Storms Do Severe Damage

It was a dark and stormy night...again. Tuesday night, July 14 storms proved once again to be expensive and damaging. Huge trees were toppled, many doing damage to homes and vehicles, especially in Deport.

A huge thunderstorm line moved into the area, with the first storm hitting in Paris about 7 or 7:30 p.m. Large hail did most of the damage there. That line of storms continued moving eastward down Red River. Blossom sustained small hail and lost some large tree limbs. Some street flooding was reported.

Around an hour later another storm built over Deport. This storm did it's worst damage on Depot street. It took down two trees in the front yard of the

Ronald Nichols'. When the trees fell they sheared off a gas meter and took down a light pole. They also totalled the Nichols' pickup and car.

Deport Volunteer Fire Department had to evacuate the area as natural gas and live electric lines provided the potential for fire or explosion. Between 15 and 20 people left the area until gas a power could be restored to a safe state.

At the Denman home on Pecan street in Deport Bessie Denman's car was destroyed as a large tree toppled directly onto it.

On North Jeffus Street a big limb blocked the road for a while, and two smaller trees narrowly missed the home of the Randy Talley's. At Grant park another big tree was blown

down. Lightning struck and exploded a pecan tree on Fourth Street, and numerous smaller trees and limbs were ripped loose.

Lightning did damage to several homes, burning out televisions and appliances. Along with the wind and rain was mothball sized hail which covered the ground briefly.

The storm moved eastward, tearing small limbs and providing more lightning damage as it approached Bogata and went on through Talco. Neither town suffered as heavy damage as where the storm first struck, however.

Another thunderstorm of much milder proportions went through the area Wednesday morning. The forecast? More of the same!

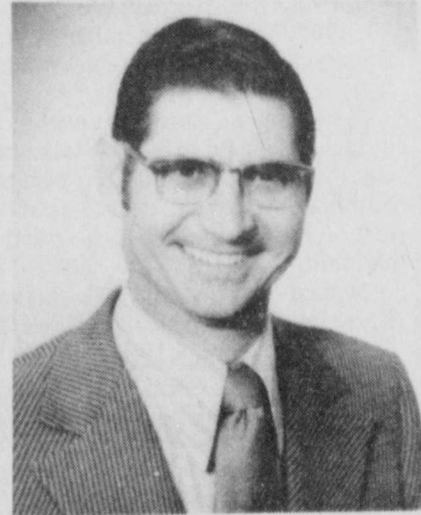

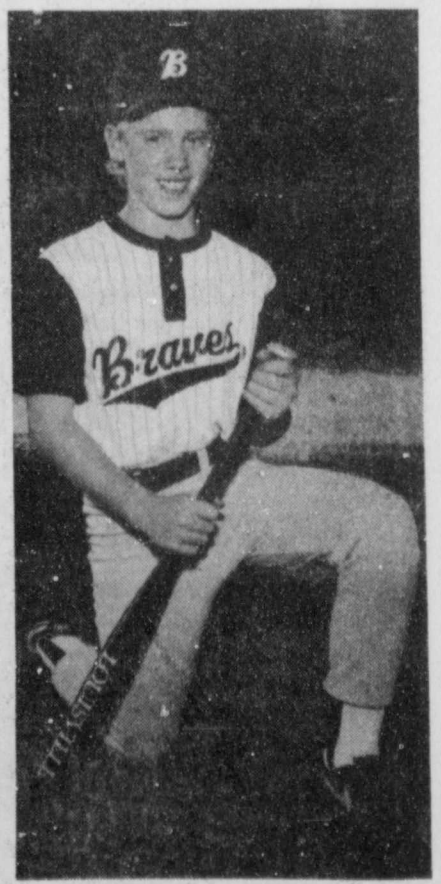

Lois Smith Dies July 9

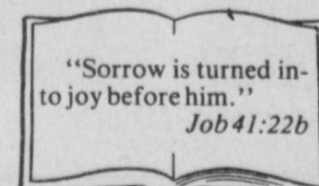
Lois Smith, 88, of Bogata died Thursday, July 9 in Red River Haven Nursing Home.

On Friday, July 10th, Ricky and

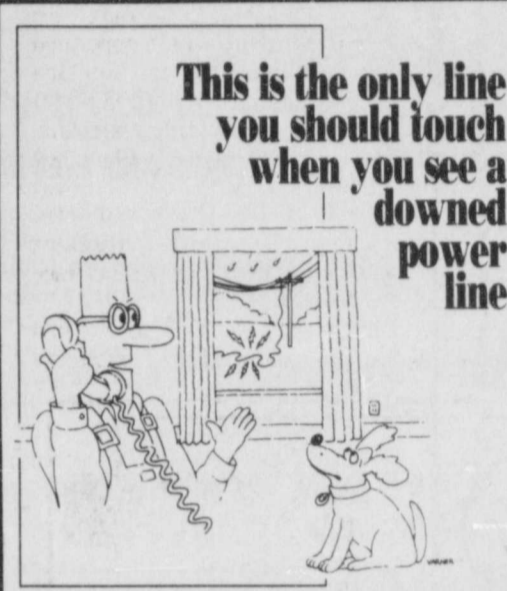
