Winners Named In Red River-Titus County Runoff

Tommie Corbell and Bob Edrington were the winners in Tuesday's run-off election for Red River County Sheriff and Commissioner positions.

Corbell, who was seeking the position of Commissioner Precinct 1, gathered 534 votes to James Meredith's 491.

Edrington, who was running against incumbent Bob Storey for Red River County Sheriff, won the

run-off with 1,637 votes to Storey's 1,311.

In Titus County's Constable 1-3-4 race, Chris Durant received 1,096 votes to win the run-off over Rex Marr's 733 votes.

Commissioner Precinct 3 in Titus County found J.W. Terrell, Jr. winning that place with 525 votes over Johnny Mack Brown's 432 votes.

There will be a Community Park Project Committee meeting Tuesday, April 21 at 7 p.m. at City Hall. All park committee members are urged to attend.

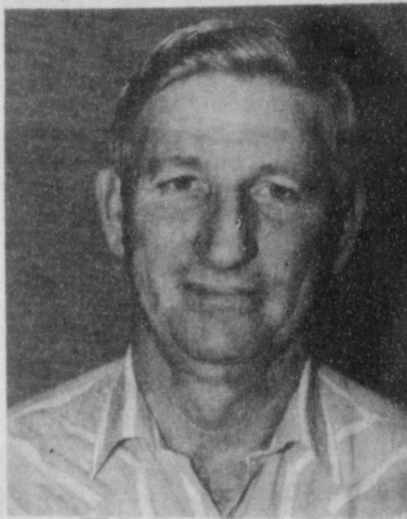

this time. Tickets are \$.50 each and the winners of the cakes will be announced at the close of the bake sale.

A general meeting was held April 13 at the school auditorium for the park project. Twenty people attended with Community Park Project President Patty Kuhl reviewing the fundraisers that have been held so far. Treasurer Judy Sloan reported that since March 3, when the Community Park Project held its first fundraiser, \$7,016.32 has been raised by members of the community. This figure includes \$344.00 raised by the bake sale held March 3; \$3,651.25 raised at the Cow Patty Splat and \$1,090.50 brought in by donations. Rivercrest Board of Trustees Makes Changes

The Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees held their regular monthly meeting Monday, April 13 at the Bogata Cafeteria. The trustees were given a tour of the campus from 6:45pm to the beginning of the meeting at 7pm.

First item on the agenda was a request regarding a change in policy limiting participation in social activities to only Rivercrest students. The board reviewed the policy after the request and voted a change in the policy. The Rivercrest juniors and seniors will now be allowed to invite dates to the Prom if approved by the high school principal.

The board accepted a three year audit contract with the accounting firm of Oakerson, Arnold and Walker of Mt. Pleasant.

In general action the board approved minutes and agreed to pay this month's bills. They also accepted the tax report and adjustments.

The board also had a discussion on

athletic equipment bids and accepted the bids as presented.

The board adopted a resolution on CED delinquent tax penalty.

Meetings set for May will be the following: May 5- for canvassing votes; and May 12- for regular May meeting at Talco school. A tour of the campus will begin at 6:45pm and the meeting will start at 7:30 pm.

A motion was made to take bids for resurfacing of the Rivercrest track.

Supt. Freddy Wade reported a loss of State revenue for this current year of \$99,000 due to the loss of enrollment due to the state proration formula.

The resignation of Sandra Southem, teachers aide at Talco, was accepted. The board interviewed and hired Roy Stone as the 1992-1993 Rivercrest girls coach. Coach Stone is currently coaching at Hawkins; but he has coached previously at North Lamar and PJC.

