





GED Test Offered At PJC

Paris Junior College will give General Eduction Development tests at 6 p.m. on April 16 and 17, according to Barbara Thomas, director of the PJC Student Development Cen-

Eligibility requirements for a Texas Safety identifcation card, or a notacertificate of high school equivalency

1. Must be a resident of Texas or a member of the U.S. armed forces stationed at a Texas installation.

2. Must be 18 years old. A 17-year old whose 16th birthday occurred prior to September 1, 1989, may take the GED tests provided that the applicant's resident district specifies that the applicant is not in attendance and has not earned sufficient high school credits to be reasonably expected to graduate. He/she must have parental or guardian permission. Those persons who are 17 years old must submit consent forms, available at the PJC testing center, that are signed and notarized by his/her parent or guardian. A letter from the school stating that he/she does not attend school and is unlikely to graduate is required.
