She was also preceded in death by a son, Bobby Ray Nichols, October 16, 1976.

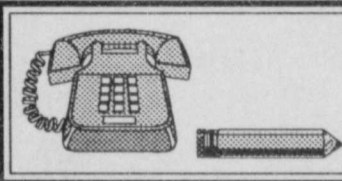
She was a member of Faith Baptist Church in Deport.

Any-Way Burritos By Karen Carpenter

8-8 or 10" flour tortillas
1 1/2 oz. desired ground meat (or option below)

1/2 cup chopped onion
1 clove garlic, minced
4 tsp. all purpose flour
desired vegetable (choose one option)

1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
1-7 1/2 oz. can tomatoes (cut up) or

1-8 oz. can stewed tomatoes
desired season (choose 1 option)
1 cup shredded desired cheese (choose 1 option)

Stack tortillas; wrap in foil. Heat in 350 oven for 10 minutes to soften.

For filling, in a large skillet, cook desired meat, onion and garlic until meat is brown. Drain fat. Stir in flour. Stir in desired vegetable, tomato sauce, tomatoes and desired seasoning. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly and vegetables are tender.

Spoon about 1/3 cup of the filling onto each tortilla just below the center. Top each with 2 tablespoons of desired cheese. Fold bottom edges up and over, just to cover the filling. Fold in opposite sides, just till they meet. Roll up tortillas from bottom. Fry, bake or micro-cook rolls as directed. (I like to bake mine). Serves 4.

To Fry: Secure rolls with toothpicks. In heavy skillet or saucapan, heat about 1" cooking oil to 365 degrees. Fry filled rolls, 2 or 3 at a time, for 1-2 minutes on each side or till crisp and golden brown. Drain on paper towels.

To Bake: Place rolls, seam side down, on ungreased baking sheet. Bake uncovered in 375 degree oven for 15-25 minutes or till golden and hot.

To Micro-Cook: Place 4 rolls on

microwave-safe plate. Cover with paper towels. Micro-cook on 100% power 1-2 minutes or till hot (low wattage oven: 2-3 minutes) Repeat with remaining rolls. If desired, serve rolls with shredded lettuce, to pwith salsa and sour cream.

Cheese: Mozzarella, American, Cheddar or Monterey Jack with jalapeno peppers.

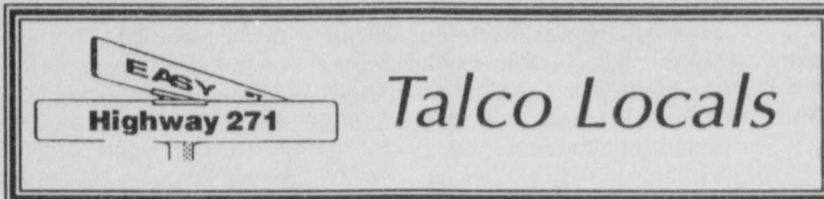

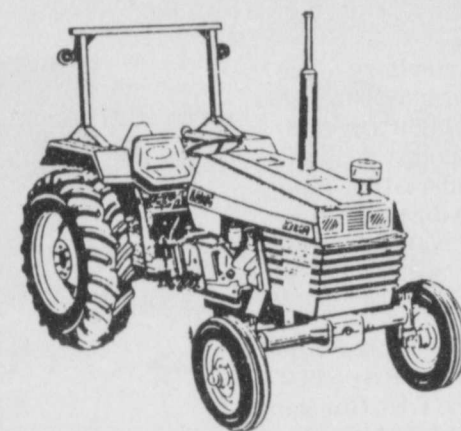
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Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

Clinic hours are from 8 to 4, Monday through Friday.

Future clinic dates will be announced. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guide-

lines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

Keeping Healthy

Sprains and Strains of Raking Autumn Leaves

Yardowners, beware: Raking leaves may be hazardous to your health.

Stooping, bending and stretching can punish your back, shoulders, neck and arms with painful muscular strains and sprains.