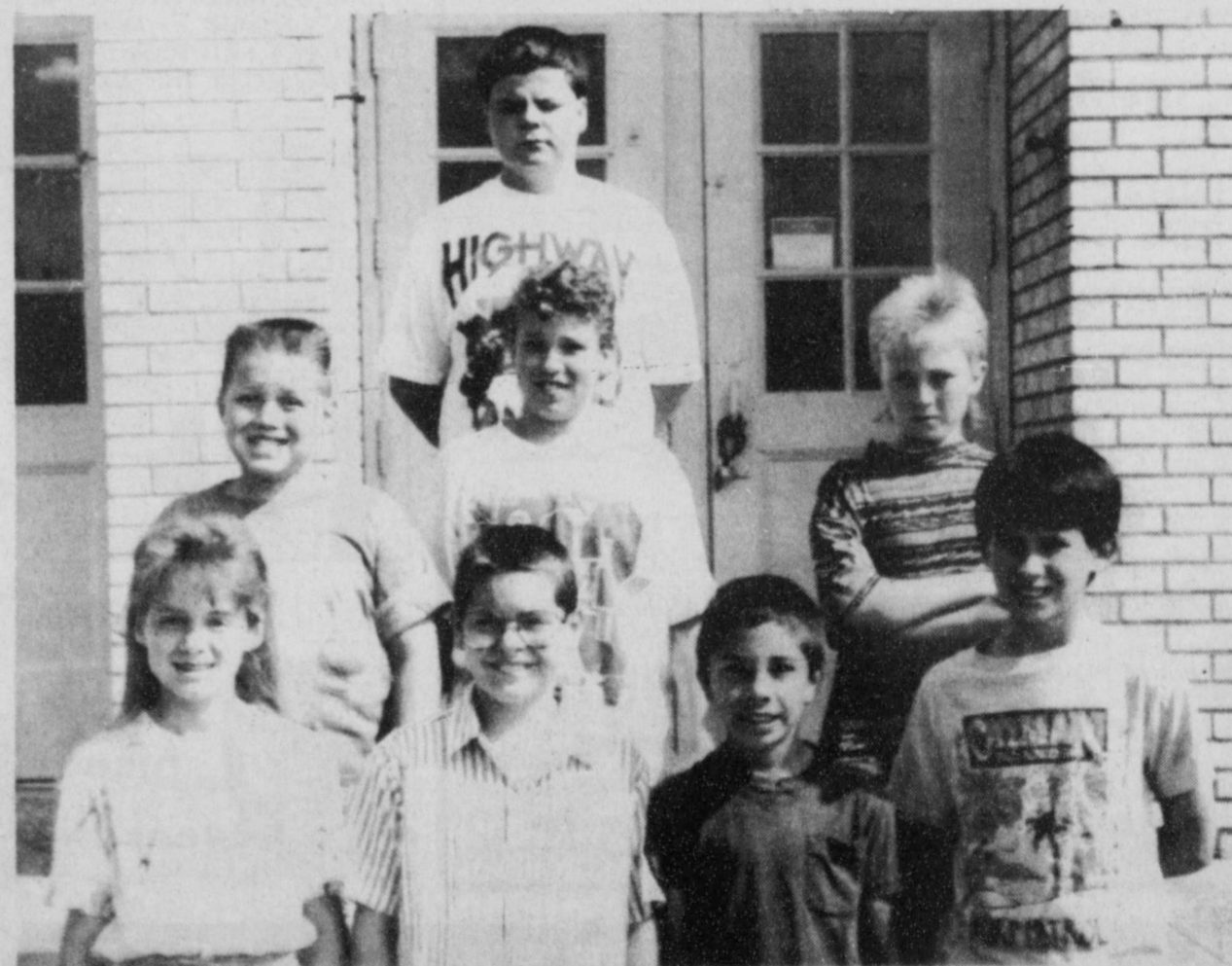

Gertru likes to cook everything, she is not partial to any one item. She doesn't use a recipe very much but she likes to experiment with foods. She also entertains with family and friends.

Fishing and camping at Pat Mayse West is their favorite spot. They prefer sand bass fishing most of all. If they are prepared correctly, this is their favorite fish to eat. She freezes between 30 and 40 loaves each fall and has her own pear tree and bakes these up and freezes them for future use.

The Cracker Snacks recipe came from a friend, Doris Lampard, of Lone Star, about three months ago. It has been a great hit with her family and she keeps them out all the time. The Chicken and Dumplings recipe was handed down from her Mom. Gertru knows her mom made them all of her life and probably many years before she was born.

Peanut Butter Cookies

1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup sugar
3/4 tsp. soda
1 egg
1 1/4 cup flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking powder
Mix and form into balls the size of a walnut. Place in pan 1 1/2" apart and press out flat with times of a fork. Bake 10-12 minutes at 375.

