## Talco Pastor Returns From Austria, Poland

Bro. David Webb, pastor of First Baptist Church of Talco and his wife, Sheila, returned on May 25 from a "Vision Trip" to Vienna, Austria and Poland.

A purpose of the trip was to get acquainted with the personnel, organizational structure and operation of Bible Education by Extension. A second purpose was to observe the culture and living conditions in Poland in order to make a decision about moving there to work as a facilitator/coordinator with BEE.

The Webb's reported they felt they could adjust to the Polish culture and austere living conditions. However, the necessity of learning the Polish language must be given serious consideration before a decision about moving there can be made. Their travels in Poland included visits to the cities of Wroclaw, Karawice and Krakow. They said the countryside was beautiful and scenic but the cities were drab and dirty, but the people were friendly, hospitable and anxious to render assistance and help.

On their return, the Webbs stopped in London, England to visit Sheila's

relatives. The Londoners were experiencing dry conditions and temperatures in the 80's, which they considered to be a heat wave, but the Texas visitors thought the weather was rather pleasant.

When they returned on Memorial Day to D-FW, they were greeted by James and Celcia Clark. They were surprised by a warm "Welcome Home" reception and supper prepared by members of the First Baptist Church when they arrived in Talco. The homecoming celebrations were climaxed by a special service and lunch in the fellowship hall last Sunday with 100 attending.

Brother and Sister Webb indicated that the most significant benefit of their trip was a new appreciation for life in America caused by their observation of the depressed living conditions and high inflation rate in Poland and the high taxes and exorbitant cost of living in Austria and England. They said "A trip abroad inspires a sincere attitude of thanksgiving for God's blessings on our great country".

Dismissal prayer was by Marvie Sue Goates.

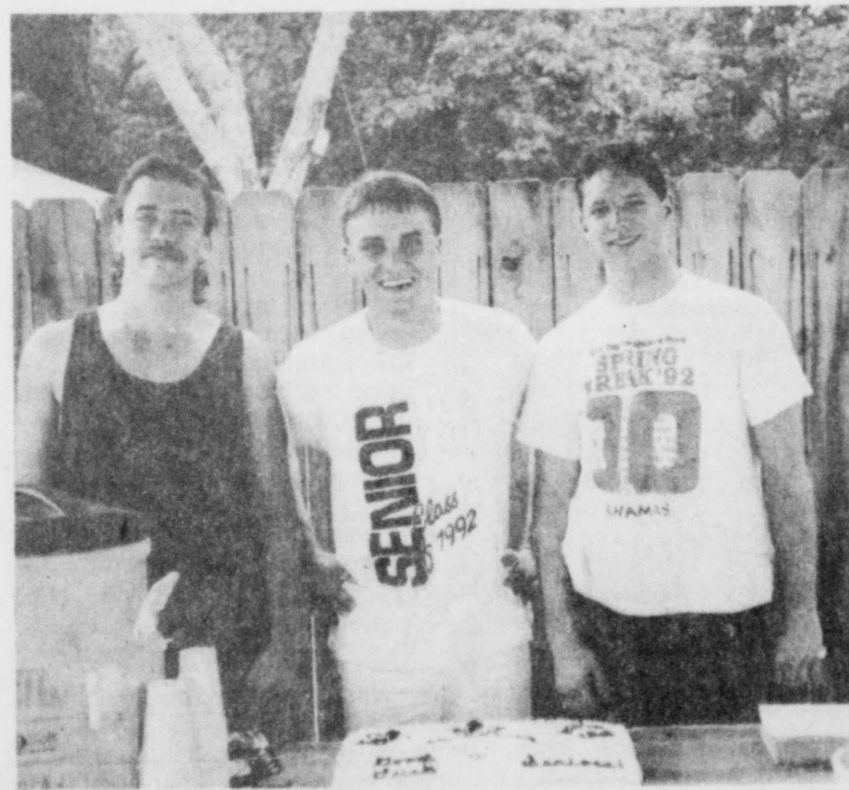
## All-Star Street Bible School Scheduled At FBC, Talco

