Dr. James A. Henry Day Observed

James (Jimmy) Alvin Henry Day was observed at the First Baptist Church of Talco on Sunday, August 18. Bro. Henry graduated from Talco High School in May, 1952, and was a member of the First Baptist Church at that time. He preached in both morning and evening services and a plaque was presented in appreciation for his work in the BMA churches during the last 39 years. Special recognition was given to Bro. Henry and his family.

He was saved in May, 1945 at Farley Street Baptist Church in Waxahachie with L.H. Raney as pastor. He surrendered to the ministry on August 15, 1951 at the Latham Springs Baptist Encampment under Harold Brunson. He was licensed to preach in August, 1952 at the First Baptist Church of Talco with his dad, E.W. Henry as pastor. He preached his first sermon which lasted 12 minutes and he received a love offering of \$24.60. He was ordained to preach in January 1954 at Myrtle Springs Baptist Church where his dad was pastor.

After high school, Bro. Henry attended Jacksonville College and re-

ceived the A.A. degree in 1955, the Th. B. in 1956. He then attended Baylor University and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1958. He received the B.D. degree in 1964 and the Th.M. in 1967 from North American Theological Seminary. He attended Ouachita Baptist University and received the Master of Arts degree in 1966. He studied through the American Divinity School of Chicago and received the Th.D. degree in 1967. He furnished the manuscript for a text book for American Bible College and was awarded the Doctor of Literature Degree in 1968.

On April 9, 1954 he married Bennie L. Frye of Springhill, LA. They have four children, James Michael Henry of Melbourne, AR, Debra Ann Shelton of Magnolia, AR, Sherry Sue Hatcher of Grand Prairie and John Mark Henry of Milford.

He taught at the BMA Seminary from 1964 to 1966 and served as Columbia Bible School president and instructor from 1969 to 1979. He has served as vice-president BMA Texas, vice president and president of BMA of America, as a trustee of BMA Seminary and Central Baptist Col-

lege, chairman of Personnel Committee and Missionary Committee for BMA of America. He has written literature for the Junior High Training Service quarterly and the Sunday School lessons for Baptist Progress. He serves as a member of the Board of Trustee of the Baptist Progress and assistant clerk of BMA missionary committee. He has been offered the presidency of the Southeastern Baptist College in Laurel, MS and the BMA Seminary in Jacksonville but declined.

He has written two books: *Lest the Stones Cry Out* and *Prescriptions from the Beloved Physician*.

His pastoral work includes Jackson Baptist Church, Canton; Caney Baptist Church and Calvary Baptist Church, Fairfield; Immanuel Baptist Church, Camden, AR; First Baptist Church, Jacksonville; First Baptist Church, Magnolia, AR; Central Baptist Church and Oak Park Baptist Church, Lubbock; Bryan Street Baptist Church, Lamesa. He now serves as Executive Director of Ministers Benefit Department in Texarkana, AR.

The Calvary Baptist Church of Talco will have a Note Burning on Sunday, September 29 during their morning services. There will be fellowship after services.

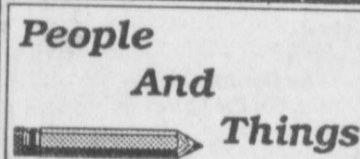

Labor Day Holiday Costs Lives

It is sobering to realize that when this nation celebrates a holiday, hundreds of lives are lost and thousands of lives are irrevocably changed through carelessness and irresponsibility.

Traffic accidents, violence, recreational mishaps and children's injuries often mar the end of the summer Labor Day weekend.

During a typical Labor Day weekend, over 400 auto crash fatalities occur and about 20,000 people suffer disabling traffic related injuries. These grim statistics are doubly tragic because most traffic crashes are preventable.

The overwhelming majority of motor vehicle injuries are not accidents at all. By adhering to safety principles, crash related fatalities and injuries can be reduced. Exercise common sense in the holiday celebration, avoid alcohol, wear your safety belt when traveling, drive the speed limit and be careful when traveling close to home or on two lane roads.

