This week the Country Cooking Column is being shared from the kitchen of Billie and Don Nolan of the McCrury-Talco area. They have been married for 44 years and have lived in this community since 1974.

Billie and Don have one son: Donald and his wife, Janie and they have two children, Marvin, age 20 and Cassie, age 16. They live in **Smithville**

Some of the hobbies Billie enjoys are oil painting, crafts, quilting, helping retired husband with taking care of the cattle, and such chores as fencing, etc. Billie spends a larg eportion of every day helping her mother in the nursing home.

Both Billie and Don share the cooking. Since most of the time, the cooking is for only two people, the cooking is very simple. Don does all the grilling of foods and Billie's specialties are cakes and ice cream. Billie shared that she never did any cooking as a youngster at home, so she had to learn everything after she

Billie has been painting with oils about four years. She enjoys painting landscapes most of all. She likes to find old pictures of sentimental value to paint. She also enjoys spending hours just looking at antiques.

Another hobby Billie really gets into is quilting. She shared that her mom always quilted while she was growing up and it just grew on her. A friend, Jackie Lewis, really helped her a lot before she passed away.

Billie and Don enjoy playing dominoes, cards and really enjoy the community homecoming held each year in October. They enjoy opening their home up to their friends on the weekends and enjoy their visits and fellowship.

You can also crush six Butterfinger bars or melt six Milky Ways and add to it. A good tip for homemade ice cream is to place Saran Wrap on top befor eyou put the lid on so ice crystals do not form. Billie keeps a lot of fresh fruits frozen to use with recipes such as

Billie thinks the Jam Cake is the best cake she has ever tasted. It has a lot of ingredients but is well worth it. It stays moist a long time and the longer it sits, the better it gets. This is a substitute for fruit cake and is especially good during the winter month holidays. She has used this recipe since 1977.

Ice Cream

6 eggs 1 1/2 cups sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt l pint cream l pint half & half

Beateggs until very thick and golden. Add sugar and salt and beat again to thickened state. Add cream and beat. Add half & half and beat. Pour into freezer and fill to 3/4 full with milk.

Extra beating makes the mixture creamier and is the secret of this recipe. Do not cut down on teh eggs. You may also put in fruit of your choice. Makes 1

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened

3 eggs 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves 1/2 teaspoon ground all spice

1 teaspoon soda 2/3 cup buttermilk 1 cup strawberry or blackberry jam or

1 cup pineapple preserves
1 cup chopped dates
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup all purpose flour
Cover raisins with boiling water; let

stand while preparing batter. When plump, drain and pat dry on paper towels. Cream sugar and butter until light and fluffy; add eggs one at a time, beat-ing well after each addition. Combine 1 1/2 cups flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Combine soda and buttermilk.

5 eggs 3 cups all purpose flour 1/4 teaspoon soda 1/4 teaspoon salt

l carton (8 oz.) sour cream cup fresh coconut, or frozen thawed teaspoon vanilla teaspoon coconut extract

1/2 cup vegetable shortening 1 box (1 lb.) confectioners sugar 1/4 cup water 1/8 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream butter for the cake, gradually dding sugar, beat until mixture is light and fluffy. Add 1 egg at a time, beating well after each addition. In separate bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt, mix well. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Stir in coconut and extracts. Pour batter in reased, floured 10" tube pan. Bake at 350 for 1 hour and twenty minutes or until a wooden pick comes out clean. Cool in pan 10-15 minutes, remove form pan andcool completely before icing or cutting. To make icing, com-bine all ingredients in large bowl of electric mixer. Mix on high until fluffy