Apple or Pear Bread

3 1/2 cups flour
3 cups sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. cinnamon
2 tsp. soda
Mix well and add: 1 cup Crisco oil, 1 tsp. vanilla, 4 eggs, 1 cup chopped nuts and 2 cups applesauce or finely chopped pears. Grease and flour pans and bake for 1 hour or until done in preheated 350 oven. Use 6 (7 o. coconut cans) or 4 (1 lb. coffee cans). Any other cans can be used. Fill only half full in cans with batter. Set cans on cookie sheet to bake. Freezes well.

Cracker Snacks

1 pkg. dry original ranch dressing mix
1 cup vegetable oil
1 tsp. dry dill weed

Mix dressing, oil and dill weed together. Pour over crackers in zip lock plastic gallon size bag. Mix well and marinate for 6-8 hours before serving.

Chicken and Dumplings

3 leg quarters
3 quarts water
1 tsp. black pepper
1 Tbs. salt
Boil ingredients till chicken falls apart. Adjust salt and pepper to taste. Take 1 cup of broth and 1 cup of water, pour into bowl, add enough all purpose flour to make a stiff dough. Put dough on floured surface, sprinkle flour on top of dough and roll out into thin layer. Cut dough into 1" strips. Pull strips apart into 3" pieces and drop into hot chicken broth. Stir and bring to a boil, cook for 10 minutes, approximately.

Aunt Sally's Syrup Pie

3 eggs (or 6 eggs)
2 cups sugar
1 cup syrup (Karo white or dark)
1/2 cup margarine or butter
1 tsp. vanilla

For 1 pie, use 3 eggs, 6 eggs for 2-9" pies. The rest of the ingredients stay the same. Cook in raw crust until set good or knife inserted comes out clean in 325-350 oven. For added flavor, use sliced bananas or put chopped pecans on top. This recipe is over 60 years old.

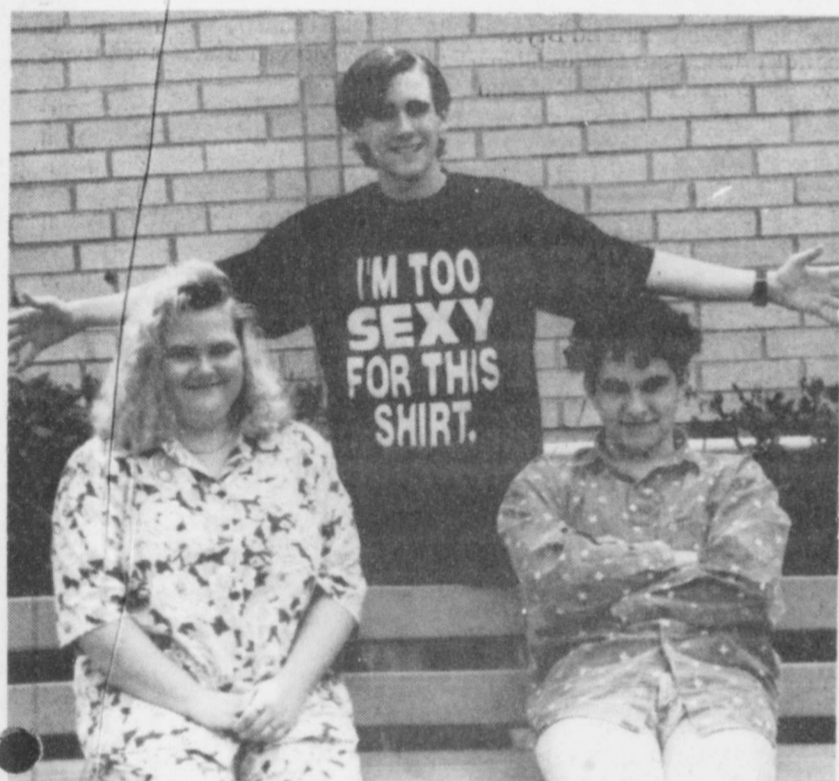

Wade White is still living out his dreams of being a successful musician. Things keep getting better for him.

