
Bob Crawford Dies February 10





People who are careless about their intake of food feel that they can set everything right with a couple of capsules from a bottle. This could not be more wrong. 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



In the past, taxpayers could avoid penalties for underpaying estimated taxes as long as they made current year payments at least equal to their prior year's tax liability. The new law limits the use of this safe harbor. Starting this year, prepaying 100% of last year's tax liability will no longer be adequate if:

*your 1992 adjusted gross income is more than \$75,000 (\$37,500 if married, filing separately), and

your adjusted gross income for 1992 exceeds your 1991 income by more than \$40,000 (\$20,000 if married, filing separately) and

*you made estimated tax payments in any of the three prior years or were assessed a penalty for failing to pay estimated taxes.

If you fall into this category, your 1992 estimated tax payments must equal at least 90% of your 1992 tax liability. You are allowed to base your first quarterly estimated tax payment for 1992 (due April 15, 1992) are referred to the payment for 19 1992) on one-fourth of your 1991 tax liability. However, you'll have to make up any shortfall with your June 15

There are some exceptions to the new rules. If the increase in your adjusted gross income is from a home sale, an involuntary conversion, or a minor ownership interest in an S corporation or a limited partnership, the

new rule can be avoided. The bottom line is that if the new rules apply to you, you may have to do more calculating to determine the amount of each quarter's estimate. Failure to do so can subject you to significant penalties.