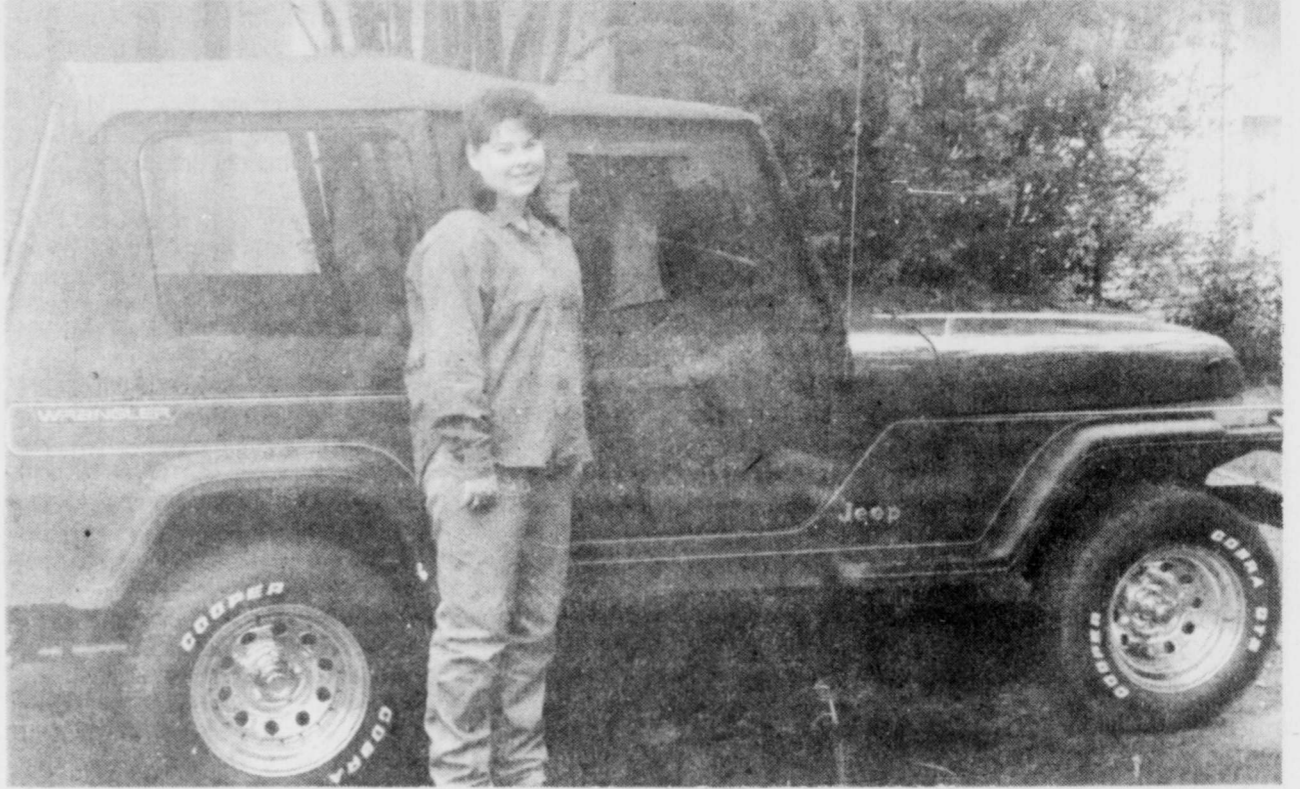

## Journey To Scotland Lit By Landscape

Once again we have been on our yearly vacation trek. Once more we feel a little embarrassed to print an account of our journey, but folks tell us they do enjoy them. If you don't care about them...just pass this story by!

After our long journey overseas and our trip to Leeds Castle all of our little band opted to sleep late the next morning. That meant we were up by 8, still confused by the time changes.

We ate a continental breakfast (rolls, yogurt and croissants) while Thomas and Richard fussed about not having bacon and eggs. Not being a "breakfast" person, I didn't mind at all.

We took a cab in a light rain over to Baker Street where we went to the Sherlock Holmes Museum.

In spite of the fact that the famous detective never really existed, he still receives over 50 letters a week!

The 221b Baker Street address is complete down to the tiniest detail, including having 17 steps up to Holmes' sitting room and tiny bedroom.

