The record shows that charges against sports figures are dropped, sentences are reduced, or the athletes are given special treatment.

NO ONE should be above the law. I don't care how important they are on a team. I don't care how popular they are.

Professional athletes on the whole are aware that they should set an example to the young fans that adore them. They are aware that fans are the reason that they have a sports career at all. The majority are worthy of the hero worship they receive.

But so much publicity goes to those that have a bad attitude, who cause troubleand who create disruptions.

.If punishment for improper behavior was shift and sure, then the message to those youngsters who look up to them would be powerful.

Sadly, I'm afraid that the message going out to kids these days is quite the opposite.

Social Security Notes

Special provisions can help people who are blind or near blind qualify for Supplemental Security Income payments. There are also other provisions to help people who are blind and already receiving SSI return to work and still receive SSI benefits or Medicaid protection

SSI makes monthly payments to people 65 and older and to people with disabilities at any age (including children) whose income and assets are below a certain level. And people who receive SSI usually qualify for

Medicaid and food stamps, too. If local Social Security officials determine that individuals meet the eligibility standards for blindness, payments for up to 6 months while they wait for a formal decision by a state Disability Determination Service. If they're later found not to meet the SSI definition of blindness, they

do not have to pay back any money. Other provisions within the law also help people with disabilities


receive SSI while they're working. For example, when figuring a disabled person's earnings, SSI does not count any work expenses directly related to the disability. These exclusions are important because the SSI payment is offset by other income a person has.

People who are blind receive additional exclusions. SSI excludes most of their work expenses (not just those related to their disability). Some examples include Federal, State and Social Security taxes; routine transportation costs to and from work; and

People who are blind also can ask for special handling of any letters sent by Social Security about changes in their SSI. At their request, we can either telephone them or send the letters by certified mail.

Anyone who wants more information about SSI or who wants to apply for benefits should call their local Social Security office.

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
SENIOR CITIZEN'S CORNER

Medication

The average eighty-year-old American takes five different medications every day. Some are prescribed, others are strictly over-the-counter drugs. When this much medicine is taken daily, the chances of drugs interacting with other drugs increase proportionately.


Most of the time, your doctor is extremely careful to make sure interaction doesn't happen. But when you take something as common as an antacid tablet, you run the risk of negating your prescribed medicine or, even worse, suffering harmful side effects. For example, if you are taking an anti-coagulant drug to prevent blood clotting, the antacid changes the gastric secretions in your stomach so the drug may never be absorbed to serve its purpose.

Even certain foods can prohibit prescribed medications from doing their job. Milk and milk products can stop the antibiotic tetracycline from warding off infection. Mineral oil laxatives can stop your body from absorbing that Vitamin D that it needs to keep healthy. When a doctor is prescribing medication for you and asks you if you are taking anything else, don't forget to tell him everything, including your diet. Medicine is one thing you can't afford to be lackadaisical with.

Mail the completed form and the information you are providing to the dress listed on the claim form. If information you provide matches records, your claim will be approved by the Treasury. For claims that have no legal complications, the process takes less than 90 days form the date the claim form is received.



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
Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, Hwy. 37 North in Clarksville. The next clinic will be held April 9. Future clinics will be held on the first Wednesday, second Thursday and fourth Monday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diptheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diptheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/ diptheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

Section 1: There is hereby established the following addressing stan-dards for numbering property and naming public streets/roads within orporated areas of the City of Talco (and any other areas by joint ement of municipalities). Strucwithin this area are subject to in accordance with this

property, notification, and enforce-

Section 2. Street naming and property numbering procedures shall be established in conjunction with he platting and subdivision requireents of the City of Talco.

a. A survey and inventory of all public street names within the City oundaries shall be prepared by the City within three (3) months for use ith addressing procedures. Propmy needing street naming or num ber assignment on public roads will be identified. Duplicate names or similar sounding names will be repealed and renamed on the recomidation of staff and the approval by the commissioners' court.

. Street Name Criteria: Nonduplicative of existing names, limto thirty (30) characters, no lar-sounding names. Directionals are spelled out (North). Deadiding roads may not be designated dts but cul-de-sacs, cove, or court. Other road types may be classified (boulevard must include median or be a minimum 150 feet in

width) as appropriate by the City. Name changes are considered for historical or clarification purposes and are limited to reconsideration three (3) years hence. Name changes list meet same criteria establishing

for new street names. Petition for change must be presented with sig-natures from 3/4 of property owners

Public Notices abutting street. Development along street and traffic volume may be considered as additional criteria.

c. Property Numbering Criteria: Number assignments is based on a grid system: center point within the community, with axis forming base lines, north-south line being 6th. and east-west line being Broad. Block assignments will be consist of 300 feet per block where possible. Number assignment progresses from the center point outward each direction, wih the interval distance of 50 feet allowed for each number. Traveling from the center point, odd numbers assigned to the left and even numbers to the right street side.

d. Final approval of new street names and name change requests resides with City of Talco (examples-Commissioner's Court, county engineer, review committee, emergency services personnel, or other). Street name adoption or changes must comply with criteria established under these standards.

Section 3. Addressing standards shall include requirements of prop-erty owners and inhabitants to post assigned property number at struc-ture. Number must be visible from the street and not be obscured. Residential posting may be no less than 3" high; business structure posting may be no less than 6" and, when located adjacent to roads with speed limits above 45 m.p.h., no less than 24". Grace priods for incorporating this requirement are within 3 months of new address notification.

Section 4: Street naming and property numbering procedures are standards as authorized in the County Road and Bridge Act (Art. 67 02-1, Texas Civil Statutes). These procea. A plat book containing public roads with proper numbering assigned shall be kept on file for public use. Property undergoing subdivision, development, or building permits issued in areas without street

addresses must comply with the

addressing procedureds.

b. Notification in written form must be presented to the property owner and/or tenant when final as signment of addresses occurs. Noti-

fication also should be made to the U.S. Postal Service. Once notified, the address becomes effective within thirty (30) days. c. Within 60 days of notification, proper address number signage should be posted. After 90 days, if no number sign is posted, the enforcement shall consist of the property authority posting such number and to apply applicable charges to

the resident or property owner.
d. Maintenance of the City's addressing procedure will reside in the City Hall. Section 5. Street signs should be erected at all intersections of public roads regardless of current route markings from state, federal or local designation. For new property development, the signage will be required at the expense of the developer. Signs must conform to guide-



AN ARCH VILLAIN

When people discuss foot problems, talk usually turns to conditions such as shin splints or ingrown toenails. There is, however, a largely unrecognized condition guaranteed to cause a host of problems: weak arches. This is actually a relatively common malady involving the bones of the foot. For a person with this condition, the foot appears perfectly normal while the arches are not bearing weight. As soon as the person stands, however, the arch loses its shape and the foot pronates (rotates inward and downward), so that the foot comes down on its inner margin when walking. One villainous aspect of weak arches is that they cause problems far away from the arch itself, such as bunions and tailor's bunions.
