NTCC Summer Schedules Ready

"Hot Dates for Summer 1990", the Northeast Texas Community College schedule of classes for Intersession and Summer 1990 is now available in the college Administration Building.

Classes begin May 15 and end May 31 with eleven courses scheduled including computer science, criminal justice, English, government, history, mathematics, physical education, psychology and speech. Most of the classes meet from 8:30 until 12:15, five days a week and students may enroll in only one class.

Students who plan to enroll should pick up a copy of an advisement/registration form in the Admissions Office and meet with an academic advisor prior to May 14. Registration will be from 8:30 until 4 on May 14 in the Administration Building.

A total of 80 classes will be offered

during the first summer session, June 4 to July 12, 61 of them day courses and 19 of them, evening courses.

Students who will attend NTCC for the first time this summer should complete an application for admission, provide either copies of GED or high school transcripts and copies of TASP scores. Students who have not taken TASP at the time of registration should arrange to take the Pre-TASP test prior to registration. A PTT testing schedule is printed in the summer schedule and students should contact the Counseling Office to sign up for testing dates.

Early registration for the first summer term is May 23-24 and regular registration is May 31. Classes, which generally meet Monday through Thursday, begin June 4.

Culinary Heart's Course To Be Offered

The American Heart Association will be offering a Culinary Heart's Course the last two Tuesdays in April and the first four Tuesdays in May at the Bogata Methodist Church at 9:30 a.m. Cost will be \$7.50 or \$12.00 per married couple. A pre-class data form will be sent upon registration, and it is preferred that you pre-register.

The Culinary Heart's Course helps teach people how to put dietary recommendations for reducing the risk of heart disease into practice, so you don't have to have high cholesterol to attend.

The American Heart Association recommends a balanced diet including all the major food groups. And many of your favorite recipes can be modified to reduce cholesterol and saturated fat content, states Virginia Brock, Certified Home Economist, Red River County Agent-HE.

One common misconception is that the AHA diet doesn't include red meat.

That's not true. Lean red meat, fish and poultry are all recommended.

Following a healthy diet is simple. Build your diet around the basic food groups and their recommended servings, four or more servings of fruit and vegetables, four or more servings of bread, cereal and starch foods, two or more servings of low-fat milk, cheese and dairy products, six ounces of lean meat, fish or poultry; limit fats and oils to 5-8 teaspoons; limit whole eggs or egg yolks to no more than 3 per week.

For more information, call Virginia Brock, Red River County Agent, Home Economics at 427-3867 or stop by the County Extension Office at 407 E. Main in Clarksville.

Last year's group had a member that lowered their cholesterol 182 points, ten weeks after the course as well as a person that lost 22 pounds. Each class builds upon the preceding class information.

New Test May Identify Blocked Or Narrowed Arteries

A special kind of electrocardiogram (EKG) taken during exercise tests may help identify people with blocked or narrowed coronary arteries, a condition that can lead to heart attacks, cardiologists at the University of Wisconsin Medical School have found.

Signal-averaged electrocardiograms may be able to detect coronary artery disease at least as well as standard EKGs and with more precise numerical readings, according to Dr. E. Wayne Grogan, Jr., UW Medical School assistant professor of cardiology and director of cardiac electrophysiology at UW Hospital and Clinics. The procedure, which involves no risk or discomfort to the patient, may help physicians determine who should be tested further.

"Exercise tests detect only about 75% of all patients with coronary artery disease," Grogan said. In addition, the standard EKG is affected adversely by medications the patient might be taking and other heart conditions unrelated to coronary artery disease, problems which do not appear to affect signal averaging, he added.

Although another more precise test, the thallium test, can detect up to 90% of these patients, it is expensive and involves injecting a small amount of radioactive substance into the body.

So Grogan and cardiology fellow Dr. Dirk Ver Steeg, UW Medical School clinical instructor, used a signal-averaged EKG to see if it could analyze the effects of exercise and determine which people have coronary artery disease.

Grogan and Ver Steeg are also studying SAEs in healthy people during exercise and in patients whose heart arteries are blocked during balloon angioplasty.

They will present these findings in May at the annual meeting of the North American Society of Pacing and Electrophysiology in San Diego.

Dr. Grogan is the son of Dr. and Mrs. E. Wayne Grogan of Rockville, Maryland and the grandson of Vera Grogan of Bogata.

nary artery disease. Forty-seven patients with chest pain were studied. It was the first time the method had been applied to examining the heart during exercise to detect coronary artery disease.

With the signal-averaging method, or SAE, many heartbeats recorded over a one-minute period are averaged to obtain a highly accurate reading. The data are then transformed into numbers for storage and analysis in a computer.

"The SAE allows us to make very precise numerical measurements of the heart's electrical activity as it works, instead of the more subjective visual interpretation required on a regular EKG," said Ver Steeg, who described the Wisconsin study March 19 at the annual meeting of the American College of Cardiology in New Orleans. SAEs also reduce the amount of interference produced by electrical activity in the lungs and muscles, and screen out other signals not necessary for analyzing coronary artery disease.

Grogan and Ver Steeg are also studying SAEs in healthy people during exercise and in patients whose heart arteries are blocked during balloon angioplasty.

They will present these findings in May at the annual meeting of the North American Society of Pacing and Electrophysiology in San Diego.

