Governor Proclaims Fire Prevention Week

Citing the loss of 271 lives and almost \$350 million in property damage to fires during 1990, Gov. Ann Richards has proclaimed the week of October 6-12 as Fire Prevention Week in Texas and announced her appointments to the new Texas Commission on Fire Protection.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all Texans, particularly the very young and the very old," Richards said. "Our intention is that by focusing attention and resources on this problem, we can increase the safety of all Texas citizens and fire service personnel."

Fire Prevention Week was first declared by 1922 President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" on October 9, 1871. That conflagration killed 250

people and destroyed 17,430 buildings valued at the time of \$168 million. Recognizing the limitations of even the best fire suppression capabilities, the public and the fire service began thinking in terms of fire prevention as a result of the Chicago fire.

The creation of the Commission on Fire Protection will be an important tool in addressing the fire problem in Texas, Richards said. The

commission, which was established by legislation passed during the regular session of the Texas Legislature, combines several state functions that deal with fire service. The agencies or agency divisions that will be part of the commission are: The Office of the State Fire Marshal; The Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education; The Fire

Department Emergency Board; The Town Rating Unit of the Texas Department of Insurance.

"Combining the functions of these agencies into the Commission on Fire Protection will enable a more direct, efficient approach to aiding fire departments and related organizations," Richards said. "This will ultimately benefit all citizens."

The commission is composed of three chiefs from fulltime paid fire departments; three firefighters, including at least one actively involved in educating the public on fire prevention; three persons who are volunteer fire chiefs or volunteer firefighters; one certified fire protection engineer; one certified arson investigator; and one fire service instructor from a college, university or junior or community college.

Various oil men were donating enough raw oil to be spread along all of Talco's streets, mixing with the dirt to create an oil-top surface.

Talco was the center of both producing and refining activities for the oil business.

The new football stadium was under construction.

A heat record of 100 degrees was set for October.

There was an advertisement for the State Fair of Texas, which was celebrating its Golden Jubilee.

Among the things to see and do at the fair were Bozo the mind reading dog the Jubilee Follies, and the Eiffel Sisters, performing daring feats high in the air.

The Talco Theatre was showing "She's Got Everything" and "Tombstone Canyon".

Later in the week "Borrowing

Trouble" and Under the Gypsy Moon".

The theatre was given away fifty gliding model airplanes to lucky girls and boys.

The Talco Gin had turned out 450 bales of cotton.

Several law suits involving oil titles were underway, apparently a Signs of the Hitler Peace Plan had found "little favor" with those at war with him. An article on the "draft Plan" which would exempt many men in the event of war. It began "Should the United States ever become involved in war..."

The farm population in the United States totted 32,059,000.

C.E. Jones Dry goods was selling blankets for 98 cents to \$1.25.

Bus routes were being oiled.

The newspaper also contained political cartoons showing the United State's determined neutrality concerning the conflict in Europe.

Other items contained lengthy locals from not only Talco but Wilkerson, Sugar Hill and others.

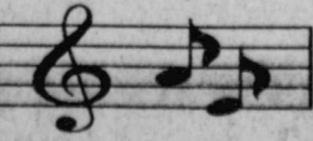

The winner of this year's top award, James Morgan of Mills County, received a plaque and \$1,000. First runner-up, Michael Reagan of Jacksonville, received \$500.