Nearly 50% of all traffic fatalities are alcohol related. Drunk driving continues to be one of the nation's most serious public health and safety problems.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson St., Mt. Pleasant on September 4 from 8:30 to 11:30 and 1 to 3 p.m. Future clinics will be held on the first and third Wednesday, of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

signed up for the peach cobbler. She always makes it for him, but wonders if he is taking the credit for making it himself.

Dorothy enjoys camping at Lake Cypress Springs. When they began this hobby they camped in a tent. However, today they have modernized camping somewhat and enjoy their travel camper.

Collecting cups is also an enjoyment of Dorothy's. She began this hobby about 24 years ago. She recalls the first cup she received was from her late mother, Zetta Marie Salter. She is the one who suggested to Dorothy to begin the collection. So, since then she's collected from many cities and states.

Every cup has a story behind it, and Dorothy enjoys sharing them. The corn casserole being shared is her son, Kent's, favorite. This dish can be served as a main dish or side dish. She got the original recipe from her step-mother, Jo Salter, but has changed a few ingredients to meet her family's taste.

Oil Pie Crust

1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup oil
1 1/2 cup flour
salt

Mix milk and oil; add flour and salt. Mix well and pat into pie plate. For double crust, make two recipes and roll top crust between wax paper and then transfer to pie.

Chocolate Chess Pie

1 cup sugar
3 T. cornmeal
3 T. cocoa
3 eggs
1/2 cup melted butter
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 t. vanilla

1 unbaked 9" pie crust
Mix all ingredients together. Pour into pie crust and bake at 350 for 45-50 minutes.

Peach Cobbler

Mix:
1 quart fresh sliced or frozen peaches
1 cup sugar with 1/4 cup flour mixed in
1 stick melted butter
enough water to make desired juice
Line a dish with 1 recipe of oil crust. Pour in peach mixture. Top with crust that has air slits cut in it. Brush top crust with milk and sprinkle sugar over it. Bake at 350 until golden brown, about 45 minutes.

Corn Casserole

Mix together:
1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup sugar
salt and pepper

Beat in:
2 eggs
1 T. oil
Add:
1 can Cream Style Corn
1 can Whole Kernel Corn, drained

1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup bell pepper
1 small jar pimentos

Spray an 8x8 dish with Pam and bake uncovered 35-45 minutes at 350. Center will be firm when done.

For a main dish meal, add one pound hamburger before baking.

Punch Bowl Cake

1 box yellow or white cake mix, prepared as directed
2 cans cherry pie filling
1-16 oz. can pineapple tidbits
4 sliced bananas
4-4 serving size boxes instant vanilla pudding, prepared as directed
1-16 oz. carton Cool Whip
pecans, cherries, coconut, etc.

Cube cooled, baked cake. Layer 1/2 cake cubes in clear punch bowl. Top with 1 can cherry pie filling, 2 boxes pudding, half pineapple, half bananas and half of Cool Whip. Repeat layers using rest of each ingredient. Garnish with chopped pecans, cherries, coconut, etc. Note: Wash bananas in lemon juice when slicing. This recipe is easy to half if using a smaller bowl.

Super Chili

Brown:
1 pound ground beef or turkey
1 medium onion

Add:
1/8 t. garlic powder
1/4 cup flour
2 T. chili powder
1 t. cumino
1/2 t. oregano
salt and pepper

Mix well. Then add:
23 oz. tomato juice
1 1/2 cups water
1 can kidney beans (optional)
Simmer at least two hours. Also cooks well in a slow cooker. Recipe is easily doubled and freezes well.

Scudder Pitches Loser To Atlanta, 4-1

Scott Scudder, formerly of Blossom, pitcher for the Cincinnati Reds, doomed himself by giving up five walks in his five innings against the Atlanta Braves on August 22.

The Reds, defending World Series champions, dropped into fourth place 10 games behind LA, their biggest deficit of the season.

Atlanta limited the Reds to Joe Oliver's seventh homerun.

Scudder gave up a leadoff single to

Otis Nixon in the fifth, and walked Ron Gant and Justice with two out to load the bases. Hunter, who flied out with the bases loaded in the first, lined a two-run single past diving third baseman Chris Sabo, who could only get the tip of his glove on the ball.