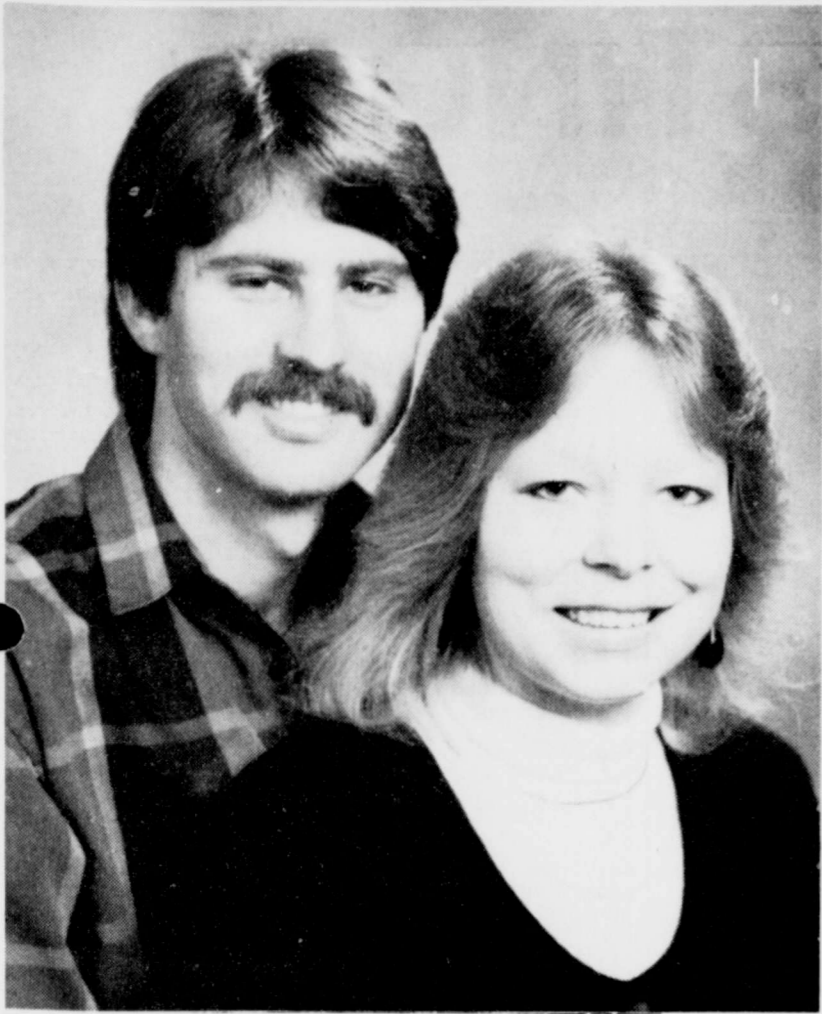



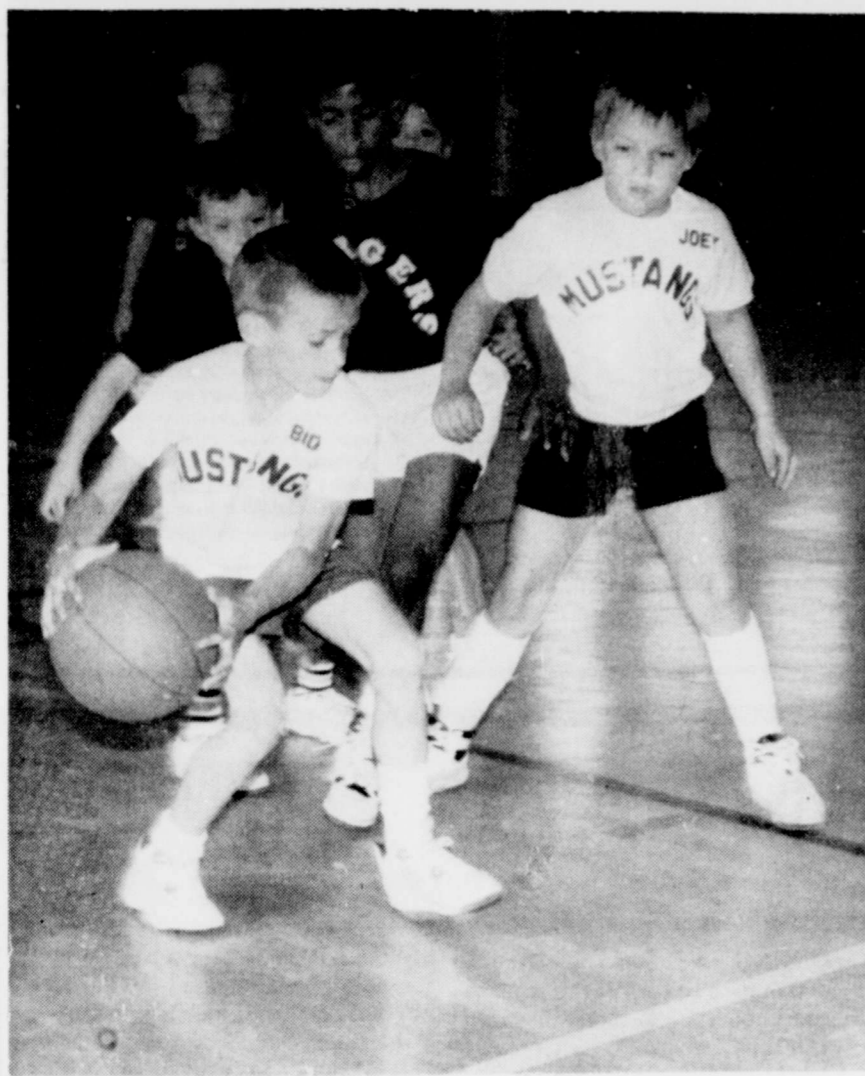