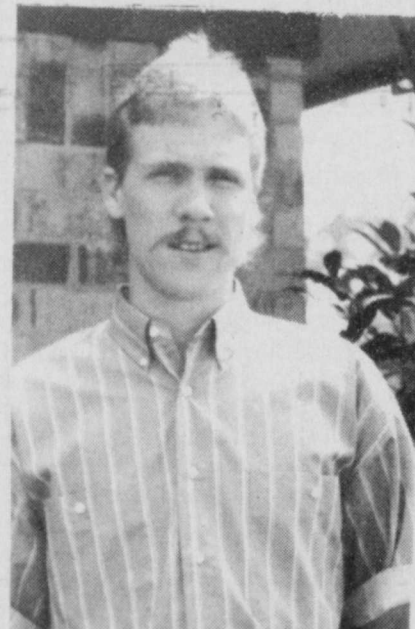

Depression

Feeling "depressed" may be a fleeting mood of a few moments to several days--what is usually referred to as "feeling blue" or "being down." This is not diagnosed as depression, medically speaking, and, in most cases, can be self-treated. Each of us knows what diversions will lift our spirits, and we usually seek that sort of distraction to dispel the temporary depressed feeling. In addition, it is natural for people who have had a recent loss, for instance, to feel grief, sadness and other symptoms of "depression" for even a longer period of time. This kind of grief reaction is also not considered a medical problem unless it persists.

Depression becomes a medical problem when it immobilizes a person, leaving him or her unable to carry on normal activities or to derive pleasure from any source.



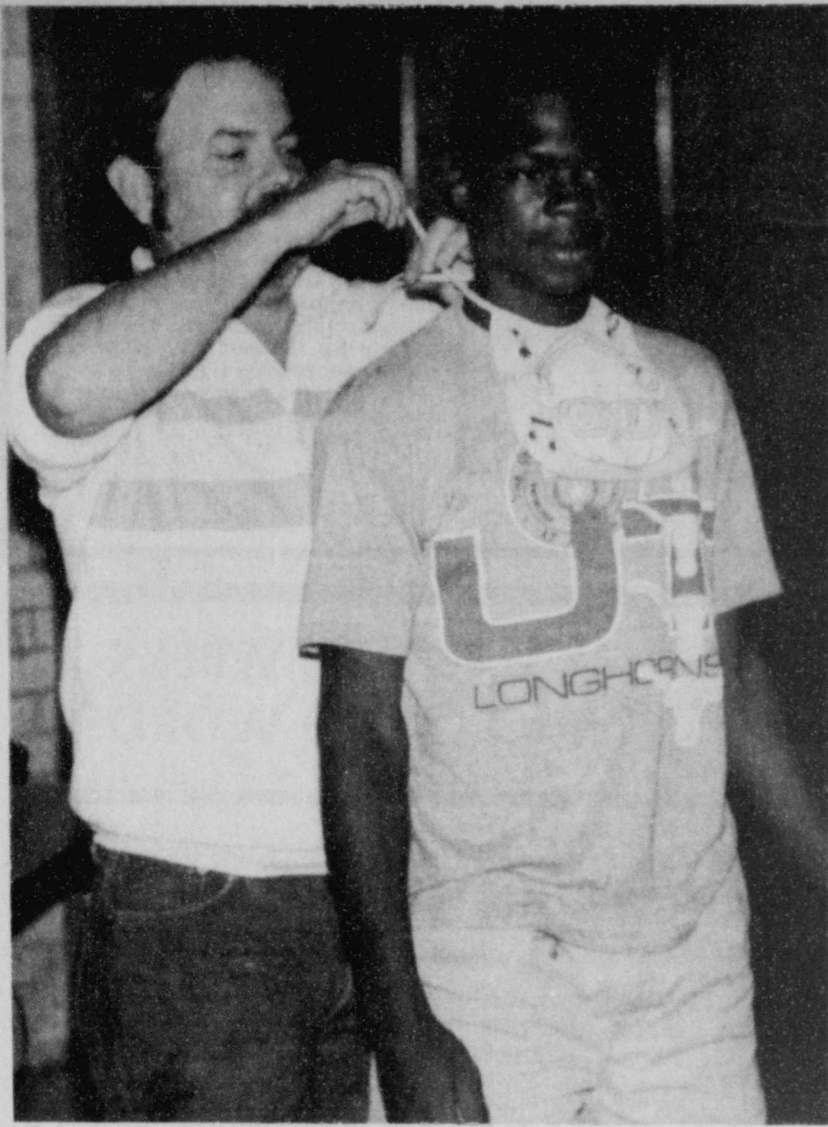