Gaslight, candles, worn velvet chairs welcomed us in, and the coal fire burning on the grate felt good after the chill rain outside.

Books, well worn, a violin, knick knacks and letters created the sense that the world's formest sleuth MUST have existed!

Upstairs were Dr. Watson's rooms, and above that a little museum area that housed a collection of absolutely fascinating, and often hilarious letters.

Fans, children, even serious pleas for help made fascinating reading. One 8 year old boy wrote that he feared for Mr. Holmes' safety since he KNEW Dr. Moriarity was on his bus he took to school every day. He said he was disguised as an old age pensioner...but it must be him because he was so hateful to children!

Every letter is responded to, and a full time secretary is employed to write people. The official line is that Holmes is retired to the country and is no longer taking cases!

We took another one of the boxy black taxi cabs through London's narrow streets to the Frames Rickards tour station. The cabs aren't the cheapest way to get around London, but they efficient, comfortable and talking with the knowledgeable cabbies is a treat.

Arriving early we wandered around until we found a pub serving lunch. The pub seems to be the only reason-

able place to get a lunch in London, which is getting very expensive.

We climbed steep steps up to the dining area, which looked as if it came from a movie set. Aged oak fire places, green glass shaded lamps and victorian pictures gave the big room a cozy feeling.

Richard, Helen and Thomas had Gannon steak (ham ) with chips (fried potatoes) and I had steak pie, served with cabbage and brown gravy. You may notice I said steak pie...not the famous steak & kidney pie. Once was quite enough for that particular delicacy!

Thomas and I were very put out with the guide that took us around for our half day tour of London.

London, with about 15 million people, is huge, busy and not a little disconcerting to the newcomer.

We still know of its beauties and glorious monuments from the past.

Richard and Helen, as newcomers, were not treated to a glimpse of the city's best side. Inside, John the guide harried and rushed, made fun of people and was generally rude and unacceptable.

St. Paul's -usually so awe-inspiring, became a blur of rush, rush rush.

The tower of London was little better. The crown jewels, however, put on their usual breath-taking display as the light sparkled from diamonds, rubies, emeralds, pearls and gold in profusion.

Other than that, most of our time had to be spent rushing after our umbrella-waving guide.

The exchange rate this trip was horrible. It now takes about \$1.90 to equal a British pound.

Back at the hotel we discovered hoards of red and white clad young men running down the sidewalks, yelling strange slogans to one another. Some had obviously been over-indulging in drink.

We inquired what was going on and learned that the Rugby stadium was only half a block away from our hotel. These crazed people were heading for a major rugby match.

We didn't linger long over dinner that night, because we had a 4:45 a.m. wake up call so that we could join our tour and head for Scotland.

The drive up to Edinburgh (pronounced by any good Scot as Edinborough) was absolutely beautiful.

Our guide for the next 10 days was David Fleming, a charming, very funny man whom told so many tall tales it was sometimes difficult to sort the truth from fact!

Our bus driver, Frank, was excellent and funny too, so we set in, our group of 40, to drive the length of the nation.

That's still something that amazes us, as Texans...the idea that the United Kingdom consisting of England, Scotland and Wales, can be driven across in a few hours! The entire length of the nation is only a little over 600 miles long.

As we drove up the motorway we were entertained with rolling fields dotted with clouds of sheep with wisps of lambs trotting along beside them.

Golden fields of rape, a crop grown for oil, lit the landscape as far as the eye could see.

The further north we proceeded the more meandering dry stone walls crisscrossed the rolling dales, hedgerows sprang up, and ruined abbeys, towering cathedrals and Hadrians wall gave mute evidence of the Normans, Romans and Celts that sprang up centuries ago.

The shires were so lovely, we drove through Lincolnshire, Nottingham, Yorkshire and across the river Tweed.

Throughout the day we listened as David Fleming explained history, agriculture and various aspects of what we were seeing in a lovely Scots accent, rolling his Rs and referring to a "wee cuppa tea" or a particularly "bonny" view.

We made a brief stop in Jedburgh and saw a 500 year old tree. When raiders used to come down and were caught the locals would hang them from the branches of the tree by their feet and decapitate them. Then, they played a game with the heads! That was one of our first hints of the bloody history that Scotland and all the country is drenched in.