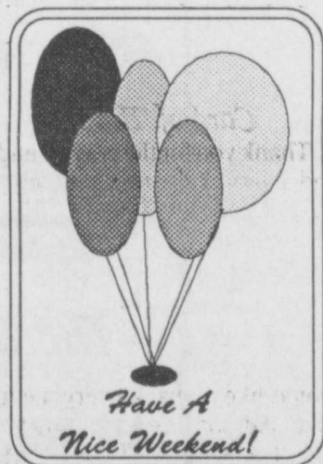

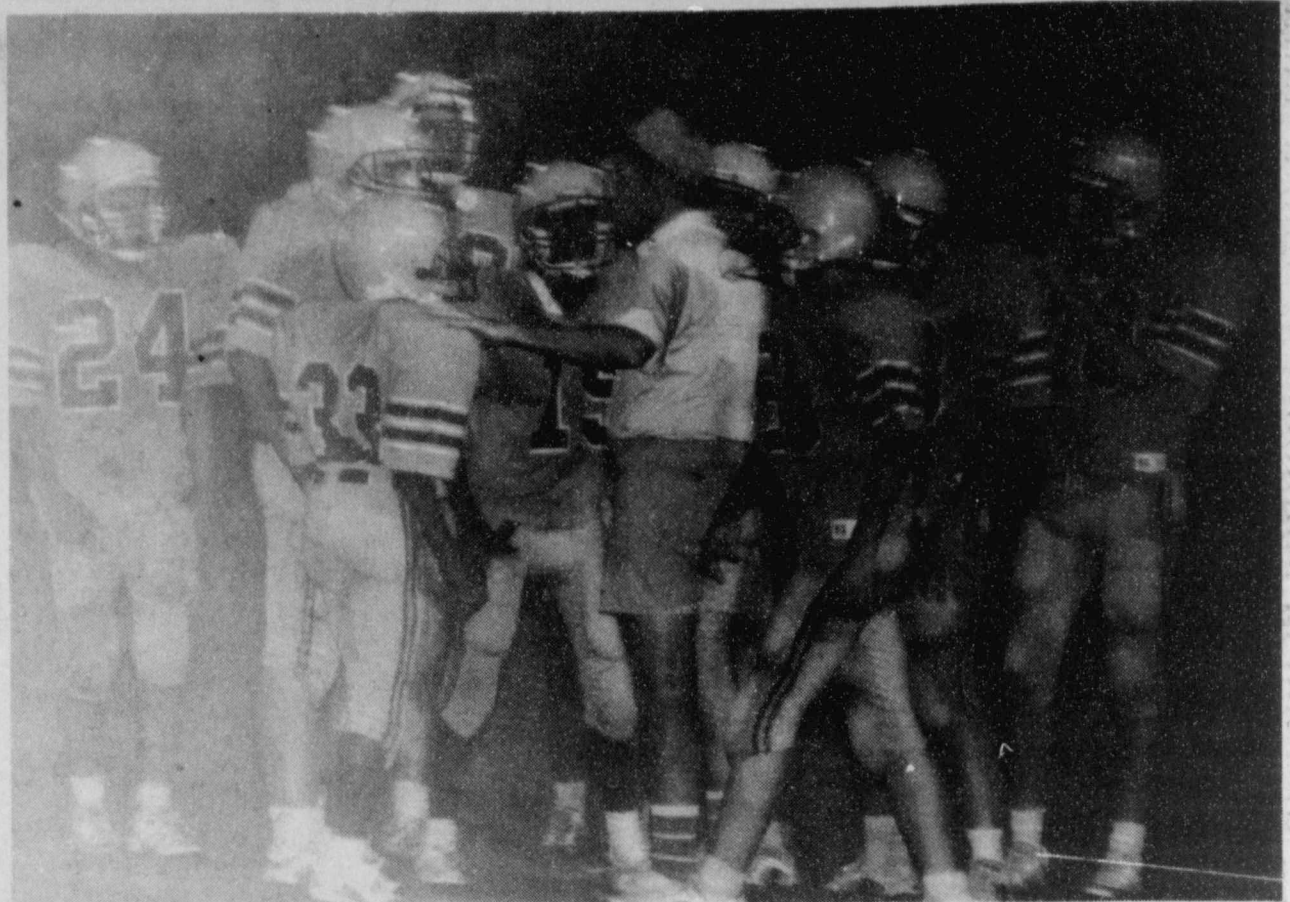
better ball.

Dean Tiffie gained 12- yards for 16 carries and for two touchdowns. He scored in the third and fourth quarters.

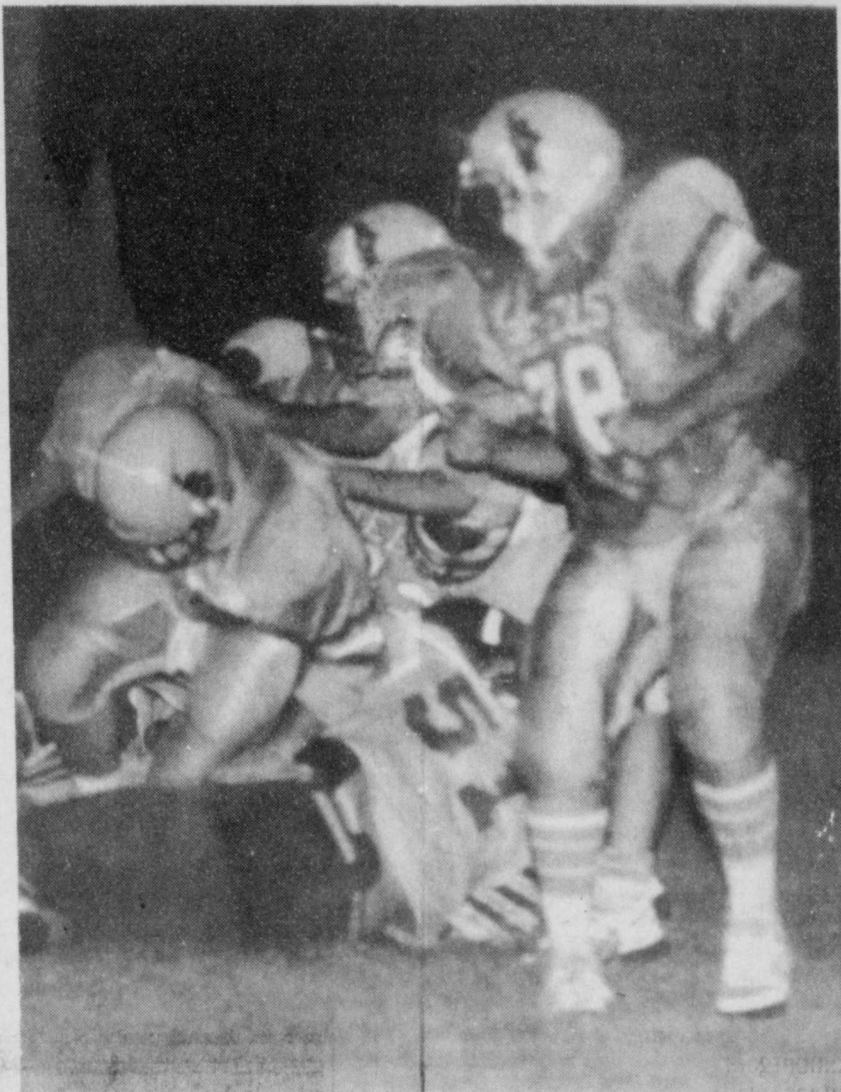
Tony Sanders rushed for 50 yards and scored once for the Rebels. John Smith rushed for over 80 yards as well.