Hunter led off the eighth inning with his eighth homer off Milt Hill, the third Reds pitcher.

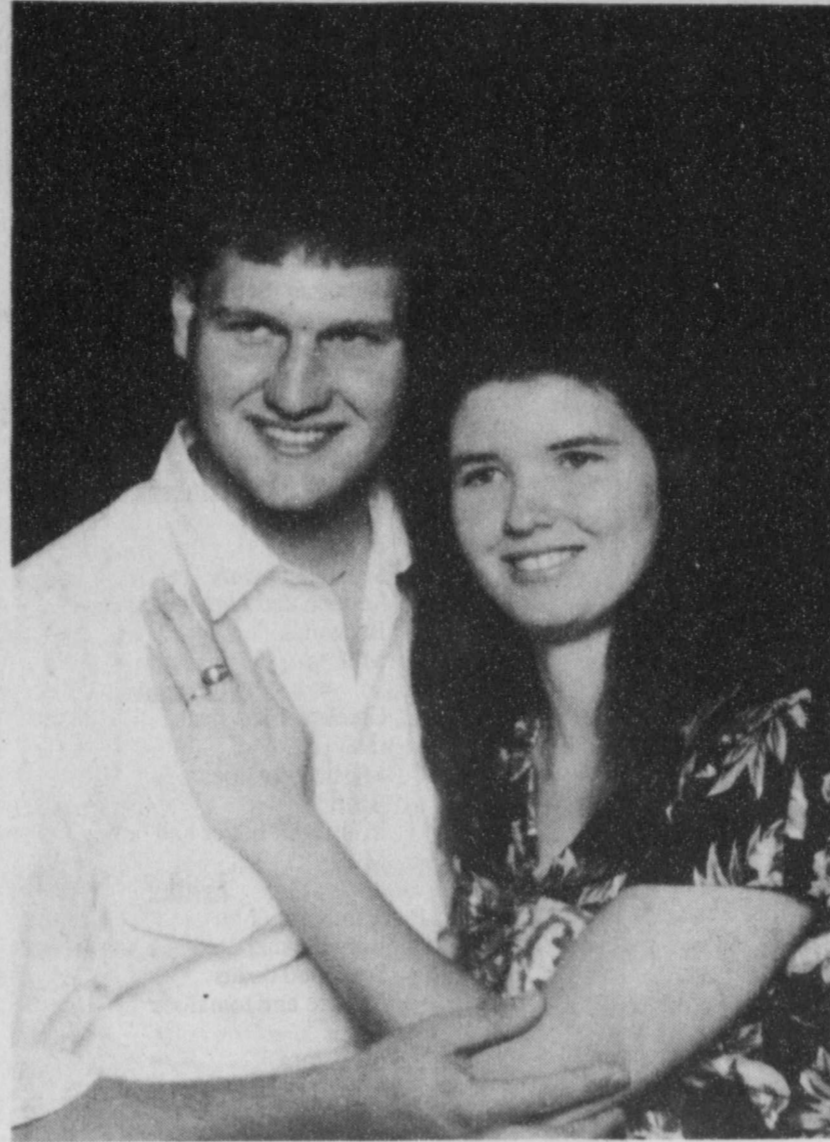

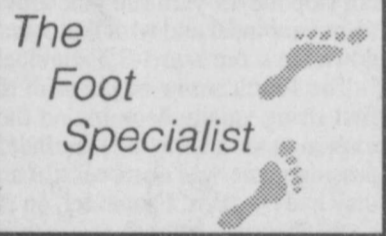

LISTEN TO YOUR FEET

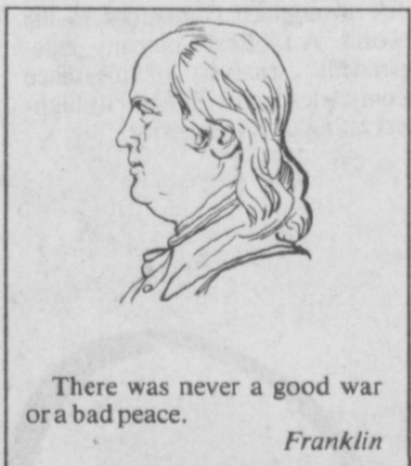

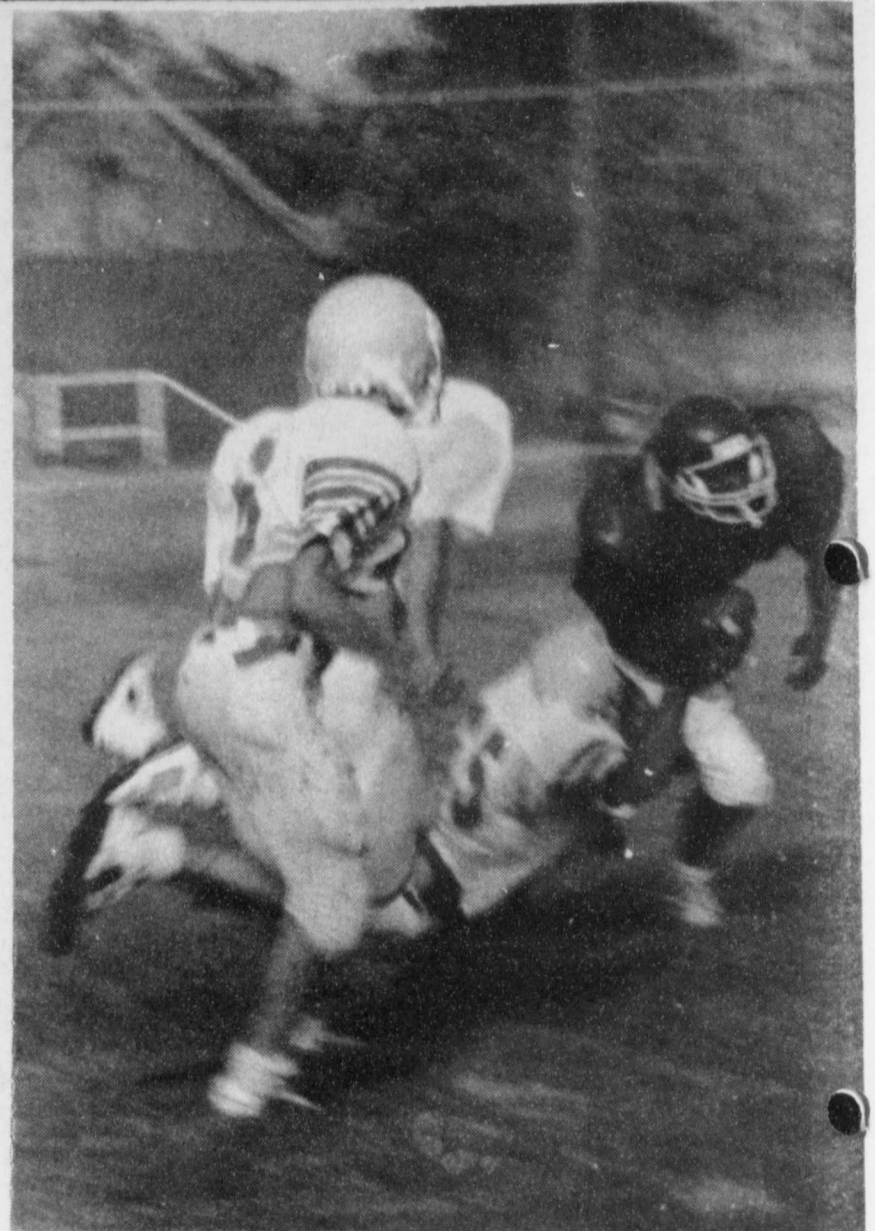

PRCA Champs Coming To Paris Rodeo

As the entries closed in Colorado Springs, CO for the Paris PRCA rodeo this Thursday, Friday and Saturday, champions appeared on the entry list to make a bid at the prize money offered in Paris.

Among the entries for the rodeo are Chuck Logue of Decatur, TX the reigning PRCA Bareback Riding Champion and Jim Sharp of Kermit, TX, the reigning Bull Riding Champion.

