Grace Pauline Crowston was born in a small rural community in Northern Franklin County called Hagansport. She attended grades 1-10 at Hagansport and Grades 11-12 at nearby Mt. Vernon school. Grace married James Hearron in 1950.

They have two children, Linda and James Carl. Grace and James also have two grandchildren, Steven and Susan. Grace's love and support of her family shines through each member.

Grace began her career with the Post Office Department on April 1, 1966 as a parttime clerk at the Talco Post Office. On August 7, 1982, she was appointed Postmaster at Talco.

Grace's loyalty to her job and her community almost overwhelms her at times, but her dedication always carries her through.

Her postal service involvement has included not only serving her daily customers, but also being an active member of the Red River Valley QWL-EI Workteam. She attended meetings on a regular basis on her own time. She has had a major part in

the success of the projects the workteam has accomplished. She is a member of NAPUS League, Leadership Sharing, and the budget committee, along with serving on numerous committees at every convention she attends, she started the Benjamin Franklin Stamp Club, taught bar code classes, trained new postmasters, completed the Accident Investigation Seminar and presented the U.S.P.S. Community Outreach film and speech. She has also accumulated nearly 1300 hours of sick leave!

Her community involvement consists of being organist at her church, secretary-treasurer of her church's womens group and secretary-treasurer of the Talco Community Park Construction Committee.

She has been trained in CPR and sign language. Grace has spent many hours helping the handicapped and collecting clothing and food items for the needy. A blood pressure cuff has been available at the post office and many customers have taken advantage of this special service.

The Talco Post Office has always

entered the Talco Christmas Parade. Several years there has been an interesting entry "The jolly old elf in the red suit, riding on the fire truck was none other than Grace! If you think you have had a day, try doing your regular duties at the post office than having a hundred or so little bundles of joy climb in your lap and pull at your beard. But Grace took off the red cap and white beard and lived up to her favorite motto "service with a smile".

She is a special lady, to the Quality Work of Life Employee Involvement Workteam, the Talco Post Office Employees, her customer, local law enforcement, her fellow postal friends, and most of all her family.

The Red River Valley QWL-EI is proud to honor Grace P. Hearron as candidate for recognition of excellence.

Grace retired on October 2, 1992.

To the right of the stove is a butcher's table with an assortment of useful objects.

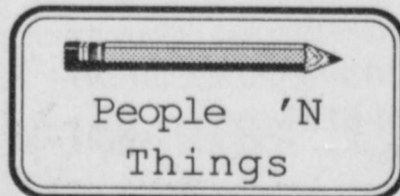
Near the front entrance is a child's desk and an antique radio.

As a long time resident of Talco I say "Thanks to Mr. Claude Lindsey and Ms. Joyce Stinson for a great job!"

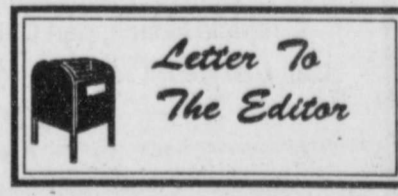

Emergency Farm Loans Are Available

Low interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers in eight East Texas counties that were declared federal disaster areas due to excessive rain, and late freezing which occurred between April and June 22.

In making the declaration, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan named Morris County a primary disaster area.

In addition Bowie, Camp, Cass, Marion, Red River, Titus, and Upshure counties were declared contiguous disaster areas.

These declarations allow family-size operators in both primary and contiguous areas to apply for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

Each loan application will be considered on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other requirements.

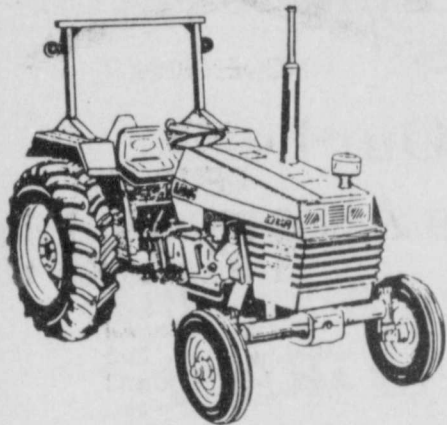

Local Missionaries Go To Romania

Drue and Wayne Huffman are by now settling into their new challenging permanent missionary calling. They are in Romania and are the first missionaries from The Assembly of God Church to be assigned a permanent location in missionary service and are very excited about the longevity of their assignment. They will be working with orphans who would otherwise have little chance of growing into adulthood since the country does not have the ability to meet the needs of these children.

The present conditions are such in these orphanages that CNN referred to them as extermination camps since many of the occupants were simply allowed to die when they were sick or otherwise in need.

It is estimated that there are 120,000 orphans in Romania and thus a great need for the work that Wayne and Drue have undertaken. They are working with the Mission of Mercy which is owned by a company in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Mission

of Mercy is helping to meet the physical and spiritual needs of hurting people in poverty-stricken areas of the world. Through emergency and support roles, people receive food, education, medical aid and hope.

This help is welcomed by the Romanian government as it does not have the resources to do the job. The Huffmans will be establishing a board of advisors from among doctors and other professionals that will help to re-organize these orphanages. Any evangelical group that is interested is welcomed and encouraged to help in this project.

It seems a wonderfully rewarding experience for these dedicated individuals who plan to take these orphanages and turn them into places where children can learn what love is.

This enormous undertaking seemed overwhelming but as these two spoke of their plans and their faith and one watched their faces it didn't seem as impossible as it had at first.

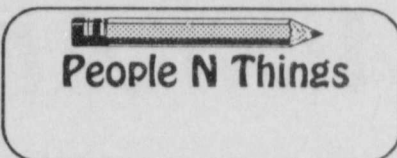

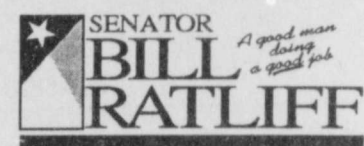
