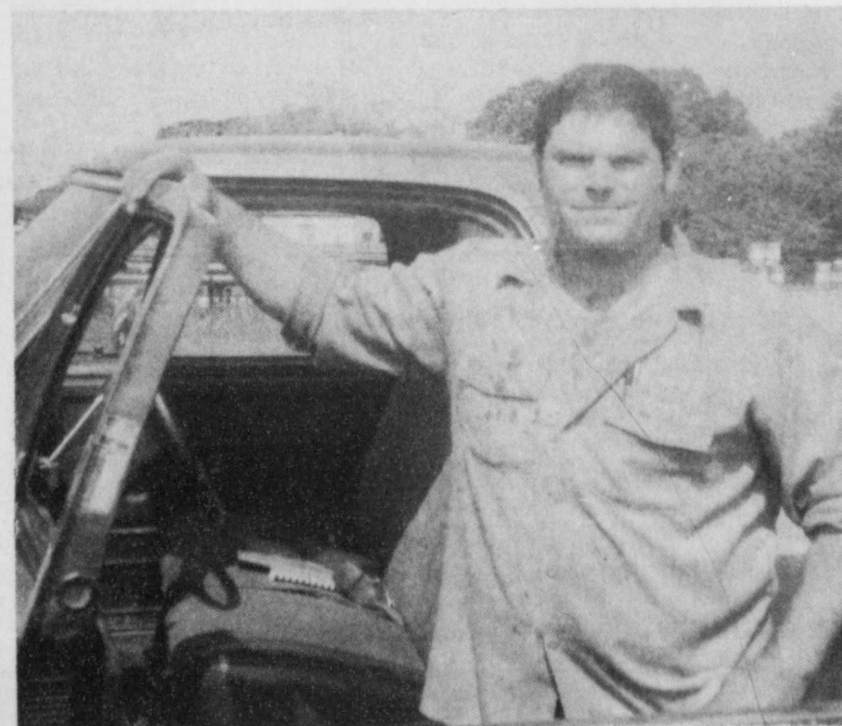
One of Talco's most familiar faces is that of Randy Carroll, especially in an emergency situation.

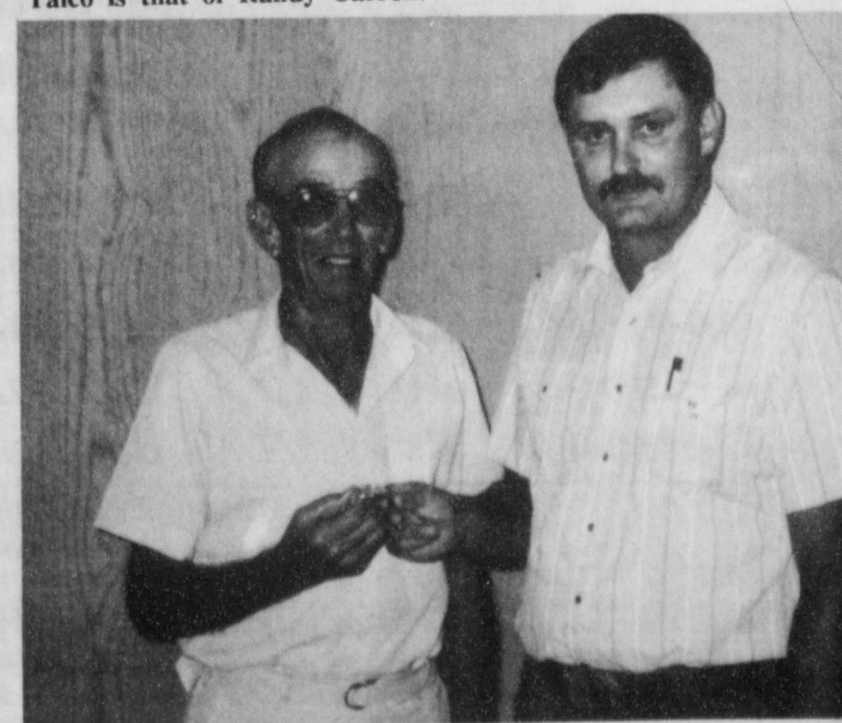
Randy is a graduate of Rivercrest High School and is employed by the City of Talco as Water Superintendent. He and his family attend the First Baptist Church.

