Of course, to be in state competition at all self-discipline was necessary, so there really wasn't too much of that.

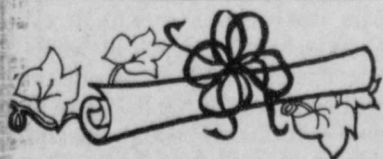
The whole afternoon was spent not only enjoying the skills and gracefulness of these kids, it was spent making observations about their life styles and training.

This week, Country Cooking is coming from the kitchen of Buster and Louise Crossland of Pattonville.

Louise's career for the past four years has been babysitting with Drew, 4, Leah, 2, Casey, 2 and Brandon, 3. Do I need to add that Louise is a very busy lady?

She enjoys cooking, collecting cookbooks, sewing and canning vegetables and fruits. She doesn't really like to cook fancy foods, just plain simple recipes. She says she can't begin to count the number of recipes she has. She also enjoys sewing for herself and her granddaughter. Louise says that Buster does all the gardening and both of them do the canning. They have already prepared several jars of beets and English peas. She says they will be very busy for the next few weeks because once the canning begins, it's a constant chore. She loves to share her fruits and vegetables with friends and family. Louise wanted to share this recipe for sweetened milk so you can make your own "eagle brand milk". She found it in a farm magazine she got through the mail several years ago. She says it's very easy to make and once you get it blended it is ready to use.

The hominy casserole recipe came from a homemaking class her daughter was in during high school. The Goody Bars came from her sister-in-law in Windom. The Millionaire Pie recipe came from their son, Willie. Louise says this recipe is different from other Millionaire Pies she has seen, so pay close attention to it.

Louise states that Buster can really make good fudge and does a much better job of it than she. If you would like his recipe for fudge, maybe he would share it with you if you call him.

Goody Bars

1 box yellow butter cake mix
1 stick oleo (room temperature)
1 egg
1/2 cup nuts
Mix together and press in pan.
Second layer:
1 box powdered sugar
2 eggs
1-8 oz. cream cheese (room temperature)
1 t. vanilla
Mix together, pour on top of first layer. Bake 40 minutes at 325.

Millionaire Pie

1-8 oz. cream cheese
1 cup powdered sugar
1 t. vanilla
Mix together and put in a graham cracker crust.
Second layer:
1 pkg. Dream Whip
1 small can pineapple
1/4 cup powdered sugar
ground pecans on top
Mix and put on first layer. Sprinkle with pecans, refrigerate.

Hominy Casserole

1/4 lb. Velveeta cheese
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can Rotel tomatoes with hot peppers
2 cans hominy (drained)
crushed fritos
Melt cheese with soup, pour in Rotel tomatoes, mix with hominy. Bake in casserole dish, put fritos on top, bake at 350 until brown.

