Talco Backward Glances

From October 13, 1939 Titus County was holding a beer election to see if the sale of beer would or would not become legal in the county.

Stimey Miller, a Talco football player was in a Paris sanitarium as the result of a fractured right ankle received Friday night in the game between Talco and Sulphur Bluff.

A group of Talco business men representing the Talco Chamber of Commerce met with the Bogata Chamber of Commerce in Bogata to discuss the barbeque which was being held to promote Bogata and Talco together and to help each other in building a park for the two cities.

Each town was to furnish \$25 for the occasion to pay for the expenses of the barbeque meal.

Rains had broken the long drought. The drought had lasted for months and was listed as one of the longest and most severe in history.

Talco State Bank had shown gains from \$120,966.26 to \$142,580.06 in deposits.

It was reported that the State of Texas had 269 living confederate veterans of the Civil War.

The Talco Trojans had beaten Sulphur Bluff by 52-0.

It was noted that Americans held extremely large investments in the four warring nations in Europe.

Hopman and Jones Drug Store were expanding and had completed a soda fountain.

Two new wells were being drilled in the Talco area by Humble Company.

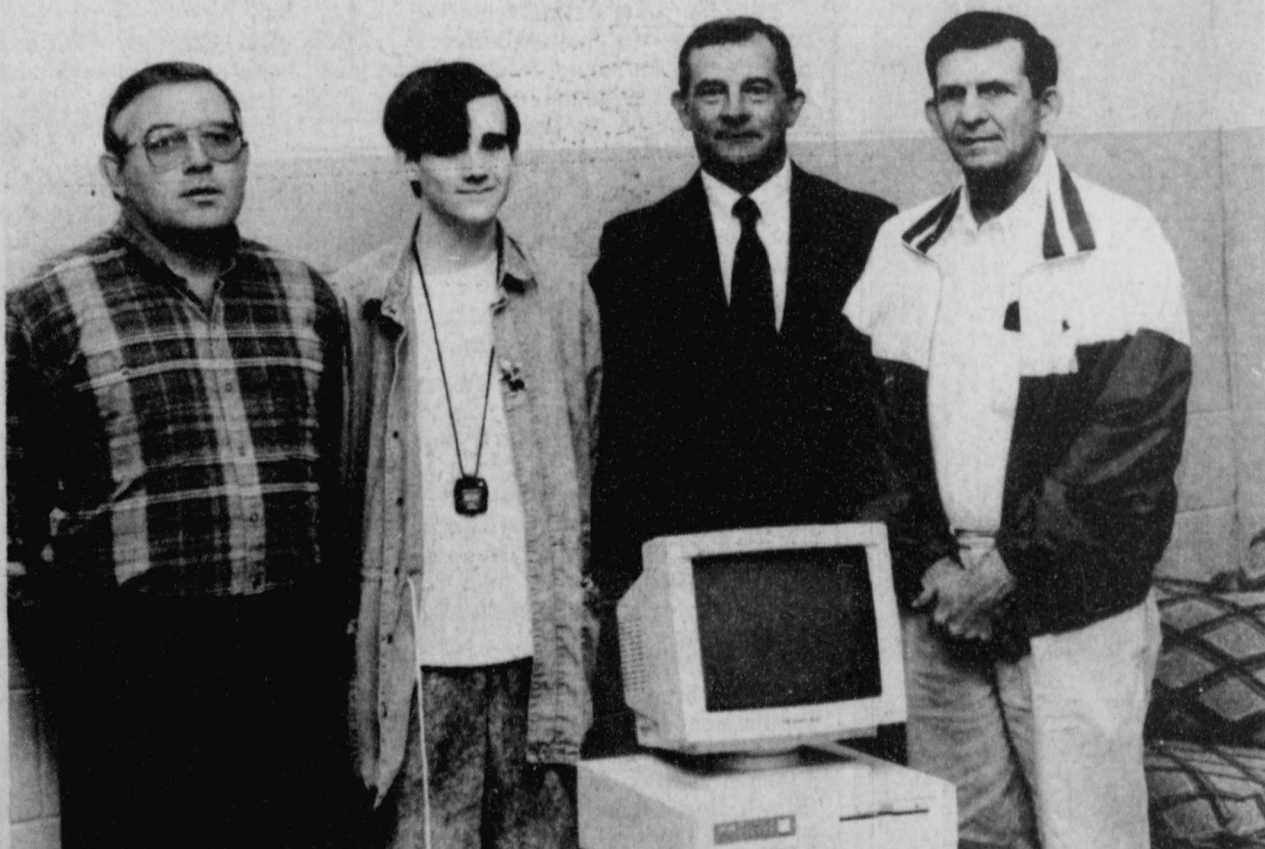
Sunshine Club Meets

Banana Pudding By Evelyn Pressley

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 T flour
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 2 eggs, beaten
- dash of salt
- 1 T vanilla

Blend sugar, eggs, flour, salt, vanilla together. Add milk, stir and cook until thick. Put banana and wafers in bowl.

