Two Down, Remainder Up In Sales Tax Figures

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent checks totaling \$151 million to 1,167 Texas cities and counties that collect local sales taxes, with the state's top six recipients showing an average increase of 5.2 percent over last year's total rebates at this time.

"Even though some areas in Texas show only a slight increase, while others' rebates are down, overall the state's economy is strong and healthy," Sharp said.

In all, 1,062 Texas cities received \$136.6 million as their August rebates for 1991 total of \$841.6 million and an increase of 10% over last year's total rebates at this time.

Bogata received \$4,398.18 for its payment for a 13.91% increase. Clarksville received \$23,399.55 for a 4.36% increase and Detroit received \$1,766.28 for a 4.87% increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$134,057.30 for a 13.53% increase.

Talco received \$1,669.46 as its payment, for a 2.05% increase.

Blossom received \$2,775.85 for a 22.79% increase while Paris received \$2,026.40 for a .23% decrease.

Deport showed the only other decrease locally, with a payment of \$2,026.40 for a .90% decrease in total payments to date.

Houston received the largest check statewide, \$24 million.

Rivercrest-Talco-Bogata School Buildings To Be "Smoke Free"

Meeting in regular session Tuesday night, August 13, the Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees adopted a smoke free buildings policy. A copy of the policy appears elsewhere in this paper.

After touring the Bogata School campus, the Board held their meeting in the school cafeteria. In addition to the Board and Superintendent Freddy Wade, the three campus principals, Ray Miller, Jimmy Lee and Ben Tyler and Tax Collector Kay Ross were present.

A number of items were discussed and acted upon in the meeting with the major items being the smoke free policy, installment payments of delinquent tax, gasoline, bread, milk and ice cream bids and the hiring of teachers' aides at the Bogata campus. Some 16 or so other items were on the

lengthy agenda, but they primarily were preschool opening activities and

Smoke-Free Policy Adopted By Talco-Bogata

The following is a policy adopted by the Talco-Bogata CISD at their meeting held August 13, 1991.

The Talco-Bogata Consolidated I.S.D. recognizes the harmful effects of tobacco smoking and the secondary inhalation of tobacco smoke. To protect our students and employees with a smoke free environment, smoking of tobacco products within our school buildings is prohibited. This prohibition includes extra curricular activities held within any of our indoor facilities.

Approved August 13, 1991

minor changes in school calendar and policy handbooks.

The smoke free building policy was adopted abolishing absolutely any smoking by student, teacher, administrator or campus visitor inside any building on any of the three campuses. A designated smoking area outside the buildings will be available and the Board authorized strict enforcement of the policy. The policy shall be in effect during school hours as well as during extra curricular activities and basketball games.

Kay Ross, School Tax Collector, met with the Board inquiring direction in the form of policy for requests she has received concerning people wishing to pay their delinquent taxes in installments. It was the opinion of

the Board that justification and authorization for these privileges should

come from a tax legal authority and Superintendent Wade was instructed to seek such advice and report back to the Board. In the meantime Mrs. Ross was instructed to not accept any installment payments of delinquent taxes until further notice.

All bids for gasoline were rejected and Superintendent Wade was authorized to re-bid for gasoline when it is needed each time.

The bid for bakery products from Mrs. Bairds was accepted as was Oak Farms bid for milk and ice cream.

Two teachers aides were employed for the Bogata campus, they being Marilyn Garretson and Judy Couch.

The next regular board meeting is scheduled for September 10 at Rivercrest.

The strongest, deepest root of a successful school system starts with the superintendent. Like a captain of a ship the job requires someone with an overall vision of the operation as a whole. The captain of the Talco-Bogata CISD is Mr. Freddy Wade.

Amendment One Passes, Two Fails In Light Turnout

In light voter turnout on Saturday state voters narrowly approved the amendment which would clear the way for school property tax exemptions.

A second amendment that would have sold bonds to finance college student loans failed.