Macaroni & Beef

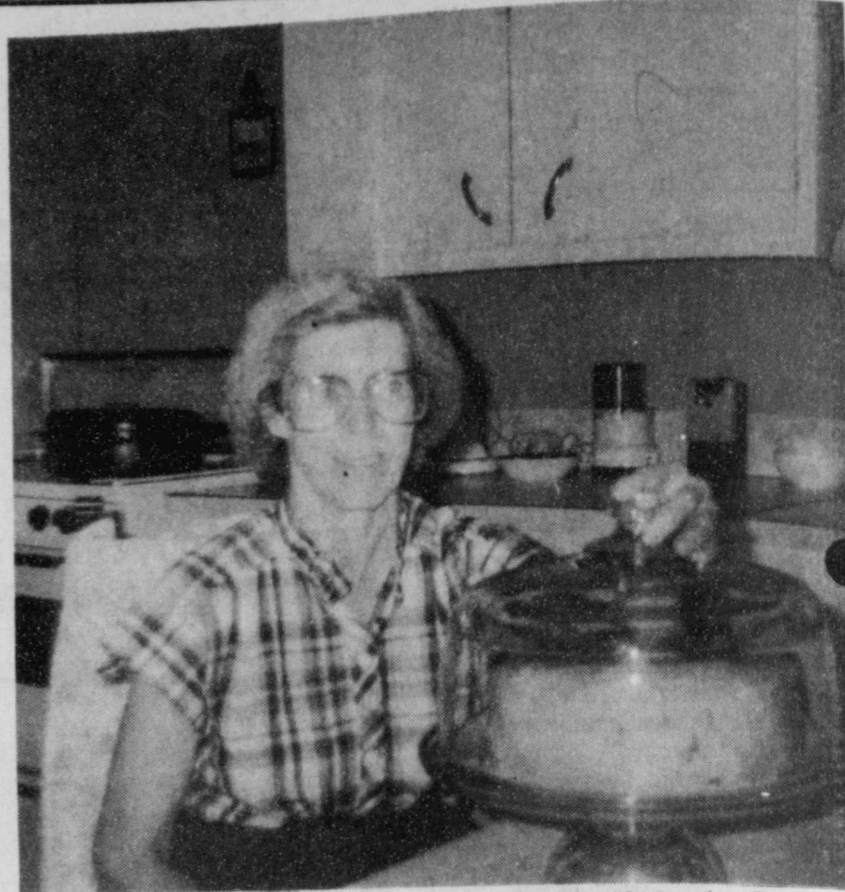
1/2 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup uncooked macaroni
1/4 cup chopped onions
1/4 cup chopped sweet peppers
1/2 t. garlic powder
3/4 t. salt
1/8 t. pepper
1 t. Worcestershire sauce
1 can tomatoes
Brown meat, onion and green sweet peppers. Add seasonings, add tomatoes and macaroni. Bring to a boil. Cover and simmer 20 minutes.

Sweetened Condensed Milk

1 cup dry milk powder
2/3 cup sugar
1/3 cup boiling water
3 T. melted oleo
Combine ingredients in container of electric blender. Process until smooth. Store in refrigerator until ready to use. Makes 1 1/4 cups.

Strawberry Jello Cake

1 pkg. White cake mix
1 pkg. strawberry jello (3 oz. size)
1/2 cup cold water
1 cup oil
3/4 cup mashed strawberries
2 eggs
Mix all ingredients together. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes or until done. Cool. Icing:
1 box powdered sugar
1/2 stick oleo
1 tsp. vanilla
Mix sugar, oleo and vanilla together; add enough strawberries to moisten. Have icing stiff. Spread on cooled cake.

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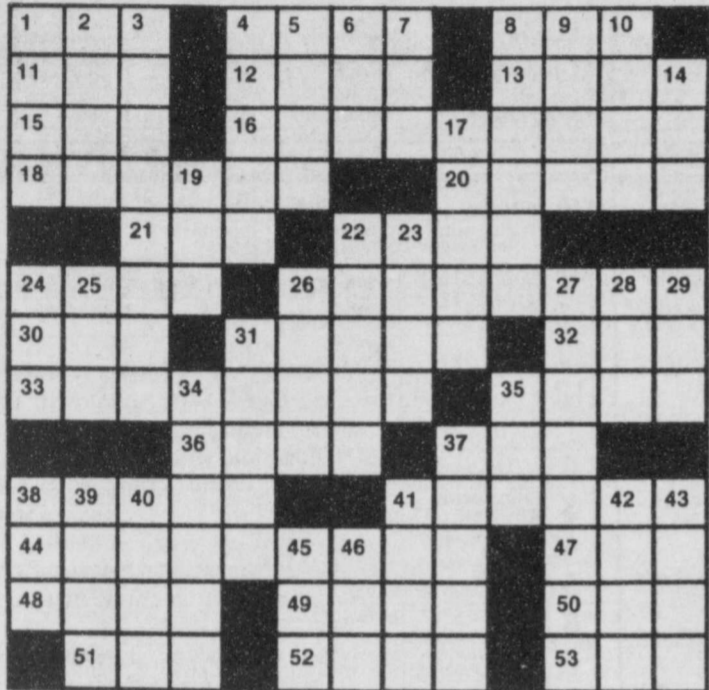

