County Attorney's Record for 1991


Total felony jury trials*





Search for a low interest rate if you pay only part of your bill each month Annual rates are as low as 9% on some cards and as high as 19.8% on others. Since personal interest expense is no longer tax deductible, keep interest expense to a minimum.

Some cards levy a cash advance fee in addition to other charges. If you expect to rely on your card for money. find out exactly what you'll pay for this convenience

Annual fees range from about \$20 to \$50. A premium card may offer automatic rental car insurance, road side assistance for your family car. and buyer protection for theft or damage to goods purchased with the card. Don't pay extra for features you won't use. Often, you can get a premium cards higher credit limit by asking for it on your standard card



Texas Department of Transportation In its monthly meeting recently, the Texas Transportation Commission voted to suspend district reorganization activities. The move gives the Paris District of the Texas Depatment of Transportation a reprieve from its consolidation with the Tyler District. The Paris office, along with a neighboring office in Atlanta, were scheduled to combine operations with the Tyler office effective September

The Legislature made its intent clear durin the third-called special session and we will comply with that," said Transportation Commissioner Ray Stoker, Jr.

Since November, the Texas Department of Transportation had been reorganizing its 24 districts to comply with a legislative mandate to consolidate into no more than 18 districts. The Commission, which is the department's governing body, decided to table reorganization plans after legislators passed a Joint Resolution requiring the department to postpone further district realignment activities until next year.


The Commission also directed the department to research and develop ways to enhance the operating efficiency of the department.