Extra Vitamins

Many people know that their diet is reasonably well balanced, but turn to supplementary vitamins as a safeguard, on the theory that you can't get too much of a good thing. Generally speaking, it is true that supplementary vitamins are harmless though unnecessary. In most cases, the body absorbs only the amount of vitamins it needs. There is, however, definite evidence of harmful effects from excess dosages of Vitamins A, K, and D, so they should not be used in large doses.

There is another danger in relying on supplementary vitamins. Many people believe these vitamins meet all their nutritional needs. People who are careless about their intake of food feel that they can set everything right with a couple of capsules from a bottle. This could not be more wrong. For example, if you consumed a diet without enough protein and relied on supplementary vitamins to keep you healthy, you would soon develop serious problems.

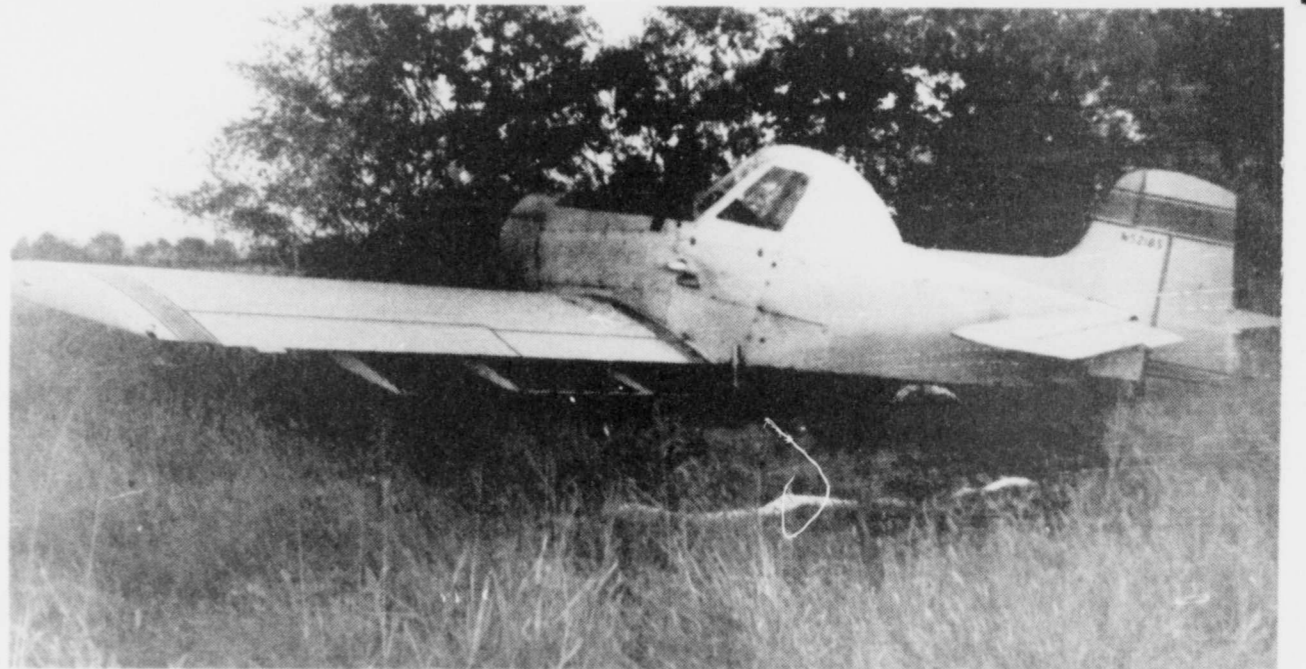
