




I have been known to flee a small room after five or ten minutes of smacking. I've changed theatre seats.



### **Baked** Onions By Thelma Warren

Choose round, squatty onions. Peel and cut into eights. First cut in halves, then quarters, then eights. Hold it carefully as you cut, do not cut all the way through. Place in baking dish close enough together to prop each one up. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour melted butter or margarine over onions. Add two cups water. Bake at 350 until tender. The size of onions will determine baking time. Fresh onions from garden are very good. Squash Enchiladas

## **Spinal Screening For** Bogata Students Is May 6

The Legislature passed a law in tection.

1985 that requires all sixth and ninth graders to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early de-

Spinal screening for Bogata Elementary School, sixth graders, has been scheduled for Wednesday, May

Children will be screened for two types of deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is an exaggerated rounding of the spine. Progression of these two conditions can often be arrestd if detected early.




## **Red River Haven** Has New Social Worker


