

Mt. Vernon High will host a tournament in which the Rebel and Lady Rebel Varsity teams will participate on the weekend of December 5-7.






You can avoid some muscle and back strain by lifting the shovel properly. Keep the weight of the snow close to your body, keep your back straight, and lift with your legs.
