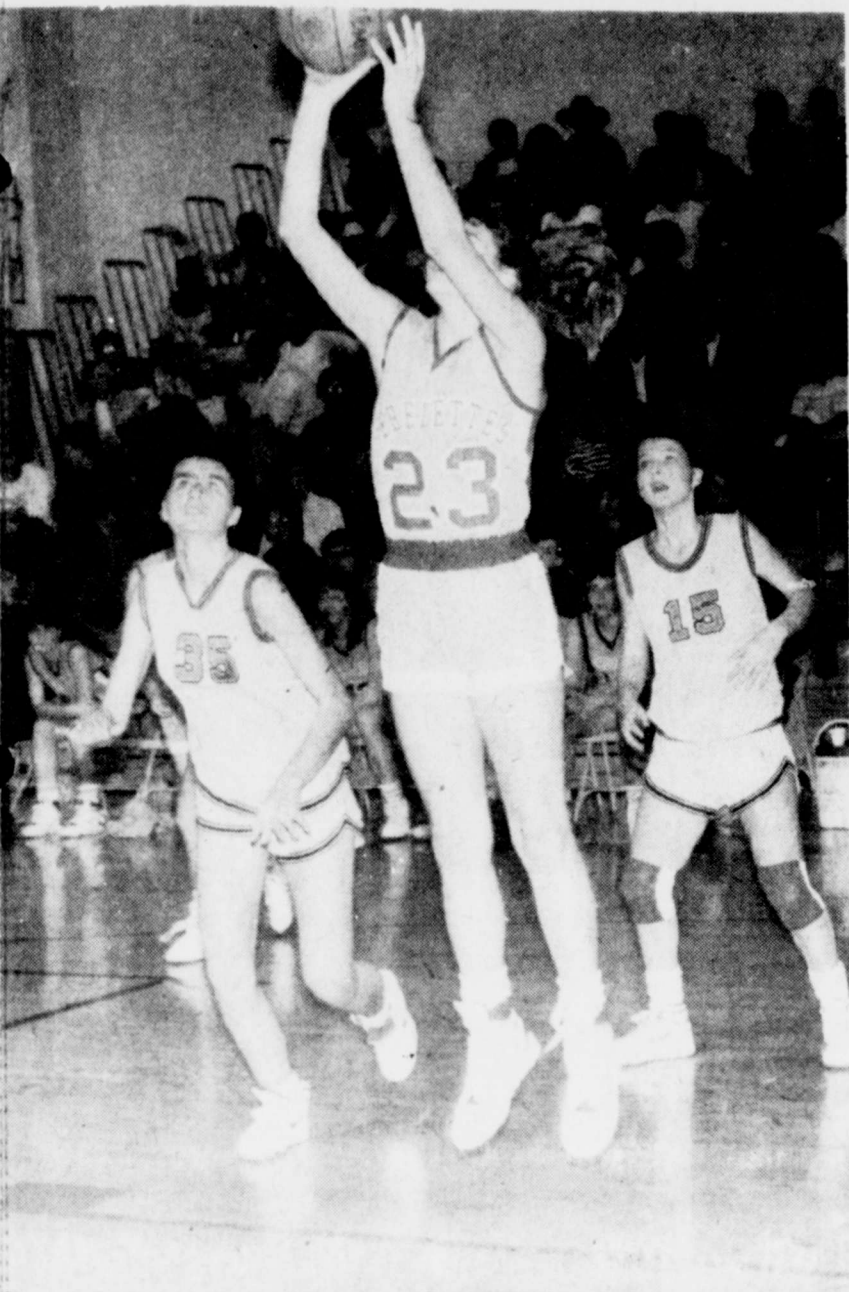