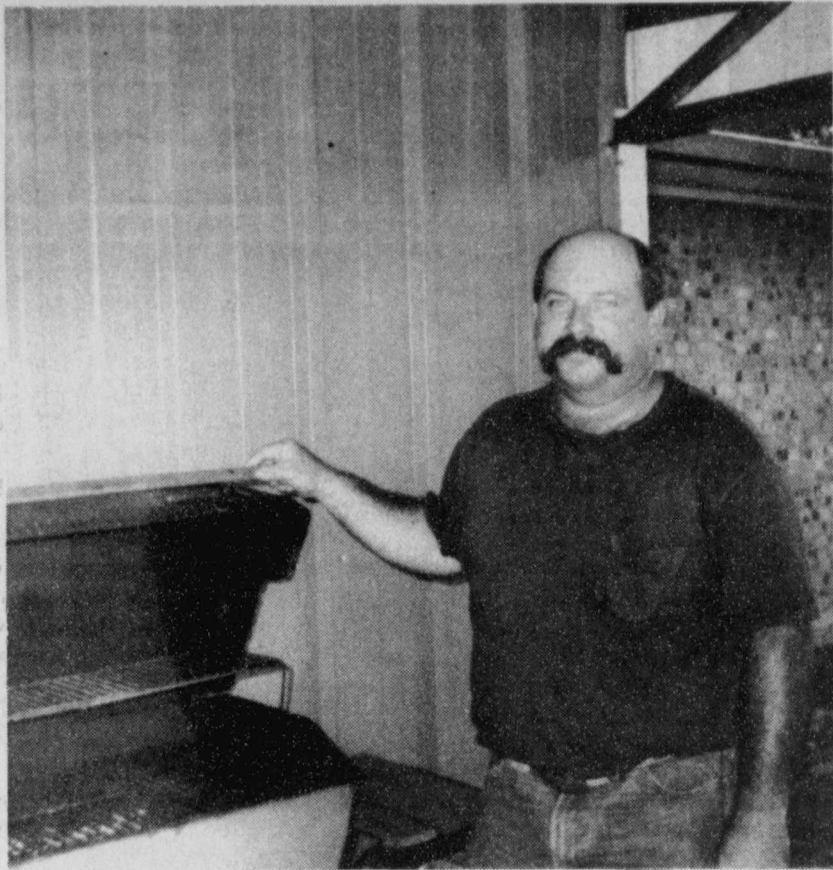
Retired Talco Water Superintendent Marvin Owings, With Mayor Mike Sloan

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SHARING recipes and grilling tips in this week's Country

Country Cooking

The Country Cooking column is coming to you this week from the backyard of Donny Darden. Donny and his wife, Dawne, have one son, David J., age 10. They have lived in the Deport area for about 12 years and attend the First United Methodist Church in Deport.

Several of Donny's hobbies include deer hunting, watching football on TV and cooking.

Donny's deer hunting habit consists of seasonal every weekend events on local territory. He is the only one who likes deer meat in his family so when he gets one, he keeps only a few pieces and gives the remainder away.

His football watching consists of the Dallas Cowboys and Prairiland Patriots. He doesn't get to see all the games of either team, but does keep up with how both are progressing.

Donny's cooking began a few years ago when his job depended more on the weather, and he had several days during the winter where he would get bored with TV and go into the kitchen to see what he could cook up. Years ago, he says, he could manage to put a sandwich together, but his mom kept insisting he and his brothers learn more about cooking. He started practicing and he's managed to do quite well. Two main dishes Donny enjoys mixing up are okra gumbo and stew. He really has no recipe for these dishes, he just adds and tastes.

Donny is sharing some tips this week on grilling foods and some recipes he and his family enjoy.

If using either a gas or a regular grill, make sure your coals are as hot as you can get them. Wait until all briquettes are white in color, then wait a little longer until the coals start cooling back down, then put your meat on and cook it very, very slowly. The longer you cook the meat, the more smoke flavor it will have. Of course, there is a point to start overcooking and your meat gets tough and learning this comes with practice.

If the wind is blowing, this causes meat to cook faster than normal so you have to really watch. When Donny finishes cooking the meat, he turns the burners on high for several minutes and burns the grates until all particles are burned to a crisp. Turn off and let cool completely, then take a wire brush and clean the grates.

Donny does his grill cooking on Sunday afternoons. In one cooking, he cooks Polish sausages, hamburgers, pork chops, steaks, chicken breasts and fajita meat. When all meat is cooked, he stores it in the microwave until thoroughly cooled. Then he puts them in freezer bags or foil and freezes them. The meat will last about a month in the freezer and still have a smoked flavor. It will also last for 3 or 4 days in a covered dish in the refrigerator and keep its flavor. Just thaw and heat in the microwave what you want to eat and you have it!