Logue, an eight times NFR qualifier, earned \$112,906 in 1990 enroute to his first world title. He has been a PRCA member since 1979 and has career earnings of \$548,650.

Sharp, age 25, is the 1988 and 1990 Bull Riding Champion. In 1990 he earned \$127,406 and has career earnings in the PRCA totaling \$508,892. He has qualified for the NFR 1986 through 1990. Sharp's biggest win of the 1990 season came at Cheyenne, Wyoming when he won \$12,334 in the bull riding.

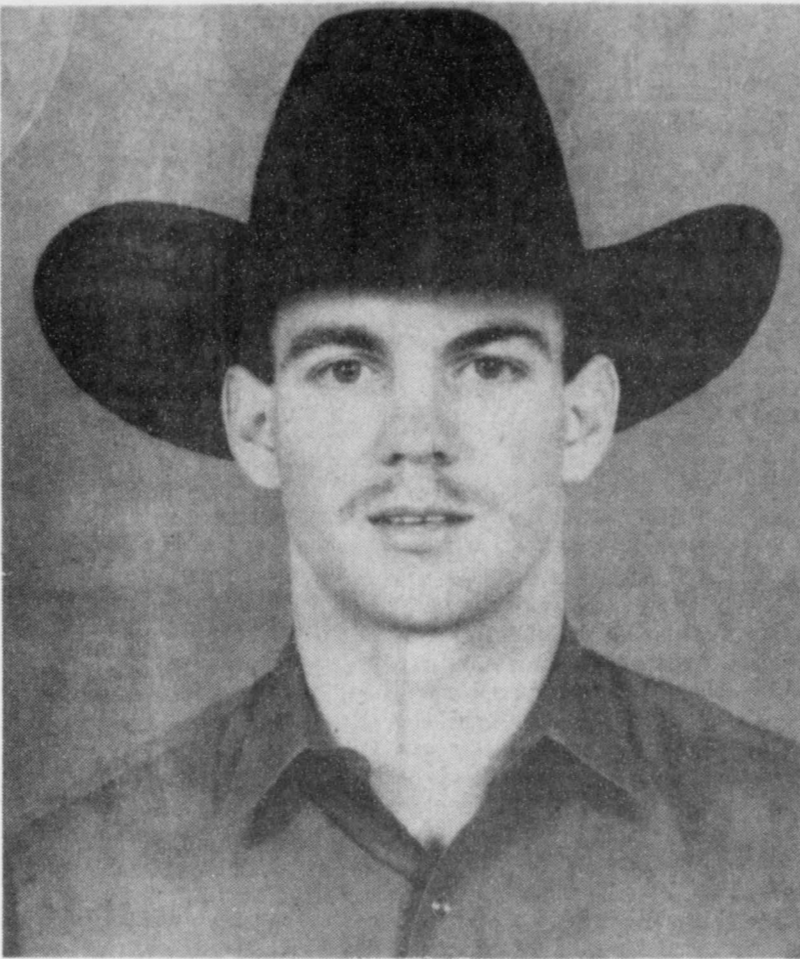
Sharp was the first man to ever ride all 10 NFR bulls, a feat he accomplished in 1988.

At the 1990 NFR, Sharp had to fend off a strong attack by Norman Curry of DeBerry, TX and his traveling partners Clint Branger and Tuff Hedeman. Branger entered the NFR just \$3,600 shy of Sharp's regular

season earnings and led the world title race going into the final round of the NFR. Sharp scored 86 points in the 10th round, forcing Branger to score 87 or higher to claim the title. Branger was impressive, but hit the turf just before the buzzer, assuring Sharp of his second world title.

During the World Champions Award Banquet held at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas, Nevada following the final round, Sharp good-naturedly expressed his gratitude to Hedeman and Branger. "I'd like to thank Tuff and Clint for falling off today," he said. Sharp said a strong friendship is important. "We go to 100-125 rodeos a year together. I hope they win just like I do. If I didn't win today, I'd have hoped one of them would have won. They want to win first, but if they don't win, they want me to. We're just good friends."