People came away confused, or else stayed away without voting because of the murky way the election was set up.

The confusion stemmed from lumping the homestead, elderly and disabled exemptions in with approval

of personal property taxes. After that amendment passed, voters on a county level seem to vote against the personal property tax.

Apparently, more people "figured out" how to vote and make it count if they were against a personal property tax and for the homestead, elderly and disabled exemptions.

That meant voting yes on the state ballot, where they were combined, and no on a county level.

Many people had to vote in two locations, which added to the confusion of the situation.

Two Injured In Collision

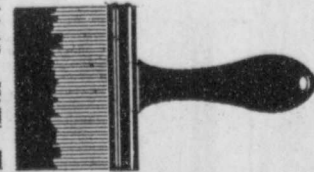
A two vehicle accident occurred Friday, August 9 about 6:30 p.m. on Hwy. 271 N. in Talco.

Maurine works part time as an Inservice Coordinator at Red River Haven Nursing Home. She has made this her career for the past five years of her 22 years at the home.

Hobbies of Maurine's are cooking, yard work, gardening, going on tours, playing 42 and entertaining, painting T-shirts, sewing, shopping for a collecting cookbooks and recipes.

Maurine's favorite food to prepare is desserts. She enjoys taking desserts to the sick, church activities anywhere needed. Seb doesn't like to cook at all, but he does run errands for her. She also enjoys making snack foods to serve her 42 guests.

Painting special scenes or flowers on T-shirts is another hobby Maurine enjoys. She gives these as gifts.

Bus tours to Palo Duro Canyon and Branson, MO are enjoyed by both Seb and Maurine. They make each trip every year.

Maurine has chosen a variety of food recipes to share with you this week and we hope you enjoy them.

Her Broccoli Casserole recipe originated from a friend, Marie Early, from Longview some two years ago. The Pepper Relish recipe came from her sister-in-law, Dorothy Henderson of Longview. The Pear Preserves came from a friend, Jettie Bond of

Bogata. She says this is the best pear preserves she's ever tasted.

While attending a luncheon at Longview about a year ago, Maurine tasted a piece of the Blackberry Cake and then asked for the recipe. She says it is delicious. The Vegetable Salad recipe was given to her by her neighbor, Brenda Gunter of Bogata. Brenda made the salad and shared it with Maurine and she certainly enjoys it.

I also want to share a cake recipe that I found during my travels this summer. I've made it twice and all my family loves it. Another reason I like it is because it's so easy. I have timed myself and can have the cake completely ready to eat in nine minutes, including cleaning the strawberries.

Take a 16 oz. carton of Cool Whip, add 2 tablespoons powdered sugar (this makes it thicker), add 1 pint of sliced strawberries. Mix well. Take a bought pound cake (I like the ones that are tall and in a bundt pan), take it out of the pan and cut it in half. Make two layers. Put half your Cool Whip mixture on the first layer, put on second layer and finish icing the cake. This is like a strawberry shortcake. I don't know a name for it, so I decided to call it the 9-minute cake. Keep in refrigerator. I hope you'll enjoy it. This cake is beautiful in a glass cake pan.

Broccoli Casserole

1 stick butter
1 pkg. chopped broccoli, thawed
1 can cream of Mushroom soup
1 cup cooked rice
1 cup chopped onions

Melt butter in skillet, add chopped onion, saute until clear. Add 1 pkg. broccoli and stir thoroughly. Add soup and stir well. Add cheese whiz and simmer a few minutes to melt cheese. Add 1 cup cooked rice. Place in casserole dish, either freeze or put in refrigerator until next day if desired. Bake 25-30 minutes at 350.

Pepper Relish

1 qt. chopped Jalapeno peppers
1 qt. chopped red and green bell peppers
1 qt. banana peppers, chopped
1 qt. chopped onions
1 qt. sugar
1 qt. vinegar
1 Tbs. salt

Mix, bring to a boil. Cook 5-10 minutes. Put in jars and seal. Makes 22 pts.

