



Smoke-Free Policy Adopted By Talco-Bogata

The following is a policy adopted by the Talco-Bogata CISD at their meeting held August 13, 1991.

The Talco-Bogata Consolidated I.S.D. recognizes the harmful effects of tobacco smoking and the secondary inhalation of tobacco smoke. To protect our students and employees with a smoke free environment, smoking of tobacco products within our school buildings is prohibited. This prohibition includes extra curricular activities held within any of our indoor facilities. Approved August 13, 1991

In Sales Tax Figures

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent checks totaling \$151 million to 1,167 Texas cities and counties that collect local sales taxes, with the state's top six recipients showing an average increase of 5.2 percent over last year's total rebates at this time.

"Even though some areas in Texas show only a slight increase, while others' rebates are down, overall the state's economy is strong and healthy," Sharp said.

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines. The clinic will be conducted at the

Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson St., Mt. Pleasant on August 21 from 8:30 to 11:30 and 1 to 3 p.m. Future clinics will be held on the first and third Wednesday, of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diptheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diptheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/ diptheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. 
The Country Cooking column is Bogata. She says this is the best pear preserves she's ever tasted.

The Vegetable Salad recipe was given to her by her neighbor, Brenda Gunter of Bogata. Brenda made the salad and shared it with Maruine and she certainly enjoys it.

I also want to share a cake recipe that I found during my travels this summer. I've made it twice and all my family loves it. Another reason I like it is because it's so easy. I have timed myself and can have the cake completely ready to eat in nine minutes, including cleaning the strawberries.

Take a 16 oz. carton of Cool Whip, add 2 tablespoons powdered sugar (this makes it thicker), add 1 pint of sliced strawberries. Mix well, Take a bought pound cake (I like the ones tht are tall and in a bundt pan), take it out of the pan and cut it in half. Make two layers. Put half your Cool Whip mixture on the first layer, put on second layer and finish icing the cake. This is like a strawberry shortcake. The Talco-Bogata School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55¢ and high school students may buy breakfast for 65¢. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price. If you now get food stamps or

AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school

If you are getting food stamps of AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time durng the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children
