Texas Cities And Counties Receive \$91.6 Million In March Rebates

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent checks totaling \$82.1 million to 931 cities, a 12% increase over the \$73.3 million received by cities last March.

Checks to 106 Texas counties totaled another \$9.4 million, up 10.4% over last March's rebate of \$8.5 million.

Quarterly rebates sent to mass transit authorities included: Austin, \$11.2 million; Corpus Christi, \$3.1 million; Dallas, \$51.7 million; Ft. Worth, \$5 million; Houston, \$58.1 million

and San Antonio, \$19.5 million.

"Payments to Texas cities and counties overall this year are up a little over 5%," said Sharp. "That reflects a gradual overall improvement and a continued slow growth in consumer confidence."

Local payments received are: Blossom: \$1,860.29 for this period, compared to \$1,085.59 for last year, an increase of 2.58%.

In Deport, \$863.47 was received, showing a 17.32% increase.

Paris received \$143,054.96 for a

9.44% decrease.

Bogata received \$2,334.35 for a 2.01% decrease over last year's payments to date while Clarksville received \$16,590.63 for a .75% increase.

Detroit received \$976.37 for an 8.85% increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$94,176.10 for a 17.48% decrease.

Talco received \$1,414.19, marking a 4.28% increase over last year's payments to date.

Progress Reports Given At Community Park Meeting

The Talco Community Park Project Park Committee met Thursday, March 12 at the Talco City Hall with Park Committee president, Patty Kuhl, calling the meeting to order.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read by Judy Sloan and approved.

Mrs. Sloan reported a total of \$914.50 in the fund and also reported that thank you cards had been written and mailed to donors thus far.

Dick Dixon reported a derrick, that was actually a water tower, has been donated to the park to place at the entrance or inside the park with a name plate on it.

Bro. Mowery reported that Mrs. Cato had agreed to take \$500.00 as down payment for the property, as long as no fence lines were removed until the land is paid for.

Patty Kuhl reported a checking account has been opened at the Talco State Bank, requiring two of three signatures to make a withdrawal.

Earl Hale and Ron Benfield reported on possible backing from the Talco City Council. More information will be prepared to be presented for approval.

Mrs. Kuhl reported that there will be a Cow Patty Splat on April 11, with the rain date being April 25 to raise money. Rusty Jones gave permission for the event to be held on the Talco State Bank parking lot. Tickets will be sold for \$10.00 per square, with the winner receiving \$1,000 if all 300 tickets are sold. If all tickets are not sold, the winner will receive 1/3 of the amount. A halter broken calf will be used. Bryan Ottinger and Kip Stansell will be contacted about providing the calf. A barbecue chicken lunch or sale of whole chickens is also in progress for this day.

Bubba Edge reported on plans for the volleyball tournament to be held

March 19-20-21 with games beginning at 6 p.m. on Thursday evening. Any local team may enter the tourney as late as March 18.

Mrs. Kuhl reported on items to be sold in the concession stand and received approval to purchase needed items. First place T-shirts and second place trophies were donated by Tro-

phies and Treasures in Mt. Pleasant.

The group voted that all bill paying must be approved and a receipt given before a check is written.

Four new members were added to the Park Committee, Kip Stansell, Karen Jones, Terry Jones and Ron Parker.

The Talco Student Council also added two members, Carey Gable and Karen Williams.

Earl Hale requested that "before and after" pictures of the park area be made. He also asked for volunteers to help flag the trees in the area to be kept. He reported that Jerry Stansell will give the use of the old Buck's Welding area for parking, will donate any scrap metal to be sold as a donation to the park and will pay \$100 for the clean-up of the area. Mr. Stansell also gave 2/3 of the building now standing for use for storage or whatever needed. With the use of the Stansell lot and railroad right-of-way, the park will include seven acres.

