That's exactly what I did, too. When I got home I emptied the bottom drawer out of the guest room chest, put in a quilt, covered it with a pretty flowered pillow case, and there was a safe, secure baby bed for an infant! It set me to thinking about all

the little tricks and bits of knowledge about baby raising that must be floating around out there.

Governor Proclaims Fire Prevention Week

Citing the loss of 271 lives and almost \$350 million in property damage to fires during 1990, Gov. Ann Richards has proclaimed the week of October 6-12 as Fire Prevention Week in Texas and announced her appointments to the new Texas Commission on Fire Protection.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all Texans, particularly the very young and the very old," Richards said. "Our intenion is that by focusing attention and resources on this probem, we can increase the safety of all Texas citizens and fire service personnel."

Fire Prevention Week was first declared by 1922 President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" on October 9, 1871. That conflagration killed 250

people and destroyed 17,430 buildings valued at the time of \$168 million. Recognizing the limitations of even the best fire suppression capabilities, the public and the fire service began thinking in terms of fire prevention as a result of the Chicago fire. The creation of the Commission

on Fire Protection will be an important tool in addressing the fire problem in Texas, Richards said. The

commission, which was established by legislation passed during the rgula rsession of the Texas Legislature, combines several state functions that deal with fire service. The agencies or agency divisions that will be part of the dcommission are: The Office of the State Fire Marshal: The Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education; The Fire

Department Emergency Board; The Town Rating Unit of the Texas Department of Insurance.

"Combining the functions of these agencies into the Commission on Fire Protection will enable a more direct, efficient approach to aiding fire departments and related organizations," Richards said. "This will untimately benefit all citizens."

The commission is composed of three chiefs from fulltime paid fire departments; three firefighters, including at least one actively involved in educating the public on fire prevention; three persons who are volunteer fire chiefs or volunteer firefighters; one certified fire protection engineer; one certified arson investigator; and one fire service instructor from a college, university or junior or community college.





Services were held at the Talco Church of Christ at 2 p.m. Thursday, October 3. Bates-Cooper-Weems made burial in Talco Cemetery.



Many people know that their diet is reasonably well balanced, but turn to supplementary vitamins as a safeguard, on the theory that you can't get too much of a good thing. Generally speaking, it is true that sup-plementary vitamins are harmless though unnecessary. In most cases, the body absorbs only the amount of vitamins it needs. There is, how-ever, definite evidence of harmful effects from excess dosages of Vitamins A, K, and D, so they should not be used in large doses.

There is another danger in relying on supplementary vitamins. Many people believe these vitamins meet who are careless about their intake of food feel that they can set everything right with a couple of capsules from a bottle. This could not be more wrong. For example, if you consumed a diet without enough protein and relied on supplementary vitamins to keep you healthy, you would soon develop serious problems.
