

The Twelfth Annual Beta Club Convention was held at the Sheraton Hotel in Washington, D.C. on June 17-21. Their favorite exhibit when they toured the Smithsonian Institute was the Hope diamond, the world's largest, and in the National Museum of American History the favorite was the interior and exterior replica of the White House. They also visited the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, Washington Monument, Kennedy Center, Iwo Jima Statue and the Pavilion at the Old Post Office which dates back to 1899.