Our hotel was right on Edinburgh's famous Royal Mile, in the center of the things to see. The city is divided into two sections...the Old Town and the New Town. Of course, the new town is over 200 years old.

We popped across the road to the Royal Mile pub and restaurant for a Hot Pot meal...thick stew and vegetables with crusty bread.

Thomas, Richard and myself dressed for our evening out, in the rain.. We were scheduled to go on a Murder, Mystery and Ghost tour! Helen had decided that walking around in the narrow, dark alleys and closes of Edinburgh hearing about torture and witches simply wasn't her cup of tea. This mystery tour was a highlight of our trip, and I'll tell you about it next week!

The Country Cooking Column is coming to you this week from the dining room of Bill and Mattylu Upchurch of Milton. After spending 30 years of their 53 years together in Albuquerque, NM, they moved back to their old home town of Milton twelve years ago.

Mattylu was born in this small community just across the street from where she lives now. Bill was reared in Blossom and recalls spending lots of time in Pattonville. They are the proud parents of five children, 16 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren: Billie Goheen and three children of Arlington; Bobbie and husband Ed Hill and three children of Arkansas; Don and wife Eva and six children of New Mexico; Jim and wife Cynthia and two children of Colorado; and Leah and husband Russell Schroeder and two children of Abilene.

Bill and Mattylu attend the First Methodist Church in Deport. While in New Mexico, they owned and operated several dry cleaning businesses. They are both retired now and seem to enjoy not having any deadlines, most of all, along with alarm clocks and being free to just "piddle" around at anything and at anytime they want to.

The Frozen Salad is her grandchildren's favorite and she has made this recipe for the past twelve years. The Candied Sweet Potatoes is submitted by her sister, Mary Elaine Lawler, and they both have used it at least 25 years. This recipe is very old and their mother used to make it a lot.

If you're wondering what the Pasole recipe is a holiday Mexican dish. The package of Pasole is hard to find in our local stores, so if you can't find it you may substitute hominy for it. This does not alter the taste or flavor at all. The recipe came from a New Mexico cookbook about 30 years ago.

The Chile Enchilada recipe came from the same cookbook. She has altered the original recipe and has made it to suit their taste. She has used this recipe about 30 years ago.

The Luncheon Crab Bake recipe came from a Better Homes and Gardens book about 20 years ago. This is Bill's recipe, and Mattylu says it is delicious.

The Salsa recipe came from her daughter, Bobbi, about a year ago. The Italian Eggplant Parmigiana came from a cookbook also.

**Frozen Salad**  
(Grandma's Delicious Dessert)  
By Mattylu Upchurch

2 ctn sour cream  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 small bottle maraschino cherries and juice  
4 bananas, cut up  
1 small can crushed pineapple, drained  
1 cup chopped pecans  
1 small can coconut

Mix and freeze in quart milk carton. Slice and serve frozen, or put in oblong dish and cut in squares.

**Candied Sweet Potatoes**

Cook sweet potatoes (partially) or use large canned one. Cut lengthwise, place in buttered baking dish.  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup Karo, white  
4 tbs. butter  
pinch salt

Mix and cook until slightly thick. Pour over potatoes, cook in slow oven for 1 hour.

**Pasole**

1 1/2 lb. pork, cubed  
1 package pasole (hominy may be used)  
1 quart rich chicken broth  
1 large onion, chopped  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
salt to taste  
pepper to taste  
oregano to taste  
1 carton frozen red chili

Brown pork and simmer in small amount of water. Rinse and clean pasole. Boil pasole in water until skin pops, adding water as necessary to cover pasole. Add cooked pork, chicken broth, onion, garlic, salt, pepper, oregano and red chili. Simmer until pasole is tender. Red chili can be cooked with pasole or serv red or green chili sauce over the pasole, good both ways. Serves 6-8.

**Chile Enchiladas**

6 corn tortillas  
1/8 cup shortening  
2 cups enchilada sauce (red or green)  
1 cup Cheddar Cheese, grated  
1 onion, chopped  
2 lightly fried or poached eggs  
lettuce, coarsely chopped

Soften tortillas in hot shortening. Drain on paper towels. Stack ingredients in the following order for each serving: tortilla, sauce, cheese, onion. Repeat twice. Top off with remaining sauce and cheese. Bake for 10 minutes at 350 to melt cheese and warm through.