Pecan Pie

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup Karo
- 1/4 T salt
- 3 eggs, beat together
- Stir together and mix in 1 cup pecans.

Bake at 350 for 1 hour in unbaked pie crust.

Brownies

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 4 eggs
- 6 T cocoa
- 1 1/2 cup flour
- dash of salt
- 2 T vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups pecans

Bake at 400 for 20 minutes.
Pink Stuff

- 8 oz. crushed pineapple, drained
- 3 oz. box dry jello (cherry or any flavor)
- 16 oz. cottage cheese
- 8 oz. cool whip
- Mix together. Place in refrigerator.

Cornbread Salad

- 1 pan cooked cornbread
- 1/4 onion, cut
- 2 tomatoes, cut
- 1/2 green pepper (bell)
- 1/2 cup miracle whip
- 2 T mustard
- salt and pepper

Crumble cornbread and mix with all ingredients. Keeps in ice box for a week. Is better a few hours after you mix it together.

Cornbread Casserole

- 2 packs cornbread mix (mix like making cornbread)

add
1 can 17 oz. cream style corn (set aside)
Brown 1 lb. ground meat, onion, add 1 small can green chilis if you want it hot. Drain. Set aside. Grate 1/2 lb. cheese (longhorn). Set aside. Heat skillet, pour half of cornbread mix in skillet, add meat mixture then cheese. Add rest of cornbread mixture. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes or until golden brown.

Carrot Cake By Nell Wolfe

- 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 1/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup unsweetened pineapple juice concentrate
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 1/2 cup golden raisins
- 1/2 cup unsweetened crushed pineapple, drained

Preheat oven to 350. Grease and flour 9x5x3" loaf pan. In a bowl, toss flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, ginger and salt. In a second bowl, stir oil, sugar, eggs, pineapple juice and vanilla. Stir liquid into dry ingredients until smooth. Stir in carrots, raisins and pineapple. Bake 35-40 minutes. Cool in pan on a rack for 1 hour. Per serving: 142 calories, 19gm. carbohydrate, 2gm. protein, 7 gm. fat, 87 mg. sodium. Cholesterol: 30 mg. per serving.

Crepe Cheese Frosting By Nell Wolfe

- 8 oz. light cream cheese at room temp.
- 5 tablespoons unsweetened pineapple juice concentrate
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon finely grated orange zest

Whisk all ingredients together until smooth. Per serving: 46 calories, 3 gm carbohydrate, 2 gm protein, 3 gm fat, 96 mg sodium. Cholesterol: 10 mg per serving.

