Chuck will show various casting techniques as well as presentations of different types of lures and their ac-tions in water. You'll enjoy the reaction of the fish to the lures and learn how to be more effective in the presentation of your lures.

The 30 minute presentation and demonstrations are presented every two hours each day of the fair for your education and enjoyment. You can also just stand and watch the fish for hours as they act just like they do in your favorite lake!