To avoid injury, perform these stretching exercises for at least one week before hitting the lawn:

—Side-to-Side Rotations: Standing with your hands on your hips, turn as far as possible to the left, holding the position five seconds, then turn to the right and hold that position five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

—Overhead Stretches: Standing with your feet slightly apart, stretch both arms over your head. Hold five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

—Front-and-Back Arm Stretches: Standing, with a straight back and arms at shoulder height, stretch arms straight out in front of your body and hold five seconds. Repeat 10 times. Holding arms at a comfortable height, swing straight arms behind body until shoulder blades touch, holding five seconds. Repeat 10 times.



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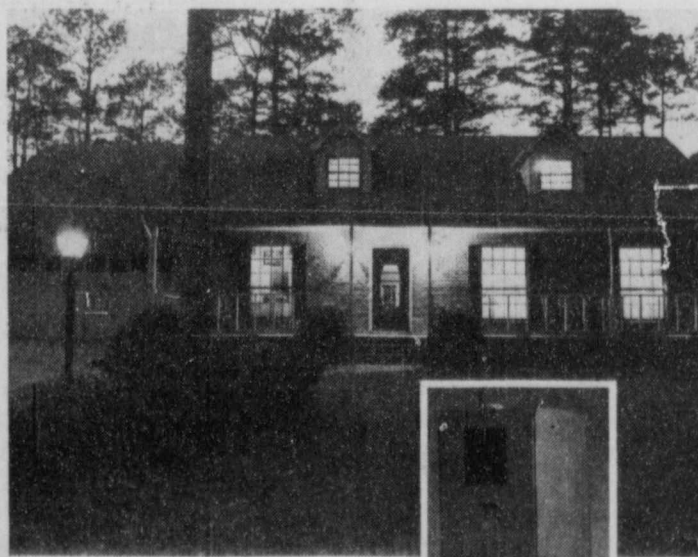

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Hearing Concludes, Brooks Attorney Says OCC Allegations Untrue

The public hearing concerning Preston J. Brooks, former president of the First National Bank of Deport concluded Wednesday September 23 with Administrative Law Judge Arthur Shipe of Washington, D.C. taking under advisement information he heard during the two day hearing in Dallas.

The hearing was held relating to a proposed civil penalty and permanent removal from the banking business against Preston J. Brooks, former president of the First National Bank of Deport.

The final judgement on this issue may take months, however Dean Deuback of the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency said that the judge will render a recommended decision in the matter, and the Comptroller of the Currency will make the final judgement.

Brooks was dismissed by the board of directors of the First National Bank of Deport in Nov. 1990, where he served as chairman of the board in addition to holding the office of bank president.

He is accused of violating banking laws and regulations and of having engaged in unsafe and unsound banking practices.

The OCC (Office of Comptroller of the Currency) alleges that Brooks on four different occasions manipulated bank-controlled accounts for the benefit of members of his family and that the bank's board or loan committee had not given prior approval to such activities.

He is also accused of causing the bank to pay an illegal dividend to the bank's holding company in 1989, of which he was the principal shareholder.

He also is accused of concealing the actions from bank examiners and causing the bank to pay the expenses of his real estate agency.

A press release sent to this newspaper by Brooks' attorney Michael D. Mosher, denies these allegations.

Mosher's release states that "When the OCC made its press release it knew that the implication carried by its press release was completely false and deliberately intended to slander

Preston Brooks". Mosher contends that the testimony at that hearing demonstrated what OCC already knew, that on Nov. 8, 1989, Preston Brooks' brother, Edward Brooks, had \$4,000 in his checking account in the First National Bank of Deport.

Edward Brooks on that day directed the bank to wire \$300 from his account to his account in the bank in Austin, Texas, and also directed the bank to wire \$700 to his wife's account in Austin.

Mosher says that "OCC knew, because it had all the documents and the deposition of Edward Brooks, that Edward Brooks made the wire transfer of his own money..."

Mosher's press release states that OCC knew the wire transfers to Brooks' sister-in-law and brother were their own money made from their own bank account to their own bank accounts.

The press release also says that the \$18,150.00 wire transfer made from the bank to Preston Brooks' mother, made October 31, 1989 represented a loan to Preston Brooks to repay money owed to his mother., and that again, OCC had the documents and knew this. Mosher says that "the minutes of the board of directors meeting show that the loan was unanimously approved on October 31, 1989, and that the bank had personal financial statements on Preston Brooks and the title to his property pledged as collateral, whose value exceeded by thousands of dollars the amount of the loan."