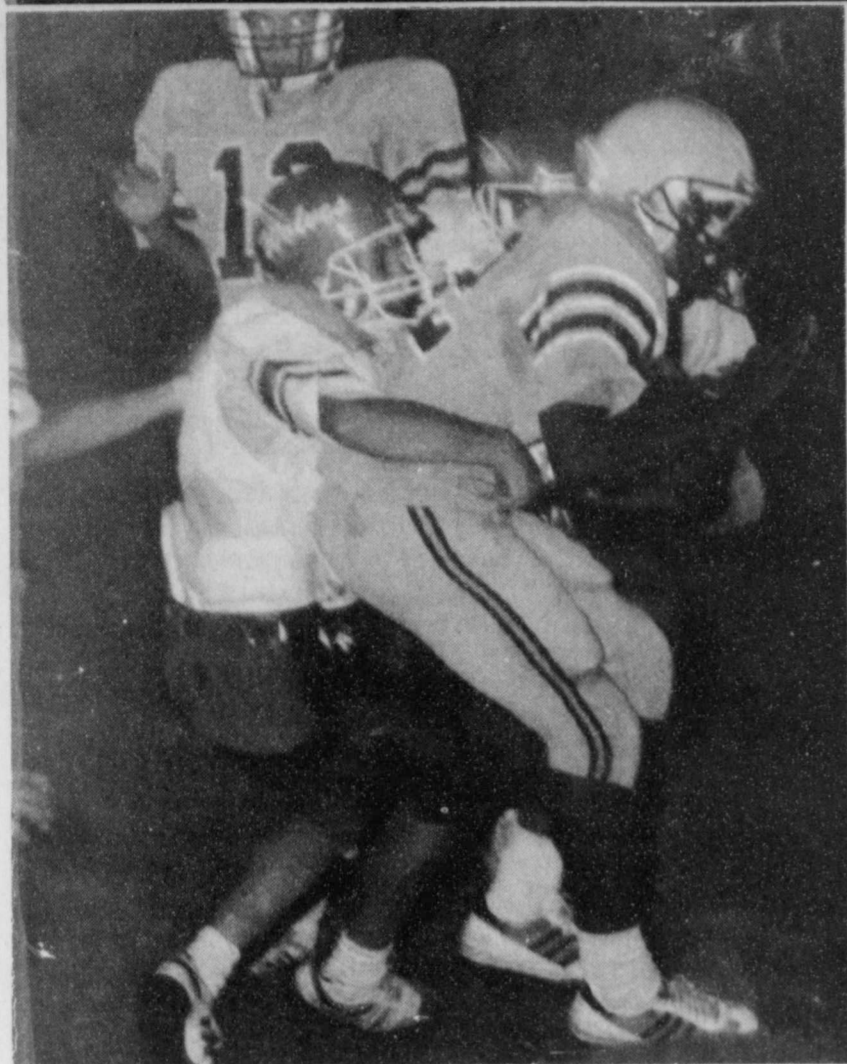

yards for a score making it 13-7.

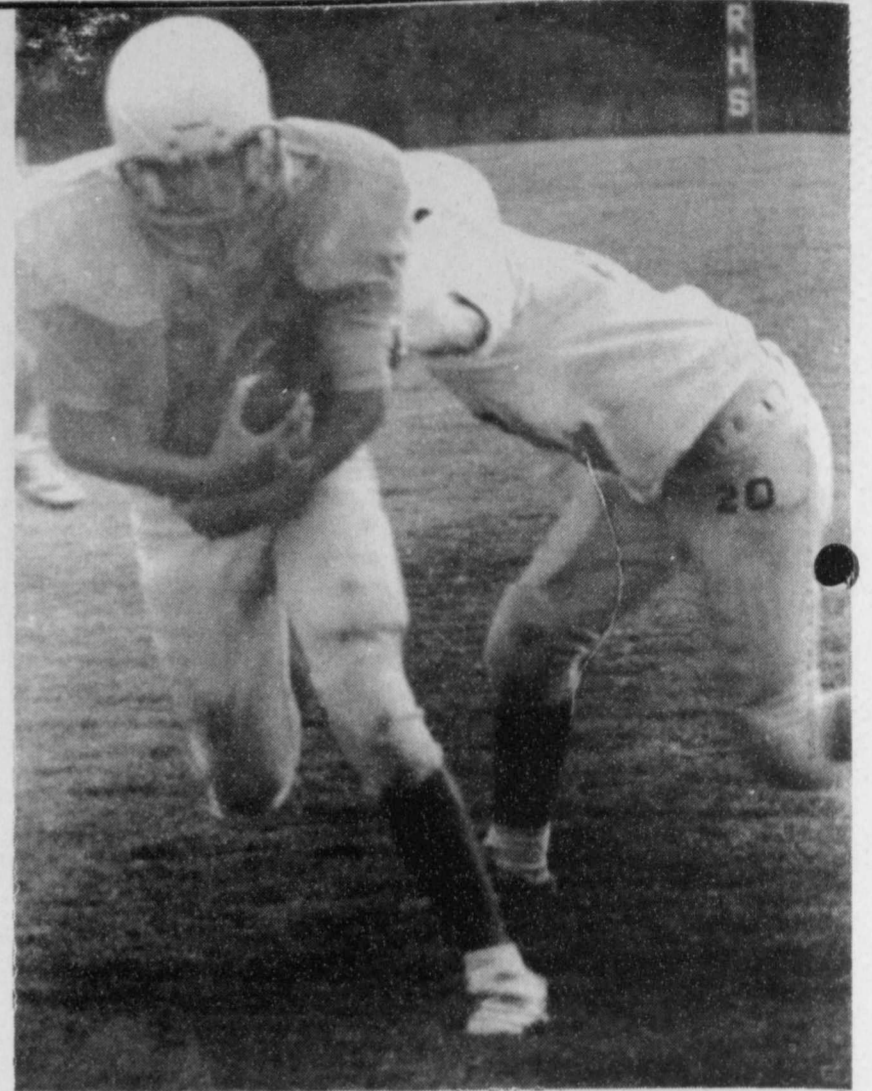
With a minute and 40 seconds left in the first half, the Wolves blocked the RHS punt, which set up their third score of the half, making the score 19-7.