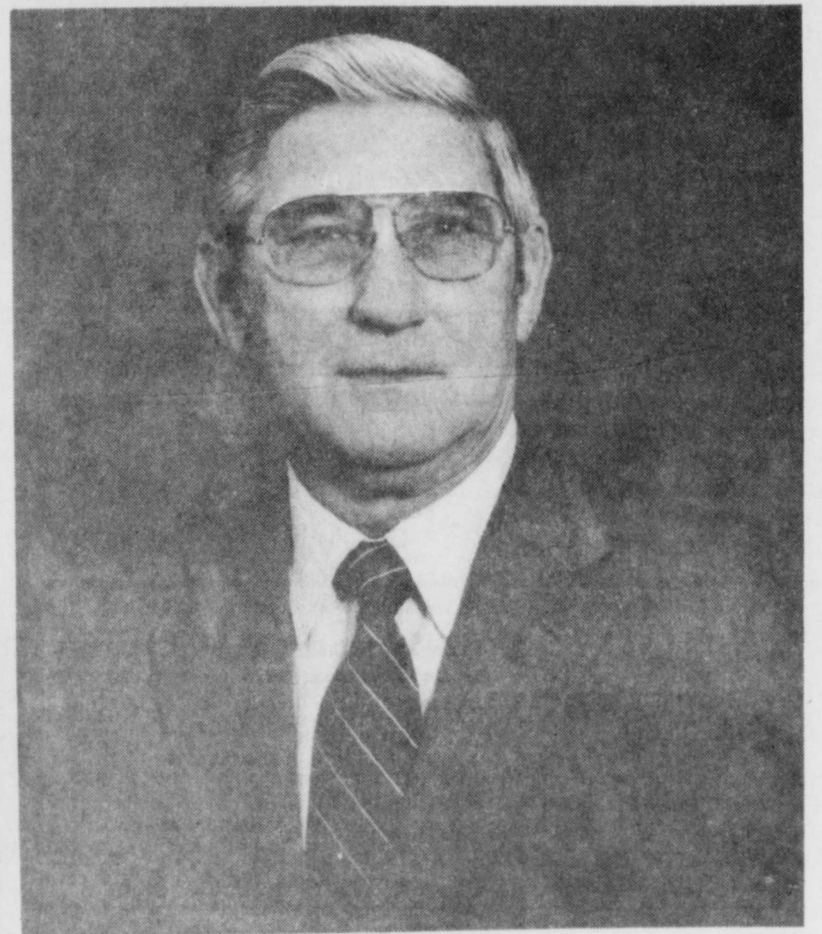

Jerry Jones To Retire April 1st

Jerry L. Jones, Chairman of the Board of the Talco State Bank is retiring as of April 1st, 1992. He will remain as a member of the board of directors, but will retire as Chairman.

He will be honored on March 30 at Talco State Bank between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. with an Open House.

Jones, who has spent most of his life in Talco, began at Talco State Bank in Talco in 1951 as Vice President, a position he held until 1964 when he became President of the bank. He was President until 1988.

He has served as Chairman of the Board of Directors since 1952.

He has served on the Board of Directors of Guaranty Bank in Mt. Pleasant since 1969, and as Chairman of the Board of Guaranty Bancshares, Inc., Mt. Pleasant since 1979.

Jones is a graduate of Talco High School, and graduated from Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth with

a Bachelor of Science in Commerce Degree in 1949.

He was a Loan and Discount Clerk from 1946 until 1949 at Trinity State Bank in Ft. Worth and a Loan Officer from 1949 until 1950 at the same bank.

He was an Assistant Examiner for the Texas Banking Department, Amarillo, 1950-51.

He was in the U.S. Army from 1944-46 as a Staff Sergeant, Finance Department at Ft. Ord, California.

Jones' civic and career activities have included: Past President Bank Administration Institute, Texoma Chapter, Paris, TX, 1954; Mayor of City of Talco from 1955-1977.

Board of Directors of the Titus County Memorial Hospital, 1955-56.

He married Dorothy Shaddix Jones and they have two children, Rusty Jones and Barry Jones.

German Chocolate Cake

2 cups sugar
1 cup Crisco
4 eggs, separated
1 cup buttermilk
2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tsp. vanilla
1 pkg. Sweet German's Chocolate, dissolved in 1/2 cup boiling water

Cream sugar and Crisco. Add beaten egg yolks; add 3/4 cups buttermilk alternately with flour. Dissolve soda in other 1/4 cup buttermilk; add to mixture. Add other ingredients. Fold in beaten egg whites. Bake at 350 for 35 minutes in 3 layers.

Filling:
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 tbsp. flour
1 1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 sticks oleo
2 tsp. vanilla
2 cup chopped nuts
1 can coconut

Mix sugar and flour. Add milk and oleo. Bring to boil slowly for 7 minutes. Add vanilla, nuts and coconut; cool. Spread between layers.

Icing:
1 lb. sifted powdered sugar
1 stick oleo
1 cup chocolate chips
2 beaten egg whites

Cream sugar and oleo; melt chips and add. Fold in beaten whites and spread on cake.

Mix two packages instant vanilla pudding with 3 cups milk. Fold in 12 oz. Cool Whip. Layer bottom of 9x13 pan with graham crackers. Pour half pudding mixture over graham crackers. Add layer of graham crackers over pudding mixture. Pour on remainder of pudding mixture. Add another layer of graham crackers. Mix 2 tbsp. hot water to frosting using electric mixer. Pour over last layer of graham crackers. Let set in fridge overnight.

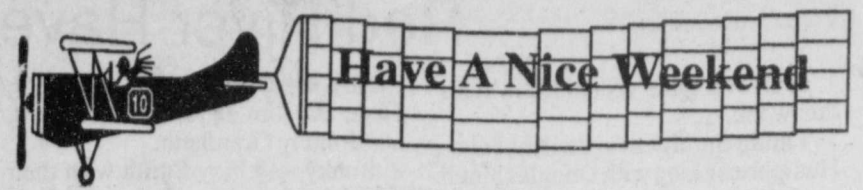



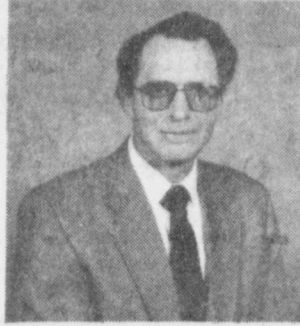

The 10-minute demonstration was given by the hostess, showing sev-

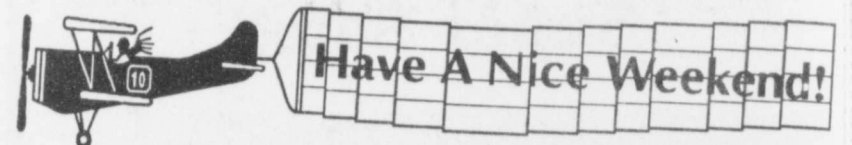

Plan For Severe Weather

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so that family members know what to do and where to go if the national weather service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornado winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area.

Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter; go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications on various weather phenomena and related information.