Pear Preserves

Mix 6 cups suga; 3 cups water; 1 cup white syrup. Bring to a boil. Add 1 gallon of peeled, sliced pears then simmer for two hours or more if desired. Put in jars and seal while hot.

Blackberry Cake

1 box Duncan Hines white cake mix
1 small box Blackberry jello (could use raspberry)
4 eggs
1/2 cup oil
1 cup Blackberry wine
1 cup chopped nuts

Grease and flour bundt pan. Put nuts on bottom. Pour batter over nuts. Bake at 350 until done.

Glaze:
3/4 cup powdered sugar
1/4 cup oleo
1/2 cup blackberry wine

Bring to boil and stir 2 minutes. Sugar melt and liquid barely thicken. Turn off heat and stir 2 more minutes. Pour part of glaze over cake and let set for 15 minutes. Turn cake out of pan and coat cake with rest of glaze. Cover and let set. Better the next day.

Vegetable Salad

1-16 oz. can corn, whole kernel
1-16 oz. can English peas, small peas
1-16 oz. can french style green beans
1 cup green onion, chopped (include tops)
1 cup celery chopped
1 small jar pimento

Sauce:
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper
1/2 cup white vinegar
1/2 cup Wesson oil
1 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. water

Mix vegetables in large bowl. Bring sauce to a boil, let cool and pour over vegetables. Refrigerate.

Add water to jello, let cool slightly. Stir in apricots, pineapple and pecans. Put into serving dish. Put pineapple and apricots in refrigerator for a while and it will congeal faster. Slice bananas over mixture, whip cream, add softened creamed cheese and extract, coconut and powdered sugar. Spread over mixture, sprinkle with coconut if desired.

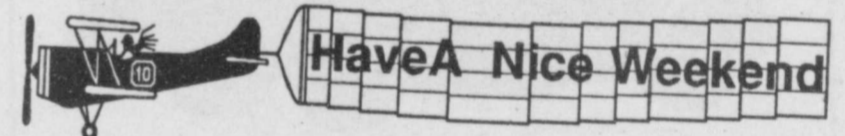

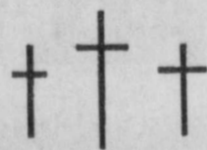

Talco-Bogata Schools Taking Applications For Lunch Program

The Talco-Bogata School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55¢ and high school students may buy breakfast for 65¢. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price. If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school.

If you are getting food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children

should get free or reduced price meals. You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You also may ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Freddy Wade, Box 130, Bogata, TX or by calling 632-5205.

If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because they get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

waking back up is encouragement enough. Let's support these coaches and players this year. Let's make this a Rebel Year.

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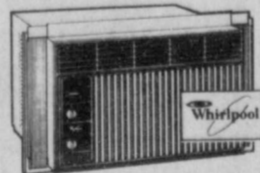
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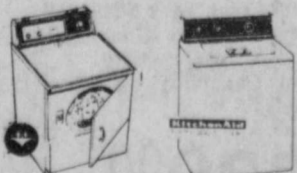
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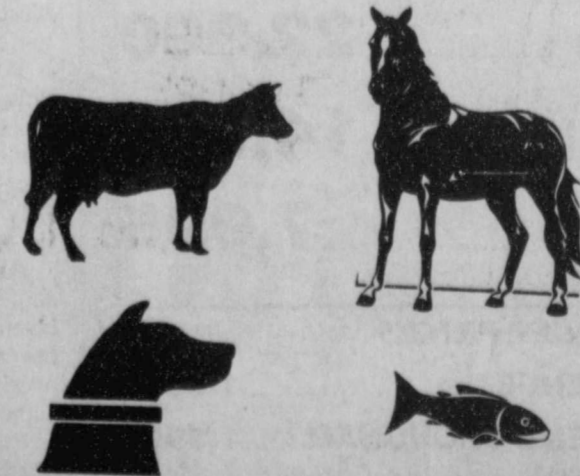