New Home Loan Program Announced By FmHA

The Farmers Home Administration has implemented a new program to assist rural residents to become successful home owners. In addition to its direct housing loan program, the federal agency is now authorized to guarantee commercial loans to purchase single-family housing. "This expands our ability to provide financing for homes in rural areas," notes FmHA State Director Sox Johnson. Under the new program, FmHA guarantees a loan made by a qualified lender against a percentage of possible loss. Loans may be made by any lender, including state housing agencies, which is approved as a mortgagee for federal housing mortgage insurance. Additionally, lenders approved by FmHA, the Federal National Mortgage Association or the Farm Credit System may qualify for the program. FmHA is authorized to guarantee up to \$100 million in loans for single-family homes during the current fiscal year. This assistance is available for new or existing rural housing, located on individual tracts or in subdivisions, according to the State Director. Many rural residents eligible for direct FmHA loan assistance may also qualify for the guaranteed loan program. Applicants with low to moderate income may be eligible for loan guarantees, and low income applicants may qualify for the agency's interest assistance program, which brings down the cost of the monthly payment. Applicants must be without safe, decent and sanitary housing and unable to obtain a loan without the FmHA guarantees at rates and terms they can reasonably be expected to pay. "Loans may be guaranteed for up to 100 percent of the cost of acquiring the house," said the State Director, who added that these are 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages. Individuals interested in the new guaranteed loan program should contact their commercial lenders of the local Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor.

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Northern Italy A Fabulous Place

Editor's Note: For those interested in hearing about a trip to Switzerland, here's your chance. If you aren't, feel free to read something else...this article is definitely for those with travel in their hearts!

Last week I recounted climbing through the mountains of Switzerland and waking in snowfall. Then we continued our climb until we crested the Julier Pass and began the tortuous descent, going down nearly 6,000 feet. Soon after our descent into the Engadin Valley changes in the terrain and type of village began to be noticeable.

Instead of the towering cedars, firs and other mountain trees we began to see the occasional palm tree. Roofs became flatter, houses closer together.

As we pulled up to the Italian border our guide told us it was illegal to photograph any military installation in Italy, including the border crossing, and to put away our cameras or risk having our film confiscated!

The Italian police came on board to check each and every passport then waved us through.

Soon there were vineyards and olive groves and little villages...and crazy drivers.

The Italians (and indeed, most Europeans) live by the horn. They beep beep before passing, they beep beep on curves, they beep beep when they are aggravated, and they beep beep when they are feeling friendly!

Our driver would honk before going down a narrow, blind street. If no one honked back then he would proceed.

The streets were like something from another age, so narrow we often gasped as window sills, walls and balconies went by literally only two or three inches away from the bus windows.

Occasionally we would meet a car and if the alley was too narrow, Renzo, being the largest vehicle on the road, would force it to back up so that we could come on through!

After one particularly harrowing navigation feat, in which the corner was so sharp and narrow that he had to back the bus up twice before it could be made, Renzo received an ovation from his bus load of tourists!

Lesley told us that Monday was wash day in Italy...and was she ever right.

On virtually every balcony, window sill or fence, washing hung. In some of the villages women could be seen at the public wash trough, scrub-

bing clothes. Pristine white villas studded the terraced hillsides, and stooped over figures wended their way down rows of grape vines, trimming, tying up and preparing the vineyards for the upcoming season.

We stopped at a tiny village for ice cream or coffee (which was as bad in Italy as it is in Switzerland). Several of us wandered through the ancient, narrow stone streets, and discovered a small, beautiful church. Inside were glorious gilded carvings of trumpet sounding angels and a beautiful altar. As in most Catholic churches, people came and went unselfconsciously, saying their prayers, lighting candles and then going their way.

A handsome, ancient fountain splashed in a tiny town square, and a young man in a truck planted geraniums at every crossroads.

After our refreshing walk we boarded the bus again and headed through the town of Donga. Up in the mountains surrounding the town the infamous Mussolini was captured and taken to Milano where the partisans hung him during World War II.