Donny likes to marinate foods before he cooks it. The oil free Italian dressing is a good marinade for grill cooking. Chicken breasts or chicken strips is very good using this recipe. You need to marinate at least 3 hours and then since chicken dries out so quickly, you need to spread occasionally while cooking. Donny has used this recipe about 3 years. The barbecue sauce was a main recipe they came across but have made several changes with it. He is still working on improvements.

The Donny's Biscuit recipe is one he takes a lot to church suppers and youth breakfasts and everyone enjoys them. Donny says it takes about 15 minutes to make these biscuits, add sausage and eggs and you have a great supper.

I've also included a carrot cake and creme cheese icing recipe for diabetics and cholesterol watchers.

Oil Free Italian Dressing As Marinade
 Marinate meat and vegetables for several hours in dressing, then use it as a basting sauce while grilling.
 This is good on boneless chicken breasts for sandwiches or on shish kabobs. For shish ka-bobs, use lean cubes of pork, beef or chicken with onion, bell pepper, cherry tomatoes and pineapple.

Barbeque Sauce
 Heat:
 16 oz. jellied cranberry sauce
 Stir until smooth.
 Add:
 12 oz. chili sauce
 1/2 cup grated onion
 1/4 cup honey
 1 teaspoon garlic powder
 This may be used on beef, chicken or pork. Baste often during grilling.

Carrot Cake
 By Nell Wolf
 Bake at 425 for 20 minutes.
 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
 1/4 cup whole wheat flour
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup vegetable oil
 6 tablespoons sugar
 2 eggs
 1/4 cup unsweetened pineapple juice concentrate
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 cup shredded carrots
 1/2 cup golden raisins
 1/2 cup unsweetened crushed pineapple, drained.
 Preheat oven to 350. Grease and flour 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. In a bowl, toss flours, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, ginger and salt. In a second bowl, stir oil, sugar, eggs, pineapple juice and vanilla. Stir liquid into dry ingredients until smooth. Stir in carrots, raisins and pineapple. Bake for 35-40 minutes. Cool in pan on a rack for 1 hour. Per serving: 142 calories, 19 gm. carbohydrates, 2 gm. protein, 7 gm. fat, 78 mg. sodium. Cholesterol: 30 mg. per serving.

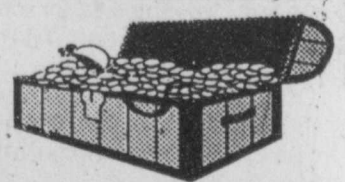
burial in Mt. Olive Cemetery.

Mr. Ham was born January 7, 1913 in East Post Oak, a son of Olen Ham and Ivy Skidmore Ham. He attended Linden schools and married Dollie Mae Pearce on October 3, 1932. He died November 24, 1988. He was a member of the Mt. Olive Baptist Church and was a deacon there. He was a member of Blossom Masonic Lodge No. 303, AF&AM and was its past Master. He worked for Babcock and Wilcox from 1953 until 1975 and had lived in the Linden community since 1966.

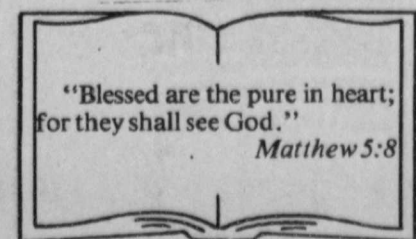

In our story last week we left Lugano for Italy once more. We headed for beautiful Lake Maggiore, where we were to take a ferry boat across the lake.

The Italian lake district is breathtaking, with snow capped mountains towering above crystal clear lakes. Along the shores of those lakes yachts and colorful sailboats were tucked into their harbors, while expensive and exclusive villas sprawled along the waterfront, surrounded by privacy walls and grottos.

One of the most unusual sights we saw were cars that were enclosed in locked heavy wire cages. We found out that there was no place to park them on the steep slope the villas were on, and isolated from the houses people had taken to stealing the radios and wheel covers from them. So, the resourceful homeowners simply drove them into these cages and locked them up!

We passed a huge stone works, in which the mountains yielded up their stony hearts to be made into roof slates, benches, huge columns, and decorative building stone smoothed to mirror finish.

In Laverio we shopped at an open air market that offered everything from tiny kittens to fresh fruits and vegetables, with fine leather work and beautiful embroidered clothing in between.

Fingering a bolt of exquisite embroidered cloth I told the woman at her stand that it was "bella".