Other names included in the Paris rodeo roster were Chris Lybbert of Argyle, TX, former All Around and Calf Roping Champion; Ronnie Sewalt of Chico, TX, former Calf Roping Champion; Tuff Hedeman of Bowie, TX, 1989 Bull Riding Champion and Norman Curry of DeBerry, TX, 1990 NFR average winner in the Bull Riding, the second man ever to ride all 10 NFR bulls.

Social Security Notes

People who owe money to Social Security as a result of Social Security benefits overpayments should be aware that a new rule authorizes the Internal Revenue Service to deduct what is owed from their Federal income tax refunds.

This authority, known as the Tax Refund Offset provision, was mandated by Congress in the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990. It provides the Social Security Administration an avenue for recovering overpayments from individuals who are no longer receiving benefits, and who are delinquent in repaying their debt.

When people on the rolls receive overpayments, Social Security generally deducts the amount of the overpayment from future checks. However, for people no longer receiving benefits, the agency can only request voluntary repayment. If the overpaid individual was unwilling to make payment or could not be located, SSA had to wait until he or she became reentitled to benefits before recovery could take place.

Under the new law, SSA will send notices to former beneficiaries who have not repaid overpayments to provide them an opportunity to arrange for repayment of request a waiver of the overpayment. If no response is received, Social Security will notify the Internal Revenue Service who will withhold the amount owed from any Federal income tax refunds due the individuals.

SSA records show that there are approximately 300,000 former beneficiaries who meet all the criteria for a tax refund offset. Of this number, about 75% are former recipients of student's benefits.

Beginning in August, SSA will mail the tax refund offset notice to these former beneficiaries. After receipt of the notices, some individuals are expected to make voluntary payments to avoid being referred to IRS for offset. These voluntary payments, along with the tax refunds that will eventually be offset by IRS, are expected to generate \$47 million in Fiscal Year 1992, and again in 1993. All monies recovered will be returned to the Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Trust Funds.

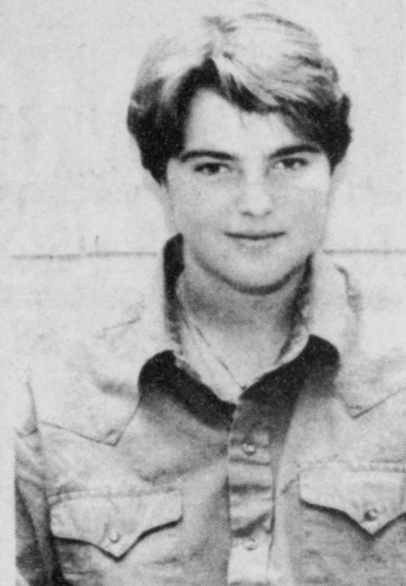

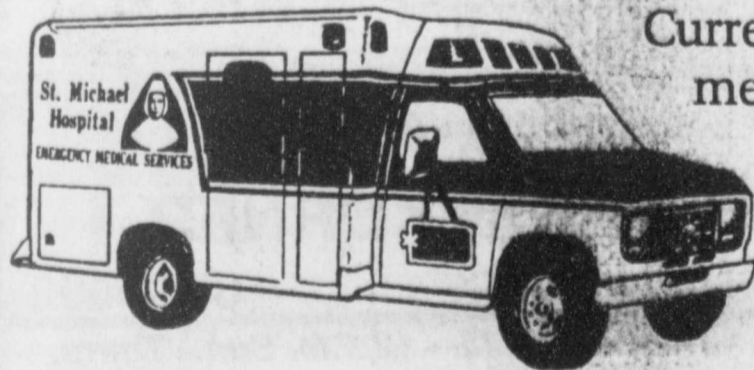

Immunization Clinic Will Be In Clarksville

Measles/Mumps/Rubella (MMR), Oral Polio (OPV), Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis (DTP) and Tetanus/diphtheria (Td). The Haemophilus Influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of two months and sixty months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security Number if it is available. The Tetanus/diphtheria (Td) vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parents or legal guardian have any questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