**Luncheon Crab Bake**

1-6 1/2 or 7 1/2 can (about 1 cup) crab meat, drained  
1 cup soft bread crumbs  
1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing  
3/4 cup milk  
6 hard boiled eggs, finely chopped  
1/3 cup chopped onions  
1/4 cup sliced stuffed green olives  
3/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup buttered soft bread crumbs

Break crab meat in chunks, remove any boney bits. Mix with next 7 ingredients. Put in greased baking dish. Top with buttered crumbs. Bake at 350 for 20-25 minutes or till hot. Makes 6 servings.

**Salsa**

1 bottle green Taco Sauce (hot)  
1 can Ro-Tel  
4 tomatoes, chopped  
1 onion, chopped  
1 cup parsley, chopped  
1 can chopped olives  
1 Tbs. cumin  
1 Tbs. oregano  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. lemon juice

Mix and serve with chips.

**Italian Eggplant Parmigiana**

1 large eggplant  
salt and pepper to taste  
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs  
2 eggs, lightly beaten  
cooking oil, preferably olive oil  
1 1/2 cups tomato sauce, heated  
1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese, sliced  
1 tsp. dried basil  
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

Wash eggplant and cut crosswise into rounds 1/4" thick. Do not peel. Season with salt and pepper. Dip into bread crumbs, dip into egg and then again into bread crumbs (more bread crumbs may be needed). Chill for 30 minutes. Heat about 1/8" of oil in skillet. Fry eggplant pieces until tender and golden on both sides. Add more oil as needed. Drain on paper towel. Line a buttered shallow baking dish with some sauce. Arrange a layer of eggplant slices over sauce. Cover with a layer of Mozzarella slices, more sauce and a sprinkling of basil and Parmesan. Repeat in layers until dish is full. Bake in preheated oven at 350 for 25-30 minutes. Serves 6.

**Top with egg and garnish with lettuce and serve immediately. Serves 2.**

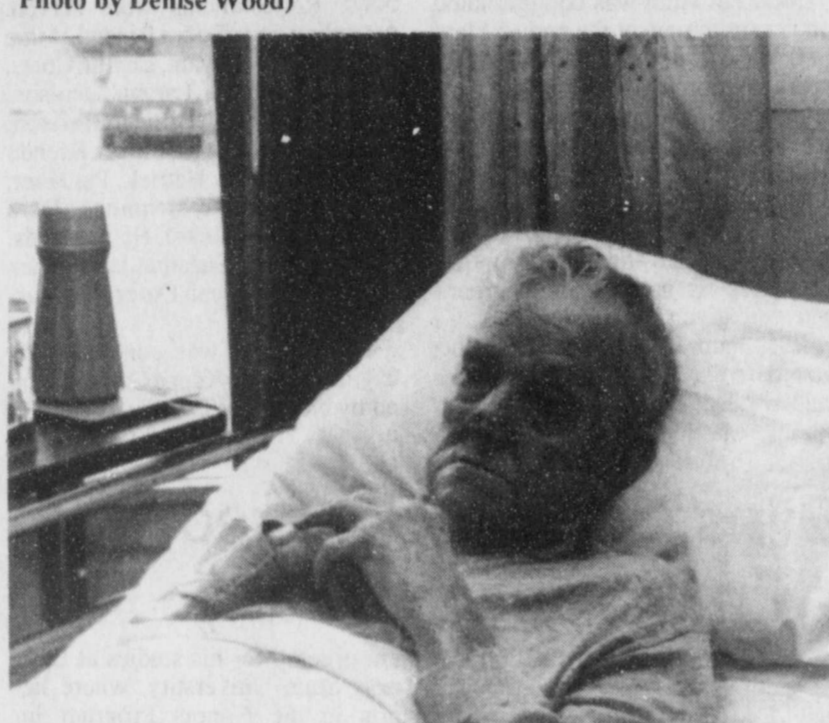

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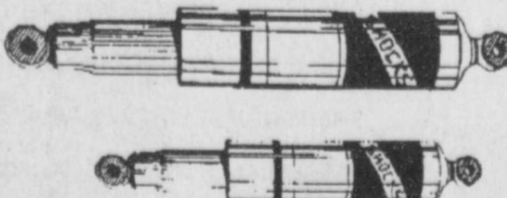