We wove in and out of tiny mountainous roads until we were back in Switzerland to spend the night in Lugano.

Lugano is on one edge of a huge lake, while Italy claims the other side.

The entire region, although Swiss, speaks Italian, thinks Italian and looks Italian.

Our hotel room boasted a wrought iron veranda that overlooked the lush palms and olive trees and the lake.

Soon after arrival we wandered down hill to take a look at the town.

Quickly lost in the narrow twisting thoroughfares, we asked an elderly man how to find the cathedral. He spoke no English, and my Italian is pretty basic too. We couldn't find out which way to go until I tried imitating a person praying...then his face lit up and he enthusiastically pointed us in the right direction.

Imagine our surprise when Richard, Helen, Thomas and I rounded the corner and found ourselves not more than a 100 yards from the cathedral we had been looking for.

Inside the huge building were murals and carvings to take the breath away.

A beautiful stained glass window shed ambient, liquid colors onto the ancient stones.

Boats plied the waters of Lake Lugano, and sidewalk cafes sported a host of people enjoying the sunshine

and sipping on some sort of liquid be it the dreadful coffee, beer or wine..

We made a quick stop by a bank, and I practised my "thank you" in Italian. "Grazi" I responded to their help.

We walked for miles up and down steep stairways and the tiny streets. Beautiful fresh flower stalls, filled with hydrangeas, miniature roses and daisies, filled the air with perfumes.

Fruit and vegetables stands offered glorious fresh produce, arranged in patterns and colors that were more works of art than anything else.

Tiny fountains interspersed the stalls.

The four of us stood in the window of a seafood shop and marvelled at the selection of caviar, shrimp, salmon and other goodies.

Pastry shops were pawns of praise to taste buds, and salami and cheeses hung like a collection of strange creatures from the rafters of stalls.

Wine shops showed the end results of all those vineyards, their colors imitating that of the stained glass windows in the churches.

Fresh poultry (feet still attached) hung in shop windows, and meats of every variety were marked with their prices.

A sidewalk cafe provided a meal of canilonni and torteloni for us all and a rain shower made us linger at the meal.

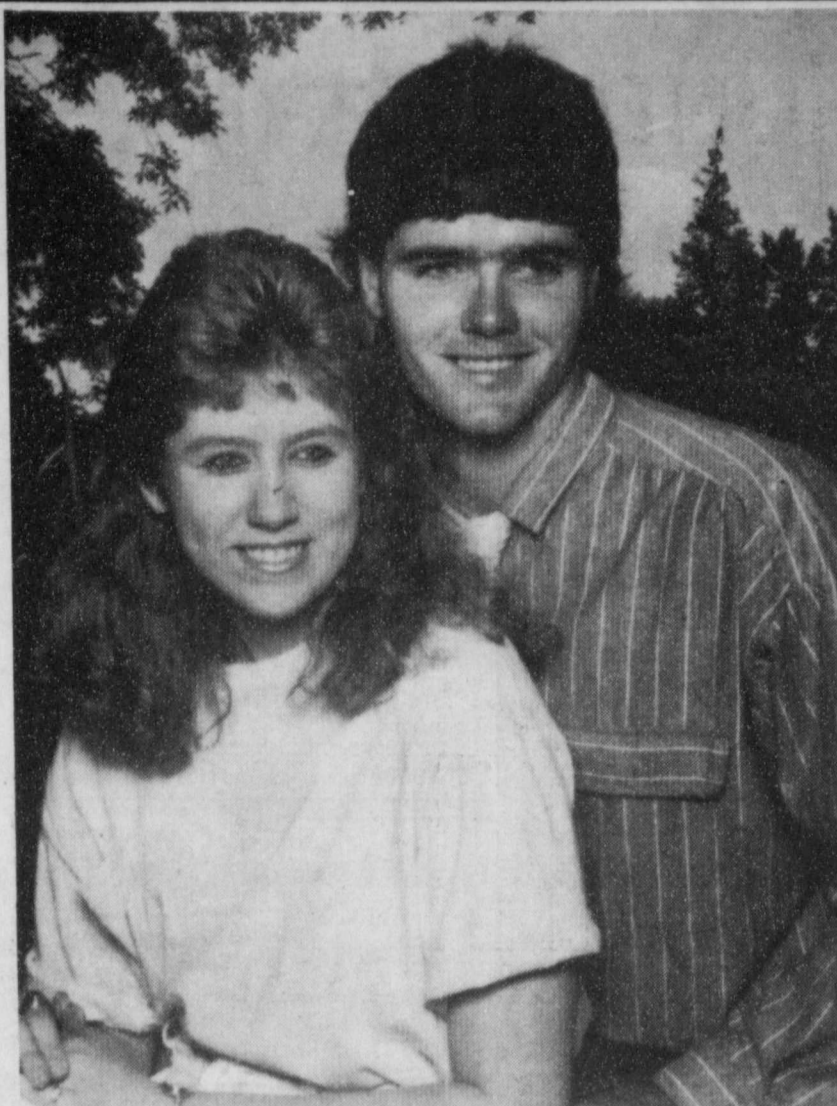
We found out that in Italy pastas are never served as a main course! An Italian meal will begin with olives and salami slices, then a spaghetti or pasta dish with sauce, then the main course of meat and vegetables. Only in other countries is pasta the main course.