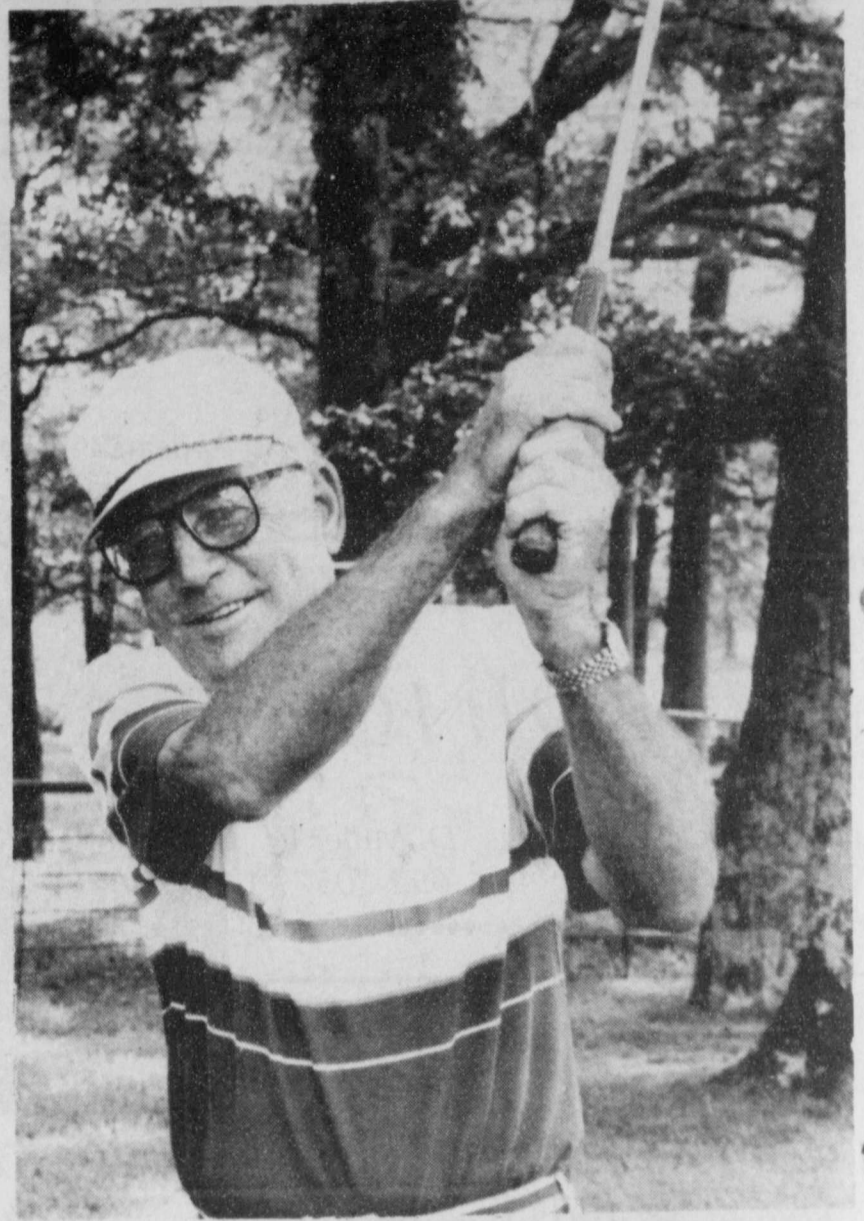

Armyworms Pose Potential Threat

Armyworm infestations are becoming a potential threat to hay meadows, permanent pastures and newly planted winter pastures.

"Infestations may continue until frost," said Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Forages, including home lawns, can be destroyed within a few days if control is delayed."

Repeat treatments with an approved insecticide may be necessary since reinfestations can occur. Robinson says that producers and home owners should continually watch for new infestations.

Several approved insecticides are

available for controlling armyworms, either with ground rigs or by aerial application.

"Producers with hay reaching maturity at the time of infestation may want to harvest the hay before applying the insecticide," Robinson said.

In home lawns, centipede, St. Augustine and bermudagrass are all susceptible to armyworm infestations. Generally, the armyworms do not kill grasses but do cause them to appear ragged. There is no established economic threshold for controlling armyworms. Economics depend on the need for forage or the aesthetic value to home owners.