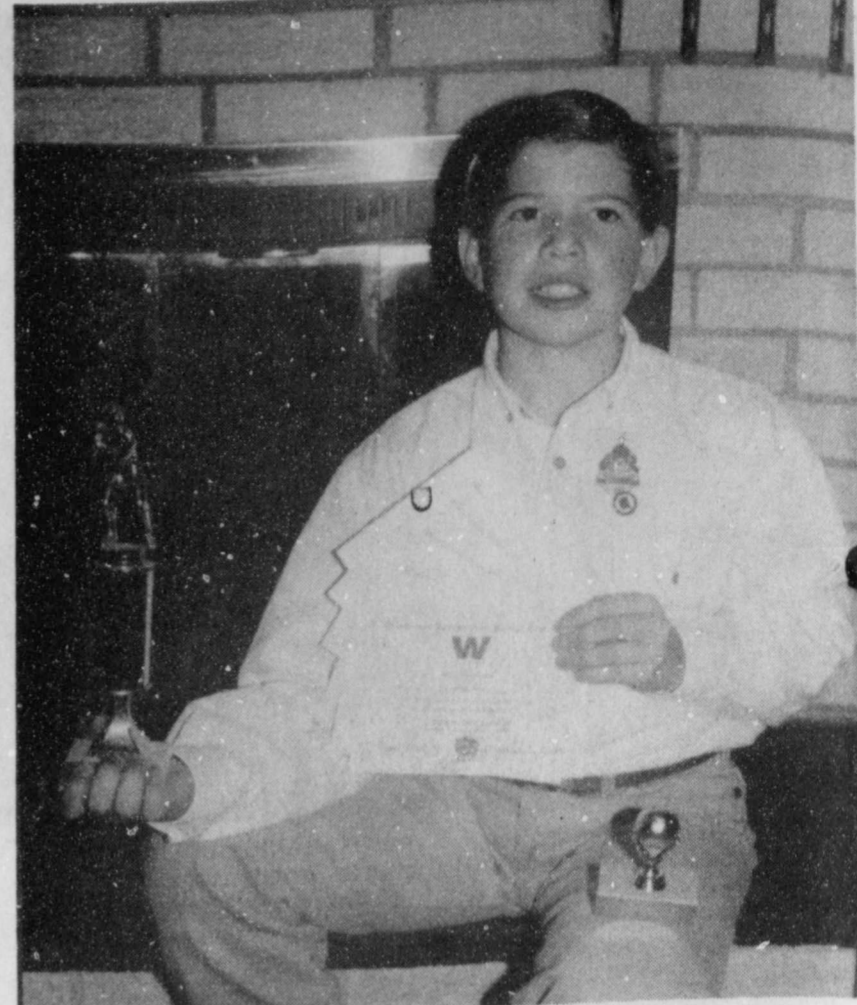

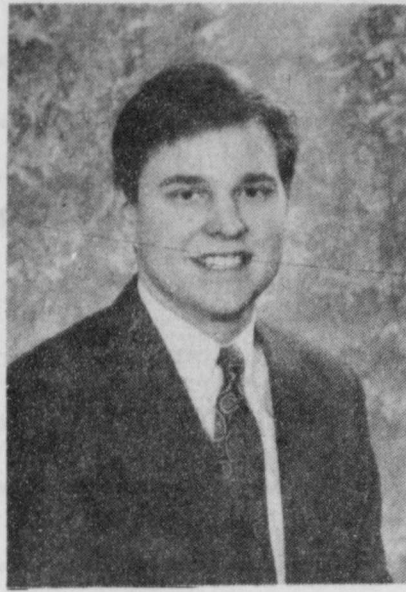
For all of the reasons above, Brad was recognized and commended by the University, the City of Ft. Worth and the Ft. Worth Star Telegram.