"Si" she smiled "bella" she then rattled off an Italian sentence that I picked enough pieces of to know meant that it was very pretty, but not expensive, did I want some?

I told her no, and strolled on. Thomas, walking beside me swore that the two of us had discussed how ugly HE was!

We all climbed on to the big ferry, and the bus drove on behind us.

Lesley made the statement that although there was a toilet on board it was definitely "unisex" and that the plumbing hadn't changed much since Roman times.

The only way to get to Zernatt is by taking a train up. There are no cars in the town, no pollution, very little noise. Little electric cars provide some services to those that can't climb the steep streets.

When we disembarked from the train in Zernatt our group toiled uphill over steep, cobbled streets. Some of the older members of the tour took the electric cars that took the luggage up to our hotel.

The hotel was new, and located up the side of a mountain. While not the most convenient to the center of town it certainly made up for it with the view.

When we stepped into our room the picture windows and balcony provided a full, striking view of the majestic Matterhorn, surrounded by other massive peaks!

We promptly took the steep road right back down to town, wandering through the narrow streets.

In the very center of this thriving ski community is a collection of ancient log buildings.

These hundreds of years old farm houses and barns are still used. Early risers in Zernatt can see the men with big baskets on their backs herding sheep, or the distinctive black and white goats up into the mountain meadows.

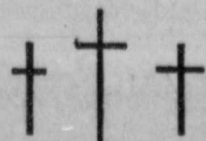

Drive Safely Over The Holiday

As many as 12 persons may be killed on Texas roadways during the 30-hour July 4 period, according to Department of Public Safety estimates.

DPS director Colonel Joe Milner said the summer vacation traveling holiday times will challenge motorists to avoid driving risks.

During July 4 last year, the DPS tabulated 15 deaths. Deaths due to critical injuries raised last year's final count to 19. This year's counting period begins at 6 p.m. Wednesday,

July 3 and continues to midnight, July 4.

In 1990, 89% of fatalities during July 4 occurred in accidents where speeding over the limits or driving while intoxicated was a factor in this state.

Of the 19 traffic deaths, 13 were persons in vehicles where seat belts could have been used.

Milner said additional troopers will be working in areas where high volumes of traffic could be anticipated.

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Herb Brevard
Gardeners can extend the productive life of spring vegetables with proper care and selection.
"Healthy plants are the first re-

quirement for extending production," said Marty Baker, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Tomatoes, peppers, okra, eggplants and some vining squash will produce into the fall if properly cared for."

Another important practice is keeping the soil moisture at the correct level. Most vegetables in East Texas need about two inches of water per week if properly mulched and weeded. Baker suggests not watering well established plants with sprinklers.

During the hot summer months, plants can be covered with muslin cloth to help protect them from the sun. It is particularly easy to shade plants being grown in cages.

Baker says to follow good insect and disease control procedures throughout the growing season. Mites and grasshoppers can be serious during mid-summer.

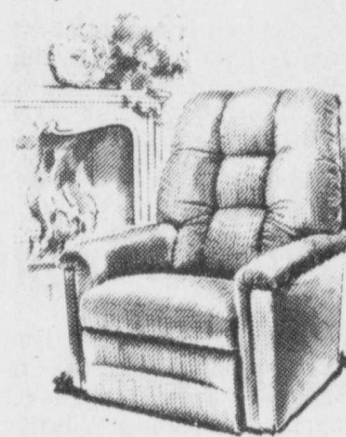
Most vegetables need very little, if any, fertilizer during the summer. Cut dead plant material out of tomatoes and peppers to stimulate new growth.

