

Pudding Pecan Pie 1 box (3.4 oz.) vanilla or butterscotch instant or reg. pudding and pie filling

1 cup light corn syrup
3/4 cup evaporated milk
1 egg slightly beaten
1 cup shopped pecans or walnuts
1 unbaked 9" pie shell
Probate over to 375 Blend pud

Preheat oven to 375. Blend pudding mix, corn syrup in a medium sized bowl, using electric mixer on low speed. Gradually add ev aporated milk and egg, beating until well blended. Stir in pecans. Pour mixture into pie shell and bake for about 40 minutes or until top is firm and just beginning to crack. Remove from oven and cool at least 3 to 4 hours before serving.

Ginger Crinkle Cookies
2/3 cup vegetable oil 1 cup sugar 1/4 cup molasses cups all purpose flour 2 tsp. baking soda l tsp. ground cinnamon 1 tsp. ground ginger 1/2 cup sugar Combine oil and 1 cup sugar in a

large mixing bowl. Add egg and beat well. Stir in molasses. Combine flour, salt, soda, cinnamon and ginger, add to molasses mixture, stirring well. Roll dough into 1" balls, roll each ball in remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Place balls 2" apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 6 minutes. Remove to wire rak to cool, yields about 4 dozen.

Purple flowers grew in the crannies of the massive stone walls as we emerged into a gray but rainless day.