After buying hand embroidered book marks (thank heavens I remembered that bibliotecca means book in Italian) we took a little funicular rail car to the top of the hill and went back to the hotel.

Imagine our joy at discovering our suitcases had finally arrived!

Helen stayed behind while the rest of our quartet went on to the huge park nearby. Pathways wandered through acres of magnificent magnolias and olive trees, carefully tended rose gardens and flower beds. At the back a playground was covered with children, running and swinging, climbing and generally being indulged by their pretty young mothers.

Rain finally drove us back, and we sat on the balcony watching it snow on the mountains high above us while the rain fell below.

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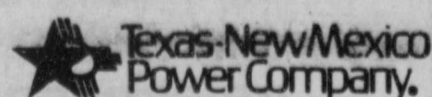

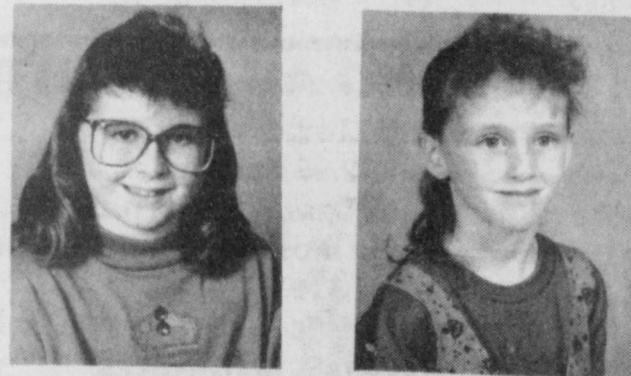

Rayburn Scholars are selected by their high schools on the basis of academic achievement and leadership ability.




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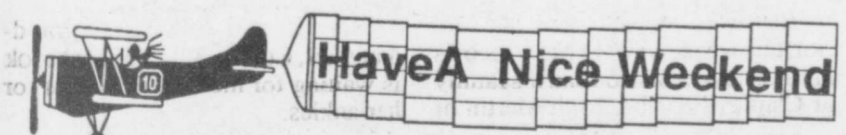

According to a survey made by Burke Marketing Research, entitled "Recall of Last Television Commercial, 1965-1990" the figures on those viewers who can remember the last commercial are declining severely.

According to the survey there is less personal involvement in TV today.

Among those called while a commercial pod was being aired, 7.2 per cent recalled the last commercial. Those reached with 60 seconds after

the commercial only 4.5 percent recalled the last ad. After 60 seconds on 2.8 percent could remember. This is down from 18 percent in 1965.

The survey cites the viewer options, including the fact that an average home receives more than 30 channels, including 24 hour news, sports, movie, comedy and music stations.