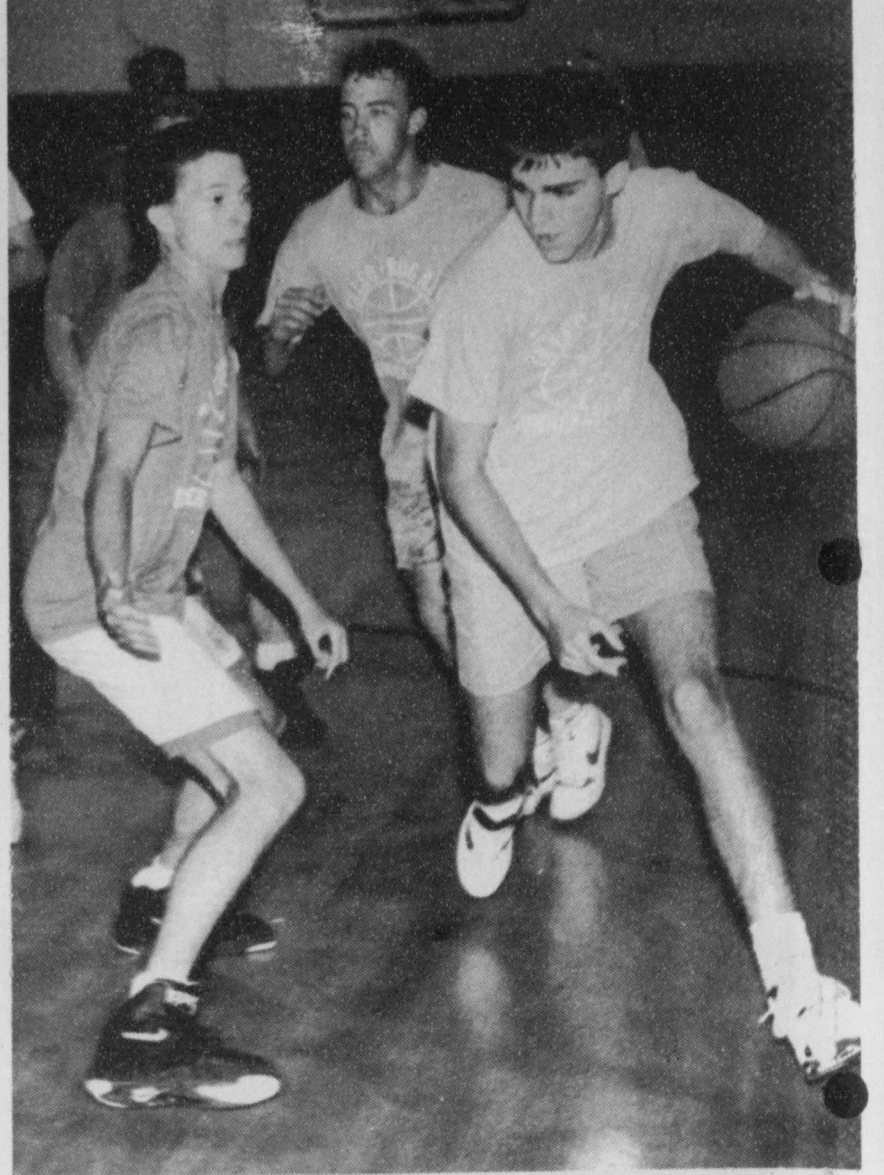


THE CLASS of 1941 was honored at the Talco Homecoming with a specially prepared table.

Agricultural Briefs

By Paul D. Payne

Have you ever spent a hot day cutting sprouts and brush to have it regrow the following year? That is exasperation. There must be a better way, right?

For spot treating small brush in pastures and fence rows, there is a new, do it yourself, method that works about any time of year without affecting nearby plants. It is called low volume basal bark treatment.

This method is effective on smooth barked brush plants up to about six inches in diameter. To control these plants a mixture of 20 to 30 percent Grazon ET herbicide and diesel fuel is sprayed directly on the lower 15 to 20 inches of trunk. Just enough mix is applied to thoroughly wet the bark but not to the point of runoff. You can use a low pressure, hand sprayer to apply the solution.

The plant absorbs the solution through the bark and moves it to the roots to kill the entire plant. To control multi-stemmed plants for example, brush that has grown back after shredding, spray the base of each stem.

One of the good points of this method is only the targeted plant is treated. There is virtually no danger of the herbicide moving via drift or runoff, and the method can be used any time of the year. However, best

results can be expected when treating anytime from May through September.

Demonstration work in Eastern Oklahoma and Texas has shown a solution of 20% Grazon ET and diesel controlled post oak, blackjack oak, honey locust, bois d'arc, wild plum, Eastern persimmon, prickly ash, hackberry, greenbriar, winged elm and Texas persimmon.

For brush plants larger than six inches in diameter, consider herbicides that are applied to the foliage or to the soil. These methods may be as effective as low volume basal, but less flexible in timing and application.

Cedars are showing up more and more on pastureland. In many part sof the county fence rows are growing up with cedars and they can also be seen in fields that are not being grazed heavily.

Cedar trees can be controlled by using picloram herbicide. Grazon PC is the common herbicide available locally that contains picloram. It may be applied undiluted to the soil under the plant. Four ml per 3 feet height applied in late winter to early sprg is suggested. The material can be mixed with diesel and water and applied to the foliage and stems.