Mosher also says that OCC admitted that all of the facts stated above were true during cross-examination during the public hearing.

"Why the OCC chose to publish the false and defamatory account it cause the press in Paris and Deport to publish we have no idea." Mosher's press release states.

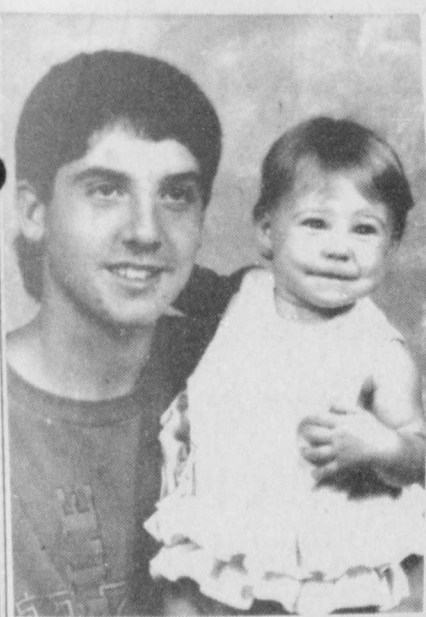

Oxford Student Visits Locally Before Returning To Continue Masters Work

Ward Eaton Jones spends some of each summer visiting with his grandparents, Lindsey and Ina Ward of Bogata. Ward is twenty-five years old and went from high school in Austin to the University of California in Berkeley. When asked why such a big step he said he wanted a new experience.

The academic record of this young scholar is quite impressive. His first bachelor's degree is in Neurobiology and philosophy and graduated in the top one percent of his class and with honors. He received High Honors and a departmental citation in philosophy.

While living and studying in California Ward worked with disadvantaged children. This volunteer work gave these children an opportunity to experience many of the things that advantaged children take for granted.

While an undergraduate at Berkeley, he accepted an honors program offer to spend his junior year in Lampeter, Wales. He attended St. David a branch of the University of Wales. It is set in the rolling, green hills of the Welsh countryside where there are more sheep than people. The population of Lampeter was about 1500 and there

were 700 students studying there. Returning to California he finished his degree at Berkeley.

In August Ward returned to Oxford, England to continue his studies for a Master's degree in philosophy. Oxford was a Saxon settlement made near the junction of the rivers Thames and Cherwell. The earliest written reference to Oxford is in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle in AD 912. Legend names Saxon Princess Frideswide as the foundress approximately 727 B.C. The Normans built a castle at Oxford and the city continued to develop, but how, why or by whom the University was started is still a matter for debate.

In these ancient halls where for centuries scholars have searched for the truth you will today find Ward Eaton Jones, student of philosophy, from Austin, Texas. When his studies are finished at Oxford he plans to return to the United States and work toward a doctorate and teach on University level.

Hopes and prayers are that they will be able to remain with the church many more years.

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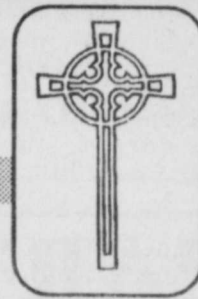
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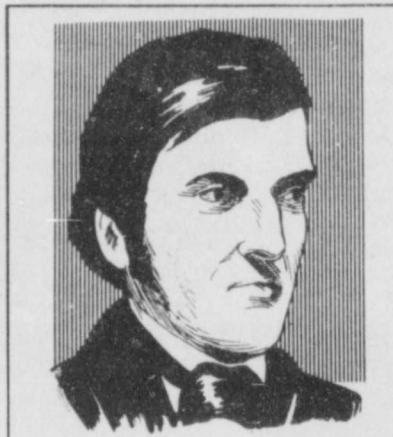

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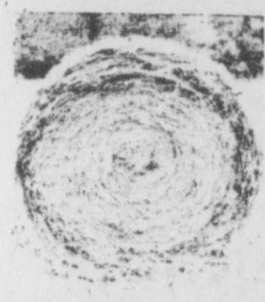
